Steers rope Cowboys

The Farwell Steers are now 1-1 on the season after a 16-13 defeat of the Plains Cowboys at home on Friday.

The game opened with Zac Stancell, tackling the kick returner, having a QB sack (with Lincoln Devault) and making a tackle. Plains went for it on 4th and 11 at midfield and failed.

Farwell again used their no-huddle, shotgun offense with QB Landry Actkinson passes filling the air throughout the game.

Danny Brown caught a 10-yard pass, and ran for 11 more. But a penalty stopped the drive and Plains took over at its 30. Trevor Owen had a tackle for a 3-yard loss. Bo Mitchell had a good tackle, and Brody Grimes and Stancell had a QB pressure. Plains punted.

Farwell was halted and Johnathan Edwards boomed a 61-yard punt to the Plains 1. But the Cowboys went on a 99-yard scoring drive, ending in a 9-yard TD pass at 10:00 of the 2nd quarter. The kick made it 7-0.

Farwell was held and punted. Taylor Mesman had a good tackle of the

punt returner at the Plains 39. Stancell had a tackle and Mitchell broke up a pass.

Now the Steers offense rolled. A short pass to Mitchell gained 23 yards due to his fine run. A pitch to Brown tained 13 more. Edwards caught a short pass, broke tackles and ran for 28 more.

A 5-yard TD pass to Austin Wright at 6:19 put Farwell on the board. For the extra point, there was a bad snap, but Edwards, the kicker, picked up the ball and plowed into paydirt for 2 points and an 8-7 Steers lead.

Farwell tried a successful onside kick, recovered by Brown. Farwell was intercepted. On defense, Mason Howard had a strong tackle. Then Farwell stopped Plains on 4th and inches at midfield.

On defense, Howard tackled the punt returner at the Plains 27. Caleb Christian had a good tackle.

On Farwell first play of the 2nd half, Brown ran for 65. But four incomplete passes stoppd the drive. Plains hit a long pass to midfield. Colby

Read had good pass defense and Devault had a strong tackle. But Plains scored on a 20-yard pass at 8:44. Caleb Christian broke up the extra point pass so Plains led 13-8.

For Farwell a pass to Mitchell gained 16, and Brown ran for 12. Farwell had to punt but recovered a fumble at the Plains 40. On 4th and 6, Actkinson hit Colton Christian with a long pass to the Plains 5. Then a TD pass to Wright at 4:37 put Farwell ahead 14-13 (the extra point kick was blocked).

Mitchell made a great tackle of the kick returner at the Plains 27. Read broke up a pass. Howard had a tackle for a loss. Mitchell intercepted at the Farwell 45. Actkinson hit Colton Christian for a

16-yard pass, and hit passes to Wright for 6 and 7 yards. Brown ran for 10 more as the 3rd quarter ended.

On 4th and 10, Read gained 12. Actkinson kept for 6. On 4th and 2 at the Plains 4, a pass to Brown came up a foot short.

Howard had a QB sack. Then Wright intercepted at the Plains 40. Read caught a pass for 34 yards but Farwell was halted at the Plains 11.

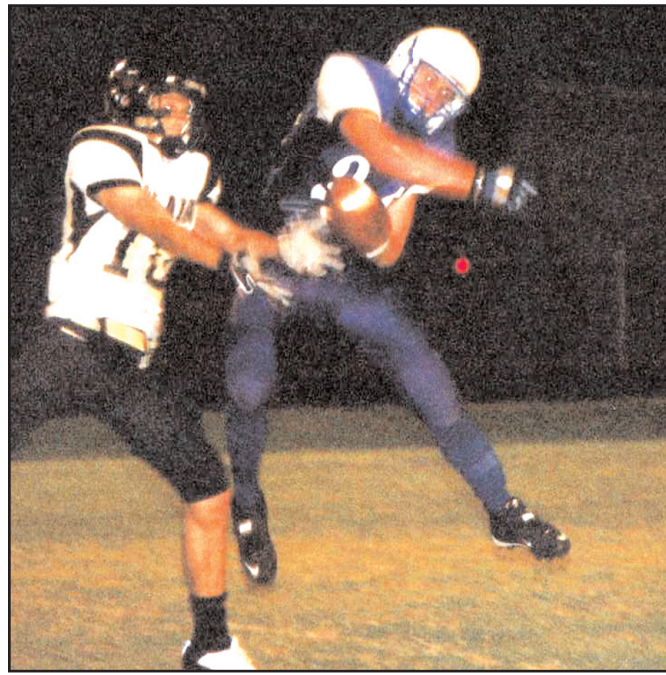
A bad snap by Plains

Defensively, Howard had a QB pressure and Julian Cuevas a big tackle. The game ended with an interception by Caleb Christian.

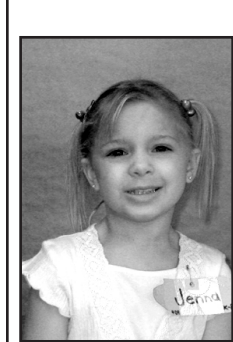

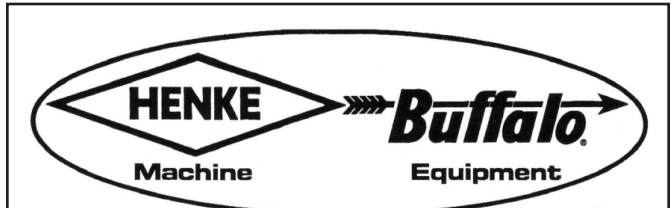

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices continue to move down towards cash prices on a weekly basis. Cash trade took place this week at \$99 as futures prices dropped from \$105 down into the \$102 range. Packers continue to buy cattle at steady money while futures prices erode. The market is technically down and projects back closer towards the \$1.00 level basis the October contract.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders have reached a major long term support level and prices have held up to this point. A break below \$109 basis the October Feeder contract would project a move down into the \$105 area. The spread between corn and live cattle prices are somewhat out of line when compared to feeder prices. Odds are good that prices will find an equilibrium over the near term.

CORN: Corn made an attempt to rally off major long term support around the \$5.50 level this week, but ended the week closing below this level. Prices will technically project back towards the \$5.04 low made just a few weeks ago. Long term trends remain down across the board and more pressure is expected as long as trends remain lower.

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices have completely retraced their incredible move up which started in August and topped just a couple of weeks ago. This level may provide some short term support, but with long term trends still pointing down, one would have to expect lower prices over the near term. A break below this support level would project another \$1-2 drop.

WHEAT: Wheat prices broke long term support levels this week which have held the market together since last May. Not only did prices trade down into the lowest levels seen this year, they also close at new lows. Prices now project another \$1.00-1.50 lower over the near term. With a higher U.S. Dollar and overall weakness throughout the commodity complex, expect trends to continue.

COTTON: Cotton prices also slipped down into the lowest levels seen this year closing extremely weak on Friday. There are several factors influencing cotton prices with the most dominate being overall weakness in the commodity complex on the whole and a weakening economy. No doubt, there will be a small crop and domestic stocks should decline, but demand must increase to support prices.

A look into the crystal ball

A small Associated Press story in the dailies recently really captured my attention.

It was about another extremist Muslim terrorist attack in Western China.

As you know, right after 9/11 I talked about expecting the War on Terrorism to last about 100 years. We are in the first decade of this lengthy conflict.

To most folks, the situation the past few years in Iraq has been called a "war." Not to me. I perceive it as a battle front.

I know that nobody talks about this war as lasting that long because it's not politically expedient. But due to the religious and cultural differences, I find no reason to change my viewpoint after its first seven years.

To many extremist Muslims, their only objective is to kill non-believers, thus gaining entry to heaven. And when I say "many," I am talking about millions of people. Unfortunately, Muslim extremism is on the rise.

And Muslim extremism continues to rise. Now to return to that attack in Western China.

We accept the fact that the American Empire is now on the decline, and that it appears China will be the world's No. 1 superpower down the road.

In trying to envision the world of 2050, for example, I see the war between the West and the Muslims to intensify. But I thought China would be wise to "sit this one out," let the folks engaged in the conflict harm each other, then step in and gather up the spoils, so to speak.

But that scenario may be way out of place because China will be one of the battle fronts of the future.

China has a large Muslim population in some of its provinces. And they are ruled by "non-believers." This is anathema to the Muslim extremists; they cannot let this go.

So the attacks will not only be on the West (i.e.,

the U.S.), but on the East (i.e., China), too.

Fascinating. Thus, one scenario for the future is to see the U.S. and China "hook up" and battle the Muslim extremists together.

It will be interesting to see how this all pans out in about 40 years.

Notice I didn't talk much about Europe during this conflict. That's because most of Europe will "go Muslim" by then.

What we are seeing is World War IV. We all know about World Wars I and II, and I consider the "Cold War" as World War III.

The Cold War wasn't that "cold." It included actual fighting in Vietnam (for the U.S.), Afghanistan (for the Soviet Union), fighting in Asia (for England, our ally) and all over Africa (for France, our ally, and Cuba, the Soviet Union's surrogate).

There were more wars than just those, but you get the picture. It was "hot."

Now, World War IV is under way, although we haven't gained that perspective yet. But take a look at this:

-- Extremist Muslims are actively fighting the West in Afghanistan and Iraq.

-- Muslims are killing all the Christians they can find in East Africa (haven't you wondered what Darfur is really about?).

-- Suicide attacks are taking place throughout North Africa, Indonesia, India, the Philippines and now China.

-- England has suffered terrorist attacks, as has Italy and other European nations.

Thus far, only Latin America and Australia have been left out of this struggle, presumably due to the small Muslim populations in those areas.

So why don't our leaders understand the full consequences of what is happening on the world stage?

Because it would be politically incorrect.

Like I said, fascinating....

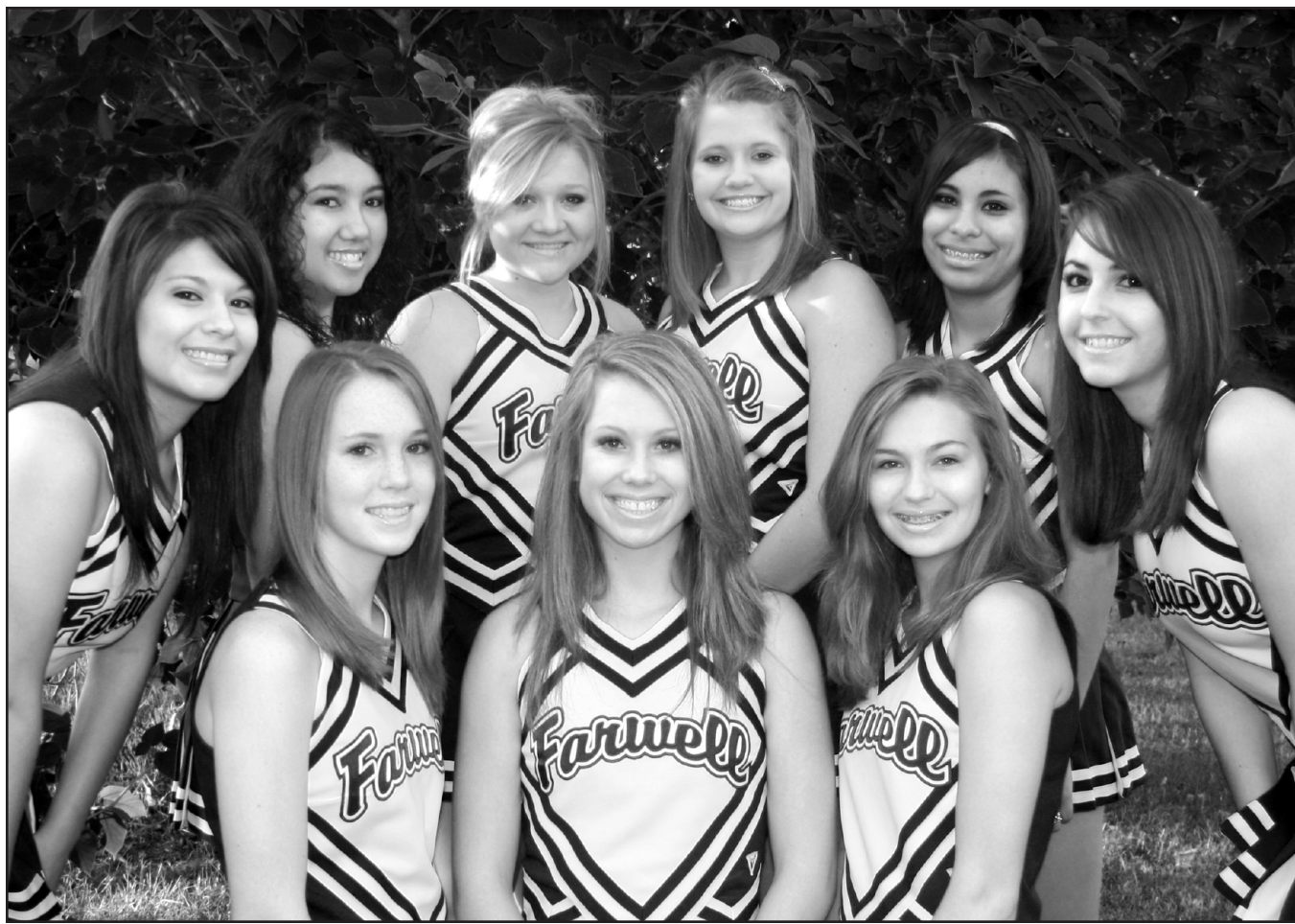

Coach Beau Thompson said the offense started off a big rugged, but the ground game paid off big.

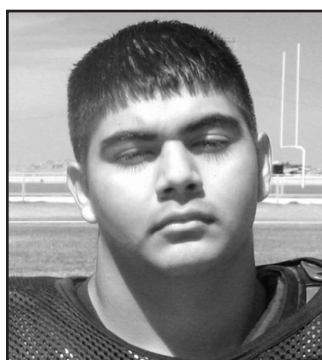
Devlin Thompson has three long runs for TDs, ranging from 25-plus to 60 yards.

Lazbuddie's JV team dominated Lubbock Home School Athletic Association, 48-0, last week.



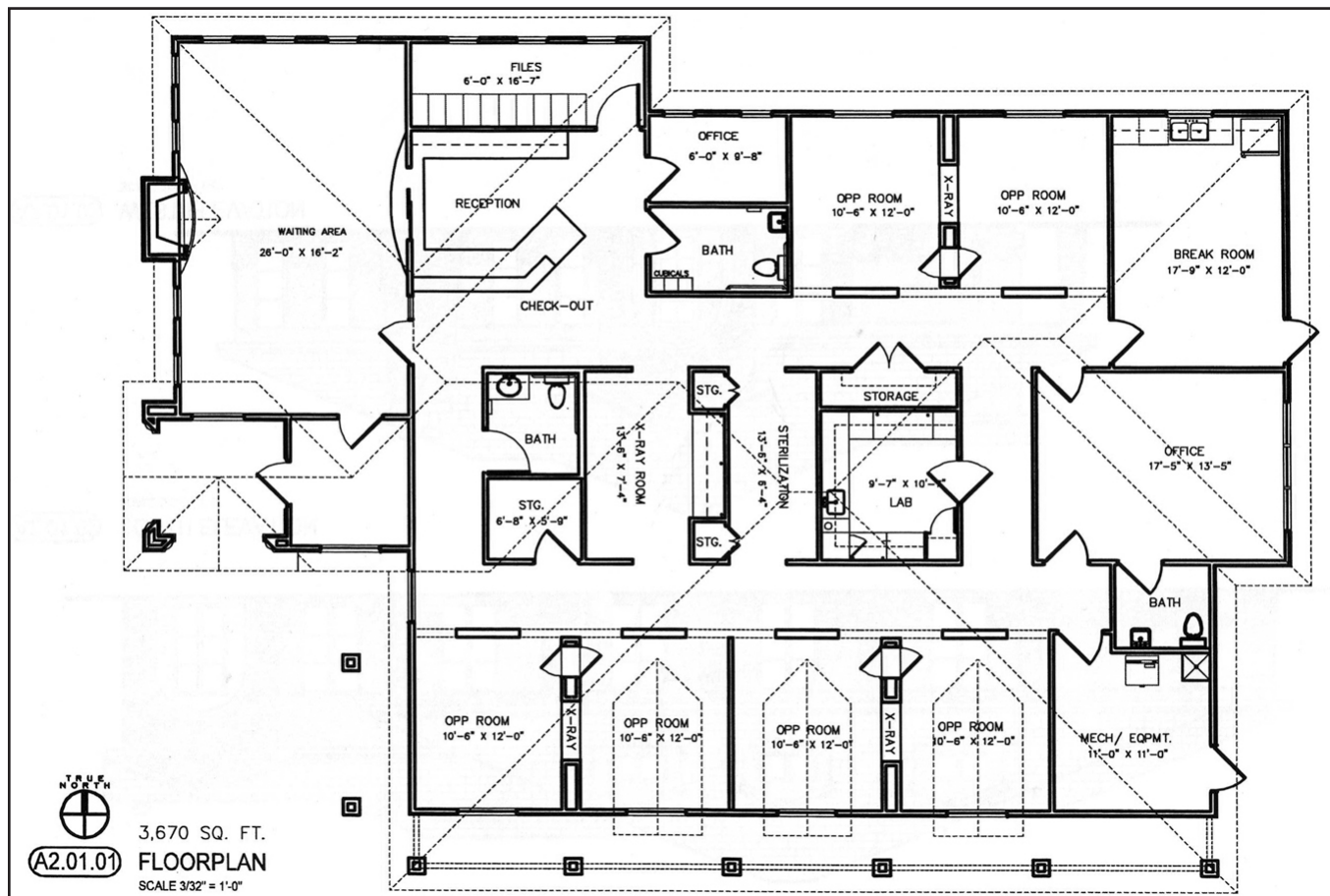
