O'Hare kicks butt at World Finals

The world's top amateur arenacross racers competed for world titles in Las Vegas on Oct. 12 as the Amateur Arenacross World Finals showcased the future of Supercross.

Farwell's Blake O'Hare got 2nd in the Arenacross Lites Novice Class just behind Joel Fittro from Elmira, California.

O'Hare placed 4th in the College Boy Class. This is an open class which means racers can ride a 250 or 450 dirt bike and be between the ages of 17-24. O'Hare was the only 250 in the top 10 and was one of the youngest riders on the gate.

The track was the most challenging to date," said Jayme Dalsing, director of Arenacross, Feld Motor Sports. "The track challenged the amateurs with this sort of design and they rose to the occasion. The rac-

ing gets better every year."

Kevin Johnson, from Team Faith, spoke to the racers Sunday morning before the race. He said that faith is one of the most important parts of life. You have to have faith in your bike, your mechanic, your abilities, and above all God. Kevin said to trust God and let Him be the author of your life.

Blake said that Kevin's message helped him stay focused. Kevin, who competed with the pros on Friday and Saturday pulled Blake aside and gave him track advice and an extra boost of confidence.

Keith Johnson, Kevin's brother, has helped O'Hare take his racing to the next level through training and support. Bobby J's, Yamaha-owned and operated by the Johnsons out of Albuquerque, has taken Blake in as one of their team riders.

"This experience has been awesome. Now I know how hard I have to work to get where I want to be," said Blake.

Let us always remember...

In 1918, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day in the eleventh month, the world rejoiced and celebrated. After four years of bitter war, the Allied powers signed a cease-fire agreement with Germany at Rethondes, France on November 11, 1918, bringing World War I to a close. The "war to end all wars" was over.

November 11, 1919 was set aside as Armistice Day in the United States, to remember the sacrifices that men and women made during World War I in order to ensure a lasting peace. On Armistice Day, soldiers who survived the war marched in a parade through their hometowns. Politicians and veteran officers gave speeches and held ceremonies of thanks for the peace they had won.

Armistice Day officially received its name in the United States in 1926 through a Congressional resolution. It became a national holiday 12 years later. Congress voted Armistice Day a federal holiday in 1938, 20 years after the war ended. But Americans realized that the previous war would not be the last one. World War II began the following year and nations great and small again participated in a bloody struggle. After the Second World War, Armistice Day continued to be observed on November 11.

In 1953 townspeople in Emporia, Kansas called the holiday Veterans' Day in gratitude to the veterans in their town. Soon after, Congress passed a bill introduced by a Kansas congressman renaming the federal holiday to Veterans' Day. Beginning in 1954, the United States designated November 11 as Veterans Day to honor veterans of all U.S. wars. 1971 President Nixon declared it a federal holiday on the second Monday in November.

Americans still give thanks for peace on Veterans' Day. There will be a ceremony at Farwell High School at 11:00 in the morning.

Wolverines undefeated in regular season: draw bye in first round of playoffs

The Texico Wolverines finished the regular season undefeated by trouncing the Estancia Bears at home on Friday, 41-0, as the clock ran most of the second half due to the mercy rule.

Texico finished 9-0 on the season and 3-0 in district.

The Wolverines are seeded No. 1 going into the state playoffs. They will draw a "bye" this weekend, then play in the state quarter-final on Nov. 14 or 15 when they host the winner of the Laguna Acoma - Cloudcroft game.

Laguna Acoma is seeded No. 8 and Cloudcroft No. 9.

Estancia finished the

regular season at 7-3.

There might have been a school record set for the Wolverines - in collecting eight interceptions, two in each quarter. Coach Mike Prokop believes it is a team record.

Estancia received the kickoff and went 3 and out. Texico ripped off big chunks of yardage, including a 33-yard pass from Brett Anderson to Marques Pena. Mario Posada ran for 9 and Edgardo Meza for 10. The drive ended when Anderson plunged over from the 1 at 6:23 for a 6-0 lead. Mario Posada added the kick.

Estancia started at its 39 and hit a long pass to

the Texico 31. Mario Posada broke up a pass. Then Anderson intercepted near the goal line and returned it to the Wolverine 34. Texico was held and punted.

Jose Posada intercepted a tipped ball and Texico started at its 40. Anderson threw a bomb to Mario Posada for 50 yards. Then Seth Bailey scored at 1:50 from the 1 and a 13-0 lead.

Texico was successful with an onside kick, with Pena making the recovery near midfield. Texico was held and punted as the first quarter ended.

Jose Posada immediately intercepted a tipped ball and ran back untouched 40 yards to

pay dirt. The Mario Posada kick made it 20-0.

Estancia went for it on 4th and a foot at its 36 and was stopped by a gang of Wolverines. Kevin Visser hauled in a 30-yard pass. Then Mario Posada swept around end untouched for a 1-yard TD. Anderson ran in the extra points and it was 28-0.

On defense, Luis Estrada and Eli Morgan had strong tackles, forcing a Bear punt to the Texico 40. On the first

play, Meza ran up the gut for 57 yards. Meza then scored from the 1 at 2:30.

On defense, Rhett Martin intercepted at midfield. The Wolverines had stifled the Bear running attack so much that Estancia turned almost completely to passes for much of the game.

An Anderson pass for a TD to Bailey was called back due to a penalty as the 2nd quarter ended. But at the start of the 3rd quarter, Mario Posada raced 66 yards for a TD; then he kicked the point after.

Jose Posada had a good tackle of the kick returner. Anderson intercepted at the Texico 30 and returned it 22 yards. Texico lost a fumble near midfield.

Donovan Johnson had a QB sack for minus 11 yards. Then Johnson intercepted at midfield.

In the 4th quarter, Anderson and Jose Posada had interceptions. Coach Mike Prokop put in his backups, with Jose Posada at QB and Warren Faircloth and Johnson at running backs.

The Texico City Council met in a regular session on October 14, 2008, and decided that reasonable notice to the public as required in Open Meetings Act (NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 to 4) would be as follows:

Unless the business before the City Council dictates otherwise, the City Council conducts open meetings to take formal action on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. However, when that Tuesday is a City holiday, that meeting will be held on the next business day.

The City Clerk and staff were authorized and directed to publish an annual schedule of regular meetings as legal advertisement in State Line Tribune.

Emergency meetings will be called only under circumstances, which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The City of Texico Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours notice, unless threat of personal injury or property damage requires less notice. 'Do not call' numbers can be added

The West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative monthly newsletter the "Co-op Connection," recently carried the following information:

The national "Do Not Call" list was launched in June 2003 as a means to help the public deal with unwanted telemarketing balls. While effective, the problem with the registry was that a listing expired after five years.

The "Do Not Call Improvement Act of 2007", passed into law earlier this year, allows the over 157 million numbers placed on the no-call registry to remain there permanently.

An expiration clause was originally built into the Do-Not-Call registry to allow for changes due to people moving and changing their telephone number.

Under the Improvement Act passed this year, the Federal Trade Commission will continue to remove numbers that have been disconnected or reassigned to other customers from the list.

Home and cell numbers can be added to the Do-Not-Call list or deleted at any time by telephone customers by calling 1 (888) 382-1222.

LIVE CATTLE: Cash trade was \$1 higher this week with most the trade taking place around \$92. Next weeks lists are already being traded at \$93 which could easily translate into \$94. The futures prices turned short term trends higher, but failed to take out last weeks higher around the \$93.50 level. There is a strong possibility that the market will rally into early December before turning back down. Some of this expectation may depend on next weeks election results and how the stock market reacts. Odds favor sharply higher prices over the next four to six weeks.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices also came back strong this week along with a higher Live Cattle market. The nearby November feeders needed to close above the \$1.00 mark, but fell short. Short term trends have turned higher and should continue to move up into the January time frame.

CORN: Corn prices also turned higher this week, but could not close above the \$4.30 level basis the December contract which is an extremely strong level of resistance. Odds are good that if prices close above \$4.30, then the market could possible test the \$5.00 level again. Much will depend on the strength of the U.S. Dollar. If the Dollar trades sideways to lower in the coming weeks, then we could see grain prices all move higher into the first quarter of next year.

SOYBEANS: Beans also traded back higher this week alongside the rest of the grain complex, but could not take out resistance around the \$9.50 level basis the November. Most of the volume will move out into the January contract this week. Same as corn, the Dollar and election may be factors which could support a rally into the next year.

WHEAT: The December KC Wheat also made some advances this week along with the rest of grain complex. Most of the resistance lies above between \$6.55 to \$7.00. If the stock market settles down and traders regain some confidence, then odds are good that the market could reset the \$7.00 level at some point over the next 90 days?

COTTON: Cotton prices have yet to gain any support from the rest of the commodity complex. This market seems to be much more economic sensitive than other markets. Due to a continued lack of world demand and negative forecastis for the world economy, prices have remained under pressure. It would take a close above 54 cents basis the December contract in order to turn trends back higher at this time. This is still quite a distance from current levels.
