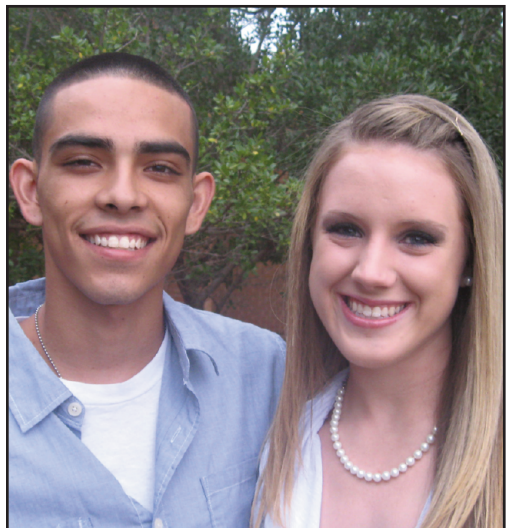

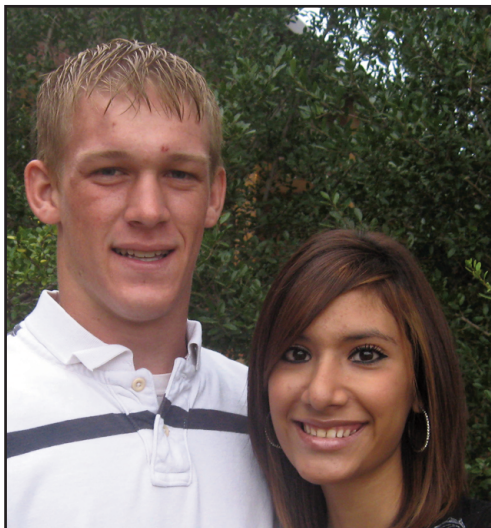

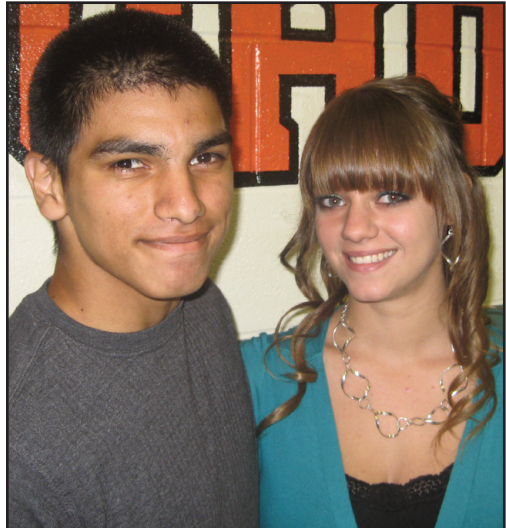

Farwell codes enforced

New Farwell police patrolman Tim Martin is also charged with duties as code enforcement officer and animal control officer in the city.

At the city council on Sept. 21, Martin summarized the progress he has made in his surveys of the city in fulfillment of the last two responsibilities.

Some residents seem to be unclear on some regulations, he said, but most have been responsive to making necessary corrections.

Martin emphasized that his surveys are intended to improve the appearance and living conditions of the community as a whole, particularly in recognition of Farwell's status as the county seat.

Vegetation: Martin pointed out that the removal of weeds, care of grass, and the removal of dead wood and debris are a major contribution to that end.

He will also be looking for tree branches and other vegetation that impede vehicle passage on the streets or obstruct their vision around corners.

Vehicles: Junk vehi-

cles parked on the street are unsightly and must be parked elsewhere. When they are on the property, they must be covered or behind a solid fence blocking their view.

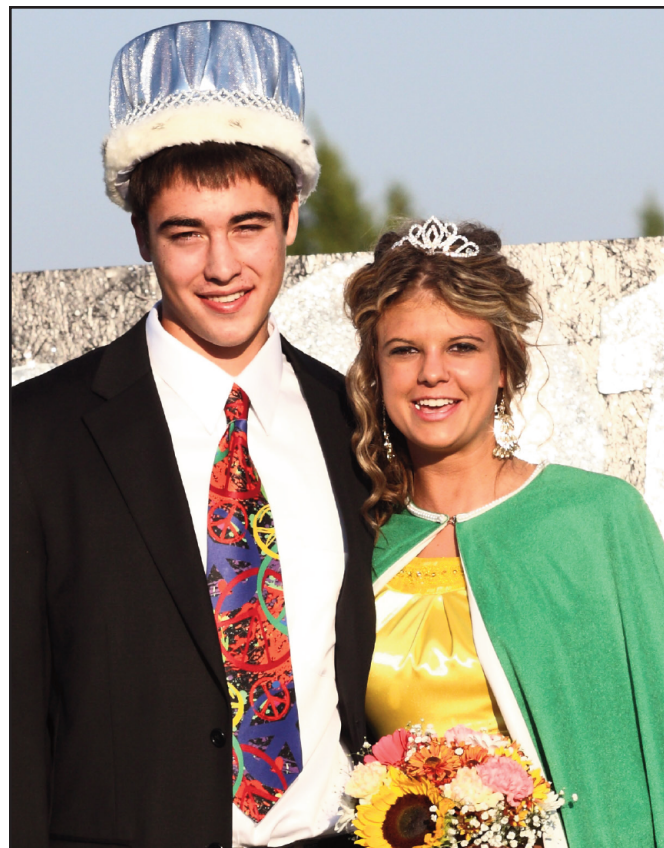
Also, the vehicles of Farwell residents must have their license and

registration from the state of Texas.

Alleys: The deficiencies have primarily been weeds or debris, unmowed grass, or trash left adjacent to dumpsters instead of in them.

We would like to offer some additional information regarding the article you had in the paper last week on the wastewater in Texico.

While it is true that there was a discussion about the plastic items mixed in with the sludge, there were other issues as to why we did not think the sludge should be put on that property.

One reason was that the land drains into the playa lake. Another reason, and possibly the main reason, is that all of the land would be plowed up after the sludge is applied. Most of the land is not available for irrigation and therefore, all the grass and vegetation would be destroyed. They said that they would furnish the grass seed and we could have it reseeded; however, without moisture it would not grow back very quickly.

After the meeting, Karen Perez, one of the officials at the meeting, stated to us that there probably was not enough land available there to take care of all the sludge anyway.

We certainly think the city needs a new wastewater plant and do not want to see them get fined or lose the money and hope other solutions will become available.

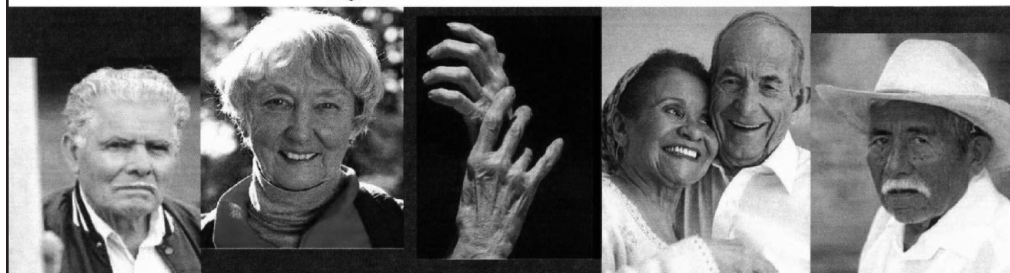
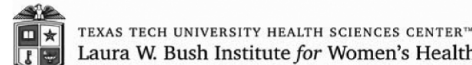
**What is involved?** The study takes 3-4 hours and involves a medical exam, blood work, an interview and memory testing. Participants are also reimbursed \$50 for their time.

In the Portales JV Tourney, Texico lost in the championship game on Saturday to Clovis JV, 18-25, 15-25, to take 2nd place honors.

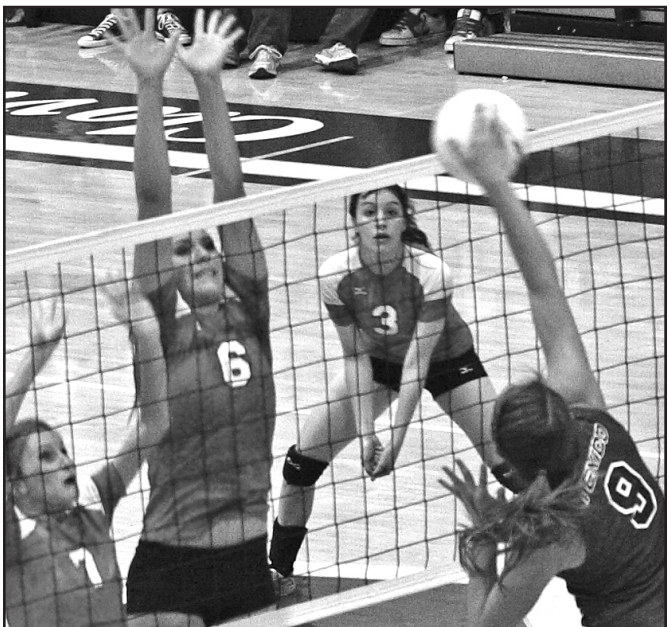

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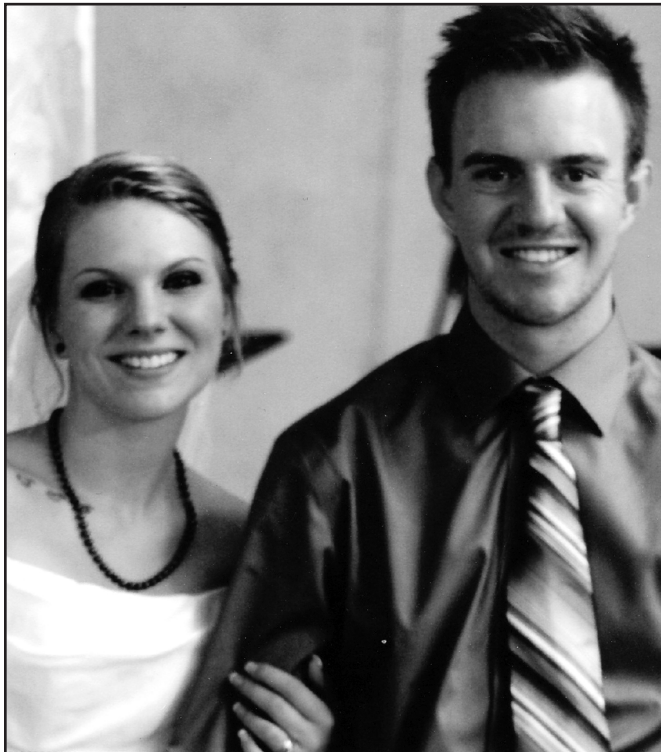

The couple is residing in Lubbock, where they are both employed, and Trevor is continuing his education at South Plains College in Sound Technology.

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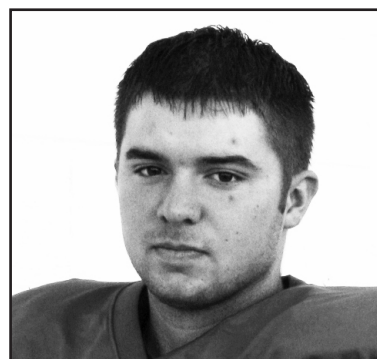

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## Farwell EMS passed review 'with flying colors'

The Farwell City Council approved a request on Sept. 21 from Duncan Disposal to increase its rate by 2.1 percent.

In other business:

-- EMS representatives sketched the results of the no-notice inspection that it had received from the state on Sept. 10, passing the review "with flying colors." The sole discrepancy, one medication that had passed beyond its expiration date by a few days, was corrected on the spot.

-- Voted to pay reimbursement to EMS volunteers whose response to emergency calls requires them to drive into town from their places of employment that are miles from Farwell.

This issue highlighted the need for additional volunteers to achieve their qualifications, particularly from residents within the city limits.

-- Code enforcement officer Tim Martin reported on his survey of properties inside the city limit to determine compliance with city regulations for cleanliness and safety.

"People are being generally responsive so far," Martin reported. "I started at the state line and have gotten about as far as 7th Street. Several warnings

items. Tires, stoves, washer-dryers, refrigerators and other discarded appliances or furniture items may not be retained in yards but must be removed to proper disposal sites.

Damaged fencing: Fences around property that are broken, missing sections, or inadequately maintained for appearance must be repaired.

Businesses. Martin said businesses have the same standards of appearance and safety on their property that are required of residences.

Building permits. Businesses and residents are reminded that new construction, remodeling, fencing, roofing, carport additions and all other types of alteration to property must have proper building permits.

Pets. In the requirements of animal control, Martin made a number of important points.

Martin noted the city's concern is the humane treatment of animals which is the reason city ordinances requiring the registration and tagging of each pet (which have been on the books for years) are being emphasized now.

No residence should have more than three pets, and the registration for each can be completed and the tag for their collar obtained at city hall for \$10.

"This is important," Martin said. "When I find an animal lost and wandering the street, with that tag I will be able to find out who the owner is right away and I will just take the pet home."

"Animals we have to pick up that don't have the city tag are much more trouble," he continued. "We have to house and feed them until someone comes and claims them or we have to euthanize the creature. We'll only do that to relieve an animal that is suffering or that remains unclaimed 10 days."

Martin said he will establish a program through which unclaimed animals can be saved from euthanasia through adoption.

"Everyone loves their pets," Martin said. "I know I do. If I have to pick up an animal and it doesn't have a tag, the owner will have to pay the \$10 fee at that time, plus whatever food and housing fee there may be, plus the possibility of a fine."

"A few minutes and \$10 to register them and get a tag on their collar can save a lot of worry later if I find them and can just take them back to their home," Martin noted. "It just make things easier on the owner, on me, and especially on the pet."

Pets must have a fenced area if they are to be kept in the yard. Chains, ropes, or leashes appropriate for walking a pet are not a humane way to restrain a pet in its yard.

At the time of the city council meeting, Martin indicated that he had surveyed from the state line to 7th Street. He will finish the streets going east and will then begin his surveys of the avenues.

Thus far, Martin reports he has given dozens of notices for corrections but has needed to issue only two citations.

have been issued but only a couple of citations have been necessary."

People know it's coming," he continued, "and we are already seeing improvements because of that on the streets and cross-streets I haven't even gotten to yet."

-- The ongoing project to introduce fiber optic lines to Farwell has also shown deficiencies that exist in the city's water supply and sewer piping systems.

Additional information on these deficiencies and estimates of the scope of work to correct them is being collected.

-- The Farwell Cemetery has only about 50 plots remaining in its southern section currently in use. The extension to its north, which will provide as many or more grave sites as the original cemetery boundaries provided, has been plotted out for the new graves.

### The Fillpot Report

Live Cattle were able to recover to some degree early this week with the anticipation that cash trade could remain steady at \$98 with last weeks trade. Prices made an attempt to recover on Friday, but fell apart on the close. Technically, long term trends have turned down and aside from a short lived correction, the market is expected to move lower over the near term.

Feeder prices also saw some recovery early in the week due primarily to the failure of corn prices to break out to new highs above the \$5.25 level. The market remained fairly strong and was able to turn short term trends back higher even though long term trends remain down. Over the last few years, feeder prices have always traded back into the high \$90's before making a bottom. This could be the case this year?

Soybean prices broke out on the upside just a couple of weeks ago and have remained in a strong uptrend. Aside from rumors of extremely high yields coming out of the Mid West, the market has remained strong as Fund buying pushes prices higher. The market did loose a little steam on Monday, but still closed higher. Lower corn and wheat prices could possibly turn the bean price down with time?

Corn prices were expected to retest their highs made early last week around the \$5.24 level basis the December contract, but traders were a little surprised to see this happen in just one day. Friday's close was strong and the night session on Sunday saw these levels penetrated until the market pulled back down for Monday's open. The market slipped almost another dime on Monday to close lower. Both short and long term trends remain higher. A new closing high would project up into the \$5.50 level followed by \$6.00. If a top is currently in place, it will take several days if not weeks to confirm.

Wheat prices also slipped to lower levels on Monday, but have yet to turn long term trends down. This market continues to trade alongside the rest of the grain complex with little direction. A close below the August low around the \$6.87 level basis the December KC contract is needed to turn trends down.

Cotton prices have done little to indicate any top may be in place. Prices are trading at historically high levels with Funds pushing hard on the long side. The volatility has seen a significant increase as daily price ranges have expanded to 3-4 cent daily ranges. Prices will continue to move up until either the Funds exit their positions or buyers begin to believe that this market has become 'over valued'?

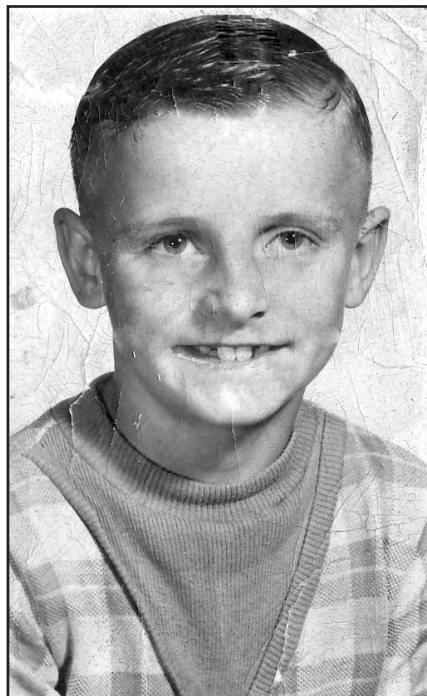

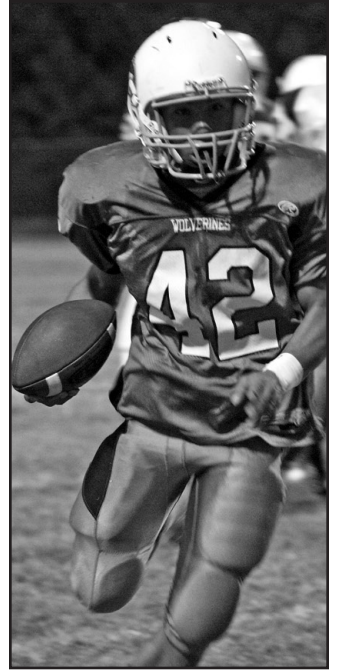
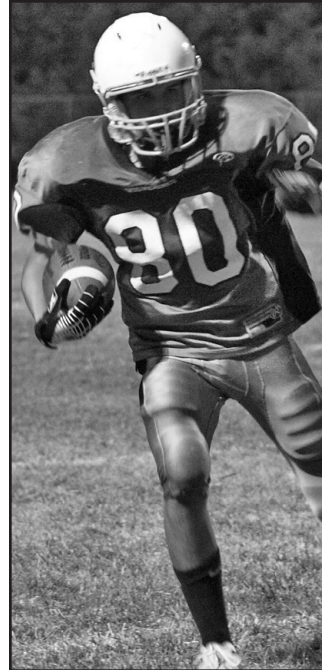

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# Texico halts sewer plant project

The Texico City Council on Tuesday voted to halt construction on the sewer plant. Despite the possibility of being fined by the state's environmental department, Texico will lose a \$450,000 grant if the project is not finished and working by Dec. 31.

The engineering company has said it will take around \$260,000 to clean out the sludge and haul it to farm land away from the site.

But any problems could put the completion date past Dec. 31.

If Texico isn't finished by then, they would have to repay the full grant as well as any money owed to workers.

Since Texico cannot pump the sludge to an adjacent property they own, it means it will take weeks longer and cost much more than they had expected.

The other route open to Texico is to voluntarily

turn back the \$450,000 grant and then reapply next year.

Texico might be in good shape to get part of the money back because they have a plan that has been approved by the Environmental Department, but the state has been tightening budgets and closing down many of its grants across the state.

If the city does not get the grant, than Texico will be forced to look at raising taxes to pay for the sewer plant to avoid fines.

The problem with the wastewater plant has arisen over complaints by Howard and Marcia Leavell who lease the land from Texico. Over the past 40 years the wastewater from the plant has run into a playa lake on the property.

The city wants to land-apply and disk in the sludge, in a mixture that is 95% water, to keep the land from being burned

by the nitrogen.

The Leavells' position can be found in a Letter to the Editor elsewhere in today's Tribune.

In other news, the council:

- Heard the EMS has installed one of its electric stretchers. The new stretchers will pick up injured folks up to 600 lbs.

Councilman Doug Scioli said this is important to help the EMS workers especially if there are understaffed ambulance runs. He also said some EMS workers weigh a lot less than the folks they have to lift into the ambulance.

The EMS is raising \$4,000 for a second stretcher, and if you would like to donate, stop by the fire department.

- Approved Bermea Construction to patch and seal parts of Anderson, Garwood, State and Turner streets.

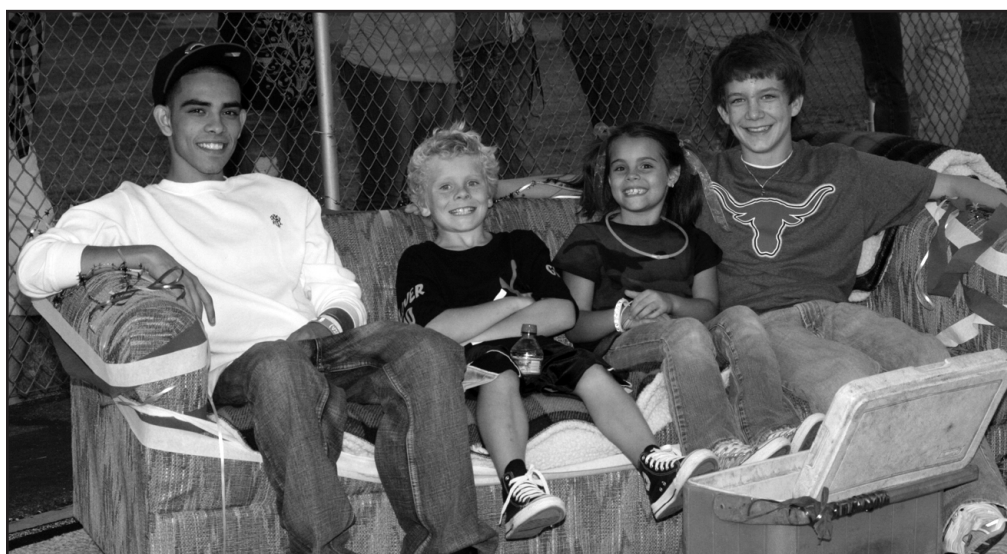
- Heard the map for the old section of the Texico Cemetery is in bad shape. The city will seek grants to get a new map made.

- Discussed the trailers on Garwood and Ave. F. The property owner had previously been approved to put 2 trailers on the property but had recently moved a third trailer on. It covered city water and sewer lines.

Police Chief Doug Bowman spoke to the owner and they moved one of the trailers, and will still have to put in a driveway.

- Received an update on the old motel next to A-Me-D's Restaurant. The owner had been updating the property, but didn't have the proper permits and has since stopped working.

Many of the doors are open as well as access to the basement. Bowman asked the city to look into securing the property before someone gets hurt there.

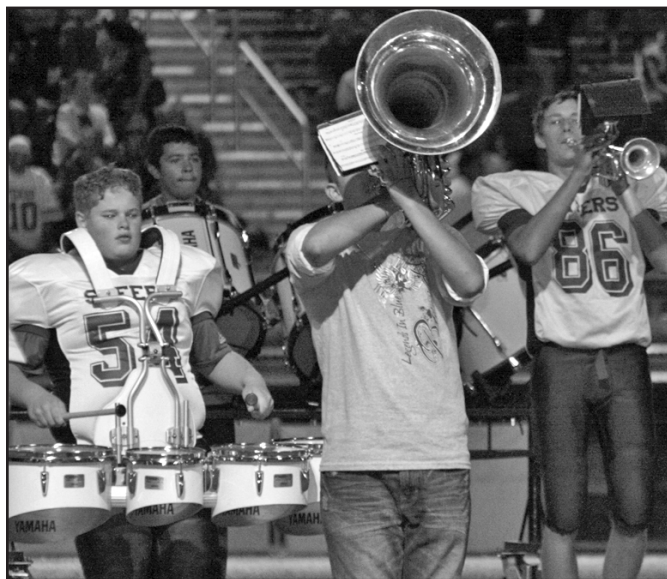

Now comes Laurance Kriegel, Plaintiff, to show in this Motion to Replevin that the Court erred allowing Diversified, Defendant, to sell two electric sprinklers and five properties of Laurance Kriegel's in Bovina, Texas to extort money from assets of Laurance Kriegel to satisfy a illegal Order and Judgment of the District Court. The Court also erred in allowing \$18,720.75 from Laurance Kriegel's inheritance from the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel to be used to satisfy a Judgment Arnold W. Kriegel, opponent, did not own.

Diversified did not prove with any evidence Laurance Kriegel owed any debt on two electric sprinklers in that trial on June 15, 2009.

Diversified's Exhibits for Attorney fees was returned to Diversified Attorney's in the June 15, 2009 Trial, therefore during the evidence part of the Trial the Court did not approve Diversified's Attorney's fees.

The proceeding was NON-SUITED by Laurance Kriegel on Aug. 24, 2009, because the Order of the Court was unjust.

Arnold W. Kriegel and his Attorney Fredric M. Wolfram sent in a document to the Court on Feb. 22, 2010 titled "Notice of Assignment of Judgement and Substitution of Real Party in interest". Arnold W. Kriegel, opponent, was never a party in this proceeding and presented a document to the Court claiming he owned a Judgment from this proceeding. Arnold W. Kriegel never proved by exhibit in Court he purchased or paid for this Judgment to receive money from Laurance Kriegel's inheritance from the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel to satisfy this Judgment. Arnold W. Kriegel placed his name in the Plaintiff position on his pleading when he presented a document to the Court to claim he owned a Judgment by Diversified against Laurance Kriegel. This violates accepted Judicial Practice and Procedure.

Now come Laurance Kriegel to show this Motion to Replevin allows Laurance Kriegel to recover \$18,720.75 from a CD from the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel. The actions of the 287th Parmer County District Court are unjust and have violated the Constitution. The 287th District Court had Notice proceeding 10020 was on Appeal to the Supreme Court of Texas. The 287th Parmer County District Court entered Orders which violated the bequeath of Marie Magdalena Kriegel and Statutes in Texas Probate Code and these Statutes have been upheld by the Supreme Court of Texas.

The Court misinterpreted the Statutes of Texas and did not follow the correct Judicial Practice and Procedures, including Motion Practice, Rules of Evidence, or the correct acceptance of the Valid Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

The Valid Last Will and Testament of Magdalena Kriegel was signed willingly by Marie Magdalena Kriegel in the Parmer County Court House on 5-1-2008.

At a hearing on July 8, 2010 transcript page 51, to determine the Valid Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel; Arnold W. Kriegel and his Attorney Fredric M. Wolfram presented a theory in their argument as to why a legally revoked Will should be accepted by the Court. This violates Rules of Evidence. A theory is not clear and convincing evidence.

Marie Magdalena Kriegel ask 3 or 4 Attorneys after the death of her husband to write a Valid Will according to her desires. These Attorneys never wrote a Will for her according to her Wishes or Desires. The Wills these Attorneys wrote violated Texas Probate Code.

The 287th Parmer County District Court ruled to accept a revoked Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel to be valid, the Will is dated March 26, 2001. This revoked Will was not written according to Texas Probate Code.

Arnold W. Kriegel disqualified himself from any inheritance when he and others removed Marie Magdalena Kriegel unwillingly from her paid for home with a broken in door on Aug. 14, 2009.

This also disqualified Arnold W. Kriegel from being an Executor in the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel. Arnold W. Kriegel did not have a Bone in the Parmer County Court on Aug. 14, 2009, as Guardian, the day Marie Magdalena Kriegel was removed from her home. This also disqualifies Arnold W. Kriegel from inheriting from the Estate and/or being the Executor of the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

Marie Magdalena Kriegel was removed from her home before a scheduled hearing on Aug. 17, 2009.

The Order accepting the revoked Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel overturned the Constitutional provision of the Constitution to bequeath assets to the qualified heirs according to the Texas Probate Code and according to the bequeaths of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

The 287th Parmer County District Court has not signed the Letters of Testamentary in proceeding 10020 in the matter of the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

The Public Notice of Letters of Testamentary published in the State Line Tribune dated Aug. 5, 2010 is a Error of Law.

Arnold W. Kriegel has not proven to the Court he has purchased a Judgment from Diversified. The Court allowed 1/3 interest (\$20,000) from a CD in the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel to be used belonging to Laurance Kriegel to pay on this Judgment.

The Diversified Trial was on June 15, 2009 and the Court Order creating this Judgment was dated June 18, 2009, which allowed unlawful interest calculations to be taken by this Judgment in excess of 10%. The Court action which led to this Judgment is still pending on Appeal at the Supreme Court of Texas and the Notice of Appeal stops all interest calculations and any activity that has to do with this Judgment.

The facts proven at the Diversified Trial by Laurance Kriegel, Plaintiff, demonstrated Defendant, Diversified, could not prove with exhibits (evidence) Laurance Kriegel owed any money to Diversified for two electric sprinklers.

During the Trial Diversified's Attorney requested a directed Verdict written by the Judge.

By the end of the Trial Diversified's Attorney interpreted the Court and handed the Judge his draft Order to sign. The Signed Order was a draft by Diversified's Attorney and not a direct Verdict by the Court. This Order affirmed a debt on two account numbers Diversified could not prove in Court belonged to Laurance Kriegel. This is a error of Law and error of Accepted

Judicial Practice and Procedure. The Order is different than the facts proven by Laurance Kriegel in the Trial. Additional discussions can be obtained in the Notice of Appeal to the Supreme Court of Texas sent in on June 24, 2009 and other Appeals, proceeding 9699.

The Judge did not accept Defendant's Exhibit 18 and 19 at Trial on June 15, 2009 in proceeding 9699 in the 287th Parmer County District Court which lead to the Judgment for Defendant's Attorney's fees, therefore, Defendant, Diversified, cannot sell property to recover Attorney's fees.

If Plaintiff assumes a Judgment could be obtained legally in Court, if Plaintiff assumes from two documents Plaintiff received from Diversified a few days before the Court Action began, the principle remaining to be paid on two electric sprinklers was \$30,833.04. This document shows two sprinkler accounts are delinquent. Therefore no additional interest is due. This proceeding was NON-SUITED on Aug. 24, 2009. One electric sprinkler sold for \$45,000 at the illegal Sheriff Sale on Aug. 26, 2009. A Sheriff Sale cannot be lawfully held until all Notice's of Appeal to the Supreme Court of Texas are decided. That proceeding is still on Appeal. The illegal Sheriff Sale collected \$95,000 from the sale of two electric sprinklers and five property's in Bovina Texas owned by Laurance Kriegel.

The 287th Parmer County District Court illegally ordered Arnold W. Kriegel could use a \$20,000 inheritance of Laurance Kriegel's to pay on a Judgment Arnold W. Kriegel did not own. Arnold W. Kriegel was not a party in the Diversified proceeding which created this Judgment. The Court has Ordered and allowed \$113,720.75 to be collected for this \$30,833.04 possible principle balance with Diversified. The decisions of the Court are unjust and un-Constitutional. The Court as extorted from Laurance Kriegel approximately \$82,887.71 in excess of a possible principal balance of \$30,833.04.

The Temporary Administration of the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel has been closed by the Order of the Court and the Letters of Testamentary was not signed by the Clerk of the 287th Parmer County District Court.

This Court ordered \$18,720.75 to pay a Judgment Arnold W. Kriegel claims he owns is a unjust unlawful taking done after the Court closed the Temporary Administration of the Estates of Marie Magdalena Kriegel. Additional discussion can be obtained in the Notices of Appeal in proceeding 10020.

The Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel contains a house and ten acres, bank accounts, in Parmer County, Texas, and some Oil and Gas Mineral Interest Royalties, and other hidden assets from the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel. Laurance Kriegel has received correspondence from the Attorney Fredric M. Wolfram for Arnold W. Kriegel indicating Arnold W. Kriegel is considering a Public Auction on the property of the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

A Public Sale of Property in the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel has not been put before the Court for a forced Sale. A Public Sale of Property cannot be held until all Notices of Appeal by the Supreme Court of Texas has been heard. A legal Public Sale cannot be held until all Statutes and the Constitution of Texas are upheld in this proceeding. Any Public Sale held will be loaded with encumbrances'.

The Sheriff can stop any Notice of Sale with this Motion to Replevin and a Writ of Execution.

This Motion to Replevin stops any attempt for Arnold W. Kriegel or his Attorney to sell any property at Public Auction or conduct any business activity in the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

This Motion to Replevin grants authority to the Parmer County Sheriff for Laurance Kriegel to have the \$18,720.75 bequeath by Marie Magdalena Kriegel returned to Laurance Kriegel.

This unjust taking violates Statutes established by the people to conduct business according to the Valid Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel dated 5-1-2008. These violations then constitute a Civil Rights violation because the Statutes of Texas were not upheld for this citizen or the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

The Law and Rules of Judicial Practice and Procedure state, a Notice of Appeal stops all activity in a proceeding until the final Order of the Supreme Court of Texas is presented.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests the Sheriff stop any attempt to sell the Property or collateral or change the address on account's of Marie Magdalena Kriegel in that Estate.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests this Motion to Replevin by Affirmed.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests two new electric sprinklers with 40 inch nozzle spacing with the sprinkler heads dropped to 18 inches about ground with drag hoses be returned with control panels and booster pump with accessory's (one electric sprinkler that was removed had a booster pump and electric motor and control panel not a part of any loan).

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests to enter his five properties in Bovina, Texas without treats of Criminal Trespass.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests the historic value of the building town down in Bovina, Texas, be paid to Laurance Kriegel.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests all of his rights or ownership of the five Properties in Bovina, Texas be restored.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests damages be paid to Laurance Kriegel for the illegal acts explained in these Court proceeding.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel request the illegal \$18,720.75 Judgment payment be returned to Laurance Kriegel from Arnold W. Kriegel.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests the \$40,000,00 remaining part of the CD be returned to the Parmer County District Clerk's office.

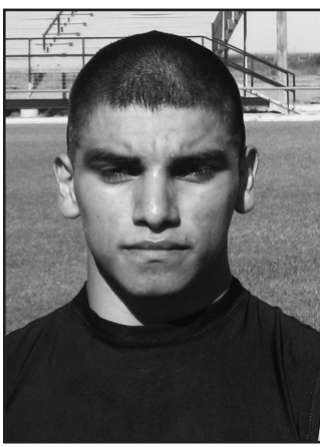

Actkinson and Christian moved the ball, but the Steers were forced to punt. Hunter Black stopped the returner for a loss.

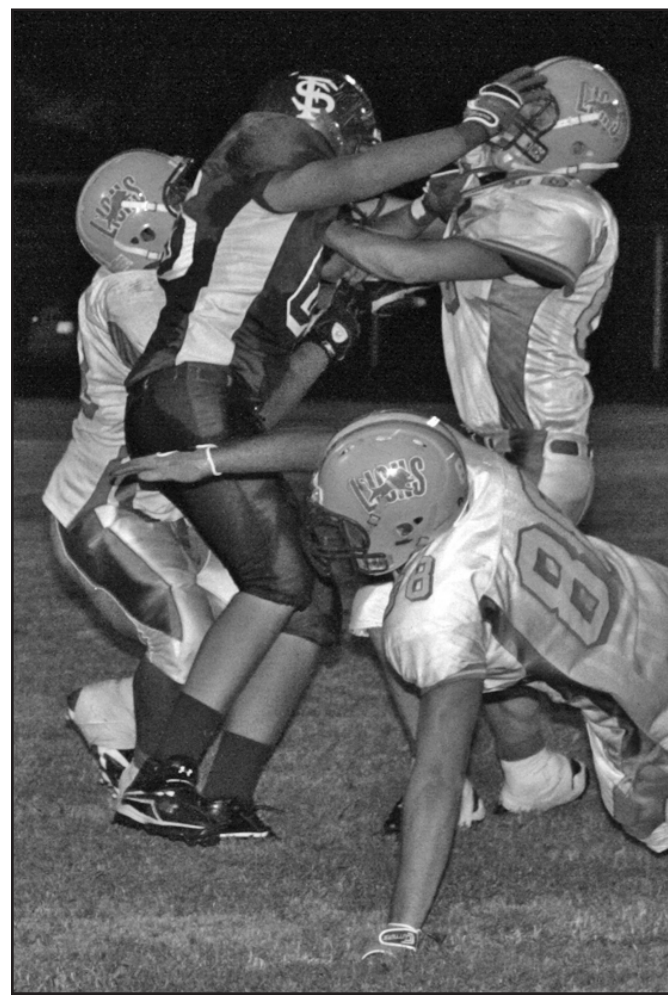
Zac Stancell and Read had big defensive plays, but the New Deal QB slipped three Steer defenders and completed a pass to put New Deal up 14-0.

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## The best of America remains here

It is the High Plains, flat, arid, and treeless and the last of the nation's frontiers to be settled, that created and preserves the heart and soul of the American character.

This was a primary theme of one of the greatest historians this nation ever produced, Walter Prescott Webb, in the masterpiece published in 1931, 'The Great Plains.'

Webb proposed that great human societies can arise only from a natural environment such as the plains, filled with peril, challenge, and uncertainty. The unyielding demands of our region have been the agents of natural selection.

Webb suggested the people who manage to survive, and ultimately flourish here, are required to develop stores of courage and community in far greater measure than in regions where the environment is less hostile.

The nation originated, of course, along the Atlantic coastline and its people overcame each challenge as they pushed the frontier further west through the almost continuous forest that stretched to Texas. Americans were defeated, however, as they never had been before, from the first efforts to settle the plains that began about 1840.

Just like the Spanish Empire that explored the plains from the south but never managed to settle its people there through more than 300 years, so America "marked time"

at its eastern fringes for half a century.

The frontier actually jumped over the plains and re-established itself in the area of familiar forests and rainfall along the Pacific coasts of California and the Oregon territories.

The tactics for warfare that had worked for generations in forests were useless against the plains Indian warriors on horseback with no more than lances and arrows. It took the invention of the Colt six-shooter and the Winchester and Henry repeating rifles (that could be reloaded on horseback) to finally defeat the mounted Indian warriors.

The last great war party of Comanche, Kiowa, and southern Cheyenne did not capitulate until 1874 in the famous engagement in the Palo Duro Canyon.

Even then, the plains defied American expansion. The solutions that had worked for Americans in the benevolent environment of the east with its plentiful rains, dense forests, and broad rivers crumbled to dust when they were attempted on the flat, dry, and barren conditions of the plains.

It took another decade, barbed wire, and windmills for ranching to really take hold and a decade after that for farming to begin establishing itself.

That is the period in which adventurous families, wrestling year after year against the plains for their farms and ranches, began creating the small towns of eastern New Mexico and the Texas panhandle. It was in that time, after the census of 1890, that America's frontier was proclaimed to have officially ended.

The great historian, Walter Prescott Webb, contended that the High Plains, despite being the last great American frontier to be conquered, created the heart and soul of the American nation.

In many ways, this last great American frontier is still being conquered. The descendants of those earlier pioneers and families that have joined them to this day confront a High Plains region that is frequently hostile and always unpredictable.

They continue year after year with the stoicism and courage that identifies America to the world.

Other parts of America with buildings or traditions that date back to the 16th or 17th centuries might seem to overshadow our much younger communities. But Webb contended that the national identity is based not on those relics but rather on the character of the people here on the High Plains.

Go into any bookstore and you will find a section dedicated entirely to stories of the plains and the old west. There are no similar sections for literature about New England, the eastern seaboard, or the west coast.

In the same way, you can subscribe to magazines sketching the history of these lands but no major publication serves the same purpose for parts of the country that were tamed and settled for 200 years longer.

The first motion picture was produced in 1915 and in the 70 years that followed, more than half of the films made by Hollywood were westerns. Americans all wanted to emulate the courage and fortitude of the High Plains people that played on movie screens from coast to coast.

To this day, when leaders of foreign countries make reference to the American character, they invariably make reference to its "cowboy" approach to challenges. Those references are usually not intended to be complimentary; Europeans in particular are squeamish about what it perceives to be American inflexibility on matters of right and wrong.

That is neither here nor there, however, because the main point is that when the world at large thinks of America, it thinks of the west, and whether it's realized or not, the High Plains.

If the west is the heart of the country, it is the

people who settled the High Plains who are the soul of the nation as well.

The harsh demands that these fields placed on settlers in the 1880s and 1890s are the same demands that farmers and ranchers face today. The scrappy little towns fighting to attract businesses and residents then continue to do so today.

The virtue of community and the stark courage required to maintain families, churches, and communities are as alive today as they were 120 years ago.

Webb's historical perspective has its detractors for a variety of reasons but if we give it a thought, we might find ourselves in complete agreement on this one main point.

Look at your neighbors at work in their fields come drought or blizzard. Look at families standing shoulder to shoulder come what may and communities embracing each other in seasons of plenty or times of crisis. Look at businesses, law enforcement, and schools all dedicated to their towns and their neighbors.

Webb is right. The best of America did indeed spring from the soil of its last great frontier.

We might add that the best of America remains here to this day, preserved by the communities and the neighbors all around us.

## Area cotton crop maturing

From the Parmer County extension service:

Corn silage harvest is winding down and grain harvest is ramping up.

Preliminary grain yields are promising, especially considering the extreme spider mite pressure and hot dry conditions after tassel. A few fields of sorghum have been harvested, again, early yield reports are promising.

The area cotton crop is rapidly maturing and is a solid 3-4 weeks ahead of last year's crop as determined by heat unit accumulation after cutout. Hot conditions in August through most of September are responsible for the dramatic differences in the 2009 and 2010 crop maturity levels.
