Who knew that a person from tiny Farwell would be making a difference halfway across the
world? Cyrus Koehn and his lamily all know what it's world country. In 1997, he and his family packed up and flew to Haiti, and that is where they stayed for seven years.
Their main goal throughout those years was mission work; they wanted to teach the Haitian people about the Gospel. Also, they did humanitarian aid work such as building a
church.
"Many people think that the entire country is deforested and bad, he said. but on the west it's beautiful. There's tropical plants, fruits of all kinds, and they average about 40 inches of rain per year."

back in time,he said. In contrast to the con ditions, the people of Haiti are very friendly. and were very welcoming when the Koehn family arrived.
