

At 11 a.m., the Big Parade kicks off at Griffin Street in Texico. A map showing where participants need to line up is elsewhere in today's Tribune.

This year's parade will feature a large contingent of tractors, motorcycles and cool cars, in addition to a record nine Farwell class reunion floats.

Lining up the entries will be parade marshals, Ruth Anne Bennett, Benji Henderson, Mark Barnes. Carmelita Retana and Matt Foster. Participants are urged to be at the parade start at least 30 minutes early.

Because the highway will be closed during the parade, Hereford Street in Texico will be used as a bypass for traffic moving through the area.

Hereford Street residents are asked not to park their vehicles on that street while the parade is held. The Border Town Days Committee appreciates your help.

Texico Police Chief Doug Bowman will give the signal to kick off the parade, after being contacted by the railroad officials who normally stop train traffic for it.

The parade proceeds down the highway (closed to traffic both ways), then turns at 5th Street in Farwell, going south past the Farwell **Convalescent Center and** ending at the Farwell city park.

Helping out in this area will be Michelle Agee, who will be stationed at the railroad crossing, and Michael Gibson, who will be at the end point of the parade to direct participants where to park.

After the parade, which normally takes about 35 minutes, folks will congregate at the Farwell City Park for a large variety of food and entertainment, highlighted by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club's BBQ.





A fund for the Garza family has been set up at the Texico branch of Citizens Bank.



2nd among Texas counties in ensilage production, 3rd in sorghum, 7th in wheat and 9th in corn.

Cotton sales lead crop receipts with \$28.8 million

average annual sales from 2005 to 2008.

The county also produces \$26.2 million in other crops, mostly from alfalfa and veggies. Parmer County is one of only a handful of High Plains coun-

ties producing a significant veggie crop.


The county's value of livestock sales is greater than crop receipts. Almost half (\$150.2 million) of the \$304.3 million in livestock receipts are from fed beef.

Parmer County ranked 3rd in cash receipts from fed beef among Texas counties from 2005 to 2008 and 4th in cattle sales nationally.

A total of 2,143 people were employed in Parmer County agribusinesses during 2007 with an associated payroll of \$61.9 million.


Also, 1,922 people were either employed full- or part-time on local farms and ranches earning \$24.6 million annually.

It should be noted that the ag impact in the county's economy is underestimated, since the economic contributions of public sector employees working in ag and the 796 farm and ranch operators are not considered in this analysis.

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





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On rights

Do you really know what a "right" is? Do you know what rights you possess?

Often we hear people saying they have a "right" to this or that (such as "governmentally-provided" health care or other subsidies), and sometimes it almost sounds like they might have a point. However, it is easy to tell a right from a "gimme", if you know the nature of rights.

A right is something you can do, without asking permission from anyone, simply because you are alive. Anything that does not violate another

person's identical and equal rights is within your rights to do, whether trivial or monumentally important, and obviously, regardless of whether it is mentioned in the Bill of Rights or

A right can only be respected or violated. It can not be limited, regurestricted. lated, licensed, or taxed as all these are just different

violations of the right. A right does not place an obligation on anyone else on your behalf, and "having to put up with being offended" by your actions does not equal an "obligation" on anyone else. In other words, as long as you are not harming or threatening to harm any innocent person while you exercise your right it doesn't how matter upset, offended, or "scared" someone gets by your

A right to health care just means no one has the authority to prevent you from seeking health care; it doesn't mean anyone has an obligation to provide you with health care at their expense or by their actions.

The Bill of Rights was seriously misnamed as it did nothing to "give" you rights, but was simply written and ratified to make it illegal for government, at any level (yes, even without the 14th Amendment; read the Constitution- Article IV, Section 2 if you don't believe me) to make any "laws" in an attempt to violate anyone's preexisting rights (a redundant phrase).

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





On June 12, 1961, Rotary International approved the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club. Both the Portales and Melrose Rotary Clubs helped with the organiza-

murders. The story goes something like this:


"A long time ago, there was a family that lived down the road from Farwell (out past Lunsford Auto Parts). One day, the man told everyone in town that his wife and children up and left to Oklahoma, and that he was going to follow them there. He decided to have an auction at his house to get rid of all his things, and a woman named Kate Hamlin was in charge.

"While looking through the house, she discovered that all the mother's and children's clothes were still hanging in the closet, so she left and told the sheriff what she had seen. Of course, they started investigating and one day the wagon accidentally rolled into the cellar and sunk because the dirt there was soft. When they went to go remove the wagon, they saw a hand sticking out of the dirt.

"They discovered the rest of the bodies that day, and arrested Mr. Hassell. He had killed his entire family. He was sent to trial and is the only man who has been sentenced to death in Parmer County."

Since he's been here, Bob has also seen a tornado go right through the middle of town, been on an undefeated Farwell High School football team, and saw Farwell men leave for war and never come home.

This little blast from the past taught me a lot about the history of our town that I never knew. I can just picture Farwell, Texas back in the day, when horses and wagons were parked all around town. What a sight that must've been.

Harry. "An old guy like me sure is proud of them."

One funny thing that Harry mentioned was about the weekly programs. "Everyone has to give a program once a week," he said. "Some have been interesting and fun, and others you can just call down right hilarious."



One last thing that Harry wanted to point out was that the Rotary is always looking for, and welcoming new, younger members to help serve the communi-



Cy Koehn: Missionary

ence halfway across the

Cyrus Koehn and his family all know what it's like to live in a third world country. In 1997, he and his family packed up and flew to Haiti, and that is where they stayed for seven years.

Their main goal throughout those years was mission work; they wanted to teach the Haitian people about the Gospel. Also, they did humanitarian aid work such as building a church.

"Many people think that the entire country is deforested and bad, he said. but on the west end, where we stayed, it's beautiful. There's tropical plants, fruits of all kinds, and they average about 40 inches of rain per year."

Even though the landscape is amazing there, the Koehn family did have to pay a price for its beauty. Roads were extremely rough; it took about 10 hours to go 185 miles, and in some places, they could only go 5 miles per hour. Also, they lived in a rented house with no air conditioning and no electricity.

They even had to build a road to get to their house, because when they arrived a road didn't exist there.

Cy said, Their way of living reminded me of Bible times. A large percentage of the people went barefoot; their living space (huts) averaged about 20 by 20 square feet; there were hardly any commercial vehicles, and the women carried loads of vegetables and fruit on their heads when they went to market."

"It was like stepping

back in time, he said.

In contrast to the conditions, the people of Haiti are very friendly. They are always smiling and were very welcoming when the Koehn family arrived.

As most know, Haiti was devastated by an earthquake on Jan. 12, 2010. A month later, Cy traveled back to Haiti to help some of the people there.

When he arrived in Puerto Prince, he said the downtown looked like a complete war zone. The streets that were once packed with hundreds of people were now deserted. The buildings were just in shambles, as he put it.



In most past issues of this newspaper, Page 3 was devoted to the Cannon Ball Motor Co. in Texico, which turned out to be a scam perpetrated by this newspaper's owner along with others.

long Texas cotton fields under a hot sun. have gotten some of that lead in my blood, because I went on to get a degree in journalism in the 1970's, after spending 13 years in the U.S. Navy.

In the mid 1950s, rock and roll music was introduced. Farwell didn't have a radio station at that time so us kids listened mostly to KCLV-AM out of Clovis.

Elvis Presley had one of the very first top hits on the radio with "Heartbreak Hotel". Later, I met Mae Boren Axton and her son Hoyt from Broken Bow, Okla., who co-wrote that song for Elvis.

When rock music was born, my family and I were members of the First Baptist Church of Farwell. Not only was our preacher against the new musical rage, our parents did not care much for it either and everyone said "it would ruin us!"

Not many people realized back then, that the name "Rock and Roll" was derived from a slang term referring to having a sexual relationship in the back seat of a car, causing it to "rock and roll."

I remember the day that a singer and his band came from the Texas State Fair and set up a stage in front of Farwell High and entertained us. And how some of us went to hear Gene Vincent sing "Be Boppa Lula" at the Clovis High School gym. And, how could I forget, after I got old enough to drive, cruising up and down the main street of Clovis, listening to Don and Phil Everly sing "Bye, Bye Love" on KCLV-AM because FM radio stations had not materialized as yet.

But there I was, in my 1946 Ford coupe, in t-shirt and jeans, with blue suede shoes and a duck tail haircut "be-bopping" up and down the avenue, stopping at times to eat a few taquito's at the drive-in and "digging the disks that were the most from coast to coast."

I decided that one day I would be a radio disk jockey. I joined the Navy and attended Communications Technician School at Imperial Beach, Calif. I learned about all types of electronic communications, including teletype, voice and Morse Code and was granted a top secret security clearance.

I did not get my chance to be a disk jockey until Continued on Page 142



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

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
