Biggest BTM crowd ever

A note from longtime Border Town Days Chairman Mike Pomper:

"Each year, I say we have a huge crowd because it's never possible to get an exact count. Folks come and go and I estimate between 2,000 and 3,000 folks attend each year.

"But this year was different. I believe it was the largest crowd in the 25 years I have been attending BTM.

"Why? Because we had a huge parade, a record number of arts and crafts vendors; a record number of concessions, a record number of kiddie rides and a record number of class reunions.

"I also heard from several other folks that they didn't remember as large a crowd as this one was.

"Thus, although I have no idea of what the total might be, I would say this was our largest BTM crowd ever."

Pomper has been BTM chairman for 24 years and will be resigning at Monday's BTM Committee wrap-up meeting.

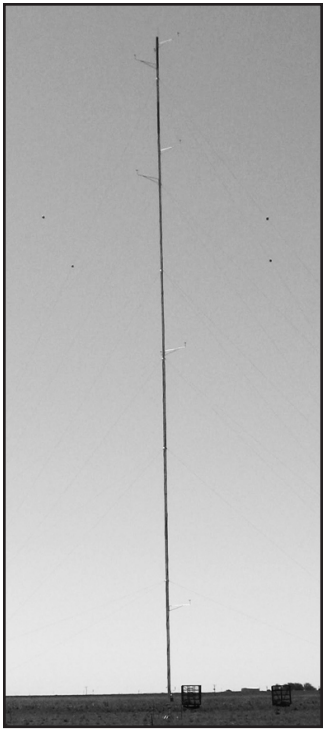

Beautification project underway

The Texico Beautification Project is underway and is running smoothly.

What this project consists of is making the entrance into New Mexico more appealing and better looking. The money came from the federal stimulus package, which totaled around \$250,000.

The district decided to turn the money over to the highway department since they had the right people to handle the project. The highway department drew up the plans, which they took over to the city for them to look over.

This project consists of planting trees on the east side of the street in buffalo grass, as well as putting trees along A-Me-D's restaurant. They also plan to put a few benches and trash cans around



the area.

The other part of the project that was completed is the new sign along with stepping stones and a newly filled sidewalk that has the word TEXICO spelled out.

The city will be in charge of maintaining the area. They plan on using a drip system to

keep the trees watered, and will also do the mowing, as well as all the other upkeep.

This area is also handicap accessible, and the sign has LED lights on it which show up very nicely at night.

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices have continued to trade up one day and down the next. Prices have basically built a sideways range at current levels over the last couple of weeks. Cash trade ended a little lower late last week on light volume. Technically, there is no clear direction at this time which is one reason prices have remained flat. There are some seasonal tendencies which point to lower prices during the month on August.

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices have traded back high enough to call this rally a test of the Spring highs. Last weeks USDA Cattle on Feed report continues to point towards sharply higher placements compared to year ago levels. For the second month in a row, placements have been in the double digits above year ago levels. Technically, trends are still pointing higher, but seasonal pressure may be seen in the month of August.

CORN: Corn prices turned short term trends down early last week, but have since turned back higher. Next level of resistance lies between the \$4.10-4.15 level basis the December contract. This was also the February high. Next level would be the high made on January 4th and also the high for the year around \$4.50. Again, crop looks like it will come in near an all time record which becomes fundamentally confusing, but Fund buying has continued to push prices to sharply higher levels.

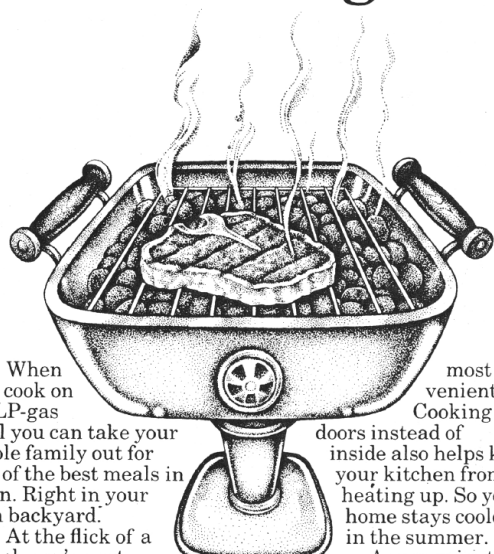
SOYBEANS: Soybean prices continue to rally after turning up their long term trends in early July. Once prices closed above the \$9.50 level basis the November contract, all trends turned higher. Although the market is still looking for a record crop this year, Fund buying continues to push the market to sharply higher levels. Next level of resistance comes in around the old high at \$10.50 basis the November contract.

WHEAT: Prices have basically lead the pack on the drive towards higher prices. There is news that Russia may end up loosing about 20% of their crop, but this seems to have been the headline for the last few weeks. Funds actually have this market running higher. World stocks remain historically large and demand historically low. In other words, the supply/demand numbers still don't support this rally.

COTTON: Cotton prices have gotten a boost off the grain complex. Prices were trading in the middle of a four month range last week and have now begun to move higher. There a couple of resistance levels above the market which are \$80 and \$82 basis the December contract. Not much change in the demand side, but still plenty of optimistic traders as the Dollar continues to weaken.

TEXICO SCHOOLS SCHOOL DISTRICT 2008-2009 REPORT CARD

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) is often called the "Nation's Report Card" because it allows the comparison of student performance across states and for the national as a whole. NAEP does not replace the Standards Based Assessment (SBA) that students take every year, which measures student performance according to New Mexico curriculum standards.

All students in New Mexico are required to take the SBA, while the NAEP selects representative samples of students. The sampling method does not allow for reporting results by district, much like a political poll does not sample and report by neighborhood. For further information, visit the NAEP web site at <http://nces.ed.gov/nationsreportcard>.

NAEP assessments have been given in subjects such as reading, mathematics, science, writing, U.S. history, geography, the arts, and others. Reading and mathematics are assessed every two years at grades 4 and 8. Science is assessed every four years. Results presented here are from 2009 (reading and mathematics), and from 2005 (science).

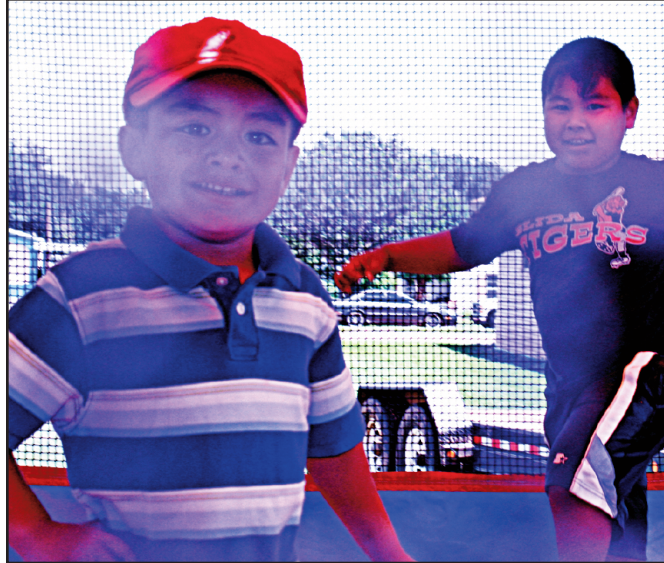
