The 7-1 Farwell Steers (2-0 in district) continued a great football season by defeating the Sudan Hornets 34-0, to ensure a state playoff berth.

The game opened as a defensive struggle, with Lincoln Devault showing tough defense.

With just over two minutes left in the first quarter, the Steers took possession near midfield.

Big plays by Collin Christian and Colby Read took the ball down to the Sudan 11 where,

on the last play of the quarter, Actkinson's pass to Devault put the Steers on the board. The Actkinson kick made it 7-0.

The Steers' Christian recovered a Sudan fumble. Again, the Steers struck swiftly, this time on a 24-yard TD pass from Actkinson to Christian. The kick made it 12-0 just a minute into the 2nd quarter.

Sudan fought back hard with a big gain, On defense, Julian Cuevas

had a spectacular tackle. Going for it on a 4th and 4, Sudan made a 1st down. But faced moments later with a 4th and 3, the Hornets were denied by a tackle in the backfield by Zac Stancell.

### Was your paper out of order last week?

A note from Tribune publisher Rob Pomper:

Some folks noticed we were a little late getting the Tribune to the newsstand last week, and some papers were late being delivered.

We ran into press problems in Clovis.

Our routine is pretty simple here at the paper. We put everything together on Monday and Tuesday, and the paper is printed in Clovis Wednesday morning.

But when the press broke down, it made things a bit interesting for us.

The Tribune was actually printed around 11 p.m. in Roswell, N.M.

I drove there, picked it up and spent the night putting mailing labels on and stuffing the inserts in. By 6 a.m., it was done.

It was ready just in time for the post offices in Farwell and Texico to open.

The press in Roswell is a little different from our normal Clovis press.

For one thing, it can't print 18 pages at a time.

You might have noticed that pages 7 through 12 were a little out of order?

That was the only way they could print it while

still keeping color on the front and back pages.

There was also an issue with color inside the paper. They could only put color on pages 1, 2, 17, and 18. We had originally planned color for pages 4 and 15, too.

I was a little disappointed about losing color on page 15. That was the page with the Texico Lady Spikers vol-

leyball team raising money for breast cancer research.

In their games against Portales and Estancia they wore pink uniforms and socks. In all, the three teams raised over \$4,000.

They did a great job, and if you look back at those pictures, just imagine a little pink to go along with a great story.

I've always respected Naz for their sports program and development of their student athletes.

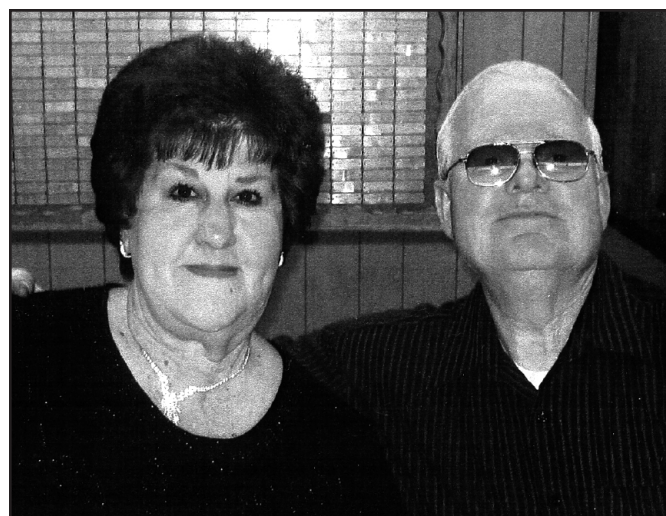

Steve Meeks briefed the Farwell City Council on Oct. 19 on plans to construct the animal detention facility the city has been required to establish.

The facility can be completed for under \$60,000 and the council accepted his bid. Meeks anticipates construction to begin within three weeks.

In other business:

-- The council received a report on the sewer piping discovered on the 900 block of 4th street to be of sub-standard dimensions. Replacement of that 185 length of piping will begin as soon as possible.

-- Mike Galvan requested clarification on the more vigorous pursuit of the city's ordinances regarding property, pets, and vehicles. The council emphasized that almost all these regulations have existed on the books for years but until recently, the city had become lax in their enforcement.

Galvan was assured that homes with wood-burning fireplaces stacking their fuel in the yards shouldn't be a concern as long as the cords of wood were neatly stacked and did not offer an apparent habitat for skunks or rodents.

-- Isidro Galvan said he had essentially the same questions. Both expressed concerns that the increased emphasis on code enforcement might lead to officers looking over back fences or even peering into the windows of homes.

Chief Larry Kelsay assured them that code enforcement would never intrude into the citizens' right to privacy on their own property, saying that the only time law enforcement might peer through a window would be in response to calls.

In those instances in which officers called to a home or business find that no one comes to the door at their knock, he noted, there is always the chance that the person who made the call could not respond because of a fall, injury, or other perilous situation.

-- Queried about the regulation against keeping dogs in a yard on a chain or rope, Mayor Jim Mace noted that pedestrians might be attacked by a dog on a chain while a fenced pet prevented an incident like that from occurring. He emphasized that dogs kept as home protection needed to be kept inside the home and that that signs advising "Beware of Dog" ought to be posted in those situations.

-- Other citizens expressed appreciation for the improvements thus far in the city's appearance resulting from the re-invigorated enforcement of standards; however, some expressed dismay that

the city itself might be negligent in maintaining property under its own jurisdiction.

These concerns included steel lids improperly replaced after reading water meters, weeds on Main Street, the increase of grass, holes, and accumulations of gravel in the city's gutters and intersections, and the disappearance of signs warning that a neighborhood child is hearing-impaired.

"Those are all excellent points," Mace replied. "This summer's installations of fiber optics throughout the city have taken a lot more time and effort from our city workers than I think anyone ever expected."

"Now we're getting near the end of the fiber optics project," he continued, "we'll be looking at catch-up in all these areas."

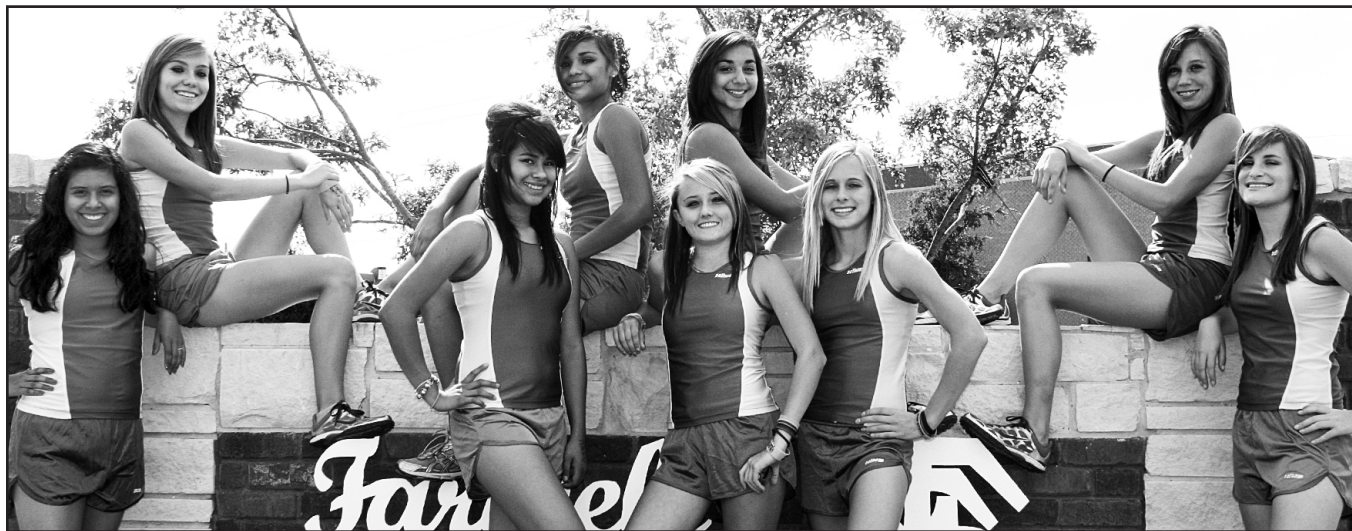

- Heard the police department made a DWI arrest over the weekend.

- Discussed using Farwell Fuels card stop for city vehicles.

- Was approached by Clovis Public Works to do future street paving for Texico. They will be included on the bid list.

**Special screenings slated**

Scan Specialists USA will be at Farwell Schools on Wednesday, Oct. 29 to perform nine ultrasound screenings for vascular disease and stroke.

The screening will be set up at Farwell High School in the gym foyer from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The cost is \$45 each or all nine for \$189.

They will scan neck arteries, the main artery off the heart, the thyroid, liver, spleen, both kidneys, gallbladder, and the arteries in the legs for P.A.D.

These tests are typically NOT performed at annual checkups, and insurance companies won't pay for them unless you are symptomatic, said Farwell School nurse Luann Fillpot.

Pre-registration is necessary. Call 1 (800) 931-4772 to schedule an appointment.

If you have high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, or if you have a family history of heart disease, stroke or cancer, please consider the ultrasound screening for early detection, said Mrs. Fillpot.

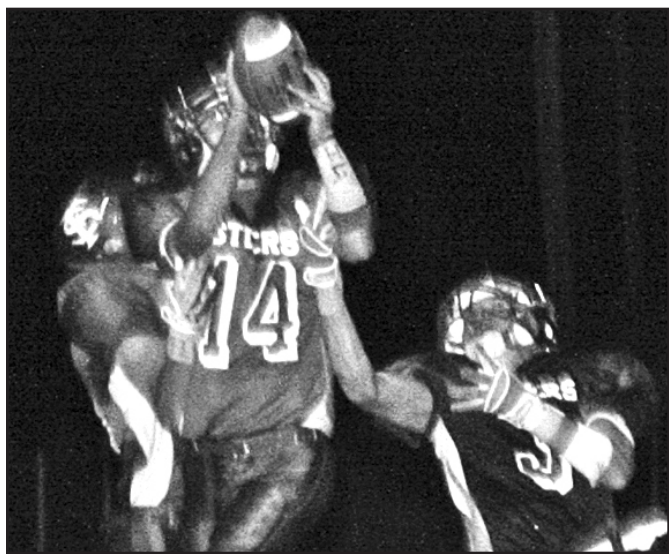
## Farwell football support fund set

**The big winner on election day**

"A government big enough to give you everything you want, is strong enough to take everything you have. The course of history shows that as a government grows, liberty decreases."

That sentiment has been attributed variously to Thomas Jefferson, Davy Crockett, and other great Americans although the precise quote above came from President Jerry Ford more than 30 years ago.

Whoever may have said it first or said it most forcefully, there can be no denying its truth and today, more than ever, it is vital for America's political leadership to take it to heart.

Sadly, however, it seems the agents of big-government in both parties don't really care much about the American people anymore. Many (including our president himself) have unblushingly dismissed the Constitution as a flawed document.

In that case, the freedoms the Constitution guarantees the American people become no more than obstacles for his anointed vision for change in our nation.

Studying the political machinations of the last century will reveal the schemes of the political class, regardless of party, to whittle down the freedoms of the American people.

Freedom is, of course, the reason our nation was founded in the first place. Americans have historically cherished freedom more than any other virtue. The 1st Amendment of the Bill of Rights guaranteed the five great freedoms of religion, speech, press, assembly, and petition.

The Declaration of Independence begins by acknowledging that the freedoms of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness are bestowed NOT by our government, but by our Creator. This was a critical point then and even more so now because if big-government could claim to be the provider of freedom then it could claim the authority to remove that freedom at any time.

America climbed to power in the world over

two centuries on the framework of free citizens engaged in a free market; however, both Democrats and Republicans now seem to be either indifferent or openly hostile to the whole concept of free enterprise. In fact, the common joke in Washington D.C., is that the main difference between the parties is that Democrats want our country to become socialist overnight while the Republicans are content to wait until next week.

That might be funny if it were not so true.

This push for socialism is not because it has ever been the lamp to a society that is more prosperous or that offers more justice than America's free market system; truth be told, socialism has failed or is failing every place it's been tried.

No, the attraction to socialism for our political class is that it creates a benefactor-suppliant relationship between government and the governed. When a government can make its people dependent, it has also made them obedient in many ways, and that seems to be the real goal of the party elites.

From entitlement programs to tax rates, big government strives to make Americans more dependent and less free. Congress is currently considering bills that reduce freedom of speech and freedom of the press. Despite the 1st Amendment assurance that there shall be no infringement on religious practice, Christianity is increasingly shackled by law and court decisions.

The Constitutional

guarantees for private property were violated more than 5,000 times in the last 10 years as big-government misused eminent domain to dispossess American families of their homes and businesses in order to transfer possession to private concerns that would pay more in taxes.

And the beat goes on, from student loans to home mortgages to energy consumption to the light-bulbs in our homes to the cattle's flatulence in our fields, big-government's tentacles are reaching everywhere.

As government control of the American people cranks up several more notches each year, there comes a point where we cease to be citizens and start to be subjects. As the screws tighten after that, subjects become no more than serfs. It is clearly true that as government grows, liberty decreases.

The silver lining to all this is that the American people are beginning to recognize these threats to their freedom. The approval rating for Congress is now about 11 percent, the lowest ever recorded.

Americans through this primary season have repeatedly rejected the lap-dog candidates that the party elites foisted off on them. In town hall meetings and political rallies and petition drives, Americans are telling the political class that they have been pushed too far.

The next real measure of the American people's wrath will be on Nov. 2. Let's hope that the big winner in 2010, for the first time in decades, will be the Constitution and the freedom it enshrines for the American people.

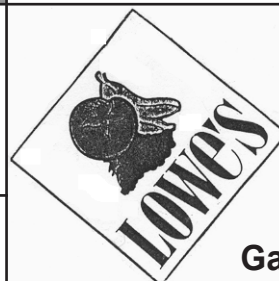
