## Some Things Seem To Be Too Hot To Handle

Every once in a while, there comes along a problem that touches so many people that those who might be in a position to do something about it are a little bit leery of even bringing up the subject for discussion, for fear that they might touch off a chain of repercussions.

Such is the problem of permitting water from irrigation wells to run down ditches and impair the proper maintenance of the public right-of-way.

This particular problem had been called to the attention of this newspaper on more than one occasion, and upon very little investigation it was discovered that this problem was certainly one of a very real nature; not just blown up by some imaginative farmer.

The subject was taken before the commissioners of Parmer County by a representative of the newspaper, because it was felt that these officials would have come to grips with the problem more than any other group of persons.

Among other things, the commissioners were asked if they would not take a stand against such practices, insofar as the pursuit of them placed a hardship upon the county as a whole.

These four men, whom this newspaper believes to be sincere individuals anxious to handle the affairs of the county as wisely as possible, were extremely cautious over speaking out against the carelessness—or sometimes deliberate acts—of farmers who let water run in "bar pits".

Every commissioner agreed that the problem was creating hardships in their precincts, and made it difficult to properly grade and maintain roads. Several specific examples were cited by these men of cases in which the practice not only proved to be a nuisance, but a downright danger to the lives of persons who attempt to travel the roads near irrigated fields.

"Well, you know what they say," said one commissioner. "The more you stir it, the more it stinks. I think we'd just better let sleeping dogs lie."

Others agreed that it might not be best to antagonize the public, especially when some officials pointed out that private parties were already virtually at each other's throats in a number of cases in water right-of-way disputes.

Surely, it is understandable how a man in public office is seldom anxious to "ride" the public to walk the narrow line of absolute adherence to the law.

By the same token, it is dangerous to the welfare of common justice for there to be no champions of civil laws. Contempt for law is a most dangerous thing.

But the problem is still there. Carelessness or wilful misuse of public property for private convenience in the matter of irrigation is placing a burden upon the men who daily attempt to see that county roads are attended to in the proper manner.

In turn, the added expense of postponing the servicing of roads is placing a burden on the county taxpayers as a whole.

A realistic approach to new farming methods, coupled with consideration for one's neighbors, can and will prevent such problems as this one.

## A Practical Approach To a Tremendous Project

It would be accurate to say that there is no one thing that civic-minded persons living in Texico-Farwell would like to see more than the establishment of a small hospital or clinic near or in the Twin Cities.

This is the perennial subject for discussion in such groups as chambers of commerce and other organizations devoted to the development of the community. Like the old farmer, it might be observed that "everybody talks about the weather (hospital), but nobody does anything about it."

For years and years, the idea of such a project has been tossed to and fro, with the result that just about everybody has had his say, and that's about as far as it went.

Directors of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce revived the idea this week. Here it might be well to mention that something may be expected out of this group, since it has just undergone a "revival" itself. Only one director did not make the meeting Monday night, and that was because he was called out of town.

They hit the same old obstacle with about the same old resounding thud that other well-meaning groups have encountered. The financial limitations of a community the size of this one seem almost an insurmountable obstacle when one first learns just how much capital might be necessary to build and furnish a modest 20-patient hospital with provisions for surgery. To be blunt, it would make your hair stand on end.

That's exactly why things have rocked along for such a long time with the result of exactly nothing for all the time and effort.

A modern brick hospital, outfitted with a first-class physician, technician, staff of nurses, other personnel, and all the equipment needed to compete with larger hospitals in larger towns would indeed be nice for the people of the community.

On the other hand, it might be better to lower our sights for a few years and determine just what is and what is not within the reach of recognized financial limitations.

People who are supposed to have studied the matter say that the Twin Cities won't be able to attract a resident doctor "worth a dime" unless they make hospital facilities available to him.

If the community can't afford a hospital, then it will have to turn elsewhere for help. Perhaps to some neighboring city where a cooperative program could be worked out.

An office for emergency care, preliminary diagnosis, and temporary treatment manned by a full-time doctor who resides in the city should, in the opinion of this newspaper, be the initial goal of persons interested in raising our present standards.

X-ray, surgical and long-term attention might well be administered in a hospital in a neighboring community, providing, of course, arrangements between that group and the local physician could be worked out.

Here's what needs to be done immediately:

- (1) Determine how much it will cost to build and equip an office for private practice.
- (2) See if a cooperative hospital program could be worked out.
- (3) Find out through reputable channels if a doctor would be interested in the arrangement.
- (4) Then look into the matter of financing the project.

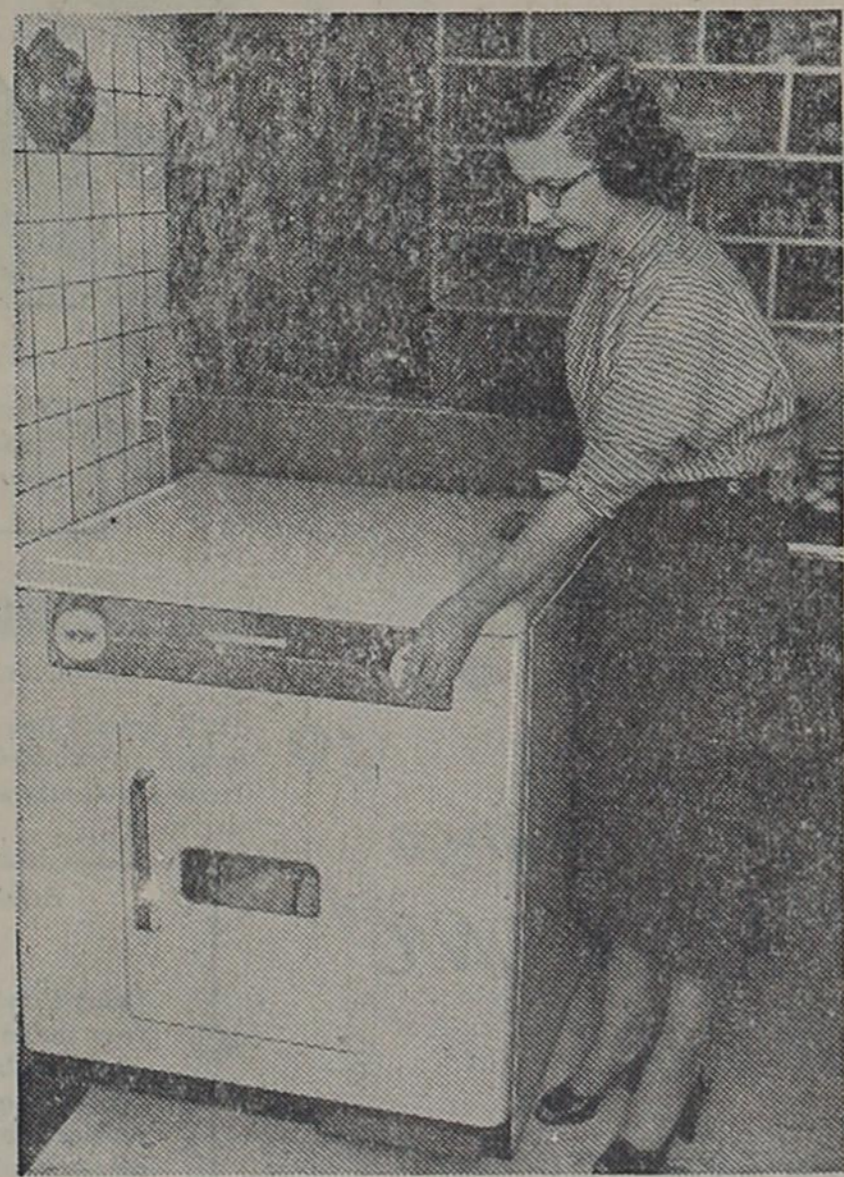

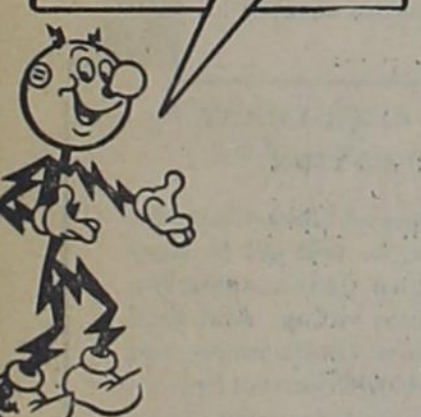

### NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

By RALPH SMITH

This legislative session is a busy one, apparently. Every effort is being made by the administration to avoid any new taxes for the next biennium. We think this is good strategy if means can be found for administering efficiently the necessary activities. Texas Farm Bureau strongly recommended increases in appropriations for Texas A&M, Extension Service, and Experiment Stations. Production is an important item in assuring a balanced economy, and experimentation is the only method for improving it. Neither the House nor Senate heeded Farm Bureau's recommendations in this case. It is still possible that these vital and necessary increases will be included in the compromise bill to be reported out by the free conference committee.

Of importance to stockmen is SB 167 and its companion, HB 247 making it illegal to feed raw garbage to swine. The bills were presented in an effort to control vesicular exanthema in swine. Since Oklahoma has passed a similar, but much stronger bill than these, and since most swine from Texas are shipped to Oklahoma, it is very important that the bills be passed as a protection to Texas swine growers. Unless we have such provisions, it is very possible that Texas swine may be barred from entering the adjoining state. Texas Farm Bureau is strongly favoring these bills, in accordance with resolutions adopted at the State Convention last November.

As a result of resolutions approved by Texas members last year, Texas Farm Bureau also favors very strongly SB 7, introduced by

Senator Grady Hazlewood, authorizing the Railroad Commission to set minimum prices for natural gas in certain areas. Though the opposing interests have made this move look very unfavorable to the consumer, it is a conservation measure that appears necessary if we are to continue to have this economical fuel for Texas use.

These subjects are not local in origin, but we feel they are of extreme interest to local agricultural folks.

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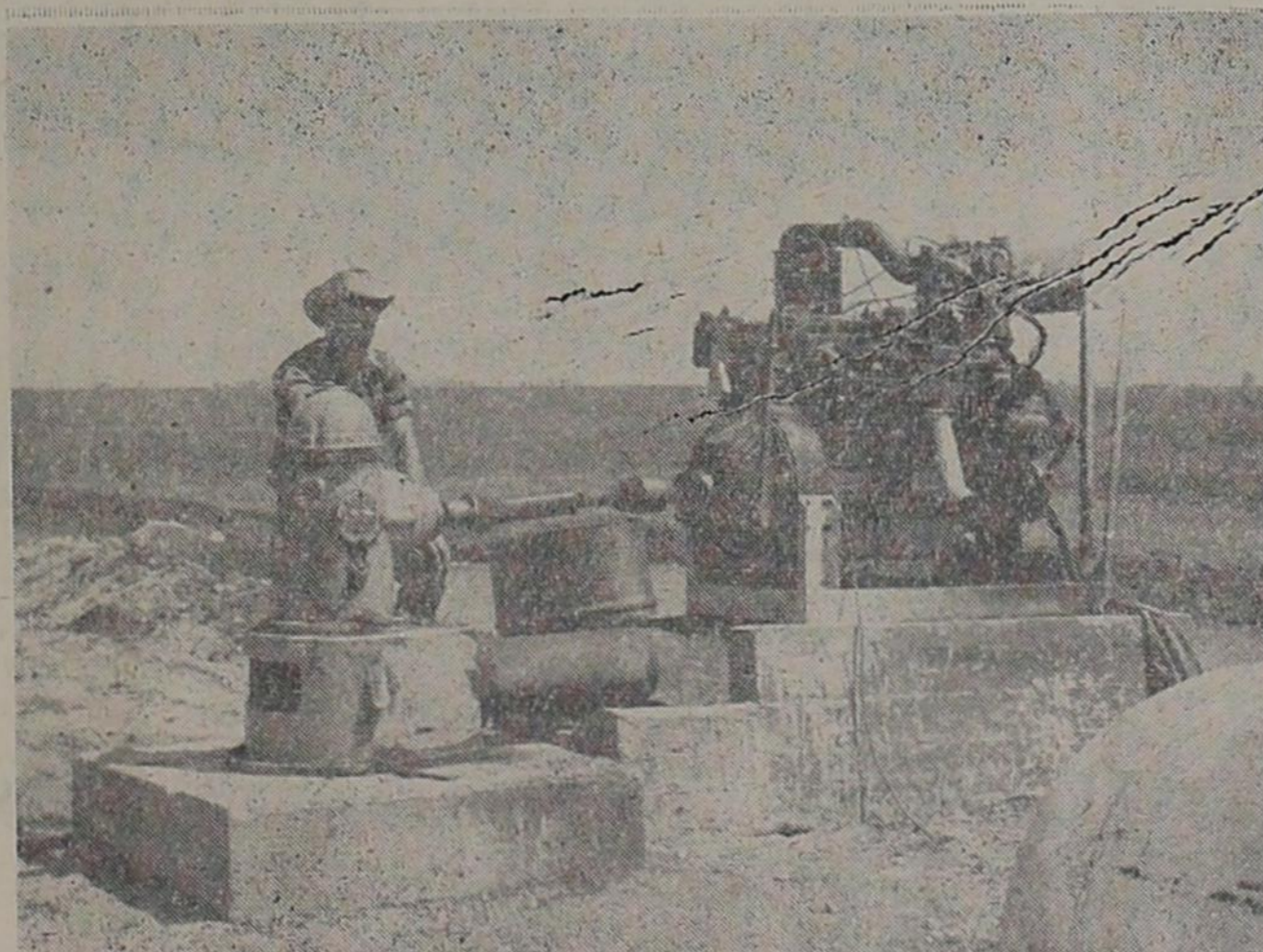

Agent Advises On Fertilizer Situation

A situation, says Joe Jones, county agent, has developed in the fertilizer field which is causing concern among farmers. Ammonium nitrate, he says, is in short supply but farmers should not fail to use a nitrogen fertilizer if one is needed to boost crop and pasture yields.

Texas Extension service's agricultural chemist, M.K. Thornton's recommendation for overcoming the existing shortage is to use ammonium sulphate. He says the supply of this material is plentiful and readily available. It contains 21 percent nitrogen as amount of

nitrogen in the soil, Thornton says, just apply one half more ammonium sulphate. In other words, 150 would contain the same amount of nitrogen as 100 pounds of the ammonium nitrate.

The specialist adds that results from the use of the substitute should be just as good or better especially on neutral and or slightly alkaline soils.

Finally, he says, don't let the short supply and high price of ammonium nitrate curtail the use of nitrogenous fertilizer because a good one that will do the job is available.

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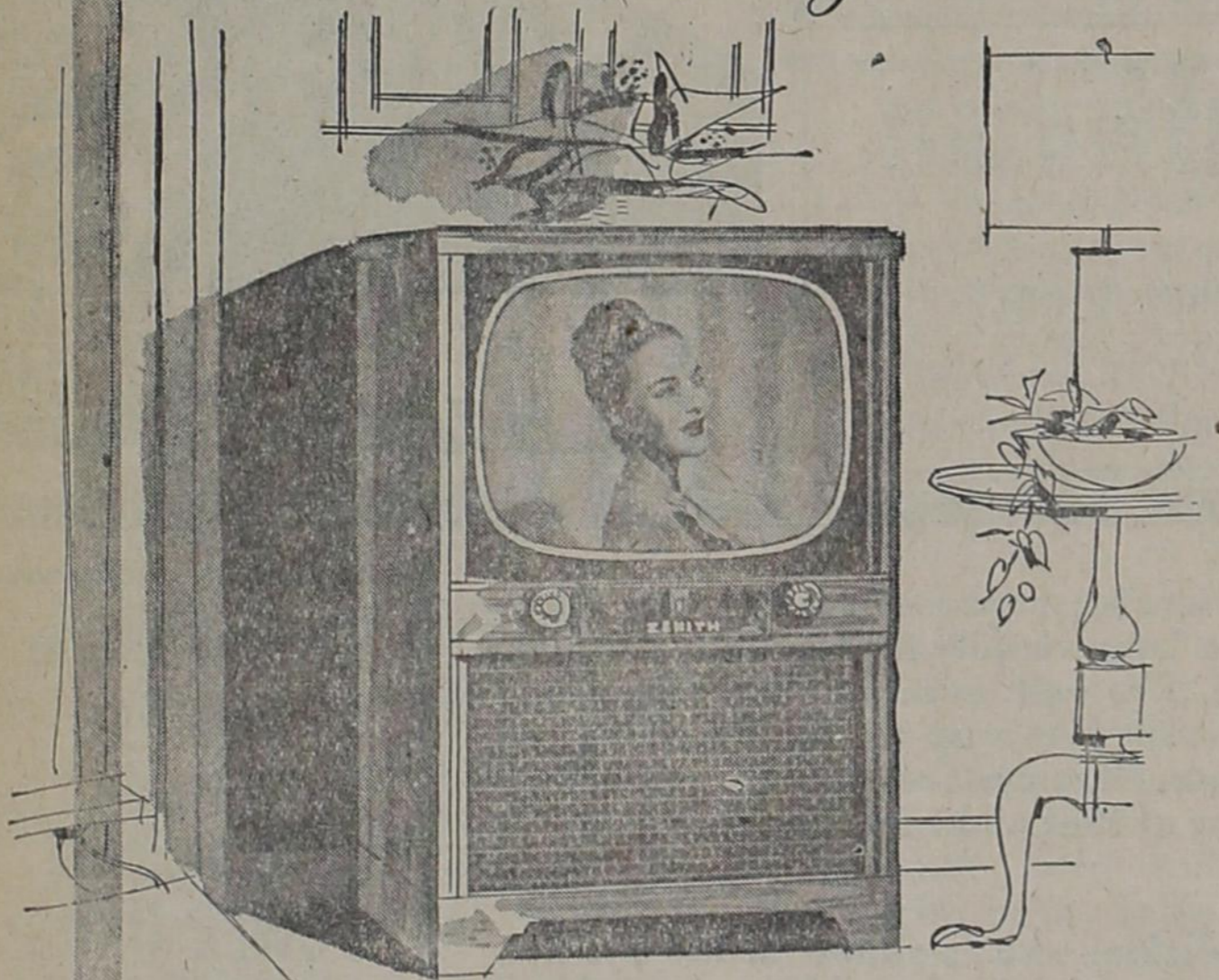
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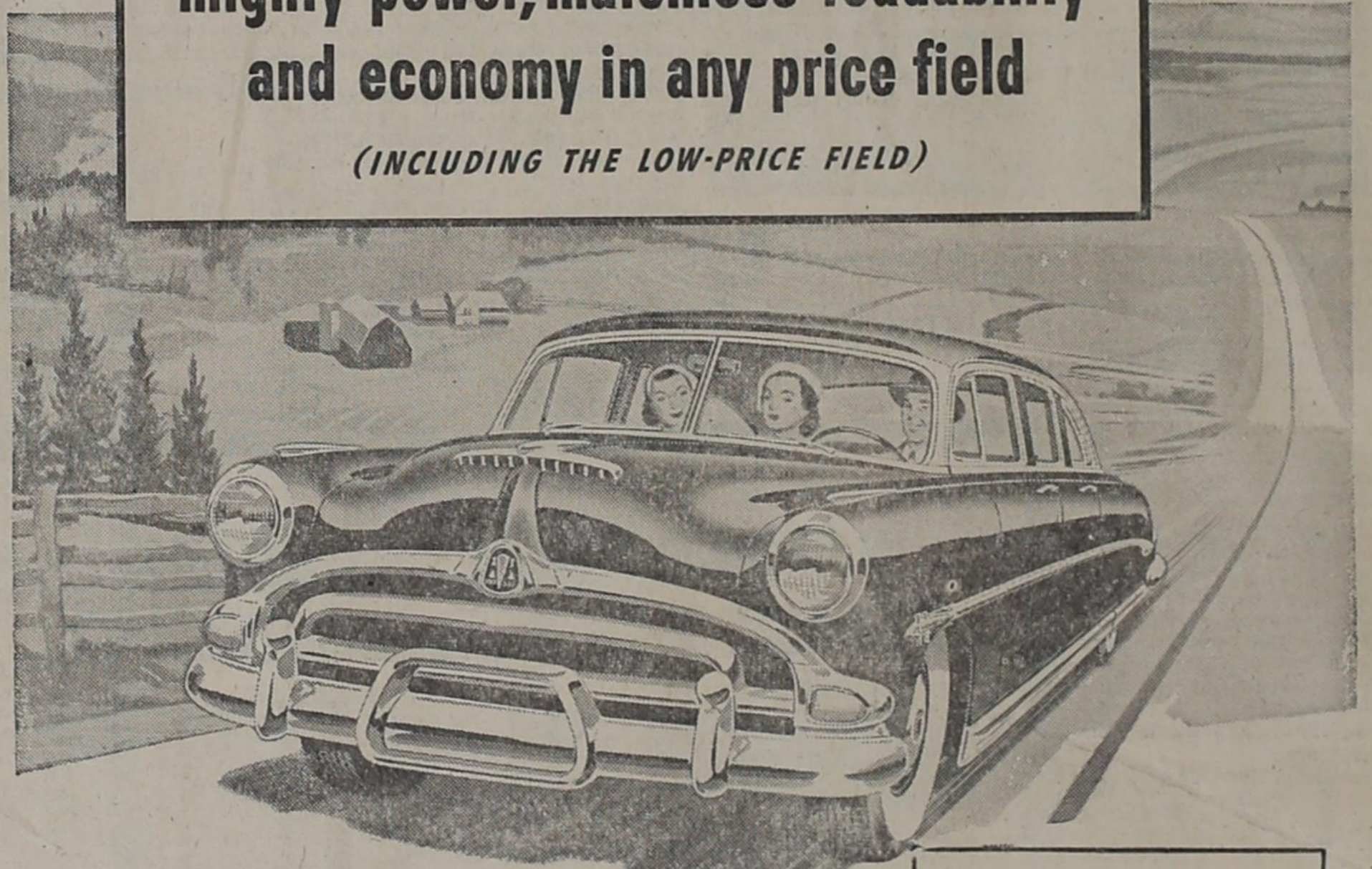

WINTERS, April 6 (RNS)—"Traveling light" may be ideal for some people, but trying to do so with two babies and a five-year old can become something of a headache, according to Mrs. Dell Gunn, daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. J.M. Gunn of Bovina.

Mrs. Gunn left Winters Thursday for New York and from there will fly to Heilbronn, Germany, to join her husband. M-Sgt. Gunn, who has been overseas since September. Her problems have been many and varied. Flying has minimized many of them, but it has involved trying to figure just how little she and the children can get along with in the way of clothing.

The family is limited to two bags—one weighing a maximum of 100 pounds for Mrs. Gunn, and another with a maximum weight of 65 pounds for 5-year-old Ronnie. The babies get no luggage allowance, so the other two members of the family will have to share theirs. It isn't just clothing that will have to go along, for seven-months-old Jana Kay will have to have her milk and baby food. All in all it has taken some figuring to decide what to take, what to send to Germany as ship luggage in her 525 pound allotment of that, and what to leave behind.

"My information said our hold luggage should get to us within 24 hours of our arrival," Mrs. Gunn said, "but some of my friends have found unexpected delays can happen. I will really have a problem if mine is delayed."

"Trying to look after my three and keep them on the ship would have doubled my problems," she said. "I am so thankful we can fly. Besides it means I get to see Dell sooner. The last couple of weeks have seemed like a lifetime."

Most of this she was advised to bring by her husband or by friends who were living in Germany.

"I could not understand why they said bring measuring cups," she said "until a brother-in-law who had been overseas reminded me that German measurements were not the same as ours."

Material is available in Germany, she said, but friends told her there was a limited choice of patterns.

A completely new house is waiting for the Gunn family in Heilbronn, according to what the sergeant has written his wife.

"It is completely equipped," she said. "From what he writes, the quarters are perfect in every detail and very spacious. Help, too, seems to be no problem, as letters have told me that about \$24 a month is top salary for a maid or housekeeper."

Sergeant and Mrs. Gunn were working in Brownwood and he was stationed there. She is the former Wauldean Yates, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willis Yates of Winters. After graduation from Winters High School she attended McMurry College for a time before accepting a position in Brownwood.

The couple lived in Brownwood, Georgia and California before he went overseas to the Pacific theater in 1943. During the two years he was gone Mrs. Gunn made her home with her parents. After his return they lived at Fort Sam Houston and in Stephenville.

Mrs. Gunn left Winters Thursday for Stephenville accompanied by her mother and her sister, Barbara. From there she went to Fort Worth, where she began the first part of her journey by taking the train to Fort Hampton. From there she will fly to Germany.

Admission will be 25c and 10c. The proceeds will go toward finishing the nurse's room at the school.

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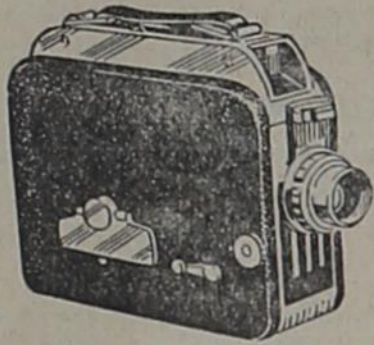

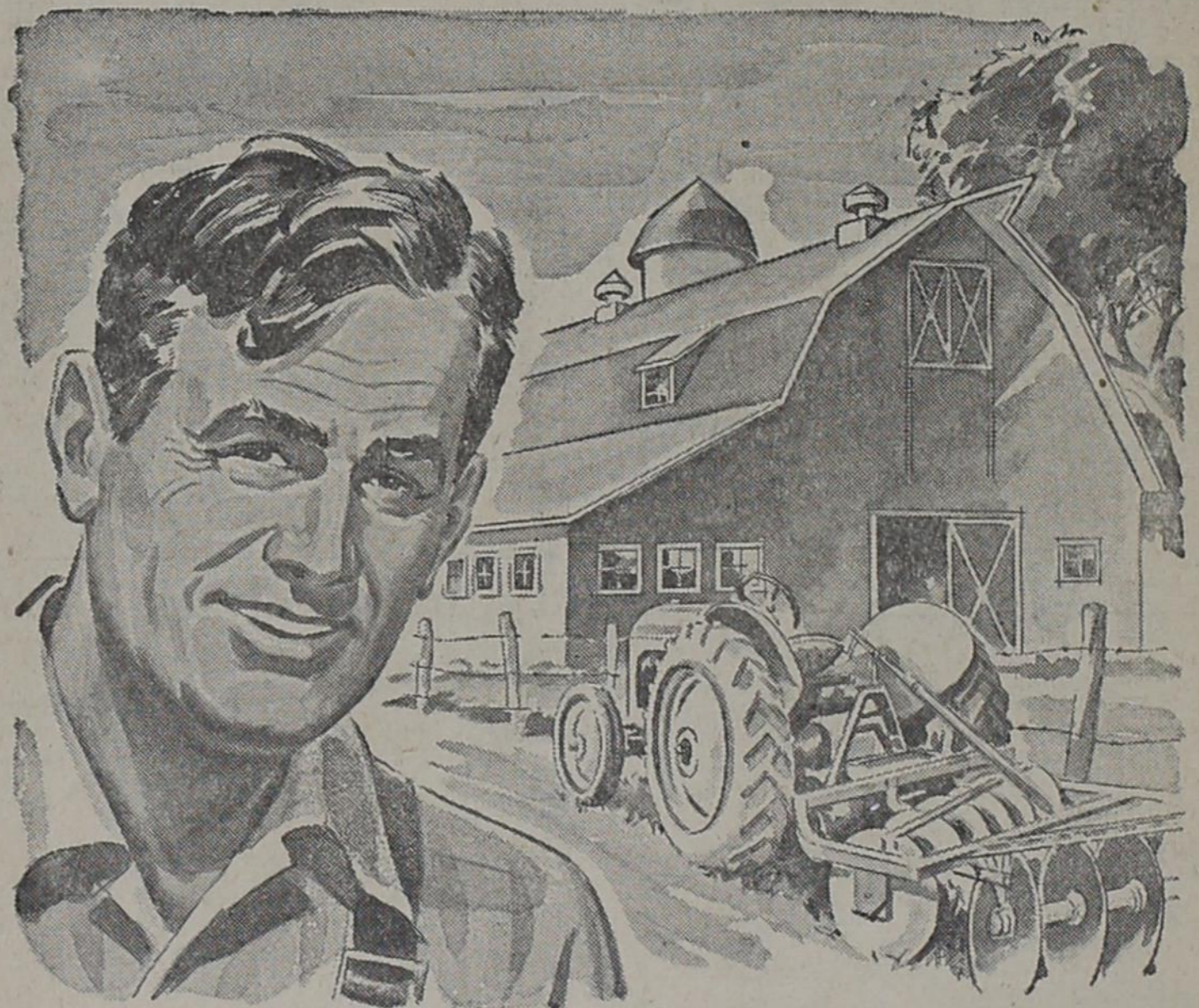
