



Lazbuddie artist publishes drawing

Alfredo Chavira began his art career as a kindergartener at Lazbuddie Elementary.

He remembers that he took the little animal stencils and started making his own improvements.

"I would take the tiger stencil and then add a hot air balloon or something to it," says Alfredo. "I have always loved art."

This love is paying off as Alfredo enters his senior year of high school. This summer, Alfredo submitted a drawing to a national art magazine called Lowrider Arte, published by Source Interlink Media.

Although Alfredo did not win the contest, they published his drawing on the back page of the August/September magazine issue. Now, he will be able to submit more drawings in the future.

His entry was an intricate pencil drawing featuring a man on a cross. Alfredo says that he visualizes his drawings in his head and he prefers the more intricate, detailed works.

"I enjoy drawing skulls because they can involve so much detail."

He also likes the graffiti type of drawing, tattoos, animation and band shirts. "I have tried graffiti with spray paint, but I really prefer to just use paper. I like to find clothing to decorate and will paint on my shirts or jeans."

Alfredo's friends also enjoy his art. "Most of my friends support my artwork and they gather around just to see what I have done."

His brother, Filiberto Derma, of Farwell, is a big supporter. Alfredo says and Filiberto drew some amazing artwork on the wall of the bedroom they shared.

Alfredo's friends sometimes pitch in to help ... as they did when he painted a Longhorn on the Lazbuddie concession stand or worked on the murals in the school building. He hopes he will be allowed to do one big mural on the cafeteria wall this year. He already has a design in mind and wants to leave his mark in the cafeteria.

If his art teacher, Sarah Black, has any input, Alfredo will get his wish. Mrs. Black admires her student for his talent and drive.

"Alfredo has always known that he wanted to be an artist. I have been his English and Art teacher since 7th grade and he has never wavered. He has always wanted to do art."

Mrs. Black adds that although Alfredo is a very good reader and writer and plays sports such as track and football at Lazbuddie, art has always been his passion. "He really has a very good portfolio. Over the years, I have gotten to watch him refine his artwork and he is really very good."

Mrs. Black said Alfredo wants to continue his art training after graduation and she supports the idea. "He is very talented."

Alfredo said he is now working on portraits and that this artwork is very challenging. "My artwork is definitely music related. I tend to do more abstract work that is heavier with darker shades."

Although some of his work is dark, Alfredo insists that he is not that dark, brooding artist personality. "I enjoy all types of art. I recently decorated a nursery for a friend who wanted a baby mural. I drew monkeys, zebras, giraffes, elephants, and even an alligator pond for the room. It was a lot of fun."

Although Alfredo has spent his entire life in Lazbuddie, he looks forward to moving to a larger area with an art institute. "Pratt Art Institute has facilities in New York or Dallas or Austin. I hope to continue my artwork at one of these."

And he believes that the animation field may be an option for him in the future. "I just would like to make art my career."

School lunch programs undergo nutritional changes

With the new school year just starting, your kids may be noticing some major changes in their lunches.

And the breakfast program will be affected next year.

Farwell School cafeteria manager Leticia Olmos says the Texas Department of Agriculture has issued many new guidelines for children's lunches.

"Coming from the Dietary Guidelines for Americans, many changes have been put in place for 2012. As cafeteria managers, it is our job to implement these mandated guidelines in our schools."

Changes include cutting out all trans-fat and limiting sodium dramatically. There is already a plan in place that continues to phase out sodium use gradually over the next 10 years.

Basically, the cafeteria menu must adhere to a strict minimum and maximum calorie guideline. For kindergarten through 5th graders, they are allowed 550 to 650 calories at lunch; 6th - 8th graders are allowed 600 to 700 calories; and 9th to 12th graders can have 750 to 850 calories.

School cafeterias also have strict rules concerning the types of foods to be offered.

Mrs. Olmos says, "Vegetables are broken down into categories such as red-orange, deep green, starchy, beans, etc. We are required to serve one red-orange and deep green vegetable per week and can only serve one type of starchy vegetable each week. This means that if one day we serve mashed potatoes, there can be no other starchy vegetable all week - no tater tots, french fries, etc. It is a highly disciplined menu system this year."

She says the Farwell cafeteria is going to try the already calculated menu that is published by the

Farwell comeback runs out of time

The Dimmitt Bobcats snuck out of Farwell with a 25-19 win last Friday despite a tremendous come from behind bid by the Steers in their season opener.

Erik Gaxiola and Daniel Kirkland sacked the Bobcat QB on the first play. The Dimmitt drive stalled at the Farwell 25 when they went for it on 4th down and J.J. Herrera knocked down a pass.

Farwell couldn't move the ball, and a Bretton Stancell punt pinned Dimmitt back. The Bobcats couldn't move the ball, and lost yardage on a 4th down attempt, giving Farwell the ball at midfield.

Kolten Morris ran for 6 and Collin Christian added another 5, but Dimmitt intercepted a pass and ran it back 50 yards for a TD and a 7-0 lead.

Curt Langford returned the kickoff to the the 22. Morris took a pitch 17 yards. The Farwell offense gained 7 more yards, but was forced to punt.

Dimmitt completed a big pass, and worked their way to the Farwell 6.

On first and goal, Lane Riley and Morris stuffed a play behind the line of scrimmage. Then Langford intercepted. Farwell was held to a punt, and the Bobcats marched down to take a 13-0 lead.

The Steers then put together a 10-play drive, marching the ball 70 yards into the end zone. Morris had back-to-back runs totaling 55 yards, and Christian tacked on 8 more, then connected on a pass to Herrera on 4th and 3 to bring the Steers to the 3 yard line.

Christian ran it in for a TD. The kick failed.

Dimmitt scored on a long pass, but Herrera

broke up the try for a two point conversion, leaving the score 19-6.

In the 3rd quarter, Farwell held Dimmitt to a three-and-out as Christian broke up a pass and stopped a screen pass from moving the chains.

Farwell fought back. Christian passed to Langford for 15, then pitched to Morris for 19 more. Christian scored from the 7 to make it 19-12.

The Steer defense again shut down the Bobcats, forcing a punt.

Christian completed a 10 yard pass Daniel Kirkland, ran for 12 yards and then connected on a screen pass to Morris for 19 more yards.

On the fifteen yard line, Farwell was faced with a fourth and inches, and the offensive line pushed back the Bobcats for the first down, but an interception stopped the drive moments later.

Olton was again kept to a 3 and out, thanks to a 20-yard loss on a Riley sack.

The Steers were on the move again. Christian ran for 40, then passed to Langford for 12 more to the Bobcat 8.

Christian then passed to Langford for a 7-yard TD. Stancell tacked on the extra point to make it 19-all.

On the last drive, the Steer defense forced Dimmitt into four consecutive third downs, but couldn't keep the Bobcats from scoring on a 4-yard run with 10 seconds left on the clock.

First downs - Farwell 6, Dimmitt 12; rushing, Farwell 236, Dimmitt 100; passing, Farwell 106, Dimmitt 248; penalties, Farwell 6 for 35; Dimmitt 8 for 60.



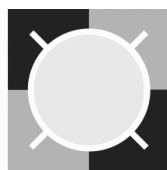

Texico shuts out Dexter

The Texico Wolverines opened their season with a 19-0 shutout of the Dexter Demons at home on Friday.

Texico's first possession was highlighted by runs from Shay Harrison and J.J. Tuls and a pass from Rallin Harris to John Myers. A big block from Canyon Scarborough gave Harrison a first down. And a pass to Justin Rucker put Texico at the Dexter 15.

With great blocking from Uriel Munoz, Zack Madrid, Elliott Pelfrey, and Daniel Gomez, it looked as though the Wolverines would be explosive both on the ground and in the air. But a penalty nullified a Texico TD run by Harrison, and Dexter stopped the drive.

On defense, Texico forced a 3 and out with the Wolverines taking over at their 39.

Harrison, behind a demolition block by Myers, sprinted 56 yards to pay dirt at 4:23. The kick was wide and it was 6-0.

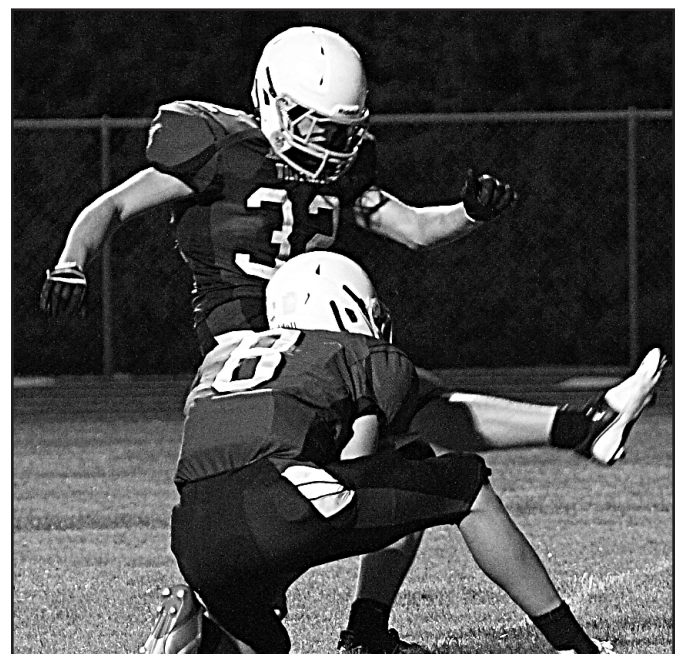
The Demons were penned in on the kickoff at their 12 with a massive tackling effort from Carlos Silva, Eliseo Arneivez and Zachary Harrison.

More bid tackles came from Silva, Madrid and Gomez. A 4th down pass was foiled by Rucker and Tuls and Texico took over at the Dexter 15.

Harrison shot up the gut to the Demon 1. On the ensuing play, Texico fumbled the ball in the end zone and Dexter had the ball at their 20.

Heavy pursuit and tackles by Pelfrey, Harrison, Munoz, and D.J. Griego forced the Demons to punt as the first quarter ended.

In the 2nd quarter, Harrison broke loose 60 yards behind a Gomez block for what appeared to be a TD, but was called back due to a penalty. On the next

play, Dexter recovered a Texico fumble at their 40. Again, Dexter went 4 and out.

On offense, runs by Silva and Pinnell got the ball to the Dexter 1, where a key block from Madrid and Myers blasted a hole for Tuls to score at 3:34. A 2-point conversion try failed and it was 12-0 as the first half ended.

Dexter received the kick to start the second half and tested their passing game, but the Texico secondary held strong, aided by strong pressure on the QB from the Wolverine defensive line.

After another Dexter punt, Texico went to the air, too. Harris connected with Pinnell for a big gain. Second-effort runs by Pinnell and Tuls and a big pass reception from Harris to Myers put the ball was on the Dexter 32. Texico was held and punted.

Big defensive stops by Madrid, Gomez and Griego ended the 3rd quarter. Scarborough returned a Dexter punt to the Wolverine 40.

Runs by Silva, Harrison, and Tuls resulted in two first downs. As Texico entered the red zone, Harris hit Rucker on a clutch pass at the Demon 8. Harrison advanced the ball to the 3 behind a Gomez block, but Texico was stopped.

Tackles by Myers, Harris, and strong pass coverage from Pinnell, Tuls, and Alan Valles forced a Dexter punt. Pinnell returned it to the Dexter 31.

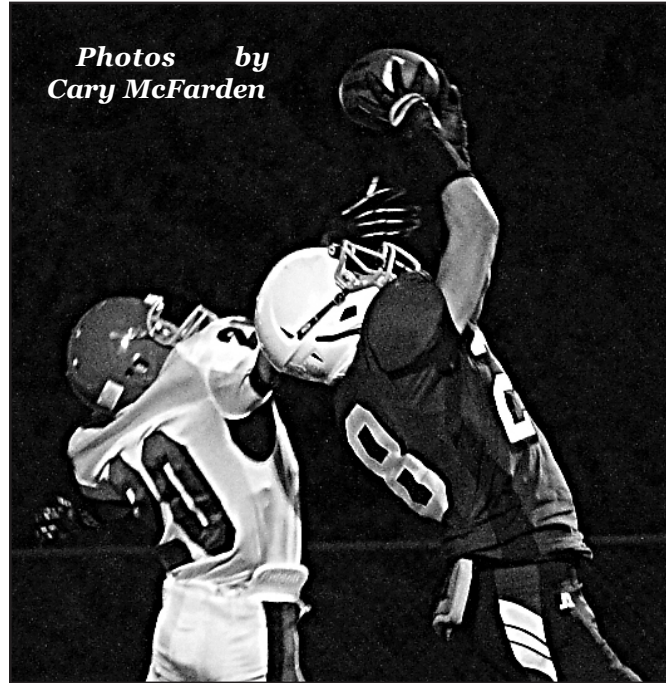

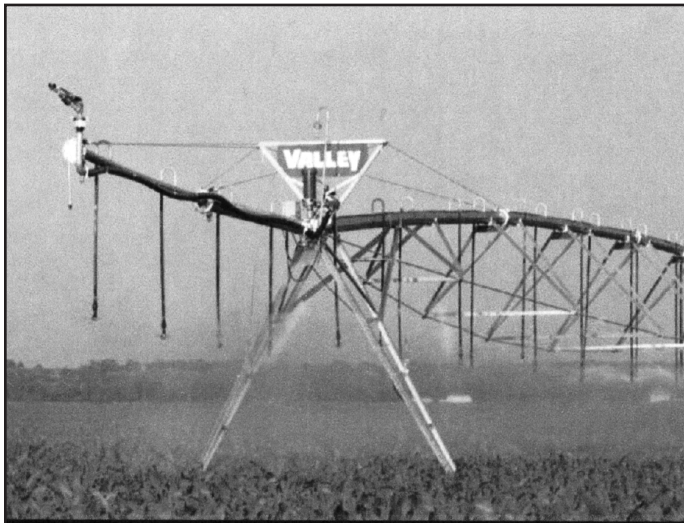

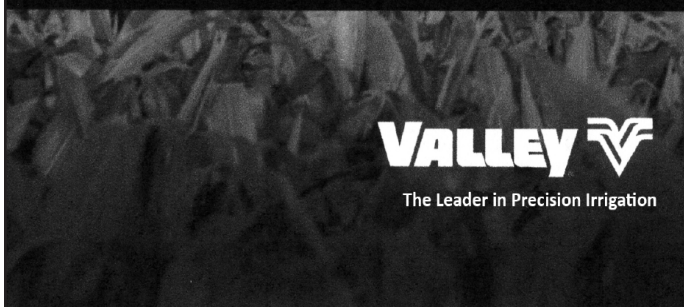

Pierce appointed to cemetery board

Richard Bermea, of Bermea Construction, addressed the Texico City Council on Aug. 28 about a ripple effect that can be left when small piles of gravel build up on streets in town.

Bermea said some ripple has always been present, but it has been more noticeable lately as the paving machines now go slower than they used to.

Bermea said there were too many close calls in the past from folks pulling out of their driveways and almost hitting the machines, almost hitting branches that grow over the road, or kids riding bikes or running into the streets while they are working.

Bermea said that in the summer months, the excess rock helps soak up oil and tar that melt in the high temperatures we've had.

Some of the excess rock also gets pressed into the roads.

Bermea said, "I know it's inconvenient right now, but by summer it will be helpful to have some extra gravel on the roads."

Bermea said that if there was too much gravel, then he could sweep it up once temperatures cooled down.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey asked about a spot in the road by the Texico School cafeteria, and Bermea said it was an overlap joint, where there is twice as much tar as other spots, but it shouldn't cause problems.

In other news, the council:

- Appointed Dan Pierce to the cemetery board. He will replace Teddy Lopez who has been working more hours and couldn't help out as much.

- Heard that city police have written 30 warrants in the past month. Officers have worked on distributing them.

- Was asked by Police Chief Doug Bowman to let folks know that the police department will be targeting folks speeding in school zones. Bowman sug-

Region officials. Menu choices all meet mandated guidelines and all calculations for calories and types of food have already been made. She believes the Farwell cafeteria will still have to make more adjustments in the future, but she is going to give this menu a try.

More changes lie ahead for dietary requirements in schools. "This year, the changes came to the lunch program -- next year breakfast is scheduled for changes." Planning has been done until 2017 for new changes.

Since these changes are nationwide, Mrs. Olmos offers some suggestions to parents.

"Tell your children to be open minded. Some of the food at the cafeteria may not be the normal type that they are used to eating. Teach them to try new things."

She adds that "we are all in this together" -- meaning that the schools, teachers, parents and children need to work together to help make these dietary changes easier.

"The changes are ultimately designed to improve the health of the kids, so it is important to understand that and be willing to try new things. For Farwell, Mrs. Olmos wants to assure parents that the cafeteria will try to use different spices that will offset the salt restrictions and do their best to make foods the kids will like.

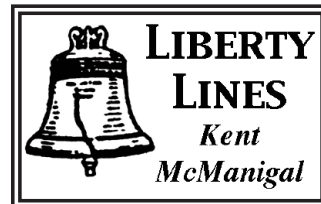

Everyone creates something. Shoemakers create shoes. Blacksmiths create iron-works. Bakers create bread. And, apparently, city councils create criminals.

The slew of new Farwell ordinances proposed recently will do nothing but make more people into lawbreakers. It is inevitable. Then the resultant "crime spree" will be pointed to as justification for even more controls and stiffer enforcement.

Aren't all the real bad things (and a lot more) already illegal? Instead of creating new laws for people to break, deal with the true offenses - theft, destruction of property, and aggression; the "mala in se" (bad in and of themselves) acts.

No "mala prohibita" ("bad" just because we say so) offenses need to be dreamed up or

enforced, as America - including Farwell - is already being crushed under an avalanche of them.

Just because the state of Texas or some international code (part of Agenda 21 - look it up) says you have to impose certain rules on those of us in Farwell, that is no reason to comply. There is an honorable tradition known as "nullification" wherein a bad legal example is not emulated. It only takes a little courage.

There is one way I could back new rules: for each new liberty-infringing rule passed, 20 currently-enforced ordinances must be abolished. At least until a level of maturity is reached where people are ashamed to obsess over what the neighbors might be doing.

Liberty is becoming a rare commodity. Let's stop outlawing it. Stop violating the property rights and the individual liberties of those who live around you.

It's just the right thing to do.

Future of the Farm Bill topic at PCCG annual meeting

Steve Verett, of Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, spoke at Parmer County Cotton Growers' annual meeting on Aug 28 in Farwell.

As the current Farm Bill failed to pass the Senate in July and now has also failed on the House floor, he predicted, "If the Democrats maintain their hold, the Republicans may get busy and pass the Farm Bill sooner. However, if there is a new President in the White House, they may wait until the new administration takes hold."

The Bill will expire at the end of September, but he said this would not be the first time the U.S. is without a Farm Bill. In 2008, the Bill did not pass until April

He insisted the Farm Bill is necessary to farmers. "Farmers need protection when low prices occur over a long period of time. The Farm Bill needs to be in place when the farmers need it the most."

He discussed changes to Farm Bill insurance coverage for farmers. Instead of blanket coverage for all crops, the insurance will now cover by need. If the farmer desires to insure his crop for 90% coverage, especially on irrigated land, he can. However, if a farmer has a dry land crop that he does not wish to fully insure, he can choose his level of insurance. He no longer has to insure all crops to the same level.

PCCG Manager Craig Rohrbach also gave some cotton predictions for next year. Ginning just over 41,000 bales in 2011, he predicted there will be reduced cotton acres in this area next year. However, he foresees good burr and seed prices again for the coming year.

Planting seed sales will also rise and the gin is making improvements that will result in faster ginning. They are in the process of updating the automation in the gin - replacing the console and battery condenser. This year they also added a spark detection sensor system that will more accurately detect any spark in order to stop the flow of cotton through the gin.

The gin has also purchased a new truck to haul modules.

Rohrbach said the gin distributed almost \$750,000 in dividends back to its members this year. PCCG now serves farmers from five counties in the area and offers seed sales for all the farmer's needs.

Also at the meeting, Mark Howard, Kendall Devault and Vick Christian were re-elected to the PCCG board.

Steve Schilling won the bale guess from last year. He received \$100 for guessing closest to the number of bales ginned in 2011.

Stephanie Baldwin's son, Rustin, won the candy guess. He received a huge jar of candy for his closest-to-the-number guess.

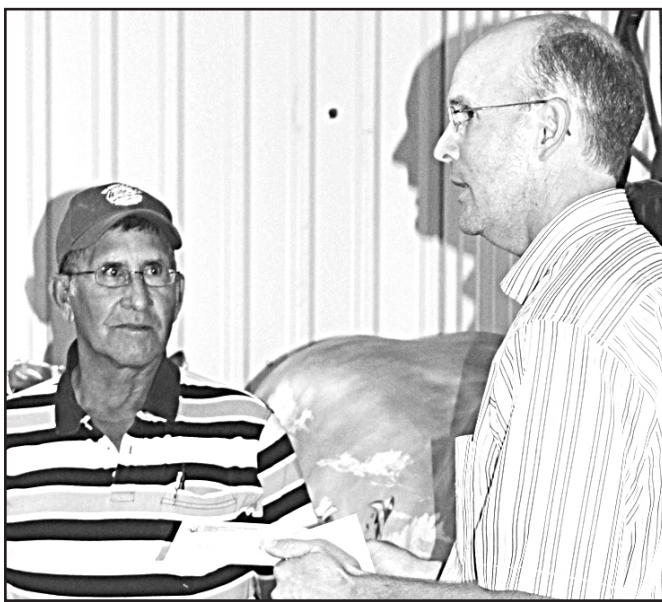

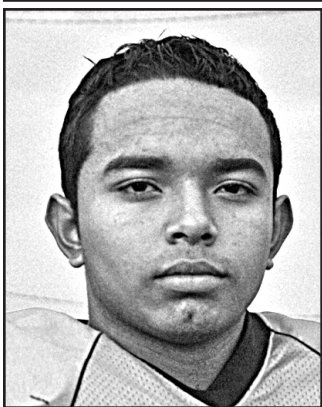

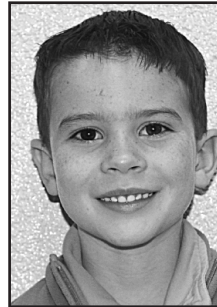

Panhandle went for it on 4th and 4 at its own 44 and the pass was incomplete. Bovina couldn't move the ball and punted. On defense, good tackles were recorded by David Velo, Casas and Alexis Oliva (two). on 4th and 2, Panhandle completed a pass at the Bovina 1-foot marker, and the Mustangs took over.

In the 4th quarter, Panhandle scored on a 25-yard pass at 11:42. The pass for extra points failed and it was 20-7.

Panhandle tops 'Stangs in season opener

The Bovina Mustangs opened their season on Aug. 30 with a 28-7 loss to a powerful Panhandle Panthers team in Amarillo.

Panhandle then hit a 58-yard pass to take a 6-0 lead (the kick was low).

Bovina started at its 27 and used its ground game effectively. Guevara ran for 9. Terrones had runs of 7 and 16. Casas kept for 11 more as the first quarter ended.

On 4th and 2 at the Panthers 27, Casas passed to Alex Mejia for 11. Terrones ran for 5 twice. Guevara scored from the 1 at 10:39. The extra point kick by Andrew Marrufo put Bovina ahead 7-6.

The 3rd quarter started with Gabe Hancock tackling the kick returner at the Panthers 38.
