

'Smile Programs' rescheduled for visit to Farwell Schools

From Farwell School nurse Lu Ann Fillpot:

Last March, "Smile Programs," which features mobile dentists, came to Farwell Schools, and we had a decent turnout (about 30 students).

This program travels about the country servicing schools. Its dentists are state licensed who conduct a complete dental exam and provide preventative care (teeth cleaning and sealants).

They accept Medicaid, CHIPS and most other dental insurances. These services can be provided to families that need financial assistance and there are subsidized fees for those who choose to PAY for preventative care.

It's quite easy to sign children up for these services and Farwell Schools handed out applications to students last week, with dismal return. Only 11 students signed up.

This is a voluntary program, but, as the school nurse, I see so many students with tooth aches related to horrendous tooth decay.

Many parents have Medicaid and/or CHIPS but are not taking their children to see a dentist. Whether it is because it's hard to get off work, or they have no transportation, I'm not sure.

But the "Smile Programs" can be a solution to a problem.

I have rescheduled "Smile Programs" to come to Farwell Schools on Dec. 17. Parents need to be proactive in their child's health, which includes their dental health.

We are blessed to have our own dentist right here in Farwell and I encourage parents to use Dr. J.R. Ivins or any dentist of their choice. If they could like to use "Smile Programs" they need to fill out an application (if they haven't done so already) and that's it.

The dentists will arrive at Farwell Elementary on Dec. 17 and set up their mobile dentist office in the library. Your child will already be at school and will be escorted to the library where they will watch a video on proper oral hygiene and proceed to have their teeth cleaned, etc.

Smile Programs does not fill cavities or pull teeth, but provide a report of services performed and problems found for parents to take to a local dentist.

I have many applications in my office, if parents are interested. They may call me at 481-9131, ext. 5 if they have questions.

Wolverines knock off Portales to go 2-0

The Texico Wolverines improved their record to 2-0 with a big 35-23 win over the Portales Rams 35-23, Friday at home.

J.J. Tuls and Canyon Scarborough tackled the Rams kick returner to open the game.

John Myers had a strong tackle. On 3rd and short D.J. Griego, Daniel Gomez and Shay Harrison sacked the QB for -2 yards, forcing a punt.

Adrian Gomez returned the punt 6 yards to the Texico 38. Harrison ran for 5 behind blocks by Elliott Pelfrey and Dalton Wren. Rallin Harris passed to Myers for 4 more.

Texico moved downfield behind the running of Harrison, Tuls and Mitchell Pinnell, with key blocks from Uriel Munoz, Daniel Gomez, Pelfrey and Zach Madrid. Pinnell then scored from the 12 at 4:06. The Harison kick made it 7-0.

The Rams started at their 35. Alan Valles broke up a pass. A QB pressure by Madrid forced an interception -- grabed by Pinnell who returned it to the Rams 38. Portales held, though.

On offense, Portales completed a short pass but Myers forced a fumble by the receiver, then recovered the ball for Texico.

Harris passed to A. Gomez for 24 yards to the Portales 12 as the first quarter ended. Then Harrison scored from 12 yards out for a 13-0 lead after the extra point kick was blocked.

The Rams kick returner was stopped by a gang tackle by Matthew Odegaard, Eliseo Arnievez and Zachary Harrison. On defense Carlos Silva had a strong pass rush. The Rams hit another short pass, but it was fumbled and recovered by Tuls.

The Wolverines drove quickly, capped by a 6-yard TD blast by Harrison, who also ran for two extra points and a 21-0 lead.

Portales drove downfield. Arneivez and Tuls had good tackles. Tuls and A. Gomez broke up a pass. On 4th and 4 at the Texico 8, the drive was stopped short by a combo tackle by Pelfrey and Griego.

With 8 seconds left in the half, Portales scored on a 32-yard pass so Texico led 21-7 at the half.

Texico opened with the ball. Harris hit A. Gomez on a 24-yard pass play, but the Wolverines had to punt. On defense, Myers had a big hit for -5 yards. Pelfrey and D. Gomez contributed a QB sack. The drive ended with a 25-yard Rams field goal to cut the lead to 21-10 with 4:43 left in the 3rd quater.

Rucker returned the kick 13 yards to the Texico 30. The Wolverines moved the ball well on the ground with Harrison opening the 4th quarter with a 6-yard TD and a 27-10 lead.

On the Ram's first play from scrimmage, Myers intercepted, giving Texico the ball at the Rams 22. But Texico was held.

Madrid had a huge QB sack at the goal line, and Portales had to punt from its end zone. Portales got the ball back at its 40 and moved quickly, scoring from a yard out and cutting the lead to 27-16.

After strong runs by Harrison, Tuls and Harris, A. Gomez caught a pass for a 42-yard TD. The Harrison run added two extra points behind a key Myers block. With 4:04 left, Texico led, 35-16.

On defense, Valles and Jonah Tuls had good pass defense. But the Rams scored on a 24-yard pass to



Mrs. Hardage died Sept. 14 in Weatherford, Texas. She was born July 17, 1936, to James and







Christian rushed for 182 yards, and Morris for 70. Langford and Morris caught 3 passes each; and Herrera 2.







Rec Center rules changed

The Bovina City Council on Sept. 17 approved changes for XIT Recreation Center policies after they were recommended by rec center board liaison Stan Mille.

- From now on, if you cancel your reservation longer than 30 days out, you get all your deposit back. If you cancel within 30 days, you lose the deposit.

- Unsupervised membership. Previously, the Rec Center was open for kids 13 years old and up. This is now changed to 11 years old and up.

- The center will close at 5 p.m. on Fridays when the Mustangs are playing a home football game. The Rec Center will only be open for members on those days after closing.

- The release form. From now on, youths have to only sign it once a year along with the legal guardian signing it, too.

- If anyone brings drugs or alcohol to an event, they will be banned for life from using the facility. Previously, rules stated only that the event will be terminated.

Any city employee can ban residents, and activities inside the Rec Center are videotaped, so city officials can ban people from the center after reviewing tapes.

-- If a person is unruly, they can be banned for 30

City Council okays budget

The Bovina City Council on Sept. 11 approved a budget for 2012-2013.

The budget amount of \$387,300 was approximately the same amount as last year's budget with no notable changes in departmental funding.

There are several capital improvement projects budgeted into next year's business including an upgrade kit for the lift station, work on valve taps and repairs for existing equipment.

Also, the city experienced a small increase in property values for the past year. However, this increase did little to affect the tax rate that was approved at 0.5984 cents per \$100 assessed valuation -- the same rate as the previous year.

In other business, the Council:

-- Accepted a bid by WT Services to continue services for Bovina. Although Windstream had also submitted a bid to the city, the Council gave a favorable vote for WT due to satisfaction with previous service and history of service.

-- Signed the official paperwork to retain group health coverage for the City of Bovina through the Texas Municipal League Intergovernmental Risk Pool. There were no increases or other changes to the coverage for this year.

School board reviews process of picking a new superintendent

The Bovina School Board had a special meeting on Monday to meet with John Bass, Executive and had to be passed for the grant. Director for Region 16, who is helping with the process of finding a new superintendent.

days from the rec center for the first offense; 60 days for the 2nd offense; and completely for the 3rd offense. In each case, if any damage is done to the center, the person person will be held responsible for repairs or replacement of any items damaged.

-- Lifetime passes are given families who donate \$500 to the center and businesses that donate \$2,000. This program will end Jan. 1, 2013. Future donors will still be recognized on the wall, but they will need to pay to reserve the building.

-- Youths under 11 can use the center only if they are supervised by a relative 18 or older.

In other news, the council:

- Met with a representative of the Panhandle **Regional Planning Commission to discuss applying** for funding through the Texas Department of Agriculture Infrastructure and Real Estate Program.

Bovina is asking for a little over half a million dollars to increase the sewer and water facilities to possibly include the Cargill Sweet Bran plant with the city facilities.

- Adopted new procedures for citizen complaints and citizen participation in the Bovina Community **Development Block Grant Program.**

The new procedures are in line with the state rules

- Tabled changes to the water rates in town. The water rates may have to be changed if the Sweet Bran plant is hooked into city water and sewer facilities, but that has not been finalized.

In other business, the board:

-- Named the Underwood law firm, of Amarillo, as its bond counsel inf the board goes ahead to seek a bond issue to build a new gym.

-- Heard there is a possibility of mediation on the disagreement between the school and the insurance company over how much money the school should get for the reroofing job.

-- Approved an agreement with the American Red Cross for disaster coverage within the Bovina area.

It was decided that the Red Cross would move into a pre-selected building, possibly St. Ann's Catholic Church or the school building, in case of disaster. These buildings would be used as a central operating location to help victims.

Also, the Red Cross announced that a volunteer certification class will be held in Bovina on Oct. 13 at the XIT Recreation Center.

In order for area residents to volunteer during an emergency situation, they must be certified by the American Red Cross, so they encourage anyone interested to sign up for this class.

-- Approved the budget for the city's Economic Development Corporation for 2012-2013. Jeff Steelman, president of the EDC, presented a budget of just over \$22,000.

The EDC has about \$2,500 of planned training expenses for the next year and \$30,000 total in the bank.

Steelman said the group would like to send committee members for more training and is looking to add more committee members for next year.

At this meeting, Stan Miller was appointed to the EDC committee to replace Randy Stone, who moved outside the required 10 mile radius of Bovina.

-- Tabled a discussion on the water rate for Bovina. Interim City Manager Scott Caldwell suggested that the discussion be tabled until the rates could be reviewed further and be presented as an ordinance at a later meeting.

The Council felt that the wording on a water rate proposal must be correctly presented since some grant funding is affected, at least in part, by water rate amounts for small cities.
