## Texico introduces Common Core curriculum

Texico Schools, as part of a New Mexico initiative, have a brand new curriculum this school year.
New Mexico, 45 other states and the District of Columbia have adopted the Common Core curricuum for grades K-12 in both English and math

Its purpose is to present critical concepts needed or success in college and careers and study them in cal application of knowledge.
Basically, the new curriculum teaches fewer concepts, but more in depth. Students will understand the concepts well, be able to apply that knowledge and use higher-level thinking skills.
Dee Rae Timberlake, a teacher at Texico Junior High, is the communication liaison between Common Core and Texico Schools. She is part of a 25-person committee in New Mexico that shares weekly communications about Common Core. Her job is to gather pertinent information and bring it changes coming in the future
Mrs. Timberlak the future
Mrs. "Basically, instead of digging over the surface of 20 miles of curriculum, Common Core takes a shovel and digs 20 miles deep in concept areas. This curriculum will offer our kids the best opportunities for success in college and careers.

She believes Common Core will raise the bar for tudents. "Concepts presented in 3rd grade last year will appear in 2nd grade now and possibly even in 1st grade."
The curriculum is designed to challenge students and incorporate more technology than before. By design, the K-3 grades began with Common Core curriculum this year while grades 4-11 will transition next year. Already, changes in technology have Eeen implemented in the elementary.
Elementary Principal Todd Estes explains, "The elementary students now go to computer lab every computers in their classrooms for student use. We want to make sure that the students have the techhology training necessary to meet their needs in future college and career paths

Estes says the standardized testing will also hange with Common Core. Tests administered to students will be computerized and students need to eceive the proper training.
This year will be a "Bridge" assessment that uses part of the old Standards Based Assessment test procedures and part of the new PARCC system. PARCC stands for Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers and is the new assessment vehicle for Common Core.

The tests will be taken on-line and will examine ing many kinds of student work, not just multiple choice answers. Over the next few years, all testing will ransition to PARCC assessments.
Estes feels the curriculum will be more rigorous.
"There will be higher expectations for or example, they will not just read a passage of text - they will now be expected to use more critical thinking skills to give the text meaning. They will restate the idea, determine their feelings about the text, be able to cite the text, etc. The Common Core provides meaning to concepts that affect our students' success in the future.
Common Core is designed for English and math but integrates all subjects. The reading and writing concepts are incorporated into social studies and science lessons as part of the student's day.
"The teachers are cooperating to integrate all their lesson plans to meet the Common Core since all the concepts are tied together," says Estes. They
also have many outside resources due to the same also have many outside reso in most other stame "Everyone is on the same page and it is easier to share information now."
Common Core was designed to provide a quality education for students regardless of their location. For example, if a student leaves his current school district and enrolls in another during a school year, the curriculum will match in both places. He will not be lost at the new school, but can pick right back up with the same curriculum. With this structure, organizers hope students will receive a better educa tion in the long run.
Estes also says teachers have worked to prepare for the new curriculum. "They attended trainings and professional development seminars over the summer and will continue to learn about Common Core."
He b
He believes Common Core will change the style of teaching for some because not so many areas have
to be covered during the school year. "Common Core narrows down the concepts but teaches them really in depth. How the teachers get there is still their own style - it still boils down to good teach-

Mrs. Timberlake agrees, "We have strong educa tors here at Texico, so Common Core is not a huge shock to us. We are 'right on target' for transitioning to the new curriculum. There will be new technology, but no concrete guidelines just yet. Right now, we are getting ready for the changes, especially the PARCC assessments, and preparing our teachers and students.'

J.J. Tuls and Canyon Scarborough tackled the Rams kick returner to open the game.
John Myers had a strong tackle. On 3rd and short D.J. Griego, Daniel Gomez and Shay Harrison
sacked the QB for -2 yards, forcing a punt. acked the QB for -2 yards, forcing a punt
Adrian Gomez returned the punt 6 yards to the Pelfrey and Dalton Wren. Rallin Harris passed to Myers for 4 more.
Texico moved downfield behind the running of Harrison, Tuls and Mitchell Pinnell, with key blocks from Uriel Munoz, Daniel Gomez, Pelfrey and Zach Madrid. Pinnell then scored from the 12 at 4:06. The Harison kick made it 7-0
The Rams started at their 35. Alan Valles broke up a pass. A QB pressure by Madrid forced an interception -- grabed by Pinnell who returned it to the Rams 38. Portales held, though.

On offense, Portales completed a short pass but Myers forced a fumble by the receiver, then recovred the ball for Texico.

From now on, if you cancel your reservation longer than 30 days out, you get all your deposit back. If you cancel within 30 days, you lose the deposit.

- Unsupervised membership. Previously, the Rec Cener was open for kids 13 years old and up. This is now changed to 11 years old and up.
The center will close at 5 p.m. on Fridays when the Mustangs are playing a home football game. The Rec Center will only be open for members on those days after closing
- The release form. From now on, youths have to only sign it once a year along with the legal guardian signing it, too.

If anyone brings drugs or alcohol to an event, they will be banned for life from using the facility Previously, rules stated only that the event will be erminated.
Any city employee can ban residents, and activi ties inside the Rec Center are videotaped, so city
officials can ban people from the center after review ing tapes. ing tapes

- If a person is unruly, they can be banned for 30 for the 2 nd offense; and completely for the 30 das offense. In each case, if any damage is done to the center, the person person will be held responsible for repairs or replacement of any items damaged.

## City Council

## okays budget

The Bovina City Council on Sept. 11 approved a budget for 2012-2013.
The budget amount of $\$ 387,300$ was approximatey the same amount as last year's budget with no otable changes in departmental funding.
There are several capital improvement projects budgeted into next year's business including an
upgrade kit for the lift station, work on valve taps and repairs for existing equipment.
Also, the city experienced a small increase in property values for the past year. However, this increase did little to affect the tax rate that was approved at 0.5984 cents per $\$ 100$ assessed valuation -- the same rate as the previous year
In other business, the Council:
-- Accepted a bid by WT Services to continue services for Bovina. Although Windstream had also submitted a bid to the city, the Council gave a favorable vote for WT due to satisfaction with previous service and history of service.

Signed the official paperwork to retain group health coverage for the City of Bovina through the Texas Municipal League intergovernmental Risk the coverage for this year - coverage for this year.

Approved an agreement with the American Red It was decided that the Red Cross would move to a pre-selected building, possibly St. Ann's Catholic Church or the school building, in case of disaster. These buildings would be used as a central operating location to help victims.
Also, the Red Cross announced that a volunteer certification class will be held in Bovina on Oct. 13 at the XIT Recreation Center.
In order for area residents to volunteer during an emergency situation, they must be certified by the American Red Cross, so they encourage anyone interested to sign up for this class.
-- Approved the budget for the city's Economic Development Corporation for 2012-2013. Jeff Steelman, president of the EDC, presented a budget just over $\$ 22,000$
The EDC has about $\$ 2,500$ of planned training xpenses for the next year and $\$ 30,000$ total in the bank
Steelman said the group would like to send committee members for more training and is looking to add more committee members for next year.
At this meeting, Stan Miller was appointed to the EDC committee to replace Randy Stone, who moved outside the required 10 mile radius of Bovina.

- Tabled a discussion on the water rate for Bovina. Interim City Manager Scott Caldwell suggested that the discussion be tabled until the rates could be reviewed further and be presented as an rdinance at a later meeting.
The Council felt that the wording on a water rate proposal must be correctly presented since some grant funding is affected, at least in part, by water
rate amounts for small cities rate amounts for small cities.
