Jessica Kirkland earns free car from Mary Kay

Most folks know Jessica Kirkland is an over-achiever. The wife of Farwell's Brandon Kirkland can be seen at a slew of sporting events and 4-H events that children Daniel, Dillon and Jenna are part of. On the side, Jessica has been a Mary Kay Beauty Consultant for the last 8 years.

Jessica has been selling them for the eight years, but it wasn't until 18 months ago that she got serious.

At that time she was a teacher at Farwell Schools wrapping up the school year. She sold a small amount, but mostly was a part of Mary Kay so she could get good deals on her make-up. Things changed when her Mary Kay director stepped down.

In the Mary Kay world, every person has an Independent Sales Director over them. If your director steps down, you are passed on to another director.

Jessica got lucky as she was passed to a national sales director for Mary Kay. Her new director, who has received 13 pink Cadillacs, started mentoring and teaching Jessica.

Jessica started attending Mary Kay meetings and events and really learning about the company. This led her to start building her own team. She now has 23 ladies working with her here, and in Clovis, Lubbock, Abilene, Fort Worth and San Antonio.

In March she became an Independent Sales Director herself.

From March to June, her team made over \$20,000 in gross sales.

West Texas Gas seeks a rate hike, but question is, for how much?

There was a bit of shock in Farwell last week, when residents received a notice from West Texas Gas indicating a huge rate hike was coming.

The proposed rate folks read in the public notice from WT Gas will not happen. Here's why:

The proposed rate is sent to the state's Railroad Commission, which reviews it, then decides on what the rate will be. If that occurs, the rate will be lower than in the public notice.

But, WT Gas has also sent a separate proposal to the Farwell City Council offering a lower rate. J.J. King, WT Gas's marketing director, will be at the City Council meeting at 5:30 p.m. on

Oct. 16 at Farwell City Hall to discuss it.

Let's take a look at the rates.

A) In the public notice sent to the state, WT Gas says the current rates for "domestic" (residences) is \$9 a month, and for "non-domestic" (businesses and schools) \$12 a month.

The proposed rates would be \$17.78 a month for domestic and \$13.70 a month for non-domestic. This proposal has been sent to the state.

B) The settlement proposal that WT Gas is making for Farwell would put a 50 percent cap on rate hikes, and likely would increase the domestic rate about 26 percent and for non-domestics 6.2 percent.

If the City Council approves the settlement proposal, then the state would not take action. If the City Council doesn't, Continued on Page 8

talking about how we, as Christians, should talk and act. After discussion, one man said that when we compromise the convictions of our salvation, we sin. Some of those in the group asked for an explanation of "compromised conviction."

The story goes something like this: The day before, the man had waited in his vehicle on the vast parking lot at Wally World, patiently waiting the phone call from his wife to inform him which door she, and her numerous purchases, would exit. Then he could meet her and help load the purchases.

While trying not to be terminally bored, the man watched people and their habits as they unloaded their shopping carts. It seemed to him that the vast majority of customers left their carts out of the cart stalls, to

blow around and possibly crash into cars on the premises.

Many of the "guilty people" nervously looked around to see if anyone was looking at them. Some of the nervous nellys apparently profess to be Christian, as signified by the decals or emblems on their vehicles that point to Christianity.

Having said this, the man noticed the now puzzled facial expressions on most of his Sunday School classmates. Feeling the need to clarify the point, he explained that this is a sin because the failure to put away the carts properly causes store employees more work, and the loose carts can cause damage.

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FCRC offers private rooms

The Farwell Hospital District Board on Oct. 4 heard from Farwell Care and Rehabilitation Center (FCRC) Director Stephen Miles that throughout the expanse bounded by Albuquerque, Amarillo, and Lubbock, the FCRC is the only facility that offers private rooms.

"Private rooms are just part of what we offer," Miles explained. "We are continually searching for any modification or method we can apply to make our facility superior to any other in the entire region."

Miles further discussed efforts the FCRC staff is meeting to spread the word about the center's effectiveness.

"We are certain that when people learn about what we offer here in Farwell, they will think of us first whenever one of their patients or their family needs the care we offer -- a step above any other facility in the region," said Miles.

He noted that the recent state survey taken of the center:

An additional good report was also provided by Miles regarding the no-notice inspection recently completed at the Care Facility. "They were here all day for three days in a row. We are happy to report they were pleased with us and that in all their time here, they discovered not a single deficiency in any category."

The next board meeting will be at the FCRC starting after the board's brief noon meal.

The "fiscal cliff" coming Jan. 1 if Congress doesn't do something scares me.

First, I need to stress that most U.S. economists clearly expect Congress to act before Jan. 1 on this issue.

If Congress doesn't, then families will get huge tax increases, there will be severe federal spending cuts, and some experts believe the U.S. will head into a very serious recession (a nice way of saying "a light depression").

As I noted last week, Congress, in trying last year to deal with the nation's huge debt problem, simply kicked the can down the road (I love that cliché) until after the 2012 general election. Being re-elected is far more important to them than the nation's future.

So automatic budget cuts and tax hikes will go into effect Jan. 1 unless Congress comes up with a better solution. While I personally don't have a problem with budget cuts, major tax increases for the middle class are a no-no at this time.

But how can Congress act any differently than it did last year when it agreed to this economic "deal"? Sure, the election will be past, but have philosophies changed?

As I've written many times in the past, the norm for Congress when faced with an issue is to throw money at the problem.

The problem is we've run out of money. The cutbacks Republicans support will be fought bitterly by Democrats, and vice versa.

And please don't bring up "we need to tax the millionaires more" baloney. That is a bunch of nonsense that is just used for political propoganda (and effectively, I might add).

It looks like the Democrats will maintain control of the Senate, and

the GOP the House. That spells one word -- stalemate.

In a fantasy world, both political parties, with the President taking the lead, would have been having serious discussions on this problem for the past several months. As far as I know, that has not happened.

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
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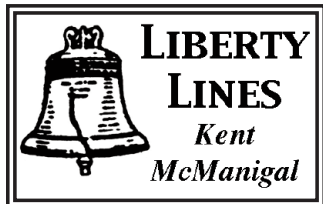
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PCCG gets new module truck

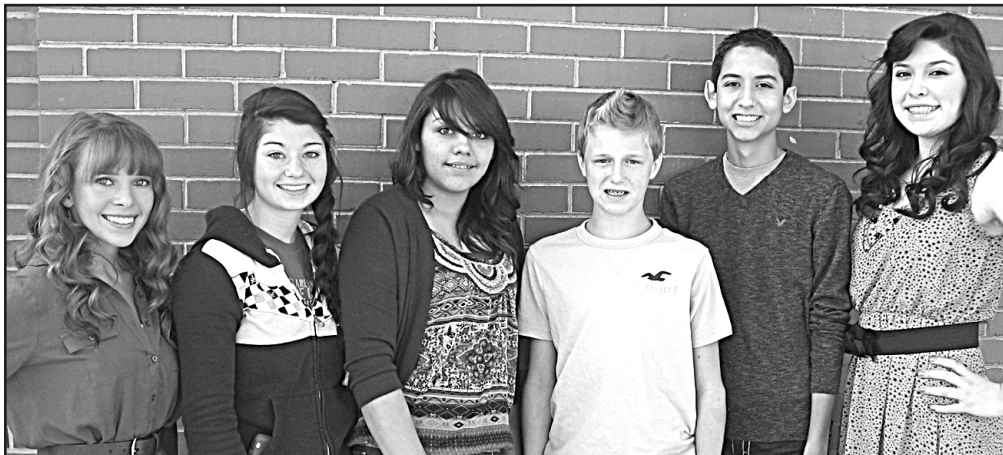
The experience might be bumpy, but getting untangled from Leviathan now will limit the danger posed by its death throes. It's coming whether you are ready or not.

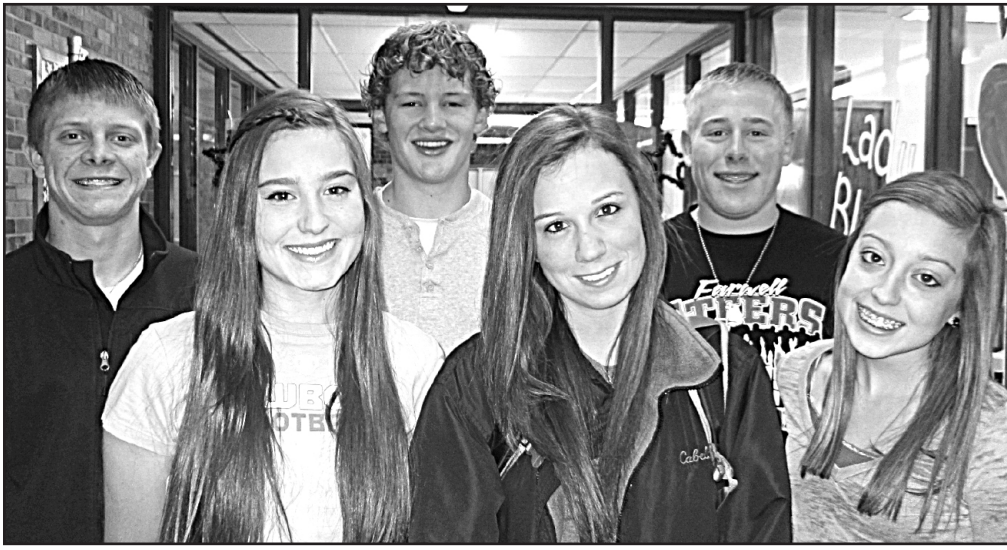

The Longhorns took an early 13-0 lead before Lubbock Harmony fought back and took a slim lead at halftime.

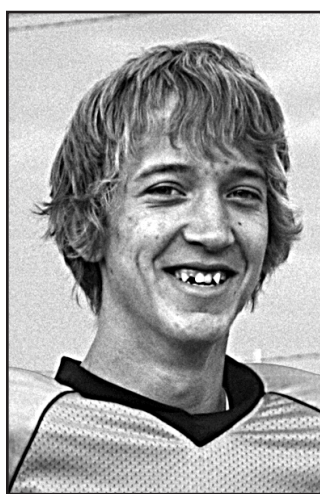
The Longhorns came out to the 2nd half fired up and took it to the Lubbock team, ending with a 19-point victory.

Live Cattle prices have begun to trade inside a two week trading range. Until the market can breakout of this range in either direction, the market is expected to remain quiet. Cash trade has remained in a tight range as well. Most of the bias looks negative at this time with short and long term trends pointing down, but a close above last weeks high or above \$124 basis the October contract could lead to a rally up into the \$125 area? A close below the \$121.50 level would be expected to push prices down into the \$119 level.

Feeder prices have continued to drift lower along with the Live Cattle price. There have been moments in which corn prices have had a little influence, but most of the link between feeder prices and Live Cattle prices are expected to continue to be much stronger. Prices have seen little movement over the last few trading days. Most of their attention will be on the strength or weakness in the Live Cattle.

Soybean prices bounced off their 50% retracement support level last week, but the market has stalled out once again. Long term trends remain down at this time and if prices retest last weeks lows and fold, then the next strong support level lies about \$1.00 lower. South American planting looks large and could eventually offset some of the shortfalls on the domestic side.

Corn prices closed below last weeks low this week which was about the only short term support this market had at these levels. Another day down should lead to a possible retest of the \$7.05 low seen just a couple of weeks ago. Some analysts believe harvest figures are on the rise which has added some uncertainty around these levels. It will take more time to gather enough information to determine just how small this crop really was.

Wheat prices are currently back down around the lower end of a trading range which began back in July. Prices have tried and failed to move below these levels of several occasions. With the tight link between the corn and beans, much will depend on the direction the rest of the grain complex moves in the coming days. Overall, the grain complex looks very weak and lower prices could pull the wheat below long term support and which would most likely lead to a sharp selloff.

Cotton prices broke down a few weeks ago and so far have held a 50% retracement level around the \$71.00 level basis the December contract. A lack of any news, good or bad, has kept this market extremely quiet. The market seems to be waiting on something to happen, but nothing on the horizon? The market remains in a holding pattern with no real indication of any direction.

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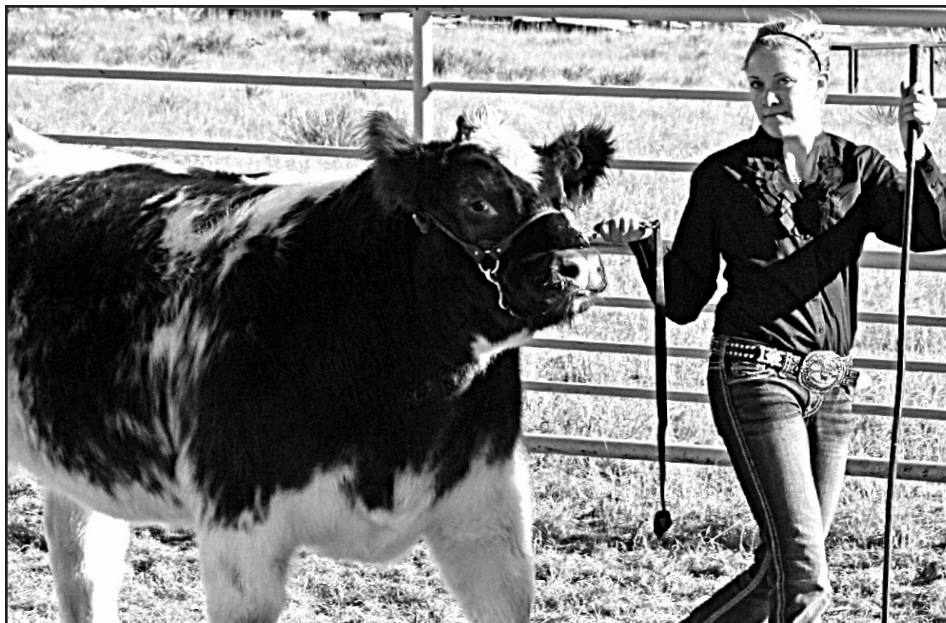
