Wolverines finish as State runner-up

The Texico Wolverines put on a great late-season run, ending with a State runner-up title for its baseball team.

The Wolverines, ranked No. 12 at the State tourney, finished a great season when they fell to Cobre in the championship game at Albuquerque on Friday, 11-1.

The title game was marked in the first inning by an umpire's call that was questionable. At the time, Texico was ahead 1-0 and could have made it 2-0 except for the call on a runner not tagging up to score from 3rd base on a fly ball out.

Coch Ty Thatcher argued the call to no avail.

Jaron Hill pitched well for the Wolverines before he reached his quota and was pulled. In New Mexico, a pitcher is limited to 12 innings he can pitch at the State tourney. Thus, he was only able to pitch 5 innings in this game.

In Hill's complete game win over Eunice, he threw only 77 pitches while his average during the

season was about 110, said Thatcher. He was well rested for his second start.

In the State quarterfinal, the Wolverines dumped No. 4 ranked Eunice, 11-1. Hill pitched a complete game, striking out 9.

The Wolverines collected 14 hits, led by Hill, 4 singles and 2 RBIs; John Myers, 2 singles and 4 RBIs; Carlos Silva, 2 singles and an RBI; and Mason Grau, 2 singles and 3 runs scored.

Earlier in the season, Eunice had won 2 games at their home over Texico.

In the State semifinal, Texico edged No. 7 ranked Loving, 6-5.

Gentry Doolittle pitched 6 1/4 innings for Texico, with the save made by Miguel Reyna.

This was a nail-biter throughout. The game ended with Eunice loading the bases, but Reyna got the final batter to fly out to Rafael Maldonado.

Earlier in that last inning, Silva made a huge play. Eunice had the bases loaded and got a base hit to

left. Two runs scored but outfielder Silva threw out the runner attempting to get to 3rd base for the second out.

Coch Thatcher complimented his team on their tenaciousness.

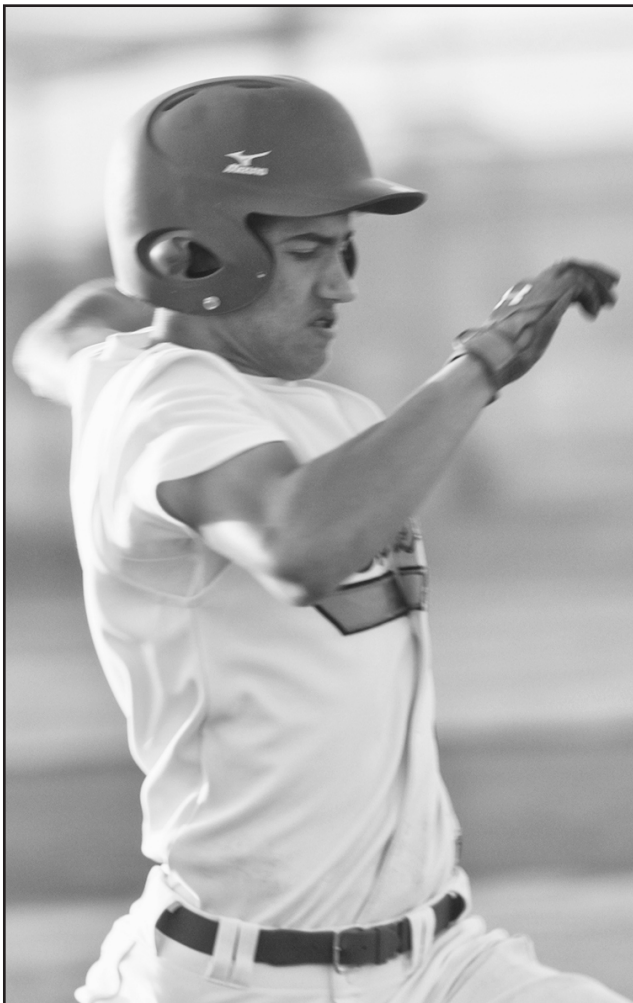
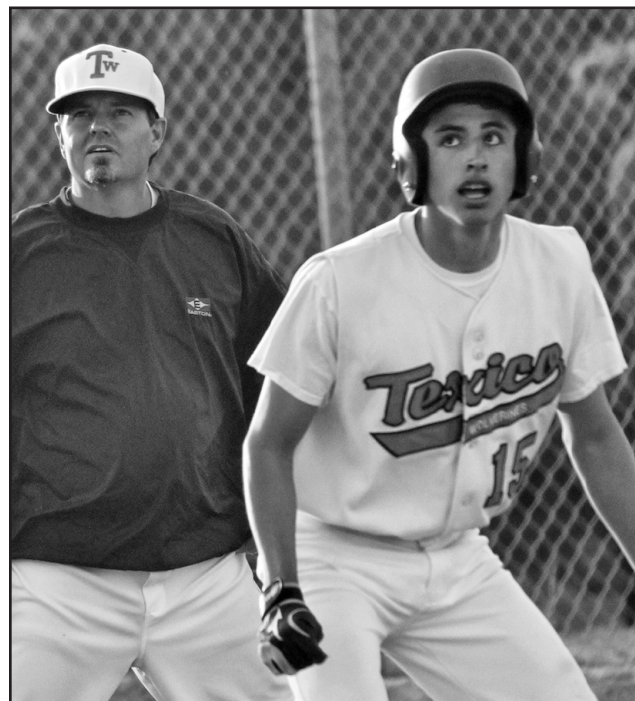
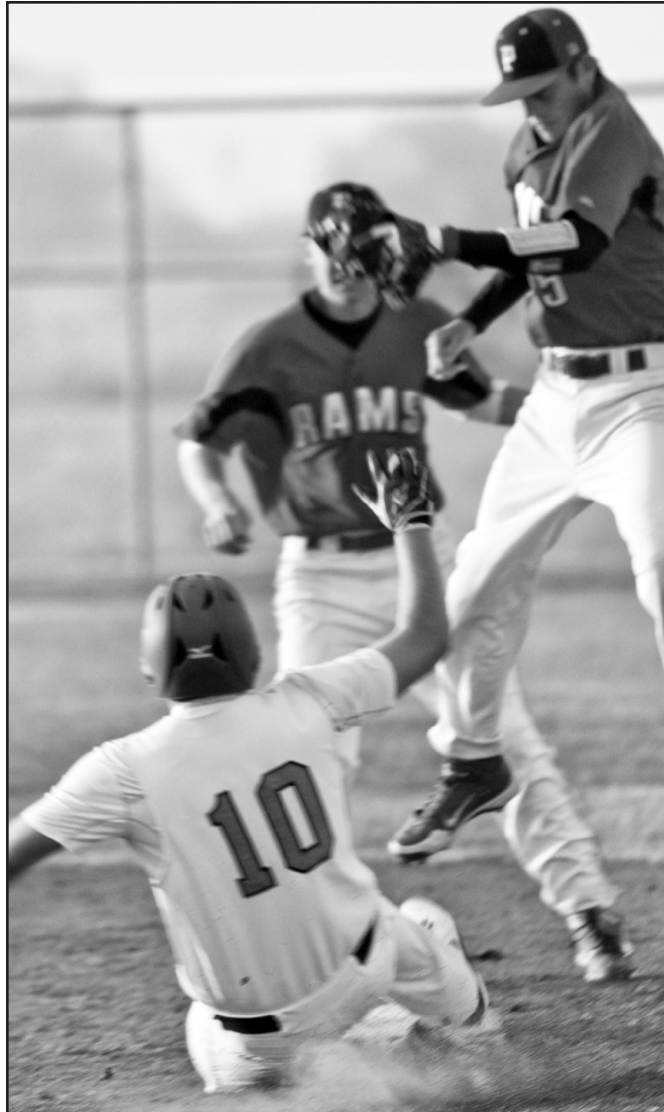
"They believed in themselves and in our motto -- lots of runs are scored after there are two outs. Our kids did a lot of that in the last several games, plus improving their defensive play.

And he cited the Eunice game where the bottom of the batting order came through with clutch hitting to spark the victory.

The Wolverines finished the campaign with a 13-15 record. Cobre was 23-7.

This was Thatcher's second year as baseball coach. Last year, the Wolverines made it to the quarter-final.

He has a strong squad coming up next year from JV so watch for the Wolverines to be back at State in 2014.

The increase would add an average of \$5.87 to an average residential bill for 1,000 kilowatt hours.

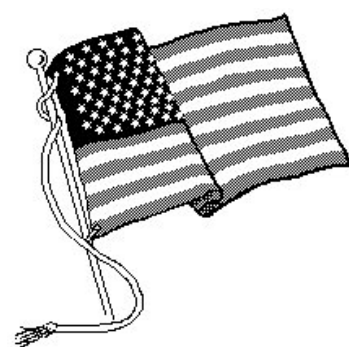

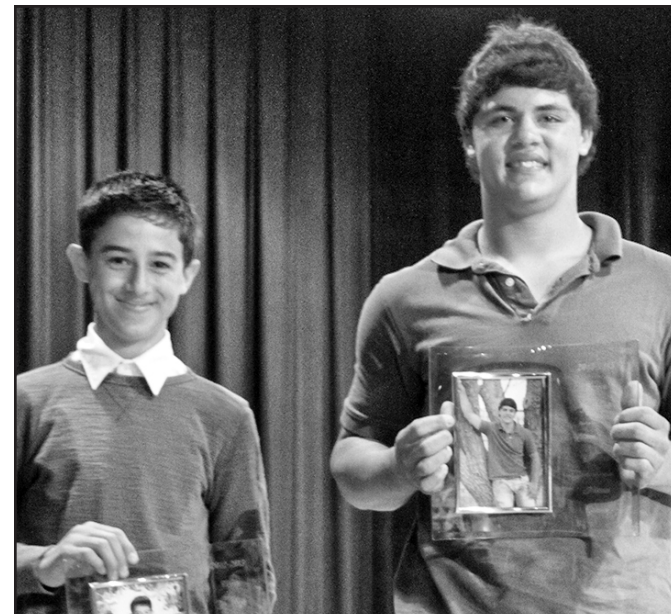
Texico Fire Department to host 'Bike Run for Life'

Memorial Day's history

Americans came to realize the Civil War was the most devastating event in the history of the United States. It is estimated some 620,000 Americans were killed. Nearly everyone in the country had known someone that was killed during the war. While the Union side came to be known as the victor, both sides came away feeling devastated.

Memorial Day was originally conceived as a day to memorialize the soldiers who lost their lives in the Civil War. It was first called "Decoration Day", in reference to the decorations that were laid on tombstones, and hung from buildings.

The earliest known evidence of such observance goes back to various women's auxiliary groups in the North and South, when ladies organized events to honor their war dead by decorating graves. The earliest recorded event took place on April 25, 1866 in Columbus, Mississippi when a group of women formed an association to decorate the graves of civil war soldiers, starting with those who died in the Battle of Shiloh.

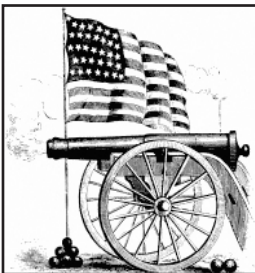
President Lyndon Johnson issued a proclamation in 1966 naming Waterloo, New York to be the official birthplace of Memorial Day, despite almost 30 towns claiming the right.

The origins of Waterloo being the birthplace of Memorial day goes back to Henry C. Welles, a town druggist, who apparently conceived the idea in the summer of 1865 by mentioning it to a friend. Sometime later, he mentioned it again to General John B. Murray, a civil war hero, and plans were finally put in place to organize an event, which was held on May 5, 1866. A similar event was held again a year later on May 5, 1867.

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, the first commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, proclaimed May 30, 1868 as the official day for decorating the graves of civil war dead. Why Logan chose May 30th as the official day is interesting, since the prior Decoration days in Waterloo were held on May 5, and the earlier Decoration event in Carbondale was on April 29. A possible explanation to this goes back to a french emigrant woman named Cassandra Oliver Moncure, who in 1866 organized a Decoration event in Virginia and picked May 30th. She explained that May 30th is the "Day of Ashes" when Napoleon's ashes were returned to France from St. Helena.

By the end of the 19th Century, cities all over the country were celebrating Decoration Day on May 30.

In 1971, Congress and the President passed a law that coined the name, "Memorial Day" and marked the last Monday in May as the official day.

Jury trial asked in civil rights case

There has been some movement concerning the federal civil rights lawsuit filed in December by nine Bovina residents against current and former city officials. On May 6, the attorney for the plaintiffs requested that a jury trial be given in the case. And on May 9, federal court Judge Mary Lou Robinson said the case would be put on the trial docket for Jan. 13, 2014. She also set a deadline for a joint report from both sides' attorneys setting forth the status of settlement negotiations by Aug. 23, 2013. A deadline for complete discovery was set for Nov. 15, 2013, unless both parties agreed to a different date. The suit was filed by Sandra Moreno, Carlos Moreno, Eliseo Castaneda, Federico Vela, Jose Garcia, Jose Gonzales, Briselda Rodriguez, Martha Jaramillo and Rogelio Martinez. Defendants are former City Manager Jana Pitcock, Municipal Judge Donna Mitchell, former Police Chief Gary Sinclair and former police officers Jonathan Jimenez, Manny Jimenez and Owen Foster. The suit alleges that hatched an "illegal scheme" to harass some residents and extort money from them to fill city coffers.

The Bovina City Council on May 14 appointed Josue Gonzales to the council. When the last filing period was held, three posts on the council were available and only two persons signed up. State law has the council appoint someone to the vacant post.

- Gonzales is the owner of Allied Granite Co. in Bovina.
- In other business, the council:
 - Set up a fee schedule for "industrial users" outside the city who use city services.
 - Agreed to add a \$2 a month fee for persons residents who have water connections to help cover costs for the roll-offs, effective June 1.
 - The council will take another look at this fee increase in October to see if it is still needed.
 - The company that takes care of the roll-offs charges about \$400 a month. If usage were to decrease and the cost goes down, the \$2 added fee may be eliminated.
 - Named Radford Venable as Mayor Pro-Tem. He replaces Frank Villarreal, who did not seek re-election.
 - Held an executive session to have its attorney give an update on the lawsuit by several Bovina residents against current and former city officials. No action was taken in public meeting after the executive session.
 - Held an executive session with its attorney concerning the waste water treatment plant problems and possible litigation.
 - In public session, City Manager Buster Poling was instructed to continue pursuing the legal aspects and also for the city to seek bids to buy a pump for the plant which could help take care of part of the problem.
 - Reviewed the Cinco de Mayo celebration held May 4, which was successful.
 - Approved the Bovina Economic Development Commission giving the Bovina Chamber of Commerce \$5,000 to spend on promoting the city. TV ads may be used.
 - Agreed to have city employees install a sprinkler system and to plant grass at the XIT Recreation Center site.
 - Agreed to sell the 1984 Chevy ambulance unit that has been used as a rescue unit by the fire department. Bids will be taken.
