Farwell raises utility rates

The Farwell City Council on Sept. 17 unanimously voted to raise utility rates across the boards.

This came on the strong recommendation of city auditor D'Aun Willoughby, who pointed out that Farwell is currently losing money on its current water, garbage and sewer rates.

Mayor Jimmie Mace said that last year the pumps in ever city well had to be replaced, leading to dramatically higher costs.

He said that there are also some major expenses expected in the city water towers, including saving up for new stainless steel impellers to push the water into the pipes.

The current impellers are brass, but the state regulations on brass have changed, making future brass impellers no longer suitable.

The base water rate in town was raised \$10 per month from \$25 to \$35.

As a means to discourage heavy watering of properties, the incremental rates were also increased:

Two thousand gallons up to 9,999 was raised from \$1.80 to \$2.25 per 1,000 gallons used; 10,000 up to 19,999 gallons was raised from \$2.55 up to \$3.30 per 1,000 gallons used; 20,000 up to 29,999 gallons was raised \$2.05 from \$3.25 up to \$5.30 per 1,000 gallons used.

For businesses and individuals that use more than 30,000 gallons of water per month, the rates were almost doubled from \$4.15 to \$7.30 per 1,000 gallons used.

Mace said that the city isn't in the business of making money. Their aim is to break even, and this is necessary to insure the water system in town will continue to work.

Sewer rates were also raised from \$15 to \$25 for residents, and from \$18 to \$33 for businesses.

Garbage rates for residents were raised by \$10 for residents from \$25 to \$35. Businesses and residents who have special dumpsters also face higher rates.

1.5 cubic yard dumpsters went up \$11 to \$50 per month. Normal dumpsters that are contracted to be picked up once a week went up \$23 to \$100; twice a week is \$200; and three times a week is \$300.

In other news, the council:

- Received the resignation of City Public Works Manager Gerald Porter due to personal reasons. Mace said he has done a great job and will be missed.

- Passed the city budget. As reported last month, the city kept the tax rate equal to last year.

- Cast its votes for Tom Ware to be on the Parmer County Appraisal Board.

- Discussed the Senior Meal Site with several representatives from the lunch group.

Lisa Sanders turned in her resignation as the cook, effective Sept. 20. Thus, a new cook is needed.

The council told the lunch group that it needs to talk with the Senior Meal Site Board to handle the situation.



Farwell falls to New Deal

The Farwell Steers ran into a very strong New Deal team last Friday, losing 47-14.

Farwell is now 3-1 on the season and New Deal is 4-0.

The Steers expect QB J.J. Herrera and receiver Curt Langford, who have been out due to injuries, to return in this week's game.

The Lions started with the ball and moved quickly, scoring at 10:35 on a 47-yard pass.

Farwell was stymied although Chase Mitchell hit a nice pass to A.J. Bermea.

On defense again, tackles were made by Gerardo Martinez, Daniel Kirkland, Ruben Gutierrez and Lazaro Vasquez.

More tackles came from Mitchell, Dillon Kirkland, Martinez and Vasquez but New Deal was able to score from the 2 and take a 14-0 lead at the 3:51 mark.

The Lions got the ball back quickly via an interception. Pedro Ruiz and Zach Dale had good taces. Then Dillon Kirkland intercepted.

Rushes by Adrian Aleman and Daniel Kirkland gained a first down as the first quarter ended.

Aleman carried twice more for a first down, but the Steers had to punt. Tackles were made by Vasquez, Angel Graxiola, Daniel Kirkland, Dillon Kirkland and Oscar Muniz. The Lions scored on a 9-yard pass and

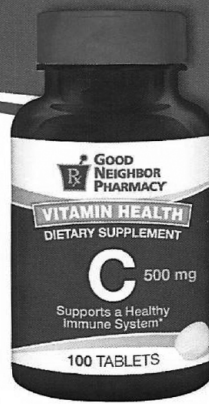

Live Cattle prices moved up of some short term cycle lows last week and should see a higher open on Monday due to a friendly Cattle on Feed report. Cash trade also took a bump up from the \$123.00 trade which has been going on for the last few weeks trading at \$124.00. Technically, there is strong resistance in the October contract between \$125.60 up to \$127.20. Need to clear the high number in order to continue higher. If this does take place, look for a test of the August highs near \$129.00.

Feeder prices were able to break out above some fairly strong resistance on Friday which came in around the \$159.40 level basis the October contract. This could open the door to retest the August high which is very close. There seems to be strong resistance across the Feeder board from front to back between the \$160.00 to \$161.00 area.

Soybean prices broke short term support levels around the \$13.33 level basis the November contract late last week. The market now looks poised to trade back down into the \$12.85 area which is about a 50% retracement from the August low up into the contract high. There should be a fair amount of support around this level as we move into harvest. South America is expected to increase soybean acres this season.

Corn prices continue to slip lower, but prices have been very slow to move down. The next short term target is around the early August low at \$4.45 basis the December contract. This is a critical support level and a close below \$4.45 would project a move on down towards the \$4.00 level which is the contract low and also last years low. The normal seasonal tendency is to see lower prices into harvest.

Wheat prices continue to trade sideways with little direction. Prices have overlapped daily trading ranges and seem to find support around the \$6.90 level basis the December contract. Resistance still lies above at the \$7.26 level. This top number needs to be taken out if price trends are going to turn back higher over the long haul. With pressure coming from the rest of the grain complex, it may be difficult.

Cotton prices have drifted up off their key support levels around the \$82.00 level basis the December contract. The market does not seem to have much strength on this rally? China is expected to have a record cotton crop coming off which could place some pressure on U.S. prices. A break below support would project a move back down into the low \$70's. Prices are still trading within this years trading range.

Eunice started at its 23. On the first play, Wolverines Mitchell Pinnell and Mason Golden tackled the ball carrier for a loss. Good defense from Tanner Pelfrey, Zach Harrison and Josh Tredway slowed the Cardinal offense down momentarily, but Eunice had a big run to the Texico 20.

Eunice scored on the next play via the pass to go up at the 7:31 mark. This would be the last time Eunice would see the end zone.

Pinnell returned the kick to the Wolverine 30. Pinnell ran for 13. Then, behind great blocking from Tredway, Jesus Maldonado, Eliseo Arenivaz, Pelfrey and Matthew Odegaard, Kendall Naceanceno pounded the ball on four straight carries to the Cardinal 32.

To its credit, Eunice held but their enthusiasm would be short-lived. C.J. Montano tackled the Eunice ball carrier for no gain and great defense by Tredway, Pelfrey, Brayden Herrington, Myers and Harrison had the Cardinal QB scrambling for his life when Adrian Gomez intercepted at the Texico 38.

Good blocking allowed Rucker time to find Gomez in the end zone for a 35-yard TD as time expired in the half.

Texico opened the 3rd quarter with Ramon Garcia returning the kick to the Texico 32.

On a 4th down play, Rucker carried for a first down at midfield. A pass to Gomez put Texico at the Cardinal 38 but Eunice held .

On defense, Naceanceno and Pinnell recorded good tackles, and a QB sack by Myers forced a punt to the Texico 22. Rucker had two big runs and Texico was at the Eunice 36. Eunice stopped the Wolverines at the 7.

Good pressure by Herrington and a sack by Myers forced a Eunice punt, which Naceanceno returned to the Cardinal 40. Myers ran for 10. Two carries by Pinnell had the ball at the 24. Rucker rambled to the 15.

Rucker hit Myers with a 13-yard TD pass to make the score 31-7 early in the final quarter.

Lance Myers and Jonah Tuls tackled the kick returner. Jesus Maldonado had a QB pressure. Harrison knocked down a pass. Rucker and Naceanceno combined on a tackle for a loss.

Eunice tried a pass on 4th down which Montano knocked down. Texico advanced to the Eunice 20 but failed on a field goal try.

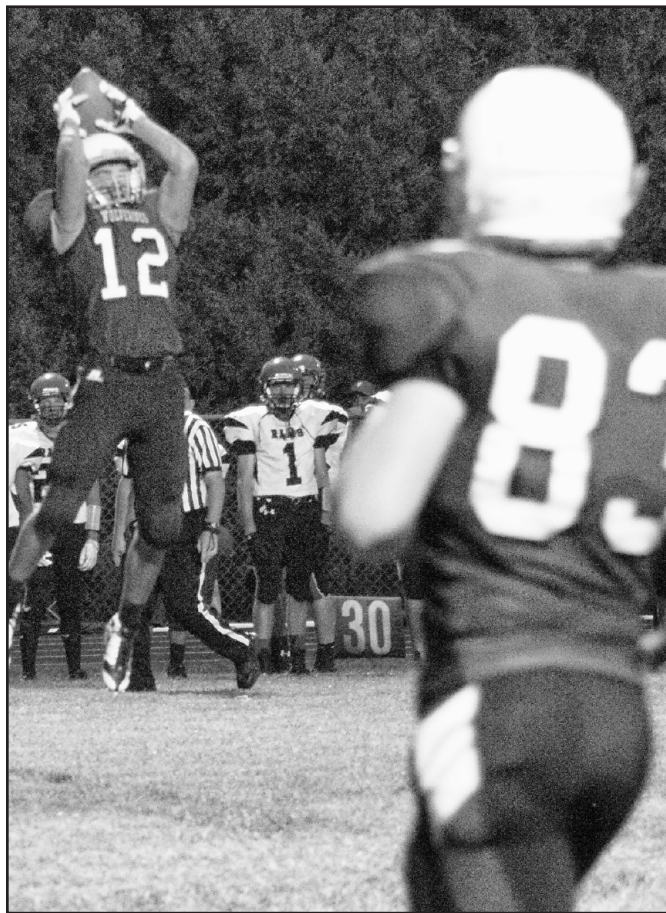

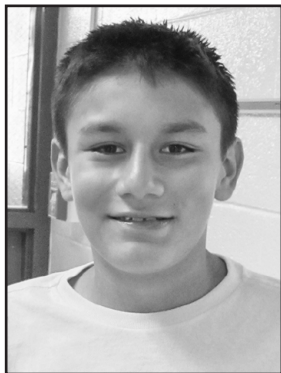

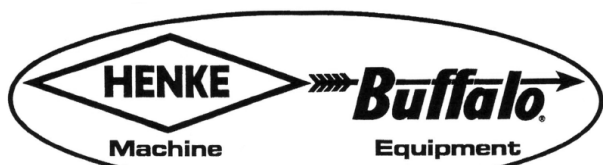

Ordinance No. 149

Ordinance No. 149 has been revised by the City Council of Farwell, Texas:

The ordinance involves water, sewer and garbage rates.

As of Oct. 1, 2013, the following rates will go into effect:

Garbage -- Residential, \$35. This is a monthly charge for weekly garbage pickup. Prices for larger businesses, schools, etc., is dependent on the size and number of dumpsters and the number of pickups per week.

Sewer -- Residential, flat rate of \$25. Business, flat rate of \$33.

Water -- Residential -- \$35, 2,000 gallons minimum; \$2.25 per 1,000 gallons, from 2,000 to 9,999; \$3.30 per 1,000 gallons, from 10,000 to 19,999; \$525 per 1,000 gallons, from 20,000 to 29,999; \$4.30 per 1,000 gallons, over 30,000.

Water -- Non-residential -- \$50, 2,000 gallons minimum; \$3.30 per 1,000 gallons, from 2,000 to 9,999; \$4.30 per 1,000 gallons, from 10,000 to 19,999; \$6 per 1,000 gallons, from 20,000 to 29,999; \$7.95 per 1,000 gallons, over 30,000.

A \$200 deposit will be charged in addition to the \$30 connection fee.

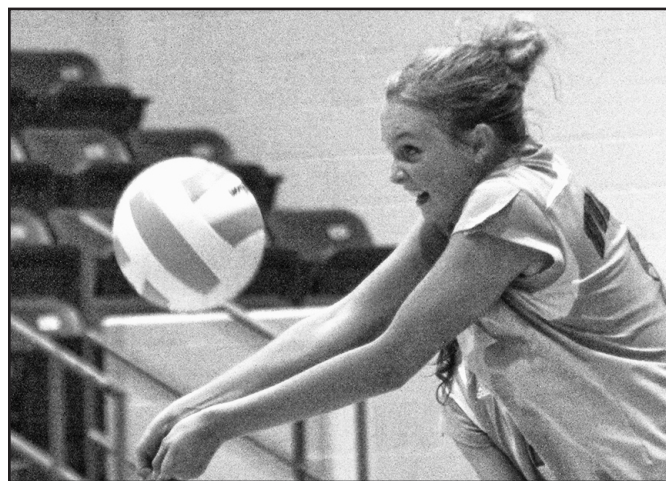

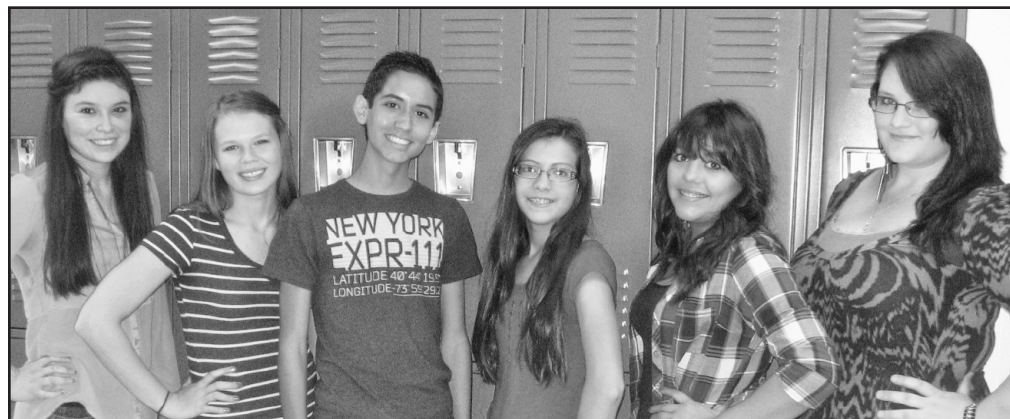

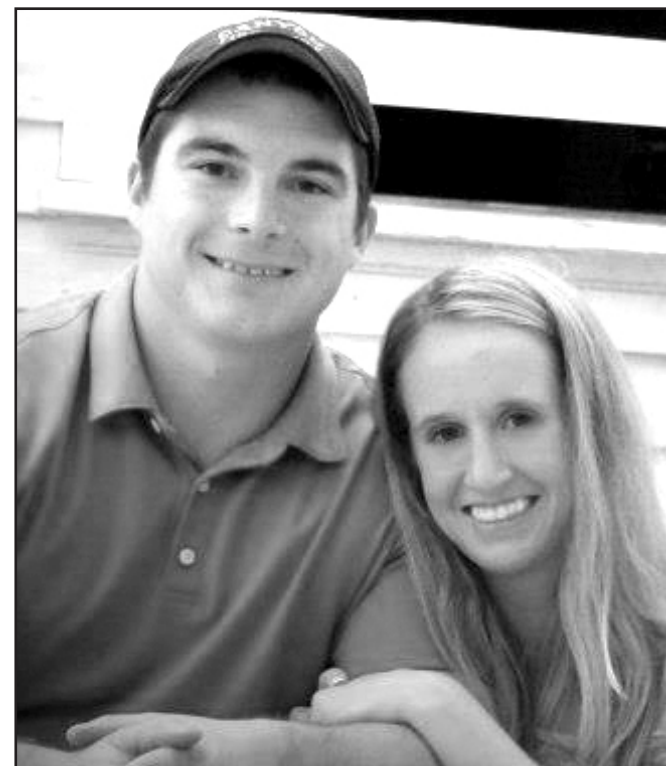

The council re-approved the budget as it stands.
