Galvan said security was certainly something he was worried about from the beginning. "We wanted a zero-tolerance for drugs and alcohol and Chief Kelsay was on hand to make sure the kids didn't break any rules."

The kids were not allowed to enter and leave the building freely. Once they left, they had to go home. Also, the dance ended at midnight so students could be off the streets under Farwell's curfew.

During the dance, free popcorn was provided by Farwell's band, and there was water, sodas and door prizes, too.

Dave Mitchell, of Sir Mitch Photography, took pictures for the event.

Galvan said that the event is limited to local-area students who are currently enrolled from 6th through 12th grade. No youths who have graduated will be allowed to attend, to limit any problems.

The next dance will be a Halloween dance on Oct. 26, and there will be a costume contest, door prizes and some other fun things planned.

The entry fee is \$3 to help cover the door prizes and clean up.

Lazbuddie Robotic Team wins 1st place BEST

Debbie Weir reports that Lazbuddie School's robotics team won 1st Place **BEST Team in Lubbock.**

The team has qualified for the regional and state competition of Texas BEST (Boosting Engineering, Science, and Technology) at the University of Dallas in Richardson on Nov.8-9.

Seventeen teams vied in Lubbock. From 40 to 50 teams will be present in Dallas from Texas, New Mexico and other states.

Labuddie won 1st place Spirit and Sportsmanship; 1st place CAD drawings; 2nd place in table display and presentation, and 3rd place in the oral presentation in front of judges. The team also placed 2nd in the engineering notebook category.

The BEST competition consists of four categories:

-- A project summary notebook submitted in advance of Texas Best.

-- An oral presentation in front of judges which included a power point presentation, an explanation of the engineering process, community outreach, school involvement, school promotion, and school spirit involvement.

Farwell Schools to get water well

The Farwell City Council on Oct. 15 approved running water lines for the school from a well on 7th Street on the south side of town to the school.

The lines will run next to the loop, but due to Texas Department of Transportation rules, the lines can only be put in by the city.

Mayor Jimmie Mace said the lines couldn't run directly down the alley to the football field, which would be the most direct route, because of fiber optic lines, old water lines and sewer lines.

Farwell School Supt. Kelly Lusk said the school would be happy to reimburse the city for running the lines and lease the lines into the future as the city would have to continue ownership of the lines due to TxDot rules.

Mace said that the well is currently producing 40-50 gallons per minute, but it is the only well that automatically chlorinates the water, as opposed to the rest of the city where chlorine is circulated in. Continued on Page 4 such as in any school topic, it will be




On the next play, the Wolverines forced a fumble and Pinnell recovered it.

Mace said that if the city kept the well, it could cost thousands of dollars to remove the chlorination system, but the school could use it as is.

Lusk said the well would be primarily used to water the football field and practice field, as they are the biggest water users.

In other business, the council:

- Heard that the Senior Meal Site has had over 20 folks eating there each day, and that the food was very good.

Mace said that he had been approached to help the site pay their \$750 liability Insurance, but said he felt unsure about the city's liability in that case.

He suggested that the council approve a donation of \$800 that they can use for anything they like.

The council approved it.

The council also approved Tim Price to build a shop behind his home, but stipulated that it could only be used for personal use, and not as a commercial shop.

- Approved Western Imperial to do a controlled burn on the east side of Farwell. The company owns the last city lot on the east side of the loop, and has cleaned up the property.

The burn will be for dead trees and other small debris, but city code states that any burn in town needs to be approved by the city council.

The burn was approved, as long as they coordinate with the fire and police departments.

- Heard that the city will be erecting a flag pole at the cemetery north of town.

- Was approached by Katrina Bryant about a problem with her water bill, but she had not asked to be on the agenda 72 hours prior to the meeting, so she was asked to come back to the next meeting.







-- Heard that the city police department has received a \$1,000 donation from the District Attorney's office to buy cameras that are put on their uniforms.

-- Got an update on a grant application to renovate the ground storage water tank. The original application last year had the wrong address, and this had to be changed.

-- Approved the 5-year lease with Charles Wilkins at the waste water treatment plant area.

-- Noted that well No. 9 was being worked on and cost information will be sought.

-- Accepted a bid to repair the EMS building roof. -- Heard Jim Bob Swafford discuss councilman Radford Venable's support to have a retail liquor store put in town.

Swafford questioned whether the council was involved in Venable's project.

Mayor Frank Gonzalez and councilmen David Curtis, Dan Mayberry and Mike Olvera said the council had nothing to do with it.

-- Heard Poling report in response to a reader's complaint in last week's Tribune about the Halloween decoration at City Hall that the same decoration has been set up at City Hall at least the last two years.

Live Cattle prices turned most of their short term harts down last Thursday after an extremely sharp selloff into the close. Prices seemed to gain some stability back on Friday, but now that short term trends have turned, it would technically require a new closing high in order to turn short term trends higher. Cash trade was a little higher last week, but seems to have lots of resistance around the \$130.00 level. Support below the market comes in around the \$131.00 level basis the December contract.

Feeder prices also took a hard hit last Thursday and also turned their short term trends down for the time being. There is some support around the \$165.00 level basis the November contract. Long term cycles pointed towards potential highs during the mid October time frame. For now, the market would need to close back above the \$169.00 level in order to turn short term rends back up.

Soybean prices held a strong double bottom around the \$12.62 level basis the November contract and prices have since rallied. A breakout above the \$13.07 area could possibly turn long term trends back higher. There is some resistance around the \$13.30 level, but overall this market along with the rest of the grain complex is beginning to show some strong signs of turning their trends back higher.

Corn prices rallied back into some short term resistance levels last week around the \$4.48 level and stopped. There have been long term price targets down around the \$4.00 level basis the December contract, but each time prices break down into new low territory, there is enough buying to support a rally back up into higher levels. This could be telling us that the market is close to finding a harvest low?

Wheat prices turned their long term trends up several weeks ago and the market has continued to work higher. The market broke out above the last couple weeks highs on Friday, but the market has given up some of their gains on Monday of this week. Technically, prices should make an attempt to test the \$7.95 level basis the December KC contract at some point.

Cotton prices have moved back down close to major upport levels around the \$82.20 level basis the December contract. Prices have stalled out for a minute. out waiting to see if any bullish news could hold prices at current levels or moving higher from here? Fundamentally, China seems to have lots of cotton on nand which could come into play at some point over the next few weeks?



Harvest Season Offers Lessons to Investors

It's harvest time again. Of course, harvest season may not mean that much to you if you don't work in agriculture. Nonetheless, you can learn a lot from those who do especially in your role as an investor.

Here are a few of these lessons to consider:

• "Feed" your portfolio. Through the proper combination of fertilizers and irrigation, farmers seek to maximize the growth of their crops. And if you want to give your portfolio the opportunity to grow, you need to "feed" it with the right mix of investments. This generally means you'll need to own a reasonable percentage of growthoriented vehicles, such as stocks and stock-based securities. Keep in mind, though, that the value of these types of investments will fluctuate, sometimes sharply — and there's no guarantee you won't lose some or all of your principal.

• Be patient. Crops don't grow overnight. Farmers know that they will put in countless hours of work before they see the fruits of their labors. And they know that, along the way, they will likely experience setbacks caused by a variety of issues: too much rain, too little rain, insect infestations — the list goes on and on. When you invest, you shouldn't expect to "get rich quick" - and you can expect to experience obstacles in the form of bear markets, economic downturns, changes in legislation and so forth. Continuing to invest for the long term and focusing more on long-term results than short-term success can help you as you work toward your objectives.

• Respond to your investment "climate." Farmers can't control the weather, but they can respond to it. So, for example, when it's been dry for a long time, they can boost their irrigation. As an investor, you can't control the economic "climate," but you can make adjustments. To illustrate: If all signs point to rising long-term interest rates, which typically have a negative effect on long-term bond prices, you may need to consider reducing your exposure, at least for a while, to these bonds.

. Diversify. Farmers face a variety of risks, including bad weather and fluctuating prices. They can help combat both threats through diversification. For instance, they can plant some crops that are more drought-resistant than others, so they won't face complete ruin when the rains don't fall. As an investor, you should also diversify; if you only owned one type of financial asset, and that asset class took a big hit, you could sustain large losses. But spreading your dollars among an array of investments - such as stocks, bonds, cash and other vehicles - may help reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio. (Be aware, though, that diversification by itself can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss.)

Relatively few of us toil in the fields to make our living. But by understanding the challenges of those who farm the land, we can learn some techniques that may help us to nurture our investments.
