Cemetery marks 50th anniversary

Many residents who have been around Farwell long enough still think of the Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery as the "new cemetery" but it is actually entering its 50th year of providing a final resting place for departed family and friends.

Its northern entrance bears a plaque revealing its origin in the hands of six men who, over their card games over half a century ago, recognized the need for the cemetery.

The plaque reads:

The Jolly Boys Poker Club got together at members' homes once a week to play, with their children standing tip-toe trying to see their fathers' cards.

The Jolly Boys would

also pool their money from the games for various investments or stocks, and would discuss the needs of their small hometown of Farwell. One concern was that the "old cemetery" south of town was running out of room.

Somebody really ought to do something about that, they agreed, and then they further decided that the Jolly Boys were just the ones to be that "somebody."

In a process that has been common for years in the improvements of small towns, these young husbands and fathers determined to contribute something of lasting benefit to their neighbors and their children.

The spot they chose for their project is north of Farwell, across Highway 60 from the old Santa Fe railroad tracks that had finally reached

the small cow-towns of Texico-Farwell in 1899.

In a town where the wail of the trains' whistles and the rumble of their cars fill the days and nights, it seems only right that the dearly departed who knew the "music of the railways" in their lives should have it close at hand as they await their resurrection just north of the old hometown.

Three of the Jolly Boys now rest in the cemetery. But three others are still with us.

One of those still alive, Elmer Hargrove, reflected that the stakes in their poker, not too big, were used to fund the investment decisions they had agreed upon over their cards. "Bob (Anderson) handled that part of the club for us," he said.

The second, Bert Williams, chuckled, "It's a good thing that we

Lazbuddie Robotics team advances to State

The Lazbuddie Robotics team won 2nd Place BEST Team and 1st place in robot competition last weekend in Lubbock. This is the first time the team has qualified in two categories.

Lazbuddie qualified for the regional and state competition of Texas BEST (boosting engineering, science, and technology) in both categories. The contest will be held at University of Texas at Dallas in Dallas on Nov. 9 and 10.

Twenty-three teams entered the Lubbock contest. Up to 60 teams will be present in Dallas from Texas and surrounding states.

The Lazbuddie team also won 1st place table display and presentation, 2nd place in the spirit and sportsmanship category, 2nd place computer aided design drawings, 2nd place notebook, and 2nd place oral presentation before a panel of judges.

The Best Competition consists of four categories:

1. A project summary notebook submitted in advance of Texas Best.
2. An oral presentation in front of judges, which included a power point presentation and an explanation of the engineering process, community outreach, school involvement and promotion, and school spirit involvement.
3. A table exhibit and interviews.
4. A spirit and sportsmanship review.

Steers fall to Hornets

The Farwell Steers fell to Sudan, 27-13, at home on Friday.

Farwell is 5-4 overall and 1-2 in District.

Farwell started on defense, with Cheyenne Rodriguez and Juan Nicolas sacked the QB on the first play. Hunter Hall also had a big tackle for loss, but Sudan drove to Farwell's 22 where Curt Langford scooped up a fumble and returned it to midfield.

Kolten Morris drove through the Sudan defense for big gains and hurdled a Hornet player to get Farwell inside the Sudan 20.

Collin Christian finished the drive with a 10-yard TD pass to J.J. Herrera for a 6-0 lead. The kick failed.

On defense again, the Steer defensive backs kept Sudan from completing two passes, and Daniel Kirkland and Morris caught the Sudan QB for a huge loss.

After a Hornet punt, Morris and Christian had big runs as the Steers crossed midfield. They were held there and a punt was returned 86 yards for a TD.

Farwell again drove downfield as Christian hit a 10-yard pass to Langford on 3rd down, and Morris moved the chains with his running as well.

Farwell got to the Sudan 20 but was held there.

Sudan scored on a 25-yard pass play with a minute left before halftime for a 13-6 lead.

In the 3rd quarter, Christian threw to Morris for 10 yards, but Farwell had to punt again, which Sudan quickly turned into a TD.

Langford sparked the Steers with a 20-yard kick return, and Morris added 25 yards of rushing. On 3rd and long, Christian hit Hunter Hall on a 43-yard pass play, that included a bruising run as Hall broke two tackles on his way into the end zone. Morris kicked the extra point to bring the Steers within 6.

But Sudan quickly increased their lead back to 14 on a 27-yard pass play.

After the teams traded possessions, the Hornets ran the ball out of punt formation for a first down. Three plays, Dillon Kirkland forced a fumble and Hayden Hadley recovered it.

Farwell drove again with Morris making big runs and Christian connected with Herrera for 10 more yards. The Steers made it to the Sudan 5 yard line, but couldn't punch the ball in.

Sudan was quickly forced to punt as Morris sacked the QB, while Daniel Kirkland and Lazaro Velazquez made tackles behind the line.

Christian hit passes to Morris and Langford, but time expired before Farwell could score again.

Team stats were: 1st downs, Farwell 21, Sudan 19; rushing yards, Farwell 168, Sudan 248; passing yards, Farwell 113, Sudan 133; and penalties, Farwell 4 for 225 yards, Sudan 6 for 55.

Wolverines put away Estancia to go 7-0

 The Texico Wolverines slipped past the Estancia Bears last Friday there, 32-28, by scoring on the final play of the game to pull out the win.
 Texico is now 7-0 overall and 2-0 in District. Estancia is 3-5 and 0-3 in District.
 On the kickoff, Eliseo Arenivaz and Matt Odegaard tackled the Estancia ball carrier. Good defense was played by Elliott Pelfrey, John Myers, Shay Harrison, Carlos Silva and D.J. Griego and a pass was knocked down by Mitchell Pinnell. Texico got the ball back at its 24.
 The Wolverines' first

offensive series was stifled and they punted. On the next series for the Bears, they scored on a 33-yard run. The PAT run was good and it was 8-0 at 3:21 in the first quarter.
 Justin Rucker returned the kickoff 50 yards to the Bears 32. Myers and Harrison had good carries. Rallin Harris passed to Myers for 10 yards, then Harrison punched into the endzone from 10 yards out. The kick failed and it was 8-6 at 1:29.
 The Bears started at their 35. Good defense by Griego, Harrison, Myers, Pelfrey and Munoz ended the quarter with the Bears at mid-field.

The Bears coughed up the ball, recovered by Myers at the 50. Texico was held there and punted to the Estancia 25. Despite good defense by Silva, Harrison, Adrian Gomez and Elliott Pelfrey, the Bears scored from the Texico 1 at 5:07 of the 2nd quarter to lead 14 to 6.
 Myers returned the kickoff to the Wolverine 43 but 4 plays later Harrison punted to the Bear 20. Good defense by Zach Madrid, Harrison

and Munoz forced an Estancia punt. Pinnell ran for 11 to end the half.
 Rucker returned the kick to the Texico 34 to open the 2nd half. Silva and Pinnell alternated carries to get the ball into Bear territory behind good offensive line blocking. Harrison rushed to the 39. Behind blocking by Dalton Wren, Munoz, Griego, Pelfrey and Madrid, Harrison scampered 39 yards to pay dirt. Estancia led 14-12 when the Texico PAT

failed.
 Zach Harrison, Eliseo Arenivaz and Jonah Tuls tackled the kick returner at the Bears 35. Madrid had a sack and the Bears punted to the Texico 36. The Wolverines were held and punted to the Bear 27.
 Good defense by Gomez and Alan Valles forced a punt. Two carries later, Harrison had the ball at midfield. Then Harris connected with Gomez to put the ball on the Estancia 25. Harris kept for a 25-yard TD run. A pass from Harris to Carlos Silva added 2 extra points and Texico led 20-14,
 Odegaard, Justin Garza and Rucker took down the kick returner at the Bears 38. A collective sack by Myers, Munoz, Pelfrey and Harrison forced a punt. But after a big gain, Texico lost a fumble at the Estancia 42,
 A few plays later, the Bears scored from 37 yards out to tie the game at 20-all after the PAT failed.
 Harrison took the kick to the 39. Harrison's runs led the way to the Bears

20 behind great offensive line blocking. Silva carried to the 16, Pinnell to the 12 and Harris to the 8. Harrison punched it in from the 8 with 1:58 left. The PAT failed and it was 26-20.
 Tuls and Zach Harrison took the kick returner

were not depending on our decisions to make our fortunes - I don't recall that any of our investment decisions ever made us rich!"
 The third, Bob Anderson, recalls, "We used the Jolly Boy fund to get a surveyor from Hereford to plat and mark the plots for us, and we drilled the water well that is still pumping out there. That piece of land on V. Scott's place belonged to Clyde and Dickie Magness and they were the ones who donated it to the city."
 The Jolly Boys themselves planted the trees on the perimeter that protect the graves from the winds and tumbleweeds. They took turns going out each day to make sure the new plants had enough water and they ran the aluminum piping to water

the new grass, too.
 John Armstrong Sr. and Earl Roberts put in the central sidewalk that terminates with the statue carved by Italian artists at its north end, purchased and shipped here by Anderson and Don Williams.
 Over the years, other families have donated memorial benches on the central sidewalk. They, with the Jolly Boys, created something that will continue to benefit residents for years to come, under the care of the city workers on whom the care of the grounds and respect for the graves

has been meticulously given in each year since.
 Half a century of providing the serenely beautiful final resting places has brought Sunset Terrace to a point in which its own capacity can be foreseen and the Farwell City Council, planning ahead, has extended the cemetery north to about the same size. City employees have planted the evergreen windbreak on its perimeter, already flourishing and filling any gaps.
 Perhaps a group of young businessmen and farmers not yet born will be playing poker some-

time around the year 2060 when they recognize that Sunset Terrace needs another extension of its sacred grounds. Perhaps they will determine that they are just the ones to make it hap-

pen.
 When they do that, perhaps they might also decide to call their little group the Jolly Boys? That would seem to be an appropriate gesture a century later.

Longhorns roll

The Lazbuddie Longhorns are 5-3 on the season and 1-0 in district after knocking off Cotton Center last Friday at home, 62-56.

Cotton Center is 5-3 overall and 0-1 in district. The 'Horns have two more district games -- vs. Whitharral and Amherst. If they win one of them, they will earn a state playoff berth for the first time since 1999.

Amherst beat Whitharral in last week's game. The fighting 'Horns, under the direction of Coaches Ken Hoskins and Bryan Coltrane, may have been short-handed in numbers (nine athletes) this year, but they have played hard in every game.

As an example of how far they have come, the 'Horns recently had a nine-season average of only one win per season. But this year has been vastly different.

The 'Horns were led by the rushing of Albert Solano, who gained 234 yards and scored 5 TDs. Most of that yardage came in the first half. Cotton Center made adjustments at halftime to keep him more contained.

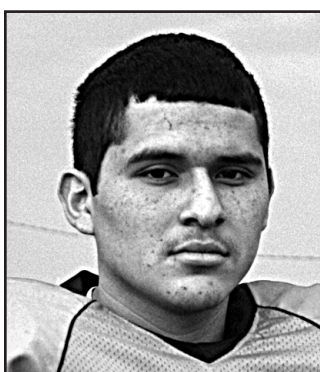
Another offensive weapon was Alex Lopez, who hauled in three passes from Jared Timms for 89 yards and a score.

Head Coach Hoskins was unable to be at the game due to illness. But he wanted to congratulate assistant coach Coltrane "on a great job getting the team ready."

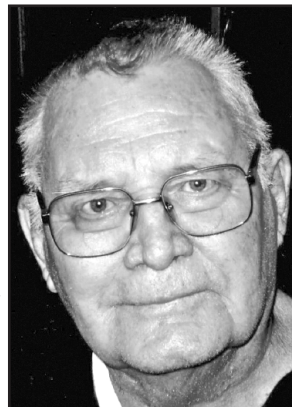

Herman Geries

Born in Progress, Texas, July 29, 1931, to Dick and Perlie Gerie, Herman Gerie passed away after a lengthy illness on Oct. 25, 2012, to be with his God and his loved ones who left this world before him. Herman grew up on a farm in Lariat, surrounded by a loving family that included his three younger brothers Bob, Don, and Dickie.



Growing up in this pioneering environment nurtured Herman's lifelong loves of working the soil, reaping the fruits of hard work, hunting, and fishing.

Herman was active in FFA at Farwell High School, and after graduation, at age 18, he made the best decision of his life and married high school sweetheart Alta Norton, on May 28, 1950. The couple have been pillars of comfort, joy, love, and support for 62 years.

The couple started their life together with Herman working for his Uncle Earnest Ramm on his farm, and then in 1951, they moved north of Farwell where Herman rented property from his father-in-law, Lester Norton. The U.S. went to war and Herman volunteered for the Air Force in 1952, where he used the skills he'd learned on the farm to serve as a sheet metal worker on airplanes during the Korean War. He was stationed in Germany for a year, an experience of service in which he always took great pride and added to his already immense sense of patriotism. Herman ended his enlistment in the Air Force with stints at Cannon AFB and Altus AFB in Oklahoma.

After leaving the Air Force, Herman continued his farming career north of Farwell and served as president of the Parmer County Farm Bureau. Alta and Herman decided to start a family, and in February of 1961 they adopted their first child, a baby girl they named Tina. Three years later, having to pull their car from the driveway with a tractor, they braved a snowstorm driving to Fort Worth to adopt their second child, a baby boy they named Todd. The couple's lives would revolve around their children for the rest of their lives, and Herman and Alta were always exemplary parents.

Herman continued his farming career and expanded his operation in 1970, buying land in New Mexico and building his own house on the property. He continued to be active in the Curry County Farm Bureau, and then in 1977, to add to his duties, he became a member of the Texico School Board on which he proudly served for 16 selfless years.

Despite all of his familial, civic, and ecclesiastical duties, Herman still found time through the years to enjoy his passion for hunting and fishing, making numerous forays into Colorado, and New Mexico to hunt for deer and elk on horseback. His penultimate hunting expedition however was a 2-week stay in the wilds of Canada in 1968, where Native American guides led him and his friends on a hunt which yielded a black bear and an elk for the avid huntsman.

While Herman focused intently on his family and career, he always held God and his church as central to being the person God wanted him to be. He was a charter member of the First Baptist Church Farwell; served as the Sunday School Superintendent; worked in the Men's Brotherhood; served as a deacon for years; taught Sunday School; volunteered for any committee that needed him; and traveled to locales as far asunder as Arizona, Mexico, Guatemala, and Brazil on mission trips to spread the word of Christ to those in need. After a devoted life of service, God has seen fit to call his good and faithful servant home.

Herman was preceded in death by his father and mother, Dick and Perlie Gerie; his daughter Tina Dorwald; brother Don and his wife Linda.

Surviving are his loving wife Alta of Farwell; son Todd and his wife Phyllis of Houston; son-in-law James Dorwald of San Antonio; granddaughter Amy Buehler and her husband Brad of Houston; granddaughter Sarah Spickard of Harrogate, England; granddaughter Christen Gill; great-grandson Grayson Buehler; great-granddaughters Ava and Sophia Buehler; great-granddaughter Abriana Gill; brother Bob Gerie and his wife Charlene of Clovis; brother Dickie and his wife Glenda of Uvalde, Texas; and numerous nieces and nephews of which he was tremendously fond.

Herman led a long, productive, and joyful life surrounded by wonderful family and friends. He will be missed, but he's in a better place and all of our lives were enriched by his life.

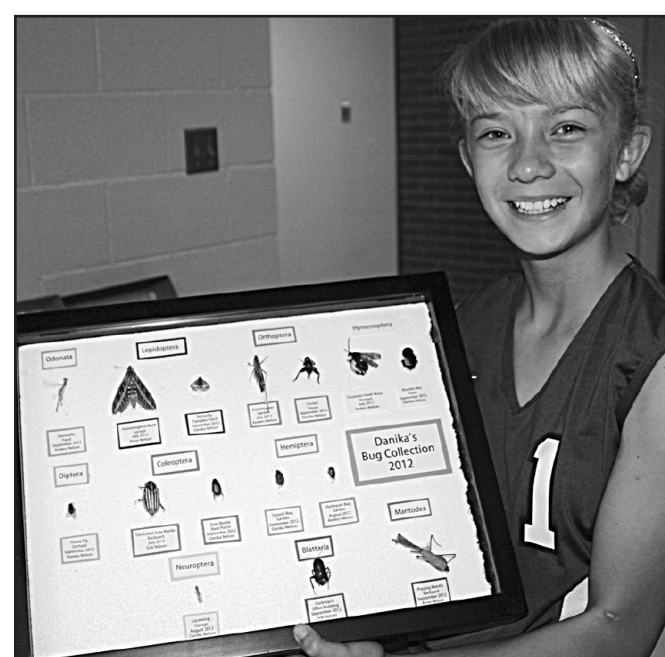
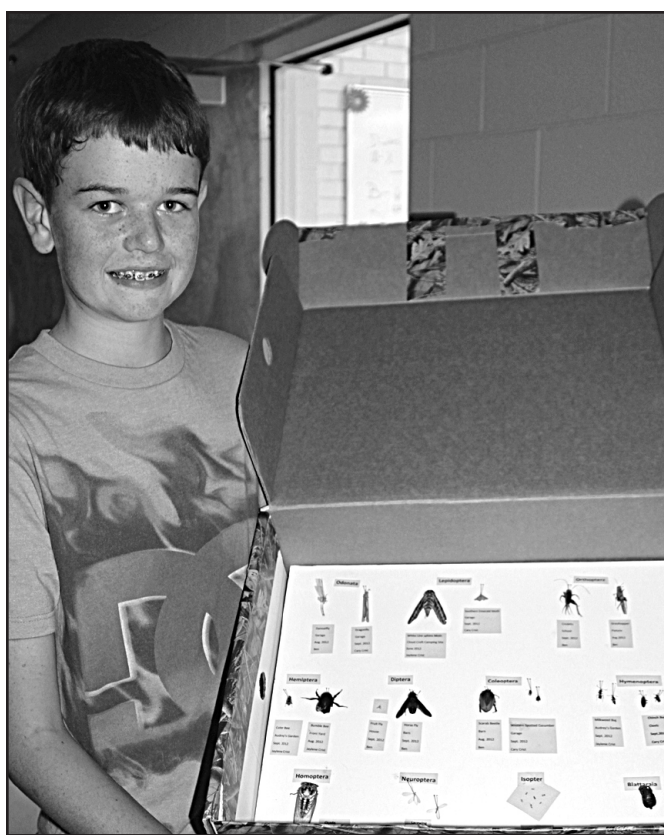
And if President Obama is re-elected, the bureaucrats in the White House are completely safe. Job, well done.

Texico discusses trash in alleys

The Texico City Council on Oct. 23 discussed cleaning up the alleys in town.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said there are still a lot of larger items that have been left in alleys. Things like couches and mattresses that don't fit in dumpsters are not picked up by the trash trucks.

Autrey said that folks dump items out there and expect the city to pick them up. He said if folks don't clean up the alleys, the city could hire a company to do it, but it would increase garbage rates by as much as \$15 per home.

Councilman Doug Scioli said he didn't feel it was right for the city to clean up trash in the alleys. He said it is the property owners' responsibility, even if they are renting the house.

He suggested having city employees pick up the items and then charge \$45 per hour, with a two hour minimum to the property owner. This is the same rate that residents are charged if the city has to mow their property.

In other news, the council:

- Discussed putting ceiling fans in the Senior Citizen building. Because the city owns the building, the work would need to be done by a licensed electrician, which would be expensive. The council voted against it, but offered to buy them free-standing fans and heaters.

Autrey offered to donate two flood lights to be put on the electrical pole in front of the building as folks have left the lights on at night, and they normally don't get shut off until the next next night.

- Received a report that work in continuing on the wastewater plant. There were a few issues this week as the city was unexpectedly charged for sand, which Autrey said he check into. And a fiber line that goes under the pit was changed to PVC to keep rodents from getting in.

They also heard that the state environmental department will require Texico to have monitoring wells around the plant to make sure the groundwater isn't contaminated.

- Discussed buying a street sweeper or hiring Bermea Construction to pick up extra rocks on the streets.

- Heard from Police Chief Doug Bowman that he has picked up several stray dogs over recent weeks.

Texico Elementary 2nd – 5th graders participated in the 5210 Challenge kick-off.

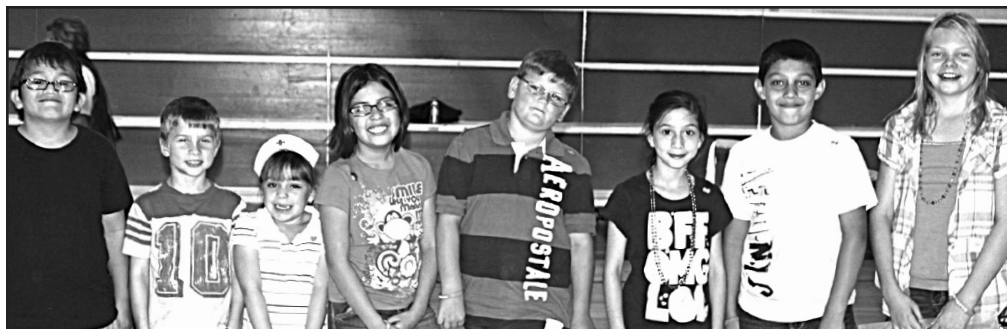
This event introduces kids to a movement sponsored by several local health organizations that want kids to get healthy and fit.

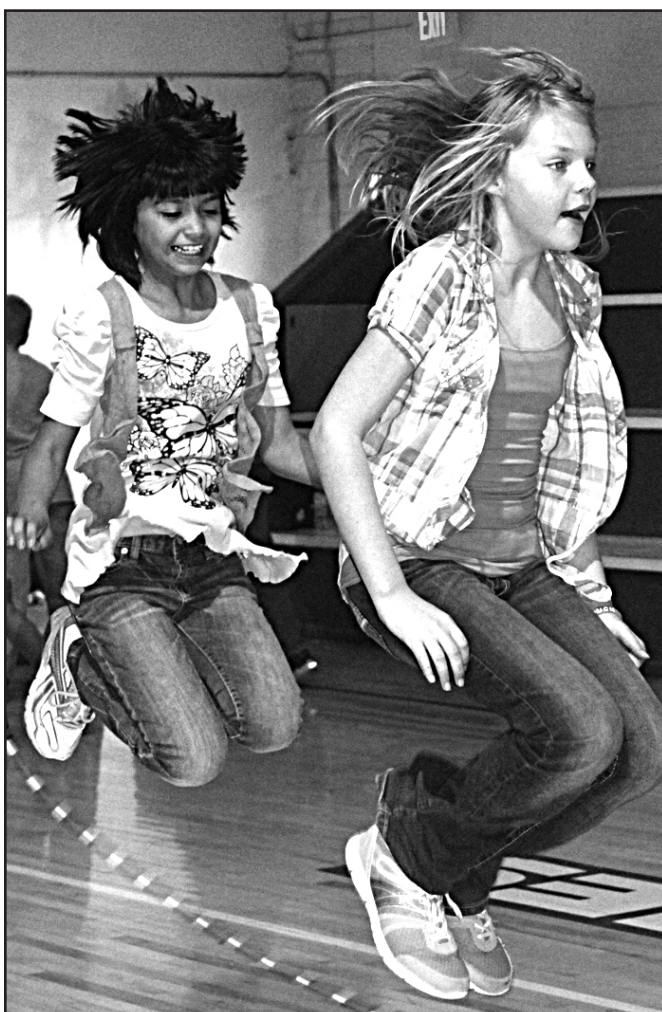
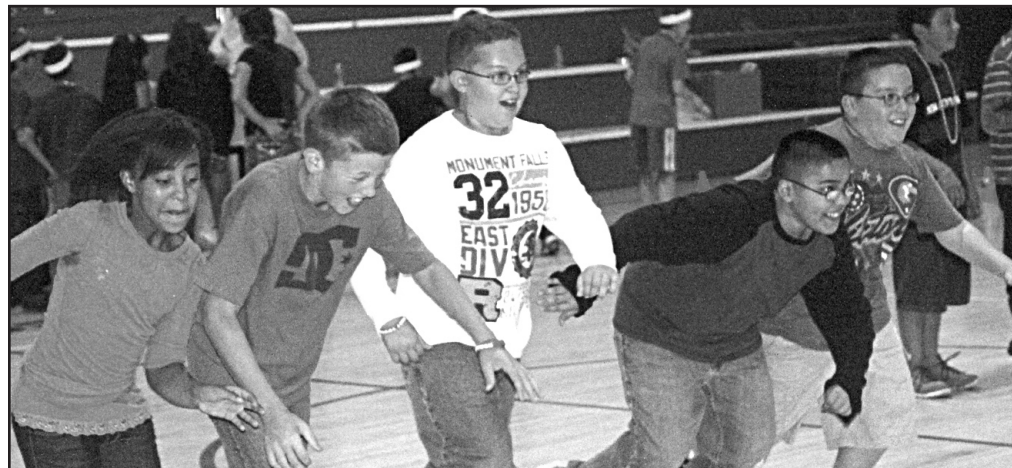
Gray, who has been working with Texico Coach Kristen Scanlan by teaching her Current Events class about drug awareness, offered to bring the health fair

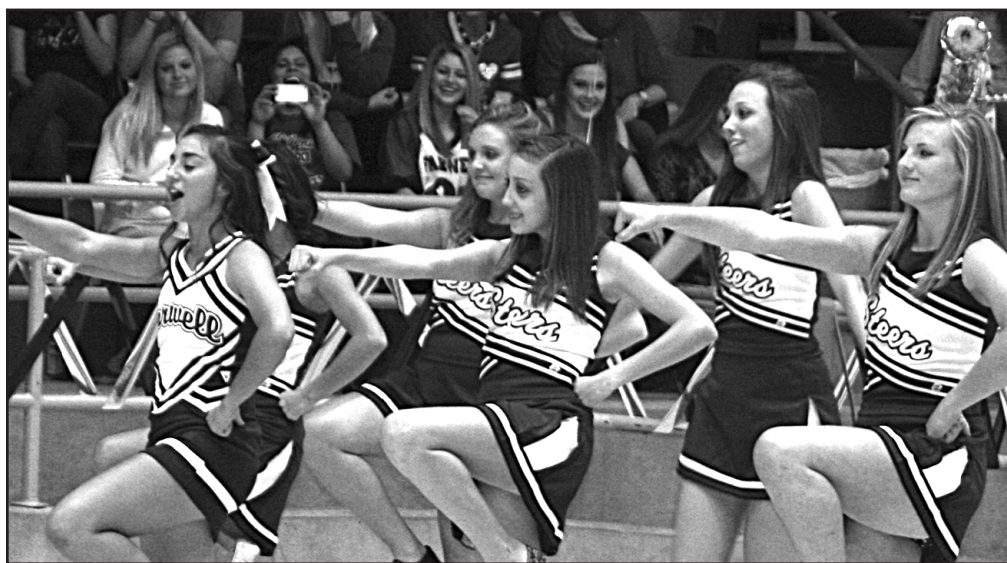

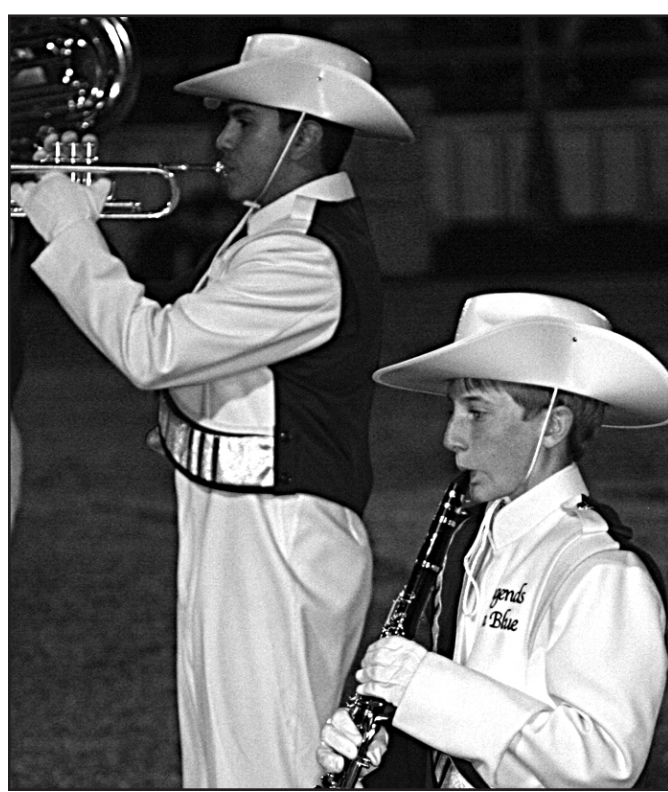

Bovina played their younger players in the final minutes. Kilpatrick had runs of 11 and 15 yards. Bernabe DeLaCruz raced for 11 more.

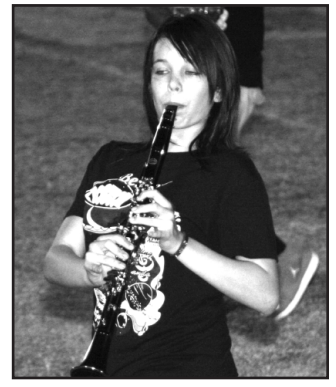
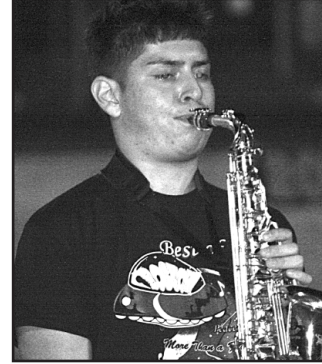
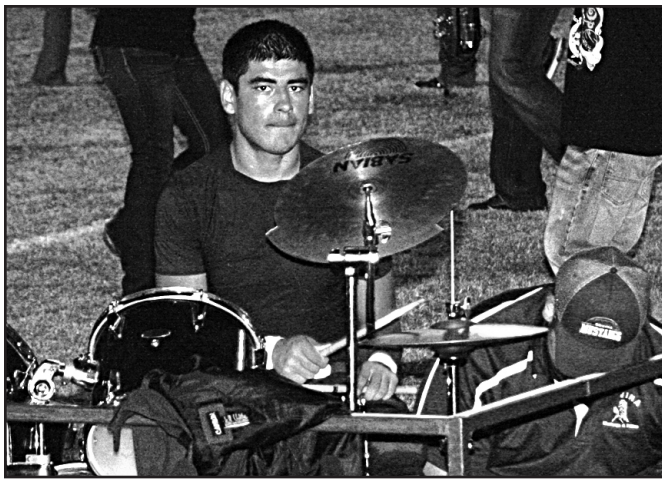
