Texico teams capture State playoff first rounds

It's on to Albuquerque for the Texico varsity basketball teams after their victories last weekend in the first round of the State playoffs.

The Lady Wolverines, ranked No. 2 in Class 2A in New Mexico, are 20-8 after destroying Ramah, 60-15, on Friday at Texico.

Ramah finished its season at 14-13. Ramah bosted a player, Jordyn Lewis, who was the leading Class 2A scorer going into the game. The tough Lady Wolverine defense held her to only 11 points (7 against Texico's first string).

The game was only close for a short while at its start, as Texico pulled away to a 22-6 halftime lead. Then Texico outscored Ramah, 38-9, in the second

Scoring were Mel Lucero, 6; Brianna Reyna, 25; Rae Lynn Prather, 13; Chasity Sharp, 2; Lindsey Foote, 3; McKenzi Mayfield, 9; and Chyanne Scarborough, 2.

Brianna, who is only a freshman, has had an outstanding season in leading the team's scoring.

Each class named their top readers for the day: Kindergarten - Adalyn Autrey, Cole Essex and Isabel Pieratt and Mrs. Brigham's class.



Kindergarten, Pre-K and Head Start Registration Wednesday, March 20, 2013, is the day to register children for next year's Farwell School kindergarten, pre-K and Head Start classes.

Registration will be held from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. Kindergarteners will register in the elementary office. Pre-K and Head Start pupils will register in the Head Start room.

All children who will be four and five years of age by Sept. 1 and live in the Farwell School District need to register for next year's classes. To register, a child must have immunization records, state copy of birth certificate and Social Security card.

Requirements to be eligible for pre-K and Head Start, a child must be four years old prior to Sept. 1, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced price lunches) and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Head Start requires income verification (check stub), Medicare/TANF.

Texas school districts are required to provide pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.

Also scheduled are drawings for prizes totaling more than \$1,500, including the grand prize -- a pair of airline tickets.








Joel White

Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income - such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10% to 50% penalty

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value to the appraisal review board.
- · You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- · You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2010. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2011.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2012 renditions is April 15. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.







The Parmer County sheriff's department and Bovina Police Department were also recognized for service to the people of Boyina and Parmer County.


Officer Trevino shared a story of how Officer Antillon received a broken nose during a boxing match as part of the training at the San Antonion Police Academy. The trauma to the nose required
