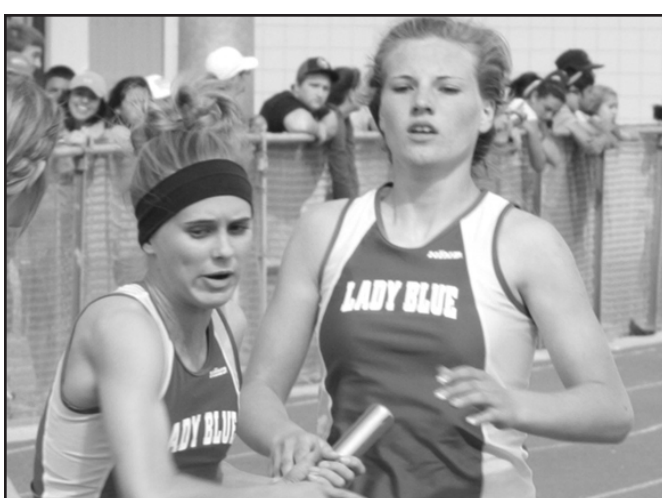


### A last look at Farwell track

### James Willard

After an extended illness with cancer, James David Willard, known to most as David, died in the early morning hours of Wednesday, June 26, at his residence in Bakersfield, Calif. He was 74.

David was born on Sept. 21, 1939, in Lutie, Collingsworth County, Texas, and grew up in Texas. He was the son of Vernon Everest Willard and Velma Agnes Collins Willard. He was the third of four children. His older brother, Vernon C. and sister, Bertha, as well as younger sister, Virginia, are all deceased. He was married to Caroline Corser from 1963 to 1982.

After graduation from high school, David attended McMurry University in Abilene, Texas, before transferring to the University of Texas in Austin. There, he earned both B.A. and M.A. degrees in English. He taught in the English Department at Bakersfield (Calif.) College from 1968 to 2000. David was a talented musician and often played the piano for friends at his home and for faculty gatherings on campus.

David is survived by sons Michael and Jeffrey; daughters-in-law Mary Kay and Judy, and five grandchildren.

### Request for Applicants For Appointment As County Auditor

Any person interested in appointment as County Auditor of Parmer County, Texas, should submit a written resume of their qualifications to the Office of the District Clerk, Parmer County Courthouse, Farwell, Texas, prior to 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 31, 2013.

The resume should include a statement of the positions of public or private trust previously held and the length of service in each of those positions.

To be qualified for appointment as a county auditor, a person must be:

1. a competent accountant with at least two years' experience in auditing and accounting;
2. thoroughly competent in public business details; and
3. a person of unquestionably good moral character and intelligence.

{There is no requirement that a county auditor be a licensed accountant or a certified public accountant.}

The term of office of a county auditor is two years. The Local Government Code prohibits any personal interest in a contract with the county by the county auditor. The Texas Constitution requires a county officer to reside in the county.

This appointment is expected to be a part-time position with the county auditor required to be in the office approximately 60 percent of the time the courthouse is open. A salary commensurate with the time worked will be set; also, health insurance and retirement benefits will be provided in accordance with county policy.

## Scioli: When an emergency arises or someone needs help, Texico is always right there

Doug Scioli and his wife, Susan, of Texico, call their screen printing and embroidery business "Midnight Teez."

Doug says this is because they literally are up at midnight working on their printing. Both Doug and Susan have "daytime" jobs, then pursue their screen printing ventures after hours.

Midnight Teez is the business that produces the Border Town Days buttons each year.

Self-taught graphic artists, the pair can create, design and print all types of t-shirt artwork. Doug says the one thing he enjoys most about this business is seeing his shirts still being worn years later.

"The drying process we use means that the designs will stay on for a long time. It is so cool to be walking down the street and see someone wearing one of my designs from 10 years ago," confirms Doug.

Most of his business comes from word of mouth, so the fact that his t-shirts remain popular is the best type of advertising.

Doug and Susan produce all their amazing designs in their own house. They have a shop in back with equipment for screen printing, drying and embroidery.

Doug prefers this to a traditional shop location for the public because the overhead is lower and he can keep his

prices down for the customers. In the past, the Sciolis have actually run other screen printing shops such as Sierra Sports and Screen printing and Southwest Screen Printing. Now, they are content to work from home with co-owners Jeff and Diane Queener.

Midnight might actually be the only time that Doug is at home. Retired from the Clovis Fire Department since 2005, Doug has stayed involved in many other local organizations.

He serves on the Texico City Council as

the Personnel Director; the EMS Board of Directors for Curry County Region 3; is the Texico Assistant Fire Chief, and the EMS area Coordinator.

Also, he works with his brother, Mike, at their Clovis auto dealership -- Mike Scioli's Auto Center.

And when school is in session, Doug can also be seen on the sidelines of the Wolverine football games where he is in charge of the ambulances and even shoots off the cannon for the home team.

# Here are details of Texico water, sewer service changes

Here are the details of the ordinance passed June 25 by the Texico City Council setting up requirements for its sewer and water services.

All new buildings on land where sewer and water mains are laid shall be connected to those lines before the buildings are occupied.

No construction permits will be given for remodeling buildings or for new buildings when the permit application shows a new connection to the sewer and water system is involved until the connection fee is paid.

The connection fee for new single family residential structures (single family structures and mobile homes) will be \$300. If the permit application shows that any single family residential structure includes more than 10 plumbing or waste fixtures, an extra charge of \$30 per fixture will be added to the connection fee.

Here's the schedule for connections for new multi-family residential structures: 1 to 10 -- \$300 per unit; 11 to 20 units -- \$270 per unit; 21 to 30 units -- \$240 per unit; 31

to 40 units, \$210 per unit; 41 to 50 units -- \$180 per unit; over 50 units -- \$150 per unit.

The connection fee for all new business, commercial or industrial structures will be \$350 for the first three plumbing or waste fixtures, and \$45 for each plumbing or waste fixture within the structure in excess of three.

The connection fee for all improvements to, or remodeling of existing structures, requiring the installation of new or additional plumbing or waste fixtures, will be \$20 for residential property and \$30 for commercial property for each such plumbing or waste fixture.

A special service fee will be charged if the city has built or extended at city expense up to \$100,000 an addition to an interceptor or transfer main that makes sewer and water service available or that increases the capacity for the definable

area where service had not been available.

The special service fee will be computed by the city utility director. If the property owner objects to the fee, he can appeal to the city council, whose decision is final.

Proceeds of all connection fees will go into a special fund to be used for (a) installing new lines as part of expanding the city's sanitary sewer and water system; (b) installing new lift stations; or (c) installing extra trunk or interceptor lines to increase the capacity of the city's system.

It's illegal to connect to the city's system until proper fees have been paid. The penalty is a fee between \$100 and \$500.

If a connection fee is not paid within three months after it's due, the city may disconnect the service. Reconnection would only be made after paying the delinquent bill plus expenses incurred by the city in its disconnection and reconnection service, but not to exceed \$25.

Sewer and water connection fees and service charges for the service to property outside city limits will be two times the applicable fees inside the city.

If the owner or developer of a subdivision within the city or requesting annexation to the city can connect to the city's sewer and water system if the following conditions are met:

-- Cost of planning and installing the connecting lines must be paid by the owner or developer.

-- The city council would approve where the existing lines would connect to the subdivision. A professional engineer must approve the plans.

-- The subdivision

owner or developer must install a connecting line of a capacity greater than that required, in view of more line potential customers. This also would be paid by the owner or developer.

Property owners outside the city who want to connect to the city's sewer and water systems must meet the following requirements:

-- The city will determine if the sewer and

water systems have sufficient capacity to handle the applicant's expected requirements.

-- Connections will be allowed only to 6-inch, 8-inch and 12-inch lines.

-- The city will determine if connections require installing a manhole, the cost of which would be paid by applicant.

-- All connections must comply with city standards.

The First Baptist Church of Farwell is doing a different plan this year to help folks in need with food boxes at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

They are starting this drive now.

Folks can stop by the church at any time and pick up a box and a grocery list and stock it gradually throughout the year, or you can just pick up a list of the grocery items and drop them by the church as you gather them.

-- Riding bikes in the park during BTD is not allowed, for safety reasons.

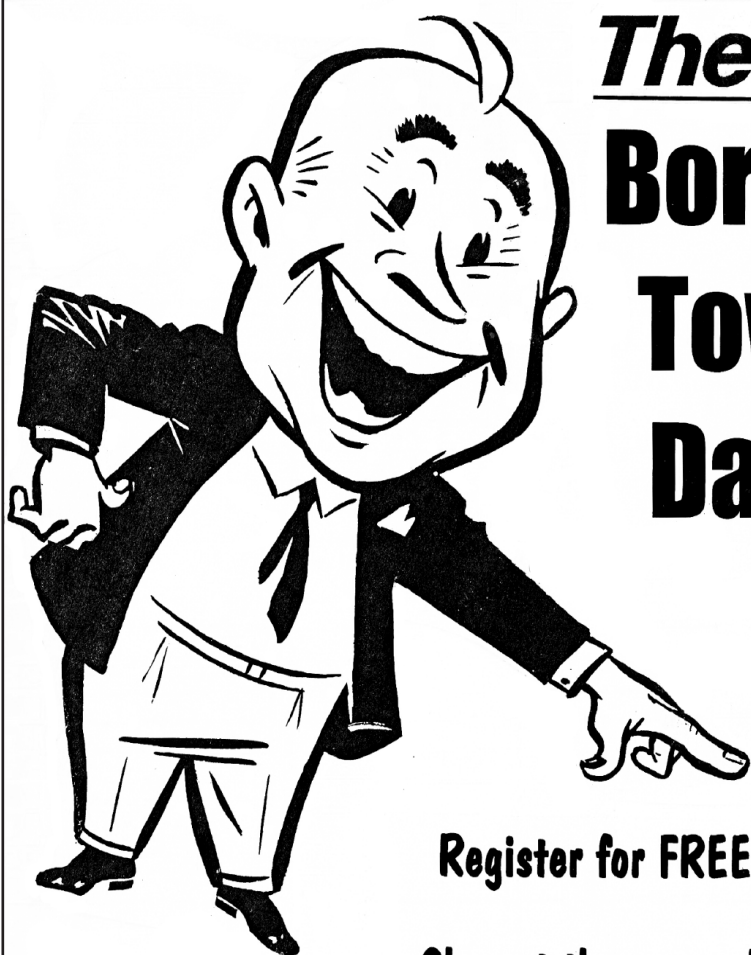
-- You must be present at the park to receive your cash prizes (or if you win the bicycles!) when the announcements are made during the 12:30 p.m. ceremonies.

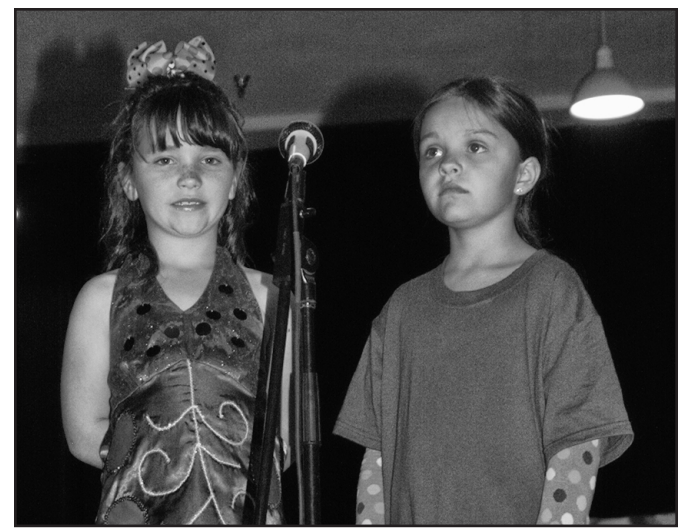
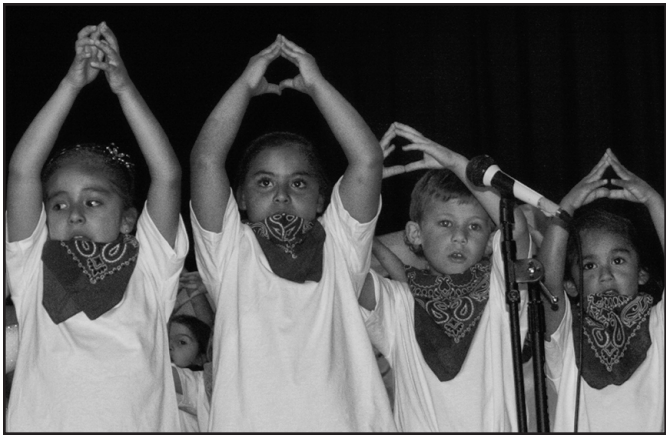

Starting Sept. 1, 287th District Attorney Kathryn Gurley will assume the position of professional prosecutor for Parmer and Bailey counties.

This means that she will no longer take on new private cases after that date. However, she will continue to work on her current private caseload until such cases are taken care of.

Mrs. Gurley also will continue to work out of her Friona office.

The change is in line with a state legislative decision. Most counties in Texas have converted to having their District Attorney's be fulltime in that position.

Mrs. Gurley said that in our area, only Oldham and Parmer counties still had District Attorneys handle private practices. Both are converting to be in line with the state decision this year.

Expenses for the fulltime prosecutor will be split between Parmer County (60 percent) and Bailey County (40 percent).

Live Cattle prices eased back down a little last week which had been expected. The market has given up very little of their gains made over the prior two weeks which could be a good sign going forward. This week will need to see the market take out last weeks highs and continue higher if some of the higher targets are going to be reached. If the market can keep their uptrend going, it should last a few more weeks. Cash trade has done little to support a higher market. Last weeks cash traded below \$120 which doesn't help.

Feeder prices have had no problem working up towards their targets. The \$152.00 level was hit this week basis August contract which was the first target once prices turned higher. The second target around the \$154.00 level will be tough one with cash trading far behind the board at this time. Whatever gains are seen between now and August may be all this market can do. Once August approaches, cash will determine where prices go from there.

Soybean prices have remained strong on old crop, but moving down in new crop. The November contract broke down again on Friday and trends are all pointing lower at this time. New crops across the board are all under pressure. Expect to see the April low around the \$11.85 level tested at some point.

Corn prices have remained strong on old crop, but new crop prices continue to move down into new low territory. The first level of strong support lies around the \$4.70 level basis the December contract. There is basically nothing below this level. If prices push down below the \$4.70 level, the next support comes in around the \$3.00 level which can only be found on the weekly charts.

Wheat prices have continued to work down into new low territory with all the nearby contracts making new contract lows. About the only long term support comes in around the \$6.00 level basis the weekly charts. There really is no support below these levels and harvest pressure usually pushes wheat prices down into the late July/August time frame. Once a bottom is complete, higher prices into December.

Cotton prices were up slightly higher on the week, but remain inside a tight trading range. Prices have now formed a range between the \$89.20 level and \$82.20 on the bottom. Until one side or the other is penetrated, the market could remain inside this range for quite some time. With many commodity prices under pressure, we would have to lean towards the downside or a deflationary environment.

From Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension agent - IPM: Recent precipitation has provided much needed moisture to the area but did come at a cost.

Streaks of hail accompanied some of the storms which damaged and, in some cases, destroyed crops in their path.

Replant decisions are having to be made as quickly as possible as time to mature a subsequent crop is limited.

The growing point of sorghum remains at or near the soil surface and likely avoided catastrophic injury in most cases and should recover.

Larger corn was at more risk since the growing point and hardened stalk below it were much more exposed.

### REVISED NOTICE OF AN APPLICATION FOR A WATER USE PERMIT APPLICATION NO. 5851

The Brazos River Authority has applied for a permit, designated its "System Operation Permit", to 1) include a Water Management Plan; 2) include accounting plans; 3) authorize an appropriation of state water for multiple use purposes; 4) authorize additional water under a term permit; 5) authorize an appropriation of return flows; 6) authorize an exempt interbasin transfer of the water requested; 7) authorize operational flexibility; 8) authorize use of the bed and banks of the Brazos River, its tributaries, and BRA's reservoirs for the storage, conveyance and subsequent diversion of state water appropriated pursuant to this application and from other sources. More information on the application and how to participate in the permitting process is given below.

**APPLICATION.** The Brazos River Authority (BRA), P.O. Box 7555, Waco, Texas 76714-7555, applicant, seeks a permit to appropriate state water pursuant to Texas Water Code (TWC) §§ 11.121, 11.042, and 11.085(v), and Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) Rules 30 Texas Administrative Code (TAC) §§ 295.1 et seq. and 30 TAC § 297.1 et seq. Published and mailed notice of the application is being given to the water rights owners of record in the Brazos River Basin pursuant to 30 TAC § 295.151.

Notice of the application was issued on April 22, 2005, to the water right holders of record in the Brazos River Basin and published in multiple newspapers. The comment period ended June 13, 2005. The application went to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) for an evidentiary hearing, from May 9 to June 2, 2011. The Commission considered the Proposal for Decision and remanded the application to SOAH with instructions to abate the hearing to allow the Applicant to submit additional information in the form of a Water Management Plan within 10 months from the Commission Order dated January 30, 2012. The Water Management Plan was received on November 28, 2012.

BRA amended its application as follows:

- To include a Water Management Plan, including a Technical Report in Support of the Water Management Plan and Technical Appendices. The information in the technical report and technical appendices provides the basis and support for the regulatory requirements in the WMP.

- To include accounting plans for: (1) its reservoirs; (2) stream reaches of the Brazos River and its tributaries where water will be delivered and/or water authorized under Permit 5851 will be diverted; (3) application of environmental flow requirements; and (4) reference and summary information.

- To request a new appropriation of 1,001,449 acre-feet of water, which represents the total amount of water that could be appropriated if all of the water was taken at the Brazos River's outlet at the Gulf of Mexico. The new appropriation is a non-firm supply and the amount of water BRA may divert at upstream locations varies depending on demands.

- To specify diversion points for the new appropriation as follows: (1) the diversion points authorized in BRA's existing water rights; (2) the Brazos River at the Gulf of Mexico; and (3) specific diversion points and reaches identified in BRA's WMP and associated technical documents, and accounting plans. Diversion rates at these diversion points are set out in BRA's WMP and associated technical documents and BRA's accounting plans.

- To request an authorization under TWC §11.1381 for a term permit to use an additional 202,650 acre-feet of water per year for thirty years or until the ports are closed on the dam impounding Allens Creek Reservoir, whichever occurs earlier. The additional 202,650 acre-feet of water is not a new appropriation but represents an additional amount of water based on the amount of water previously appropriated under Water Use Permit 2925.

- To request use of the bed and banks of the Brazos River and its tributaries to convey water as specified in BRA's WMP and accounting plans. BRA provided channel losses and estimated travel times for water deliveries under Permit 5851 and the WMP.

- To remove the request in Application 5851 for recognition that Permit 5851 prevail over inconsistent provisions in BRA's existing water rights regarding system operation.

The BRA owns the following water rights, which comprise BRA's system of reservoirs for the purposes of this application: Certificate of Adjudication (Certificate) No. 12-5155 (Possum Kingdom Lake), Certificate No. 12-5156 (Lake Granbury), Certificate No. 12-5165 (Lake Limestone), and Water Use Permit 2925, as amended, (Allens Creek Reservoir) along with the Texas Water Development Board and the City of Houston. The BRA also owns the water rights and has contracts with the United States Army Corps of Engineers for storage authorized by Certificate No. 12-5157 (Lake Whitney), Certificate No. 12-5158 (Lake Aquilla), Certificate No. 12-5159 (Lake Proctor), Certificate No. 12-5160 (Lake Belton), Certificate No. 12-5161 (Lake Stillhouse Hollow), Certificate No. 12-5162 (Lake Georgetown), Certificate No. 12-5163 (Lake Granger), and Certificate No. 12-5164 (Lake Somerville). The BRA also owns Certificate Nos. 12-5166, as amended, and 12-5167, which authorize various uses of water within the applicant's other certificates and permits.

The applicant is currently authorized, pursuant to the 1964 System Operation Order, as amended (System Order), to manage and operate its tributary reservoirs as elements of a system, coordinating releases and diversions from the tributary reservoirs with releases and diversions from the applicant's main-stem reservoirs to minimize waste, and to conserve water in reservoirs in which the supply is short by making releases from tributary reservoirs in which the supply is more abundant.

The applicant's following requests have not changed:

- A new appropriation of state water for multiple uses, includ-

ing domestic, municipal, agricultural, industrial, mining and other beneficial uses in the Brazos River Basin.

- An exempt interbasin transfer authorization to transfer and use, on a firm and non-firm basis, such water in the adjoining San Jacinto-Brazos Coastal Basin and the Brazos-Colorado Coastal Basin, and to transfer such water to any county or municipality or the municipality's retail service area that is partially within the Brazos River Basin for use, on a firm and non-firm basis, in that part of the county or municipality and the municipality's retail service area not within the Brazos River Basin.

- An appropriation of return flows.

- Operational flexibility.

- Use of the bed and banks of the Brazos River, its tributaries and the Applicant's reservoirs.

This application is subject to the Texas Coastal Management Program (CMP) and must be consistent with the CMP goals and policies.

The application was received on June 28, 2004. The application was declared administratively complete and accepted for filing on October 14, 2004. This application went to evidentiary hearing at the State Office of Administrative Hearings in 2011, a Proposal for Decision was prepared, and the application was heard by the Commission. The Commission sent the case back for further contested case hearing after a Water Management Plan was prepared. The Water Management Plan was received on November 28, 2012 and additional information and fees were received on December 18, 2012, April 24, and May 1, June 3, and June 12, 2013. The amended application was declared administratively complete and accepted for filing on May 7, 2013.

The Executive Director completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if granted, would include special conditions to protect senior and superior water rights owners. The application, technical memorandum, and Executive Director's draft permit are available for viewing and copying at the Office of the Chief Clerk, 12100 Park 35 Circle, Bldg. F, Austin, TX 78753.

**PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETINGS.** The TCEQ will hold a public meeting to receive comments on the application filed by the Brazos River Authority. The public meeting will consist of two parts, an Informal Discussion Period and a Formal Comment Period. During the Informal Discussion Period, the public is encouraged to ask questions of the applicant and TCEQ staff concerning the application, but comments made during the Informal Discussion Period will not be considered by the Commissioners before reaching a decision on the application and no formal response will be made. During the Formal Comment Period, members of the public may state their comments into the official record. The Executive Director will summarize the formal comments and prepare a written response. The written response will be considered by the Commissioners in their decision-making process and upon request will be made available to the public.

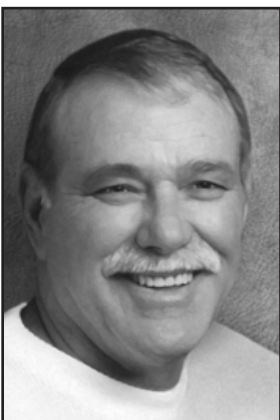

My years in high school have been interesting to say the least. So many memories have been made that I will never forget.

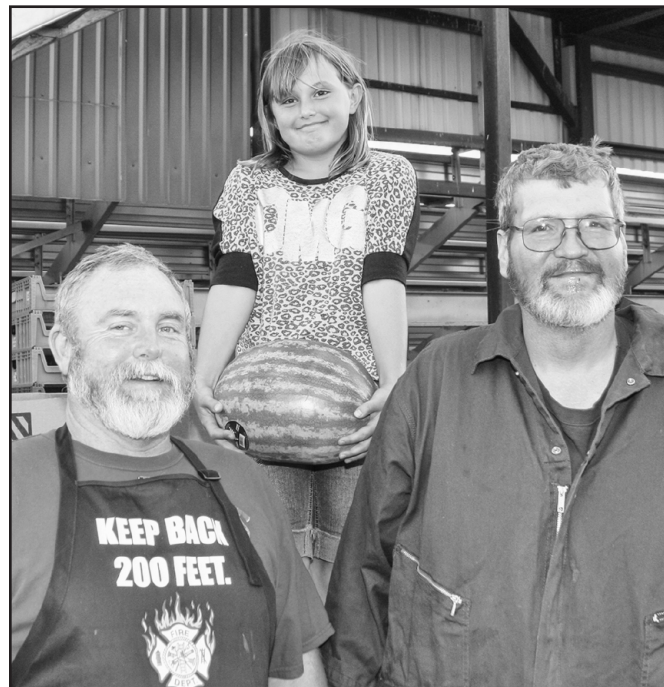

 In other business, the board:  
 -- Received the resignation of Karen Wilford, 4th grade teacher.

 -- Noted that Alice Armstrong, of Farwell, will be a half-time Head Start

teacher.
