The check was for $\$ 700,000$, in addition to pany -- for a total of $\$ 902,000$
Originally, the insurance company only wanted to pay $\$ 300,000$, while the school wanted the entire cost for the repair work -- $\$ 970,000$
The roof repairs included some upgrades. The formerly flat roof is now tapered.
The cost for the upgrades, litigation fees and money paid to experts who would testify at the trial was around $\$ 250,000$ for the school, said Bovina Supt. Denise Anderson
Thus, if the school board simply had accepted the insurance company's offer, it would have gotten

But by fing the suit, the school received a net of bout $\$ 652,000$, which included the roof upgrades.
