The psychologists would have a big word for what I am trying to do with this in my mind, but I have justified my own conscience by saying that this is a measure that has been necessary for me to undertake on my own part to preserve justice and equity for myself.

I do knowingly drive at higher than posted highway speeds, and in frequent instances. It is absurd to say that the limit of a modern automobile's safe oper ation on a modern highway, with fair weather and average traffic conditions, is 60 miles per hour. The absurdity is heightened when you recall that the 60-mile limit has been that for --well, how long is it, 20 years or more? If cars were safe to .60 then, aren't they considerably safer now?

My biggest complaint about the whole idea of radar is that it is a mass common denominator that strains out ONLY the fast drivers (not necessarily the ones most likely to cause accidents).

When spraying the rose before planting time. bushes, any shrub, or garden vegetables always spray the insecticide with the wind direction. Be sure to wear clothing that will protect you from any drift of the chemical. If any mixture does get on your skin do wash it off and change clothing if they become dampened. 


Green Thumb Tips Cauliflower plants should be transplanted early enough so that heads form during cool weather. Otherwise they will be off color and have poor texture.


