Warm, Dry Weather Benefits Cotton

Cotton Harvest Gets Off To Slow Start

Most of the cotton in Bailey County is still in the fields awaiting some warm, dry weather to finish maturing. Several hundred bales have been harvested in recent weeks, but rainy weather has slowed down the majority of harvesting. As soon as the fields dry out, many farmers will begin stripping the cotton.

The area has recorded its first hard freeze and most of the leaves are falling from the plants since the killing freeze hit.

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It has been estimated that Bailey County will produce between 40,000 and 45,000 bales of cotton this year. There were approximately 30,000 unplanted acres in the county this year.

Inclement weather has hampered cotton crops to some degree with late rains and hail contributing to most of the damage. The relatively early freeze did not damage the more mature crop, but slightly damaged some of the late, immature crops in the area.

A spotcheck with local gins reveals that the cotton harvest is just now getting underway in most areas. C.E. Grant of the Beck Gin reports they have ginned around 300 bales but the season is just starting in that area. Most cotton in that area is making lower yields this year, he reports.

O.C. Fry at Campbell Gin, located 14 miles east and seven miles north of Muleshoe, reports 80 bales with average yields and the harvesting just starting.

Dale Newson at the Needmore Co-op Gin in Needmore said he had ginned around 80 bales and is hoping for 3,000 but that the cotton is not turning out as it did last year. He also reports that the harvesting has just started in that area.

Earl Richards of the Muleshoe Co-op Gin reports that he has ginned around 200 bales with the harvest just beginning to get started.

County Records Several Arrests

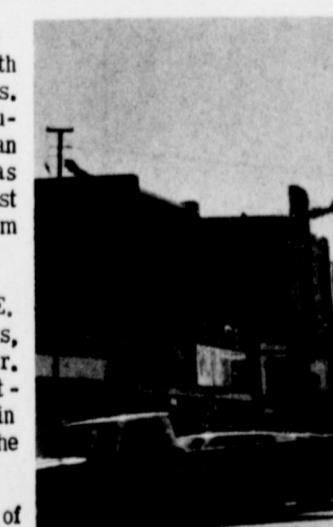

698 Citizens Have Registered To Vote

Bailey County Tax Assessor-Collector Jean Lovelady reports that to date 698 citizens have registered to vote under the new permanent voting law. This includes the 18 year old voters as well.

To register under this new law, a voter must register at least 30 days before any election, be a resident of Texas for one year and to vote in county and state elections, must be a resident of the county in which he votes for six months.

This permanent registration system entitles the voter to vote for three successive vot-

ing years in place of one year under the old annual registration system. Each time a voter votes in a primary or general election or has his registration extended or renewed by notice, his registration is good for another three successive voting years, provided he remains qualified and his registration has not been cancelled.

This is the first time under Texas law that voters may re-register by voting. This is a common practice in other states with a permanent registration system. A qualified voter is automatically rereg-

istered for another three successive voting years when he votes in a general or primary election, including a run-off.

The new registration system removes the old January 31 deadline for registration.

Yearly checks will be made to determine who failed to vote during the preceding three years, the first three year period commencing in 1972.

Applications for voter registration certificates may be picked up in the Tax Assessor-Collector's office in the Bailey County Courthouse.

Postal Service Invites Bids On Delivery

The U.S. Postal Service is inviting bids from all qualified parties to perform service on a Box Delivery Highway Contract originating from Muleshoe, Texas. The route is seventy-nine (79.0) miles in length and serves 121 boxes. Service will be daily, except on Sunday and nine holidays. Contractor will be required to perform box service to customers and perform all other related duties as specified in Section 4 (b) of the Contract General Provisions. A passenger car will be sufficient to handle mail on this route. Contractors scheduled work time will be from

The largest project of the Muleshoe United Fund is the annual Bailey County Junior Livestock Show. This year's budget for the show is \$3,786.35. The expense for the livestock show includes repairs, \$14.00; night watchman, \$25.00; ribbons and rosettes, \$61.85; earrings and rings, \$16.60; trophies and plaques, \$84.49; judges fee, \$115.00; and prizemoney, \$3,469.40. The total expense is \$3,786.35. Income received includes the cash balance as of December 30, 1970, \$427.25; entry fees, \$162.50; donations, \$50.00; United Fund, \$3,700.00 total income of \$4,333.95. This makes a cash balance as of

May 26, 1971 of \$553.60. In 1963, there were 88 exhibitors showing 170 animals with a budget of \$2,500.00. In 1971, 121 exhibitors showed 288 animals with a budget of \$3,786.35. The percent of increase shows 45.5 per cent in number of exhibitors, 69.4 percent in number of animals, and 51.5 per cent in amount of budget.

"If You Don't Do It, It Won't Get Done" is the theme for this year's campaign. The United Fund is made up of donations from people in the community. All of the projects are to help the community and for the community's benefit. Most of the funds are used in this community.

Other projects benefited by the United Fund include the Boy Scouts, Salvation Army.

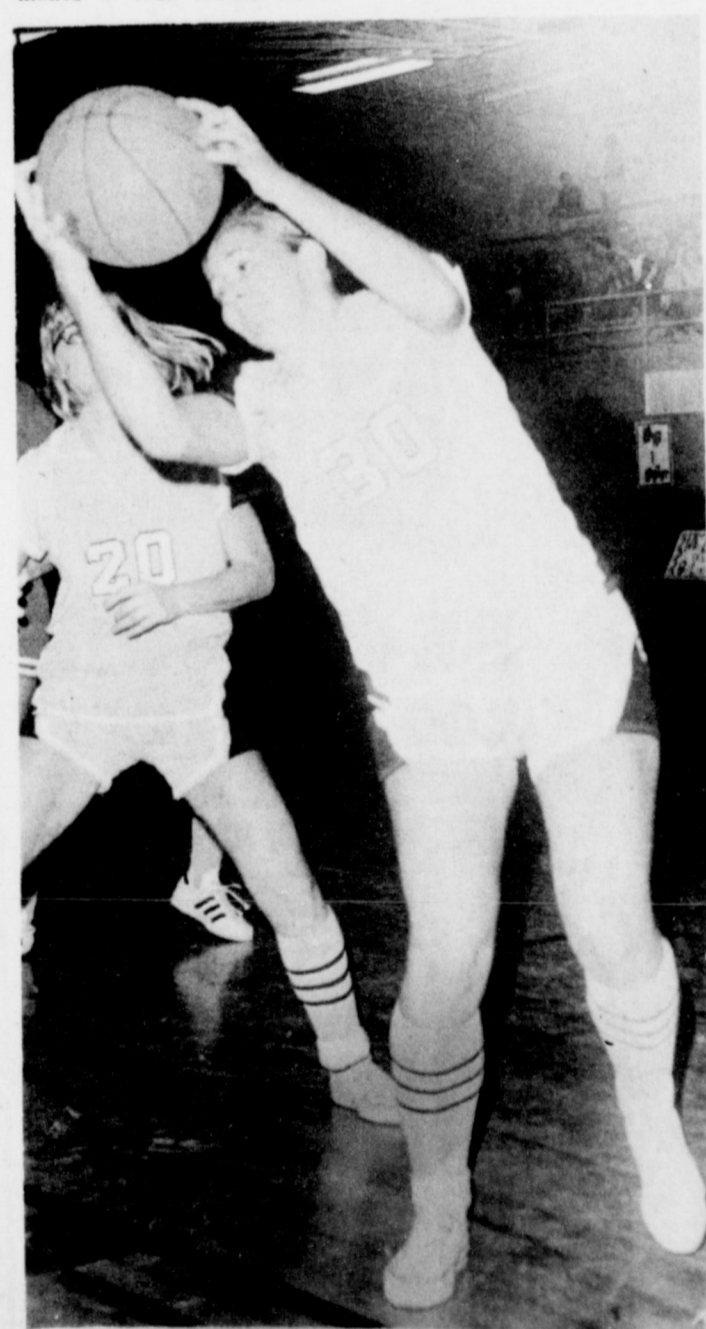
All the above were issued by county officers.

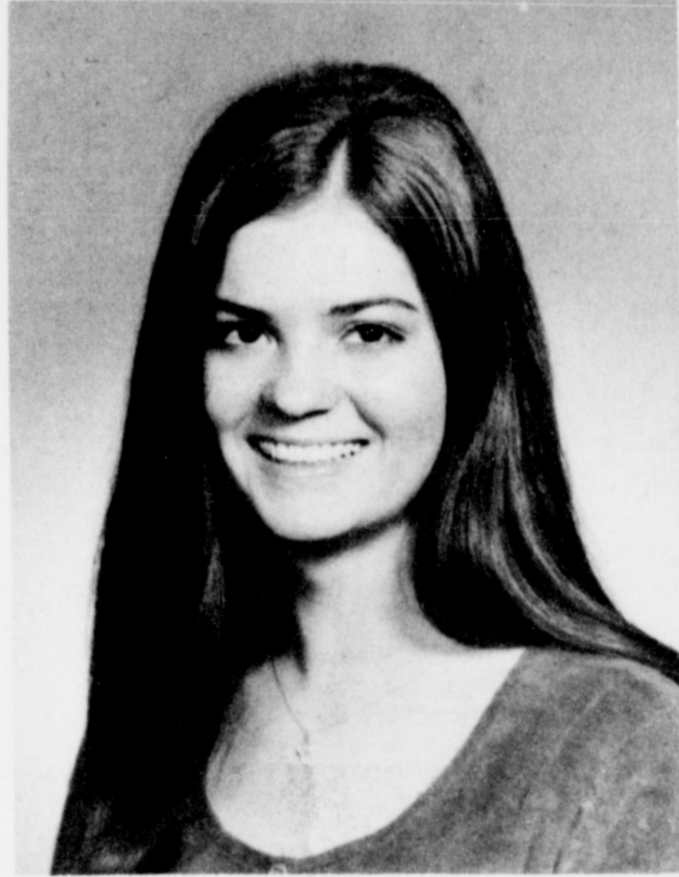

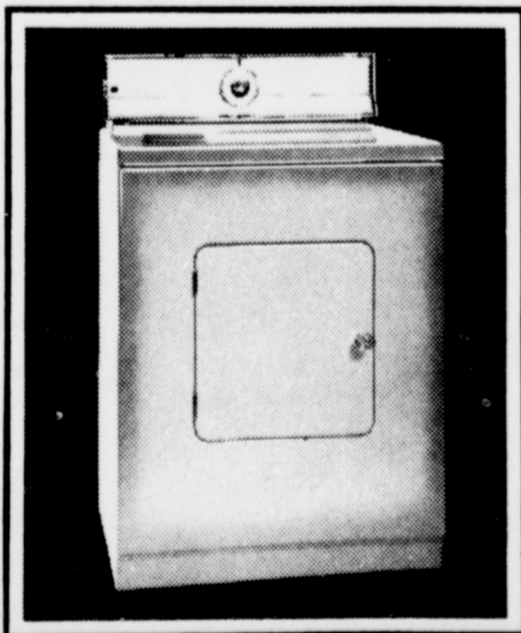

Bike thefts are a booming business and an increasing police headache all over the country. Parents buying Christmas bikes for their children, or for themselves, can follow some practical advice from the Bicycle Institute of America on how to keep from becoming a pedestrian again.

Buy a four-foot length of case-hardened steel chain, with links not less than 3/8 inch diameter, and a quality lock with at least a 3/8 inch shackle. Run the chain through both wheels and the frame before locking the bike to some stationary object. Register your new bike with the police, identifying it by color, style and serial number. Additionally, low cost, non-deductible bicycle theft insurance is available through all bicycle retailers who are members of the National Bicycle Dealers Association.

Your Christmas bike is a considerable investment as well as a prized possession; lock it, register it and insure it. (NP Features)

ELIMINATING THE MESS IN BROILING---Broiling is a highly recommended way to cook tender cuts of meat, but many homemakers shy away from broiling because it can make such a mess in the oven. Extension home economics specialists suggest these ways to keep the oven cleaner while broiling:

Place lightly crushed foil in the broiler pan under the broiler rack to catch meat drippings and keep them from overheating.

Be sure meat drippings have sufficient drainage. If aluminum foil is used to cover the broiler rack, be sure to punch holes in it.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, TEXAS--Almost 100,000 state employees and 140,000 school teachers will get the pay raises the Legislature voted for them--effective November 14.

President Nixon's Pay Board and the Cost of Living Council notified state officials all wage, salary and other benefit increases provided in the 1971-72 state appropriations act will be permitted on end of Phase I of the president's wage-price freeze.

For most state employees, the 6.8 per cent increase they expected to get September 1 will reach them on a supplemental payroll for the November 14-November 30 period.

Teachers will receive a five per cent per year boost in line with a 1969 long-term compensation plan approved by the Legislature.

State employees and teachers lost about \$19 million of their scheduled raises between September 1 (start of the state's fiscal year) and November 14, date of the un-thawing.

They continued to sweat out federal agency rulings as to whether their benefits could be made retroactive because they actually were ordered by state lawmakers before the August freeze order.

State Commissioner of Education J.W. Edgar notified local school districts that compensation benefits such as travel expenses and supplements for insurance premiums may also be put into effect. State funds will be disbursed to school districts in line with the programmed increases beginning with the December foundation fund payments.

School districts with 1,000 or more employees will have to report raises to the Pay Board. Districts with fewer than 1,000 employees are not required to make the reports, although they must operate within board rules.

ALLOWABLE INCREASED--After seven months of declining oil production allowable, the Railroad Commission set the December production figure at 63 per cent of potential--an increase from 62.5 per cent.

Commission Chairman Byron Tunnell cited declining stocks of crude oil. He said the stocks stood at 99.8 million barrels on November 12, down 11 million from 1970.

The commission's production allowable will permit a maximum output of 3,339,400 barrels a day, 21,341 more than for November. Actual production is estimated at 3,060,846 daily for December, just over what major crude purchasers asked.

Foreign oil stocks are up 8.6 million barrels from 1970, Tunnell reported.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM ALTERED--Changes in the food stamp program for the needy approved by the Board of Public Welfare last week will double the number of participants and increase cost.

Changes ordered by federal legislation will liberalize eligibility standards based on a scale of maximum income.

Board also adopted these policy changes in event federal court cases are decided against the Welfare Department:

*To permit welfare aid to non-citizens lawfully admitted to this country for permanent residence or to those seeking old age assistance who have lived in the U.S. at least 25 years.

*Eliminate a provision that criminal charges must be filed against a parent who deserts a child before aid to families with dependent children can be paid.

*Wipe out forced establishment of guardianship before aid can be paid to those permanently and totally disabled due to mental impairment.

APPOINTMENTS--Governor Preston Smith named Robert L. Thornton Jr., of Dallas to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, succeeding Alfred Negley of San Antonio.

Smith also appointed Dr. Dan J. Anderson of Fort Worth and Dr. John E. Wilkins Jr. of Greenville to the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners.

Sen. O.H. Harris of Dallas was elected chairman and Lamar Golding of Huntsville vice-chairman of a senate committee studying feasibility of the parliament horse racing in Texas.

Fritz Lanham of Austin, an aide to Smith, was placed on the Criminal Justice Council executive committee.

AG OPINIONS--A local police and fire civil service commissioner may serve as a city tax board of equalization member at the same time, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

In other recent opinions Martin concluded:

*Taxable property valuation as used in the education code is synonymous with "assessed valuation", and only last assessed valuation as determined by county government in the next preceding year may be used as one of the criteria for establishment of a county junior college district.

Bids on more than 600 tracts of oil and gas leases will be opened December 7 by the School Land Board.

Undercover Alcoholic Beverage Commission agents will check private clubs for violations of a new law allowing issue of temporary membership permits for \$2.

Hunting license sales are near a record--at more than 290,000 for September and October alone--reports Parks and Wildlife Department.

December 1 is the deadline for new car dealers, distributors, manufacturers and factory representatives to get licenses under the Texas Motor Vehicle Commission act.

The State Bar of Texas has approved a new code of professional responsibility for lawyers.

Reps. Tom Moore Jr. of Waco and Grant Jones of Abilene are candidates for the state senate in the new 24th district.

A major Democratic fundraising dinner is scheduled here December 6, with Sen. Hubert Humphrey and Congressman Wilbur Mills as drawing cards.

COURTS SPEAK--A district court retrial was ordered by the Texas Supreme Court of a \$470,000 judgement against Sharpstown State Bank of Houston in litigation concerning two surety bonds.

Third Court of Civil Appeals approved shutting St. Louis Southwestern Railway Company stations in Addison and Grapevine-- and a business shift to Carrollton.

Supreme Court judges heard oral arguments from the Alcoholic Beverage Commission in a case in which the agency attacks a district court ruling that its suspensions of offending taverns' licenses are appealable.

BANK BIDS STUDIED--The State Banking Board may act next week on a dozen applications for "phantom bank" charters.

Board must decide whether authorizing such procedures for larger banks to absorb smaller ones is a step toward prohibited branch banking.

Charter applications for new state banks in Magnolia, White Oak and Port Neches received board approval. Applications were turned down for other banks in San Antonio, Wimberley and Texas City.

SHORT SNORTS State Sen Wayne Connolly of Floresville announced his candidacy for lieutenant governor.

The State Highway Department received permission to excavate the site of its proposed new \$20 million headquarters building here.

State Securities Commissioner Truman Holladay stopped stock trading by three Sherman firms promoting a kind of "electronic checkbook."

Former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough says its 10-to-one he will run for governor or U.S. Senator next year.

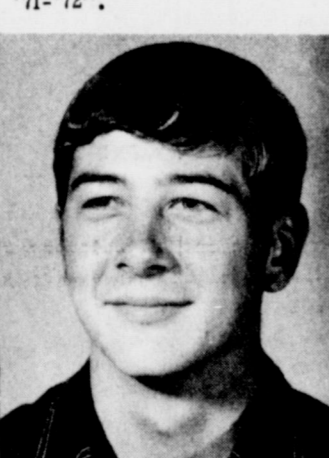

cently about detergents I have come to the conclusion that the way of the ecologist is hard.

As you know, housewives, after being convinced that regular detergents coming out of their washing machines were putting too much phosphate into the streams and lakes of the nation, decided, on the advice of the authorities, to switch to non-phosphate brands which quickly appeared on the market.

Now the Surgeon General has reversed the advice and says the new-style detergents have too much caustic in them and are therefore unsafe, particularly for children. In fact, he says the housewives should go back to the phosphate detergents for the time being until something better is found. I don't know what this does to ecology but it sure saves two-thirds of day-time television.

However, I got to thinking. Was everybody's clothes dingy before automatic washing machines were invented? Was everybody ashamed to hang his

clothes out to dry where neighbors could sneer at them? You mean every President before the last four was inaugurated with a dirty collar?

Of course not. While the Surgeon General wrings his hands over having to choose between phosphate detergents and caustic detergents, why doesn't somebody tell him how clothes used to be washed?

The answer to the problem is homemade soap, made from hog fat.

If the professional ecologists are on the ball they'll come out with a campaign for a hog in everybody's backyard and four washpots in every block. This will solve the soap problem.

Of course, it'll give rise to some other problems, particularly in the summer with a strong breeze waiting for the hog pen, but that's not my problem.

Nowadays, all people want is a solution to the immediate problems. The fact that the solution creates more problems than the problem is beside the point and offers a challenge for more solutions. The men who invented the atom bomb all won prizes, but there are even bigger prizes waiting for those who can think up something to do about it.
