## Texico raises water, sewer, garbage rates 10 percent

The Texico City Council on Tue
rates 10 percent, effective Nov. 1.
they have received no feedback on the plans. Thus:

3) Should interest be charged if folks make payments over a period of time for plots?
4) Who should be authorizing the handling of plots -- the city or the cemetery A mo
A motion was made to keep the plot rate at $\$ 400$, payable within two years (currenty it is one), with no interest and no late fee. But this was not voted on due to the deci-

## Gas prices may affect us more than the Cannon AFB situation

Here at the Tribune office we have some of the best in-depth discussions about politics, society and socialization, art, culture and the status quo.
Before Hurricane Katrina hit, the discussions were mainly about the situation with BRAC hearings and the commission's ultimate decision.
I tuned into the BRAC hearings on C-SPAN and I must say that it was an interesting process. I also felt that most of the commissioners were in favor of Cannon and I believed that they were going to vote to keep it open and go ahead and re-assign the mission for the facility. I was a little surprised at the outcome, however.
I believe that it was the only way for the commissioners to "keep" Cannon after voting in favor of so many bases before the Cannon discussion and vote. I also believe that it will only be a very short time before a major assignment comes to Cannon. (I think it will be the new high-powered jets that were discussed at the hearings.)
It will also be interesting to watch the developments with Cannon as a result of the
hurricane damage to the Gulf Coast region.
But what is really interesting to me and to my co-horts here at the Tribune, is what will be happening around the Twin Cities of Texico and Farwell as a result of the
Cannon outcome. Will the five years that have been assigned to Cannon have any effect on business and industry in the two cities and surrounding areas?
I believe that the situation will have minimal effect on our businesses in the long run. The knee-jerk reaction to the possibility of closure was that several of the advertisers for the Tribune pulled back a little on their budgets. This was to be expected, but only time will tell if the trend continues.
l've always been a big proponent for communities not becoming entirely reliant on military bases and their personnel. I'm all for supporting and encouraging these factions; but to base all business futures on them alone is asking for trouble.
Here in the Twin Cities, we're fortunate to have a strong agricultural base. This base

Dear Mike
Too often, our elected officials use tragedy as political cover for avoiding difficult policy decisions. In the wake of our nation's hurricane devastation, hundreds of frail elderly are being driven from their homes and communities and into Texas. Unfortunately, what they will find is a Texas that ranks among the lowest of all states for funding our elderly healthcare. Our legislature can aid in the care of our elderly, while also aiding the elderly victims of Katrina, by increasing the funding for elderly residents in nursing homes
The Texas Legislative Budget Board has an opportunity to correct a serious prob lem with funding care for our frailest elderly. During the past four years, Texas legislators have failed to provide an adequate funding level to care for nursing home residents and the funding levels continue to deteriorate. Just this past legislative session, Texas legislators reduced the budget for long-term care and placed Texas as one of the worst funded states for elderly hea
There is a glimmer of hope. Gov. Perry has called for legislative leaders to direct $\$ 200$ million toward raising the rates of Texas nursing homes. By the state's own inter nal estimates, nursing home rates are about 30 percent less than they should be. This means that for every nursing home resident on Medicaid, the facility is losing about $\$ 30$ a day. As a result, campuses that have private pay residents must increase their rates to make up for the shortfall. In addition, direct care staff is reduced, leading to poor quality of care. Neither option is acceptable.
Directing the $\$ 200$ million requires a 10 -member Legislative Budget Board to appropriate the funds for improving funding for our frail elderly. The cost of taking care of a frail senior is immense. Housing is only one part of the equation. Residents need nurses, nurse assistants, dietary aides, nutritionists, activity directors, social workers, maintenance personnel, administrators, and many more caring personnel. The cost of energy, food, personnel, transportation, insurance, supplies and professional fees have all increased in the past four years since the last time nursing homes saw an increase in their Medicaid reimbursement rates.
Quality of life for our greatest generation will suffer if the members of the Legislative Budget Board do not act quickly and put much needed monies into nursing home care. Texas historically has ranked near the bottom of the nation in terms of us who care about the future of Texas but also those who love their parents or grandparents or even those who hope to someday grow old in Texas. Please, do not put Texas at the absolute bottom of the nation's rankings. Our seniors deserve better than That.
that. resident care at dollars below what was paid four years ago. Costs have risen and Medicaid funds have decreased. We must stand up for seniors! Fifteen years ago, the Medicaid. This occupancy rate has reversed itself since that time and currently our residents consist of about 70 percent Medicaid and 30 percent private pay. Not a single person had flood insurance. They all said it was too expensive, or that the chance of getting hit by a hurricane was pretty low, or that they were in a place that had never flooded before so they should be fine. New Orleans home owners who had flood insurance at

That's only 1 in 4 houses that are insured for hurrianes, right?
