## 'Vegetable retail

 consolidation coming'Retail consolidation in the vegetable industry is scary, but inevitable, said John McClung, president of the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Association, at the recent West Texas Vegetable Conference here.
"Consolidation is intimidating - to grower, shippres and packers - but it is an inescapable part of doing business in the future," McClung said. "Even so, we do have some choices as we face consolidation.
"We can form strategic alliances to boost our market reach. We can continue to find and capitalize on niche markets. Or we can simply go out of business."
McClung said the USDA's Economic Research Service is now conducting a study of retail practices and methods in the egetable industry
The results of that study could provide growers, shippers and packers valuable insight as they decide how "I think
tink oupliers are going to continue to face sometimes burdensome food safety-quality requirements. We may even see a third-party certification requirement.
"In the future, a third agency or party may be responsible for certifying that our produce meets consumer food safety and quality parimeters," he added. "The government won't take on that burden - it probably will "We also
We also are facing new technology requirements as produce suppliers. As retail firms (buyers) continue to consolidate, merge and grow larger, they will expect us to be in synch with the technology they use in product tracking, identification and pricing.

Consolidation within our own ranks should give the Texas produce an edge in meeting this technology requirement together, we have the resources at hand to make it work." produce industry productivity and acerage of the Texas there is good news on the horizon.
"Consumption of fresh fruit, vegetables and produces is at an all time high, and should continue to grow. People are consuming more produce and that's not going to change," he said. "Our challenge is to keep our industry alive and vital so we can fill that need.
"Our best shot is strategic alliances that synch with consolidation on the buyers' side. They will need us to supply them with a consistent, high quality product almost yearround.
"We can do that, and meet consumers' growing taste for our produce, if our alliances are intelligent, flexible and technologically sound. We still have tremendous potential for arowth through our future alliances.
