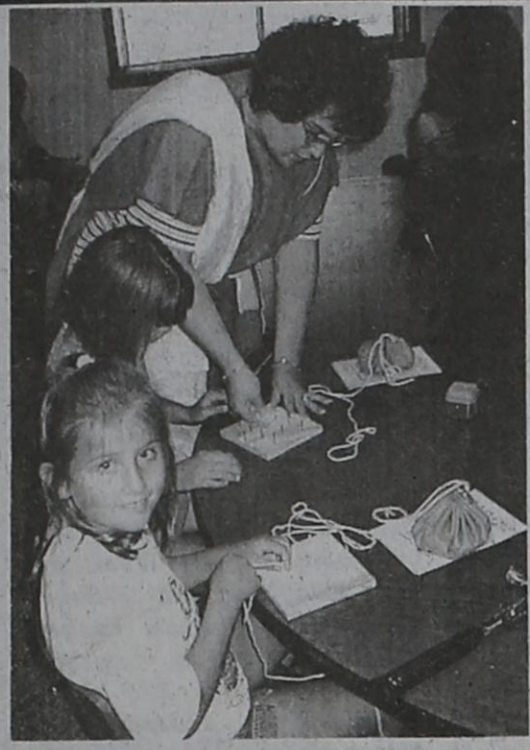

For example, let's take a look at my involvement in high school sports-wise.

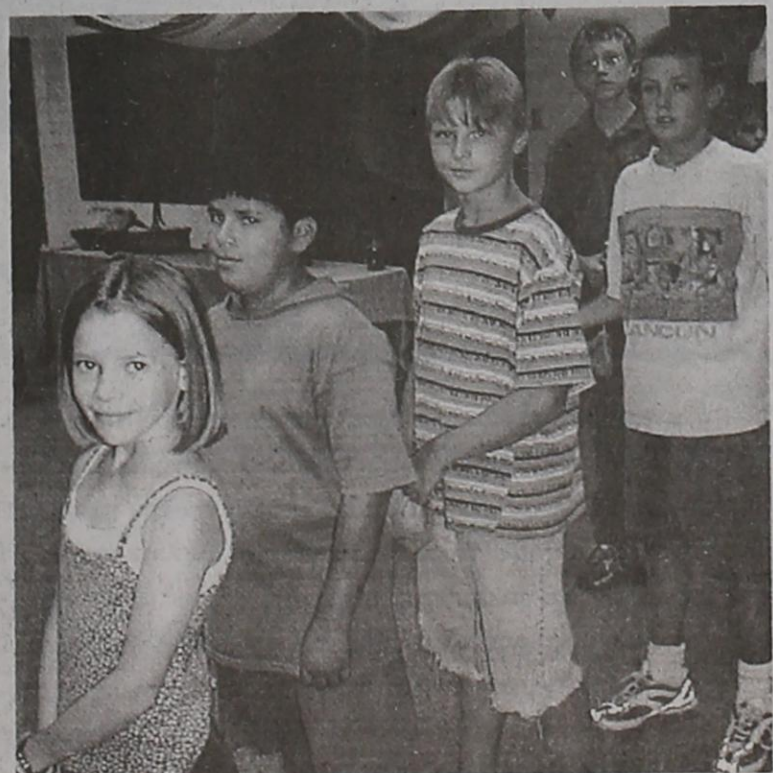
When I was a senior, I went to my one and only high school football game.

Longhorns win grid opener

The Lazbuddie Longhorns opened the 2000 season last Friday by whipping Wilson, 48-21, in an away game.

Landon Parham had a big game for the Longhorns, scoring four times.

The game opened with Parham hitting paydirt on a 39-yard pass from QB Lucas DeLeon. The kick by Fabian Guzman made it 8-0.

After Wilson scored on a 60-yard pass, Lazbuddie answered on a 4 yard TD run by Guzman. His kick put Lazbuddie ahead 16-7 at the stop.

In the second quarter, Lazbuddie outscored Wilson, 14-6.

Parham plunged over twice from the 1 yard line, with one Guzman kick good for two extra points. Wilson tallied on an 8-yard run.

So Lazbuddie went into the halftime intermission ahead, 30-13.

There was only one score in the third quarter, as the defenses predominated. Jake Louder scored on a 12-yard pass from DeLeon. The kick failed and it was 36-13.

The final quarter had Lazbuddie score twice and Wilson once.

The Longhorn scores came on a 30-yard pass play from DeLeon to Moi Garcia, and on a 46-yard scamper by Parham. Wilson's score came on a 36-

yard run.

Overall, Coach Mark Scisson was happy with his team's effort "but we didn't play great. We had good balance, but made a lot of mistakes, which we will work on."

Team stats were:

First downs, Lazbuddie 16, Wilson 10; rushing yards, Lazbuddie, 32 for 243, Wilson, 31 for 191; passing yards, Lazbuddie, 9* of 16 for 177, Wilson, 6 of 20 for 73; punting, Lazbuddie didn't punt, Wilson, 4 for 28 yard average; penalties, Lazbuddie, 3 for 15 yards, Wilson, 0.

Lazbuddie's next game is tonight (Friday) at Jayton at 7:30 p.m.

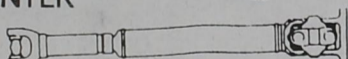

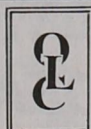

Steers lose opener to Petersburg

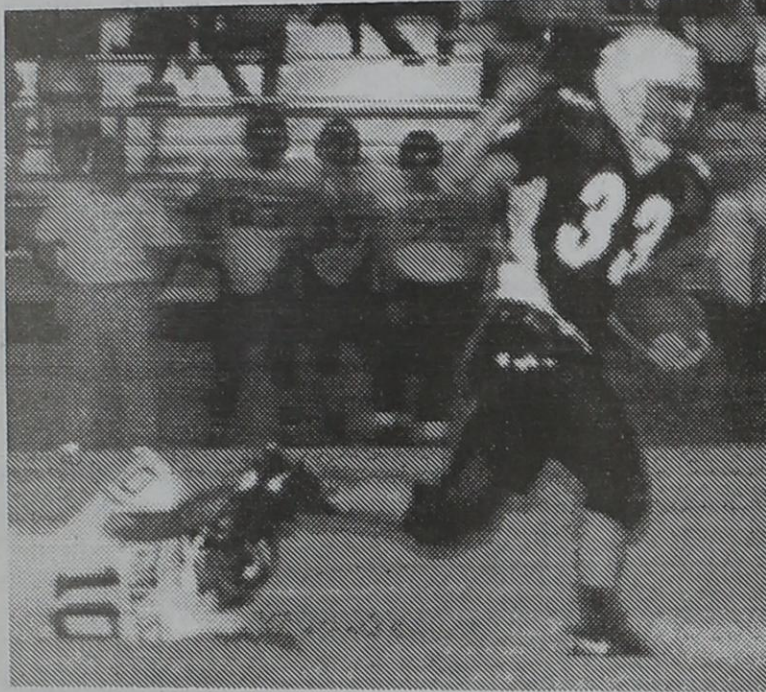
The Farwell Steers ran into an extremely tough opponent in their opening game last Friday, and lost to the Petersburg Buffaloes, 56-14. Farwell will play at Portales tonight (Friday) at 8 p.m. The game opened with Kolby Kimbrough kicking off. Petersburg started on its 19. Gaylen Sudderth and Manuel Garcia

had good tackles and the Buffaloes punted to the Farwell 43. the Steers were held, then had their punt blocked. Josh Bright scooped it up and score at 9:07. The kick failed. Farwell started at its 36 after a 20-yard kick return by Kimbrough. Three runs only gained 5 yards and Farwell punted to the Petersburg 21. On defense, Derek Gottsch had 3 good tackles, Kimbrough had 2 and Tyler Scott 1 while Petersburg was able moving the ball on the ground. The drive ended in a 3-yard TD run at 3:10. Garcia tackled the runner trying for two extra points and the Buffaloes led 12-0.

On offense, late in the game, Ruiz busted up the middle for a 26-yard gain. Then Gregory hit McFarland with a 20-yard pass. And Ortiz ran for 9 yards. Farwell got to the Petersburg 3 but the Buffaloes held as time ran out. Team stats were: first downs, Petersburg 11, Farwell 7; rushing yards, Petersburg, 41 for 275, Farwell 31 for 186; passing yards, Petersburg 3 of 8 for 98, Farwell 2 of 16 for 20; punting average, Petersburg 2 for 27.5, Farwell, 4 for 20; and penalties, Petersburg, 10 for 70, Farwell 2 for 30.

Farwell started at its 28. Thomas Ortiz ran for 6. Then a 61-yard TD run by Kimbrough was negated by a penalty flag. QB Gage Gregory ran for 11 as the first quarter ended. Farwell was stopped and punted to the Petersburg 28. At 10:20, the Buffaloes hit a short pass and the received ran 72 yards for a TD. A run for extra points made it 20-0. Eulogio Ruiz returned the kick to the Steers 35. Petersburg intercepted near midfield. Michael Hernandez had a good tackle. Petersburg broke off a long run to the 1, then scored at 7:55. The pass for extra points made it 28-0.

Taylor Nichols returned the kick to the Steers 31. Ortiz then ran for 8, 16 and 4 yards. But Petersburg intercepted again, this time off a deflection. On defense, Gregory and Lane McFarland had strong tackles. On a 4th and inches play, Petersburg tallied from the 46. The extra point pass made it 36-0.

The Steers started the second half with a good kick return by Kimbrough to the 38. Then Farwell got on the scoreboard when Ruiz raced 57 yards for a TD at 11:02 of the third quarter. The pass for extra points miscued.

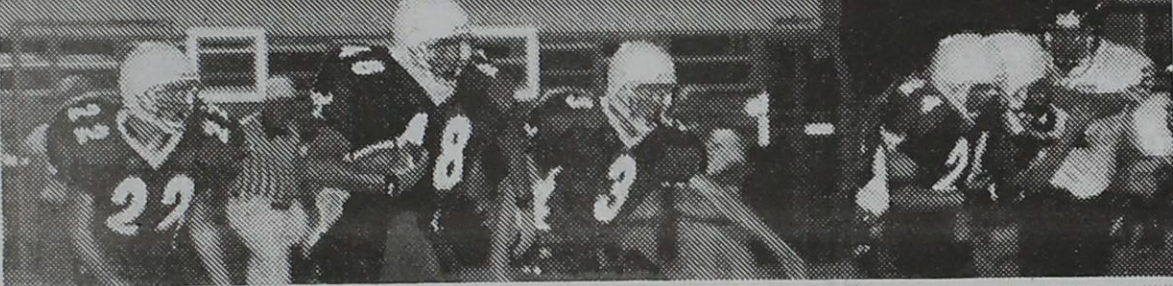
Petersburg started near midfield after the kick returner was tackled by Kimbrough and Sudderth. Ruiz and Nichols had good tackles. But Petersburg scored on a 5-yard run at 6:55. The pass for extra points made it 44-6.

Ruiz took a short kickoff and had a great run to the Farwell 47. Farwell was held and Petersburg took over near midfield. Manual Garcia intercepted at the Steers 43. On offense, Ruiz ran for 5. Then on 4th and 8, Gregory bootlegged for a first down behind a great block by Casey Meeks, who took out two defenders. Farwell was held, as the third quarter ended.

On defense, Jordan Barrett and Zac Schilling combined on a QB hurry. So Petersburg punted to the Farwell 39. Due to a bad snap on 4th down, the Buffaloes got the ball in Farwell territory. Ruiz had a good tackle. Nichols broke up a pass in the end zone. But Petersburg scored at 7:08 on a 9-yard pass to go ahead 50-6.

Farwell immediately responded when Kimbrough took the kick at the Farwell 19, made a great cutback, and scored. The pass for extra points from Gregory to Ortiz made it 50-14.

The final score of the game came when Petersburg scored on a 87-yard kick return.

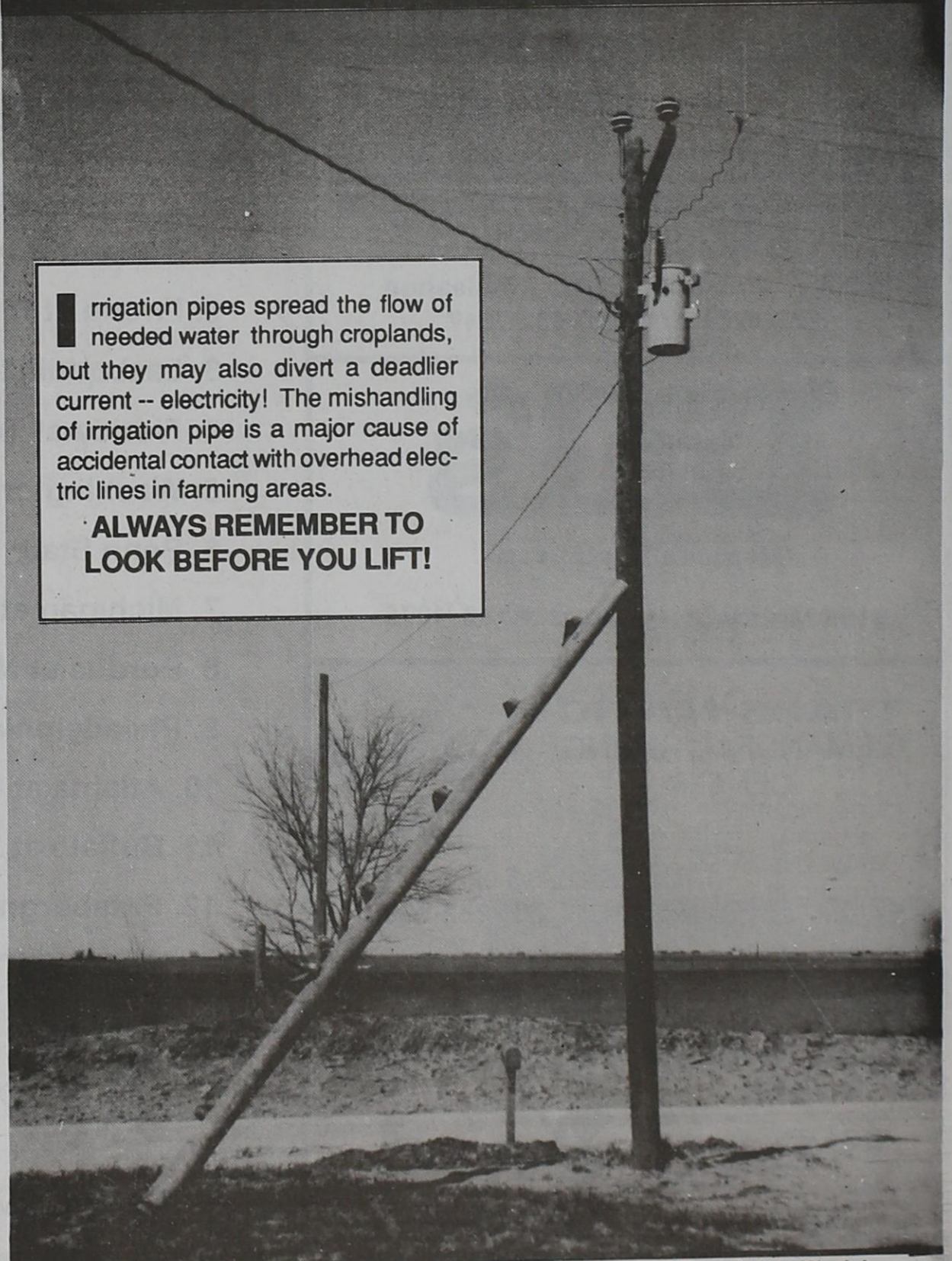

The Texico Lady Spikers are 4-1 on the season and took 3rd place in the Cloudfcroft Tournament last weekend.

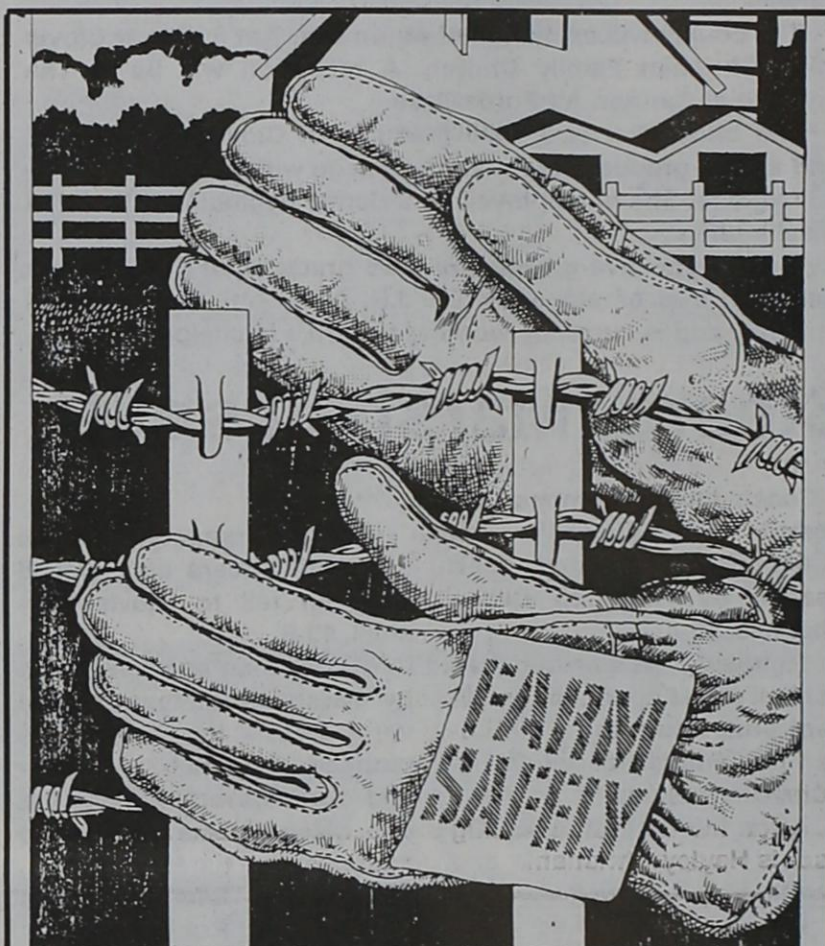

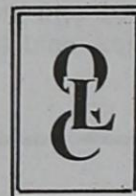

eradication zones and possibly restrict the ability of blossoming weevil populations in non-active zones to fully prepare for the winter.

In other business, the council:

— Tabled whether to hire a fire chief since councilman Jeff Queener, who had raised the idea, was not present.

— Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey push for a well to be built at the cemetery, and to have more trees added there.

— Was told that the Texico Chamber of Commerce was donating a swing set to KKR Park.

— Ordered some trees given away by Trees America.

— Heard that the legal paperwork is still under way on the Avenue F properties annexation.

— Opened two bids for a KKR Park sprinkler system. Since the city is short on money, they are looking at buying the parts and doing the installation themselves. The bids were taken under advisement.

— Renewed the joint powers agreement with Curry County on prisoner housing.

— Okayed a mutual aid agreement with Clovis police.

— Allowed a family to place a camper at 305 Griffin St. for up to 60 days while their house is being remodeled. Also, a work trailer will be placed behind 300 Lamar St. for the same period for the same reason.
