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### **Paid fire chief is an idea whose time has come**

I support the proposal to have a paid fire chief for Texico's volunteer fire department.

When the idea was first broached in September, I wasn't in favor. That's when a councilman gave a rough estimate of paying a fire chief \$15,000 -- with the cost split between the fire department and the city.

But when councilman Jeff Queener presented the proposal at last week's meeting to pay the chief \$500 a month (\$6,000 a year), with all funds coming for the salary and insurance from the fire department, I had no problem with that.

That should mean no higher taxes, since I believe the revenues raised from the department's activities should cover this fee.

The council did goof up when it invited city residents to attend that meeting, before Queener gave that newer proposal.

The council should have asked folks to voice their opinions *after* the proposal was given. That way folks could have digested the newer information and had a chance to understand the full proposal.

Be as it may, several folks attended the meeting to oppose paying a fire chief of a volunteer fire department.

I appreciate their views, but respectfully disagree with them.

To use an old cliché, times have changed.

So the Texico department has done as it had to, but kept it as inexpensive for residents as possible. We should appreciate that.

And I'm not writing that for "public relations" purposes; I'm writing it because I believe it. And I believe I am correct.

To become a volunteer on the ambulance is a whole different ball game than 25 years ago. The amount of learning you must get is much higher. And that education is ongoing as medical help has gotten more sophisticated.

And that sophistication is great! More folks' lives are being saved than ever before because of the EMT's training and the improved facilities aboard the ambulances.

Texico and Farwell are very fortunate to have men and women volunteer their time to serve on these departments.

Let me rephrase that: we are *darned* fortunate!

So we must realize that the time and effort given by these volunteers comes at a cost.

And when our firemen say that they need a paid fire chief because of the great amount of extra work needed in the year 2000, I have no question about it. We need to support them.

We need to support our volunteers. When they need our help, we *must* give it.

I mean, when we need their help, they are always there for us, right?????????????

Let's make it a two-way street. That's only fair.

It was an all-Texico School finale in last week's Area Merchants Football Contest.

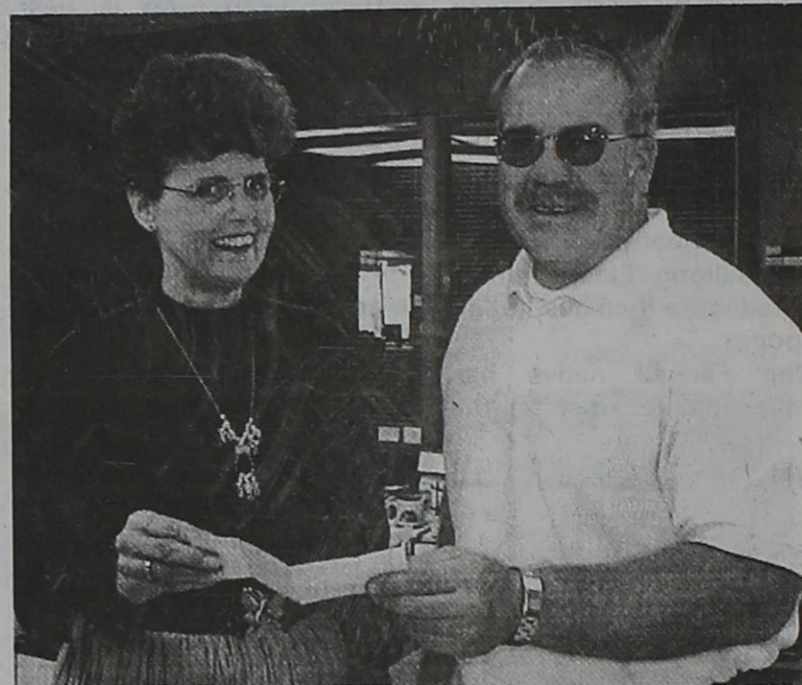
Only two of the hundreds of entrants managed to get 11 games picked correctly, and both are Texico School personnel.

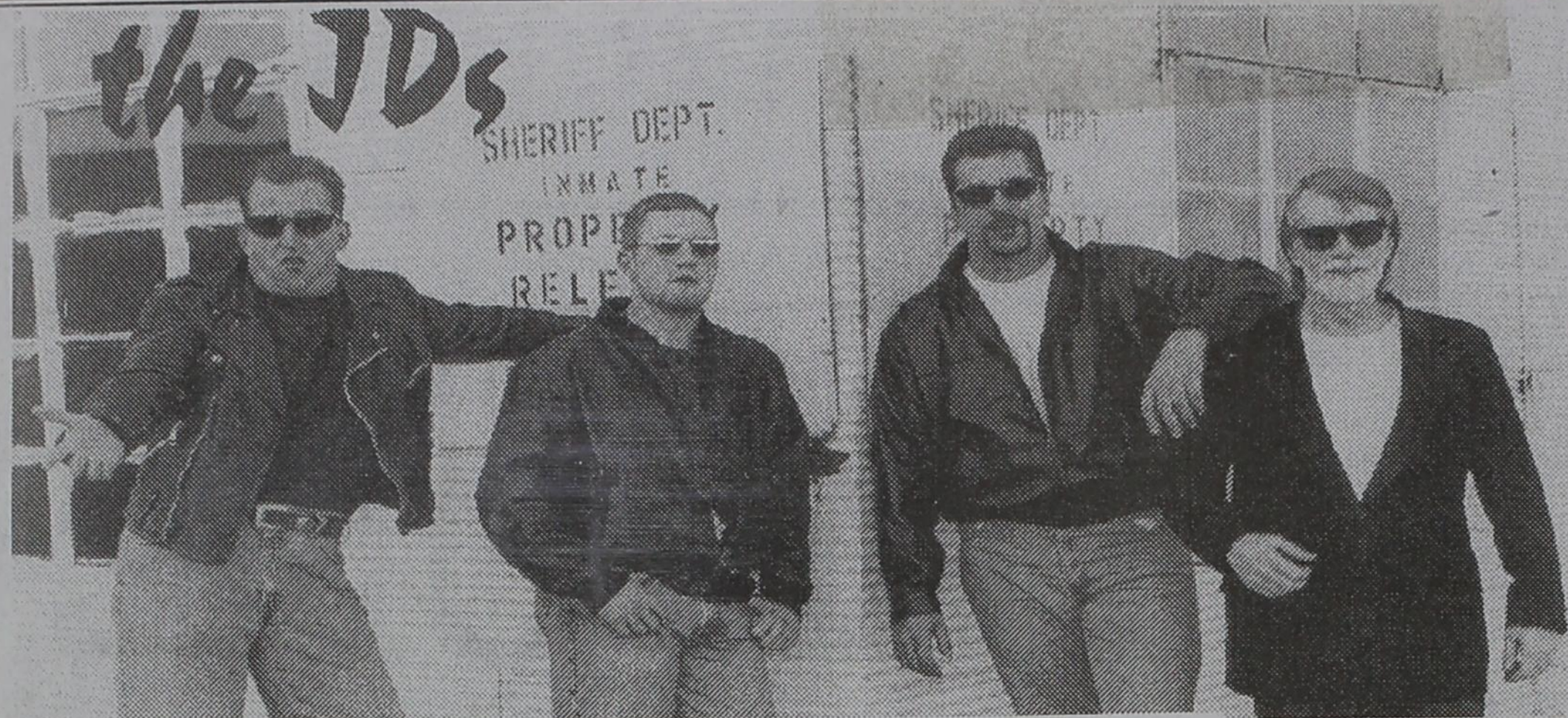

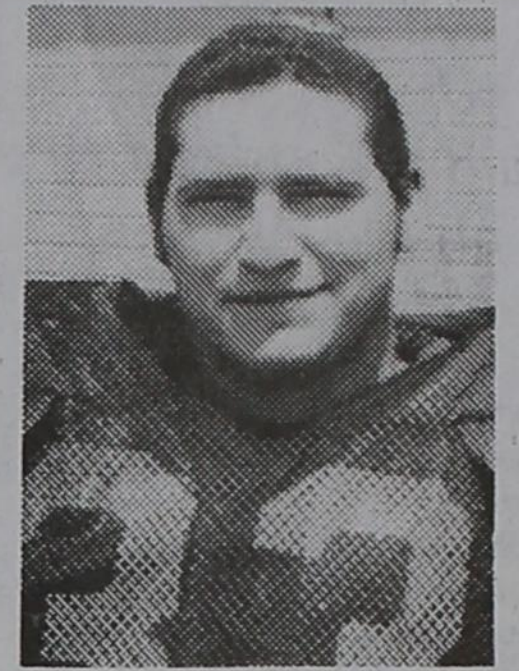

**Financial Focus**

If you weren't all that good in math at school, then you probably have never really liked the way stocks are priced -- in fractions of a dollar, rather than dollars and cents.

To make it more confusing, most stocks generally trade in increments of 1/16ths of a dollar. And some stocks are even offered in increments of 64/100ths.

The Securities and Exchange Commission has ordered U.S. securities markets to quote securities prices in decimals.

When decimal pricing is completely phased in, you should find it much easier to understand stock prices. For example, a stock that trades at \$4 3/4 would be quoted at \$4.75. This change also should make it simpler for you to compare prices of different stocks.

If stock quotes eventually get priced in 1-cent increments, you also may benefit in another way. This penny pricing system could narrow the "spread" -- the difference between the best buying price and the best selling price for a stock. Consequently, you may find it easier to buy a stock at the price you want to pay.

Decimal pricing, by itself, really shouldn't change the way you invest. You still need to find stocks of companies that have strong economic fundamentals, competitive products and a clear plan for future growth.

And you also need to diversify your holdings among a variety of different stocks. This need for diversification has become even more apparent with the stock market's recent turmoil, in which the technology sector was particularly hard hit.

By spreading your investment dollars among many stocks, in many different sectors, you should be able to minimize losses affecting just one area -- while giving yourself more opportunities for success.

Although decimal pricing won't affect your choice of investments, it should still be a positive step in the actual mechanics of constructing a well-diversified portfolio. And, from a psychological viewpoint, dollars-and-cents pricing should take some of the complexity out of the investment process.

# Springlake-Earth blanks Farwell

QB Gregory was tackled in the end zone at 9:44 for a safety, and a 2-0 S-E lead.

Barrett tackled the kick returner at midfield. Zac Schilling

had a good tackle and Kimbrough had a TD-saving tackle. But at 7:49, S-E scored from the 1. The kick made it 9-0.

Nichols had a good kick return to the Farwell 28. Again, Farwell was stymied and punted. Barrett had a tackle for a 2-yard loss. S-E punted but Farwell lost it on a fumble. Then Hernandez recovered a Wolverine fumble at the Steers 21. Farwell tried some trick formations, but they didn't work and had to punt.

An S-E drive failed when Nichols made a key tackle on a 4th and 2 situation. Farwell got its first 1st down of the half on a Gregory keeper with a minute left in the half.

In the 3rd quarter, Gregory hit Kimbrough with a 9-yard pass. Farwell had to punt, though, to the S-E 40. Christian and Kimbrough had tackles, forcing a punt.

Gregory hit Derek Goettsch with a 10-yard pass. But Gregory had a knee pop out, and had to leave the game. S-E then scored from the 1, after a 57-yard run. It was now 15-0.

# Two die in county vehicle accidents

Two people died in connected wrecks Monday morning at the Clay's Corner intersection of FM 145 and State Highway 214 according to Texas State Trooper Trey Ellis.

The first wreck occurred at 5:50 a.m. at the intersection. Richard Williams, 37, of Sudan, was driving a 1993 Dodge pickup westbound on FM 145. According to reports, as he entered the intersection, a 1979 Kenworth tractor trailer struck the pickup, spinning it into a ditch and ejecting Williams. The semi tried to swerve to avoid hitting the pickup, causing the trailer to roll onto its side, landing on Williams.

Williams was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Vi Hutto, Ellis reported. Williams was not wearing a seat belt and failed to yield the right of way, police reports said. The driver of the semi, Donald Cobb, did not report any injuries.

A heavy fog blanketed the area Monday morning according to reports. The Kenworth blocked the southbound lane of Highway 214 and approximately five minutes after it came to rest from the first wreck, a 1999 Kenworth struck the rear of the upended tractor trailer killing the driver.

Bruce Robison, 43, of Hereford, was pronounced dead at the scene by Hutto. Debris from the initial wreck went through his windshield, killing him instantly. He was wearing a seat belt, reported Trooper Ellis.

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# A look back at Parmer County's agricultural agents

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has an 86-year history of helping farmers and ranchers in Parmer County.

The first county agent was William Boys. He served the tri-county area of Parmer, Castro, and Deaf Smith counties. He was appointed in November of 1914 and served until September of 1915.

For the next 19 years, there was no county agent due to lack of funds. Then Alex Bateman began his career in Parmer County in January of 1934. After the passage of the Agricultural Adjustment Act in 1933, Bateman also served as the administrator of this program. Bateman was transferred to Deaf Smith County in January of 1936.

The next agent was J.O. Gordon, who was assistant agent in Lubbock County prior to his appointment in Parmer county on Jan. 21, 1936. In July, 1937, the administration of the Agricultural Adjustment Program came to an end. The agents could then work wholly on the education program again. Gordon transferred to Floyd county in September of 1941.

On Oct. 1, 1941, Parmer again received an assistant agent from Lubbock county to serve as county agent. Lee H. McEl-

roy served until May 5, 1942 when he was inducted into the military service: after World War II, he returned on Oct. 16, 1944 and served until Oct. 15, 1946 before being transferred to Terry county. During McElroy's absence, Garlon Harper, assistant county agent for Hale County served Parmer county from June 16, 1942 until Oct. 15, 1944. Harper worked with the victory councils on Red Cross drives, save the meat program, increasing food production and conservation.

In February of 1947, Ollie Liner, assistant county agent from Hale County, was appointed as county agent of Parmer County. He served until Feb. 28, 1950, and was transferred to Hale County.

On March 1, 1950, Joe Jones, assistant county agent from Lubbock County, was appointed county agent in Parmer county. He has had the longest tenure of any agent in the county up to this point. Jones served until Sept. 15, 1961; a total of 11 1/2 years of service. Joe was responsible for helping bring about the irrigation age to Parmer County in the 1950's. He helped many producers locate their first irrigation well. He is currently vice-president of Security State Bank in Farwell.

The next agent was Deryl Coker, from Levelland who served until March 31, 1964. Deryl's successor was Joe Vanzandt. Joe came to Parmer County from Liveoak County. He served Parmer County from May 21, 1964 until Aug. 10, 1966. He then transferred to Dumas in Moore county.

The next agent was the assistant agent in Lamb county prior to his appointment, here. Ronny McNutt, served from Oct. 16, 1966 until May 31, 1970. He then transferred to Childress.

The 11th county agent to serve Parmer County was Mack Heald. He was the assistant agent in Floyd County prior to coming to Parmer County on June 1, 1970. Under Mack's guidance, Parmer County became the largest corn growing county in the state. Mack worked very closely with producers on Irrigation Water Efficiency Usage. Mack also had a very successful 4-H Livestock program. Mack served seven years and nine months. He entered the pest control business

in Parmer County on April 1, 1978.

Seth Ralston followed Mack in May of 1978. He was the assistant agent in Castro County prior to his appointment here. Producers are still concerned about irrigation water efficiency usage, but energy cost has risen as the top concern. Seth served Parmer County from 1978 until December 1983.

Gary Patterson, the 13th county agent to serve Parmer County, was the assistant agent in Hockley County prior to accepting his position in Parmer County on Jan. 15, 1983. Gary worked closely with agriculture producers, as well as young people across the county. He served until April 15, 1996. Gary has had the longest tenure of any agent in Parmer County. He is currently branch manager of Muleshoe State Bank in Farwell.

On Aug. 1, 1996, Parmer County received an assistant from Gaines County to serve as county extension agent. Cody G. Hill currently serves as county extension agent -- agriculture for Parmer county. Cody works with agriculture producers to help educate them on new technologies in crop production and irrigation management. Cody also believes that young people are the backbone of his county and therefore, he works closely with them through the 4-H program to help develop their leadership and communication skills. Also, responsibility is demonstrated through many of the projects in the Parmer county 4-H program.

Today the county agents are still challenged to meet the needs of the people. They are the link between Texas A&M University and research and citizens of the county.

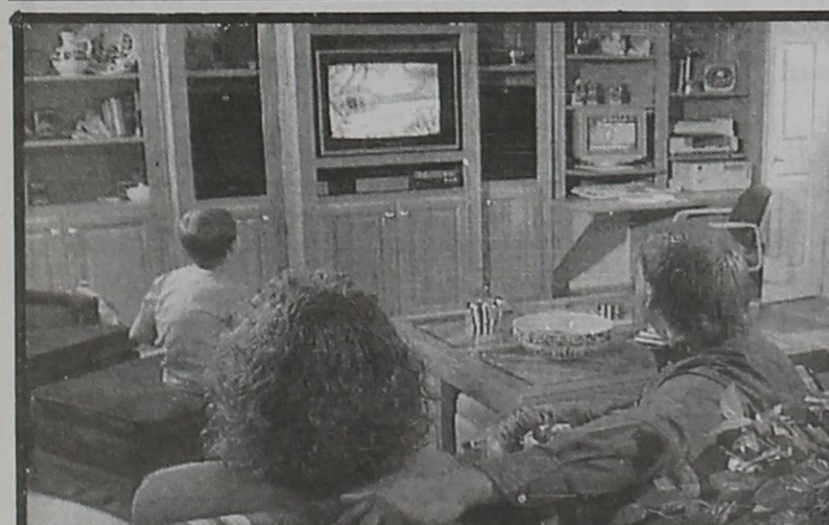
The counties' agricultural agents provide education in the areas of Crop and Livestock production, as well as assisting with the 4-H and Youth program in the county.

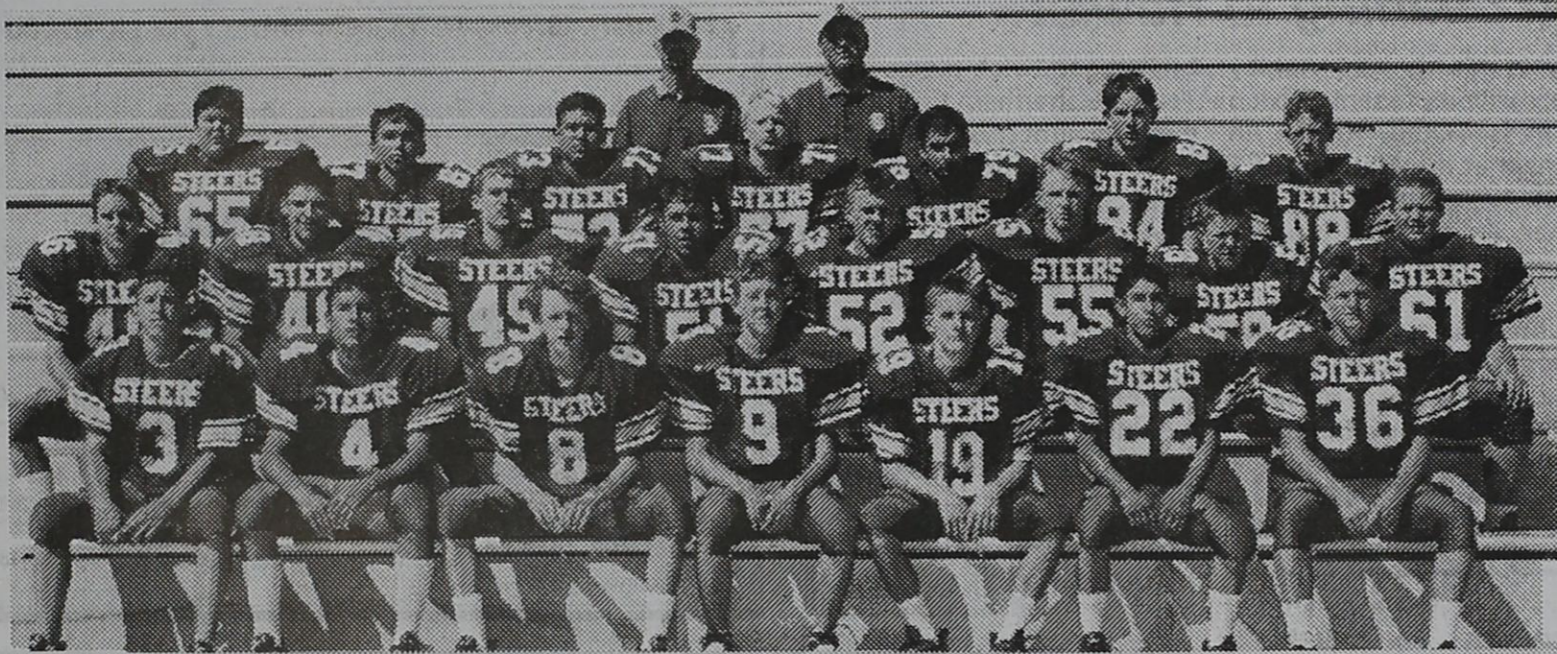
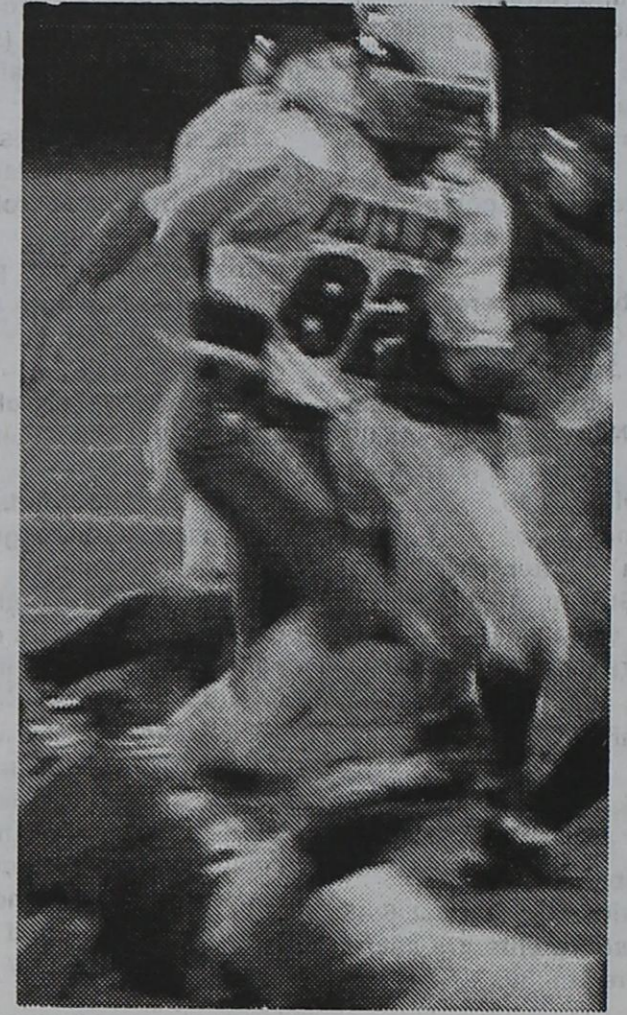

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
