Ray Stanley wins 8th contest

Marijuana processing facility found in Lazbuddie farm

The Parmer County sheriff's office staged a successful raid on a Lazbuddie farm on Oct. 18.

Sheriff Randy Geries, responding to a tip, checked out the area and found marijuana plants amid the corn crop in a field 1 1/2 miles from Lazbuddie School.

District Attorney Johnny Actkinson said the property belongs to a corporation, one of whose officers is William Vernon Puckett, 74. He was charged with felony possession of marijuana after a very large amount of the drug was found.

After a search warrant was issued for the barns on the property, the sheriff's deputies found a facility in one barn for the processing, manufacturing and distribution of marijuana. Geries said it took deputies five hours to remove the drugs from the facility.

Puckett was bonded out on \$10,000 bail. Geries said the case will go to the grand jury and it's likely that manufacturing and delivery of drugs charges will be added.

Geries also will recommend to the D.A.'s office that all assets (land and barns) be seized.

And the sheriff said the investigation is ongoing, and other arrests may be made.

He died Oct. 18 at Pleasant Hill.

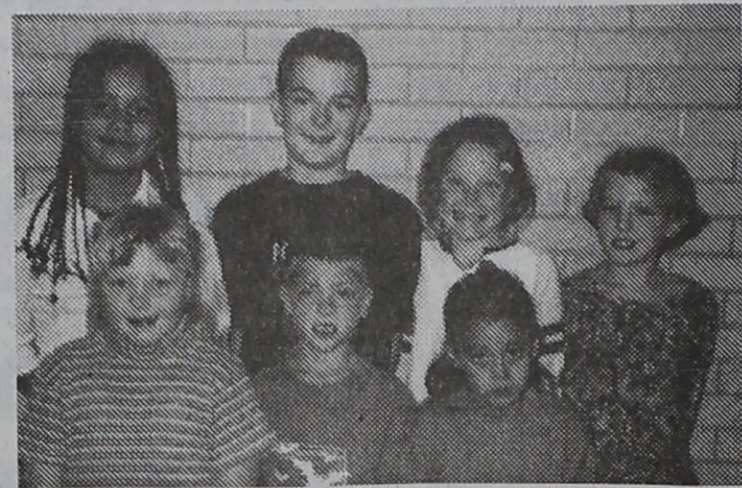
He was born Oct. 27, 1935, in Springlake to Frank and Lillian Mayfield.

In other business, the commissioners:

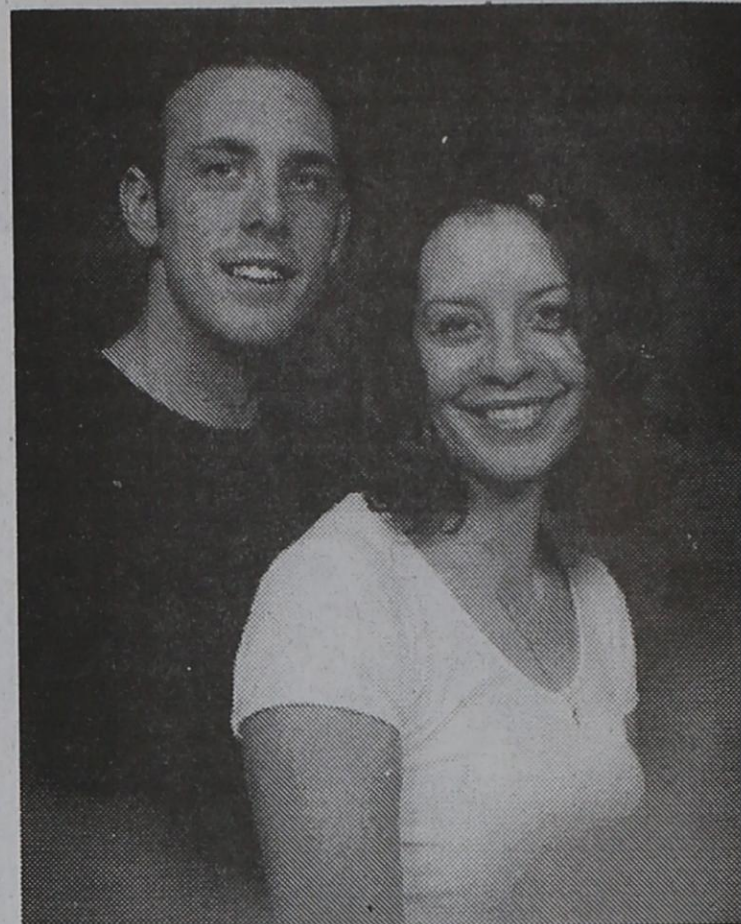
-- Approved a machine for hire from Yancy Farms for \$544 for work in Pct. 1 (Friona area).

This was especially summed up in the exclamation of one vivacious

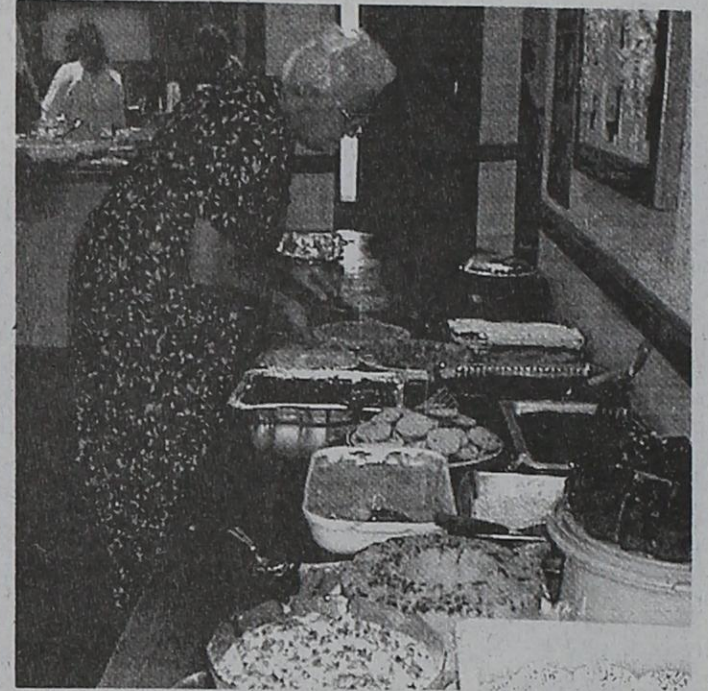
preschooler as he toured the building... "God is so good! Jesus really loves us to give us this neat school!"

The Farwell Steers scored a 24-13 victory over the Bovina Mustangs last Friday in an away district game.

The win put Farwell at 1-1 in district and 2-5 overall. The Steers host Whiteface on Friday at 7:30 p.m. Whiteface is also 1-1 in district, so the winner of this game will take a big step at earning a playoff berth.

The game opened with Bovina scoring on a 4-yard run in the first quarter, followed by a kick to take a 7-0 lead. During the quarter, on defense, Brice Hunt, Thomas Ortiz and Kason Gabriel had strong stops, and Luke Schwertner had a tackle for a loss.

And on offense, Ortiz had a 20-yard run behind a great block by Landon Meeks. Carlos Garcia had runs of 7 and 8 yards as the first quarter ended.

Farwell owned the second quarter as the Steers pushed over two touchdowns. Josh Curtis recovered a fumble at the Mustangs 11. After Ortiz ran for 7, Taylor Nichols kept for a 4-yard TD. Nichols then ran for the 2-point conversion as Farwell took an 8-7 lead.

On their second possession of the quarter, Garcia ran for 6 behind a good block by Shelby Teltschik. Fidel Ruiz then grabbed a pass good for 27 yards. Nichols made a twisting 13-yard run, followed by a 10-yard run for a TD. Farwell then scored a 2-point conversion on a pass from Nichols to Randy Armstrong, who made a great catch.

On Farwell's next possession, Cale Stevenson caught an 18-yard pass, followed by Garcia making an excellent

grab. But an interception halted this drive.

On defense in the second quarter, good tackles were recorded by Hunt, Gabriel and Ortiz.

The Steers' 3rd TD came in the 3rd quarter. The drive included a 15-yard run by Nichols and a 30-yard pass to Ruiz. It culminated in a 6-yard TD pass from Nichols to Gabriel. The 2-point conversion was good when Nichols passed to Landon Meeks. Farwell was not up, 24-7.

On defense in the 3rd quarter, strong tackles were made by Hunt, Gabriel and Schwertner.

Top offensive plays for Farwell in the final period include a 15-yard run by Ortiz and a 9-yard catch by Ruiz. Bovina scored on an 82-yard run, with the kick failing. During this quarter, the defense played strong. On their first possession, Bovina had a 3rd and 6 when Ortiz made a big stop.

Then Casey Meeks and Hunt had good tackles. When Bovina was 4th and 11, Ben Opplinger made the stop, causing a Bovina punt.

Later, Schwertner had a tackle for a loss, Armstrong and Gabriel had good punt coverage, and more good tackles were made by Hunt, Opplinger and Gaylen Sudderth.

LIVE CATTLE: Prices have re-tested lows made in October and have held so far? This market has been extremely emotional. Trading has been volatile and may continue this way as long as terrorists threaten our country. A close above \$68.20 basis December would turn trends higher and a close above \$70.80 would confirm a major low is in place. Looking for stable to higher prices.

FEEDER CATTLE: A close above \$87.50 basis the November Feeders would turn short term trends higher. A close above \$88.50 should confirm a long term bottom is in place. The spread between feeders and fed cattle should continue to narrow. At this time, spreads are still too wide to justify the uncertainty in the market. Feeder prices will follow fed cattle prices, not lead.

CORN: Prices are re-testing this summer's lows around the \$2.00 level basis December Corn. There should be enough support around this level to hold prices even though some analysts are still expecting prices to move down toward the \$1.80 area? We will continue to move with the trend and hope to see the \$2.00 area hold. A close above \$2.09 would turn trends higher.

SOYBEANS: Prices broke down again this week and look like they're headed toward the \$4.20 area which was last summer's low. Long term charts are indicating that this market may close to a low, but prices will need to close above \$4.38 in order to turn short term trends back higher. Harvest pressure should be near an end while export demand will be the key to higher prices.

WHEAT: Chicago Wheat continues to be the leader in the grain complex with Kansas City Wheat dragging behind. Long term trends turned higher last week and prices continue to show strength. Long term targets will be \$2.95-3.10 basis the December contract. Seasonal support should move prices higher into the December/January time frames.

COTTON: The trends have continued to move lower on abbreviated sessions in New York. Prices were able to post new contract lows again this week at \$30.50 basis the December Cotton contract. The 1986 low of \$29.50 was test on the October contract and may provide some support for the December contract, but the market is following prices and the trends are still down.

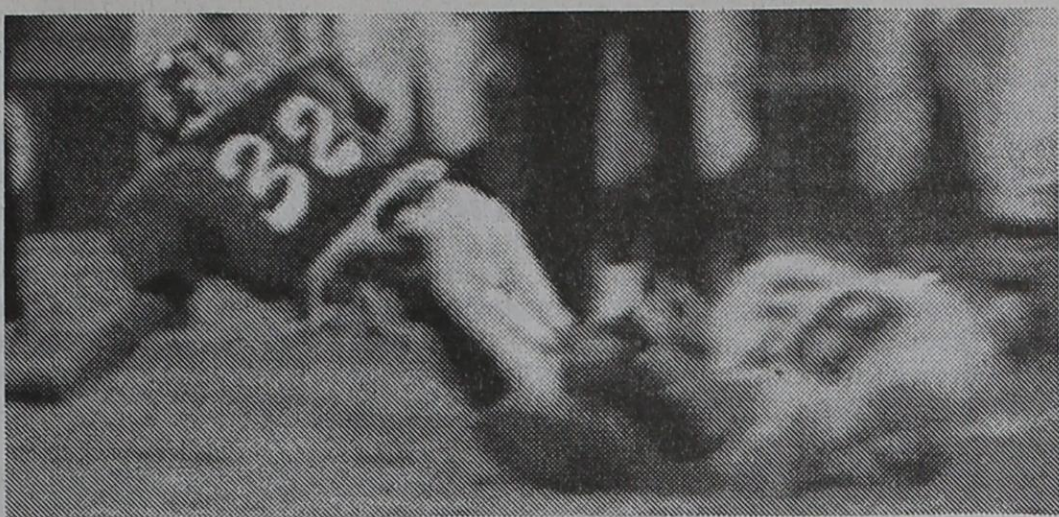

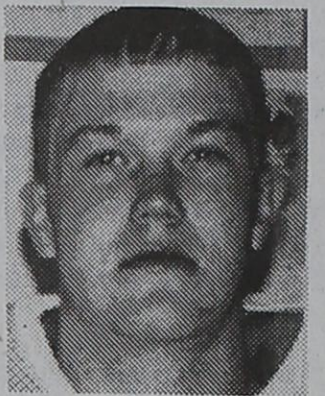


Toby Thornton makes a tackle against Hagerman. Thornton participated in 16 tackles.

The final quarter wasn't a good one for Texico. Hagerman recovered a fumble in the Texico end zone for a TD, followed by the kick. Later, the Bobcats got their first TD on offense on a 14-yard run by their QB. The kick failed.

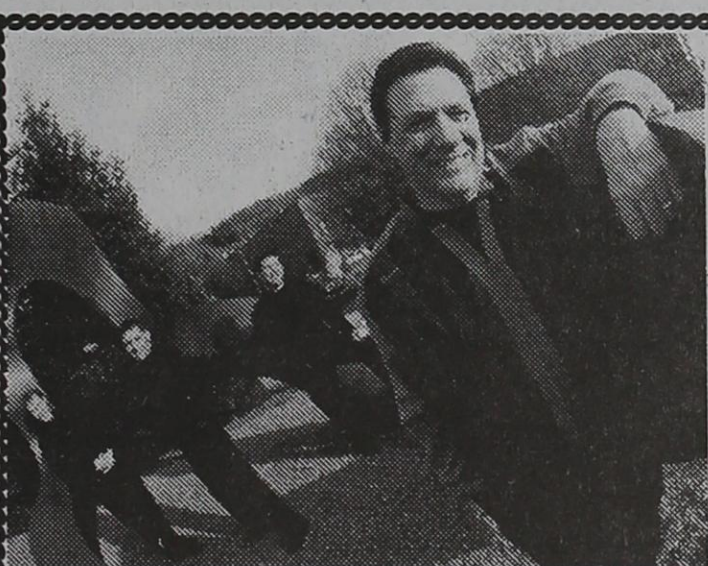
