



#### Marijuana processing facility found in Lazbuddie farm

The Parmer County sheriff's office staged a successful raid on a Lazbuddie farm on Oct. 18.

Sheriff Randy Geries, responding to a tip, checked out the area and found marijuana plants amid the corn crop in a field 1 1/2 miles from Lazbuddie School.

District Attorney Johnny Actkinson said the property belongs to a corporation, one of whose officers is William Vernon Puckett, 74. He was charged with felony possession of marijuana after a very large amount of the drug was found.

After a search warrant was issued for the barns on the property, the sheriff's deputies found a facility in one barn for the processing, manufacturing and distribution of marijuana. Geries said it took deputies five hours to

remove the drugs from the facility. Puckett was bonded out on \$10,000 bail.

Geries said the case will go to the grand jury and it's likely that manufacturing and delivery of drugs charges will be added.

Geries also will recommend to the D.A.'s office that all assets (land and barns) be seized.

And the sheriff said the investigation is ongoing, and

other arrests may be made.



The building committee that designed and coordinated the facility with contractor Tommy Knight are to be thanked for thinking out the details for the preschool building.


They not only thought about the big stuff like heating and cooling systems, they thought out the small stuff, like having bright colors and inviting interiors for the children.


On defense in the 3rd quarter, strong tackles were made by Hunt, Gabriel and Schwertner.



LIVE CATTLE: Prices have re-tested lows made in October and have held so far? This market has been extremely emotional. Trading has been volatile and may continue this way as long as terrorists threaten our country. A close above \$68.20 basis December would turn trends higher and a close above \$70.80 would confirm a major low is in place. Looking for stable to higher prices.

FEEDER CATTLE: A close above \$87.50 basis the November Feeders would turn short term trends higher. A close above \$88.50 should confirm a long term bottom is in place. The spread between feeders and fed cattle should continue to narrow. At this time, spreads are still too wide to justify the uncertainty in the market. Feeder prices will follow fed cattle prices,

CORN: Prices are re-testing this summer's lows around the \$2.00 level basis December Corn. WHEAT: Chicago Wheat continues to be the leader in the grain complex with Kansas City Wheat dragging behind. Long term trends turned higher last week and prices continue to show strength. Long term targets will be \$2.95-3.10 basis the December contract. Seasonal support should move prices higher into the December/January time frames.

COTTON: The trends have continued to move lower on abbreviated sessions in New York. Prices were able to post new contract lows again this week at \$30.50 basis the December Cotton contract.
