Border A look back Banter at history of Pleasant Hill

The following history of the Pleasant Hill Community was taken almost in its entirety from the 1978 reunion booklet:

Pleasant Hill Community is a farming community, consisting of many friendly families 14 miles northeast of Clovis and 1 1/2 miles west of the New Mexico-Texas line. The community began to settle up in the early 1900's. Most of the early settlers came out on excursion trains and would unload their possessions at either Bovina or Texico, and move out for a home-

Pleasant Hill Community was named for Lee Barnes, when he came to New Mexico in 1906 from Tennessee. The name is for a place in Tennessee where he had lived.

In 1906, Barnes, C.H. DeLozier and Joe Singleterry were some of the men who met and organized the first school. It was in a one-room shack which later De-Lozier used for a chicken house. There was only a three-month term of school in 1906-07 and Mr. Moyer was the first teacher.

In 1907, school was held in a tent until the concrete block building was first completed in 1908. Some of the men who helped in making the blocks and building the school building in 1908 were: Barnes, DeLozier, Clyde Hartshrone, Samuel Kirby, A.J. Jones, L.B. Moorman, Ben Singleterry, George Singleterry, Joe Singleterry and John R. Spearman. The block building was 30x60 feet.

In 1913, an addition wad added to the block building and in 1916, a new two-story frame building was constructed across the road east of the concrete block building, at a cost of \$16,000.00. One summer, Ray Hungate helped in painting the two-story building white. In 1931, a gymnasium was built across the road south of the two-story building. In the summer of 1938, the cement block building was torn down and the blocks used to build a teacherage, consisting of seven apartments. This building is presently known as the community center.

The land for the Pleasant Hill School was donated by several citizens and consisted of two-acre tracts located on four corners.

Pleasant Hill School consisted of numerous smaller schools that were consolidated with it at different times. Some of the smaller schools were: Friona School first located north of Pleasant Hill where Clarence Brown now lives on Highway 108. This was a one-room school house with three-month school terms, and Wilson Davis taught there in 1910. Frio later moved north, closer to the Frio Draw.

Shilo School was four miles north of Pleasant Hill. Anna Wesemann taught school there in the one-room school house. Shilo school building is still standing on the B.A. Rogers farm, four miles north and one-half mile west of Pleasant Hill.

Lakeview School was south of Pleasant Hill across Running Water Draw, where the American Feeders is now located Vergil Davis taught at Lakeview in the one-room school in 1912.

Casa Rock School was located south of Pleasant Hill and five miles north of Texico on Highway 108. This was a one-room rock building, and L.C. Mers-

felder taught there in 1910. Daniels School and Fairview School were across the State Line in Texas and they consolidated into State Line School. In 1931 State Line School went to

Washington School and Lincoln School consoli-I don't think anyone dated and formed Claude School which was located 12 miles north and one mile east of Clovis. In 1932, the high school from Claude started going to Pleasant Hill, and in 1946, the grade school from Claude went to

> In 1950 the Pleasant Hill High School was moved to Texico, and in May 1951 Pleasant Hill School was closed out and the school was divided into the Clovis and Texico School Districts.

The Pleasant Hill cemetery is one mile north of the Vaughan, this team's of- community. It was donated by J.H. Kays.

I.L. Cone had the first store that was located one mile north of Pleasant Hill. Later Cleve Martin owned and operated a store in 1917 that was across the road west of the school building. W.F. Greer bought the store in 1919, and in 1922 C.M. Page purchased the store from Greer.

Page's house was near the store. While Page owned the store, it was robbed and set on fire one (Continued on Page 8)





I forgot the stat on what the extent of credit card debt is today, but I believe it's much higher than ever before. And that eventually will cause young couples severe problems. It's just putting off a catastrophe.

I wish I could sit down with our nation's economic advisors and explain it to them this way:

A man makes \$10. Thirty years ago, \$2 went to the federal income tax; \$3 went to ancillary taxes (insurance, local taxes, utilities, etc.), \$1 went to pension or Social Security, and you kept \$4.

Today, of that \$10, \$2 still only goes to the federal income tax; \$1 to pension or Social Security, but \$5 to \$6 on ancillary taxes. This means, you keep \$1.50.

Thus, economic relief must be geared toward those ancillary taxes.





It was a battle last Friday of the state's No. 2 ranked teams in Classes 1A and 2A.






Vaughan tackled the kick returner at the Rattlers 44. Brown had a big hit. Clements made a good tackle,

Plans told of converting Texico ex-motel into rental apartments

The Texico City Council didn't have much of a meeting on Tuesday because it lacked a quorum to conduct business.

Present were Mayor Jerry Cunningham and councilman Oran Jay Autrey. Absent were councilmen Doug Scioli, Monnie Cunningham and Sharon Askew.

But representatives of Esteban Flores, of Los Angeles, attended to talk with the council about their plans to convert the former Westerner Motel (next to the former Spur Restaurant) into rental apartments. Rafael Gallegos, of Los Angeles, was the representative.

Gallegos asked about water and sewer lines, and how to find out about the history of the property. He said he has a disagreement over the hotel's use with a neighboring property owner.

To find out about the property's history, he was told to go to the Curry County clerk's office. As for utility lines, he was told to talk with Texico public works Supt. Clarene Smith. As for a disagreement with another property owner, the city does not get involved in such disputes. Gallegos also was told that the building would have to be brought up to state codes.

In other business, Smith reported that Curry County will improve the bar ditches along Craig Street, thus helping the drainage problem, at no cost to the city.

And city clerk Teresa Harth said the architect for the city hall project will attend the next council meeting. The council has voted to place the new city hall adjacent to the community center. But Police Chief Kelley Brophy had major concerns about this, involving street congestion, parking regulations and vandalism.







night. The fire woke the Page family and they were able to save their house from burning by pouring buckets of water on it. The store was a total loss, though.

A few people came to help including Lonnie Daniels who lived east of Pleasant Hill and first happened to see the fire from several miles away.

Mr. Walker did auto repair and operated a gas pump, but after the fire it was several years before another store opened.

William Penn Curtis had his store and house across the road south of the school in 1927. In 1930, Guy Board built a store west of the school en route to Clovis. Then in 1936, Monk Horton purchased the store from Board and operated it for several years.

In 1942, Mamie and John Hightower bought the store from Monk and operated it until 1960 when they closed the store and moved to Texico.

C.M. Page had the first bus contract for Pleasant Hill. He purchased four Ford trucks with chassis, and he built the bed with seats down the sides and a canvass top. Other school bus contractors were W.W. Hungate, Monk Horton, and Bud Peyton.

At one time the Community had two churches, Baptist and Methodist. The Baptist Church was organized in 1907 and first met in a dugout, the home of Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Singleterry, which was located south and east of Pleasant Hill community on Running Water Draw (Richardson Farm). In 1908 C.H. DeLozier donated land for the church. The first full time pastor of the Baptist Church was W.W. Taylor who came in 1912. In 1918 the Baptist Church building was built by G.A. Thornton. This building was torn down in 1974 and the present church facilities were built.

In the early years of the Community, all denominations met together and held Church serves. One Sunday the Baptist preacher would speak and the next Sunday it would be the Methodist preacher.

The Methodist Church was organized in 1929. Joe Bell and G.A. Thornton built this building that was located west of the community building. Rev. J.E. Thomas was the first pastor. In 1950 the Methodist Church dissolved, and the building was sold and was moved to Floyd, N.M.

The first high school class graduated in 1917 -- Ray Hungate, Mary Kays Martin, Jerry Blackwell and Cliff Gallagher.

The first annual was printed in 1917 and was called the "Echo." Later in the 1920's the name was changed to the "Chieftain," and in 1937, the school paper was called the "War Whoop." In 1940 the annual's name was changed to the "Legend," but in 1945 it was changed to the "Chieftain" again. They were known as the "Indians" and the school colors were maroon and white.

A few items reminiscent of the early days at Pleasant Hill High School are still around, such as a May 17, 1929, edition of the "War Whoop" and a 1928 copy of the "Chieftain."

The "War Whoop," which was the school newspaper contained a summary of school work as well as the graduating class's future plans. The class will was printed along with plans for the junior-senior banquet. One whole page was also devoted to sports. The back page was reserved for teachers' pet phrases: "Won't you boys ever grow up?" "Now let's have it quiet or I'll send someone out of the room," and pupils' pet phrases, "You remind me of a hyena. I'm gonna tell him what I think."

The 1928 annual was dedicated to James W. Wilson, superintendent. The class motto was "If the elevator to success isn't running, take the stairs." The American Beauty Rose was the class flower and red and white were the class colors.





Pleasant Hill School history outlined

The first Pleasant Hill School was organized in 1906 largely through the efforts of Lee Barnes, C.H. DeLozier and Joe Singleterry.

The first building was a one-room shack which De-Lozier later used for a chicken house. The first term in 1906-07 was only three months long, and Mr. Moyer was the first teacher.

In 1907, classes were conducted in a tent until the concrete block building was completed in 1908. Several of the men who helped in making the blocks and building the school building in 1908 were: Barnes, De-Lozier, Clyde Hartshorne, Samuel Kirby, A.J. Jones, L.B. Moorman, Ben Singleterry, George Singleterry, Joe Singleterry and John R. Spearman. This block. building was 30x60 feet.

An addition to the block building was added in 1913. In 1916, a new two-story frame building was constructed, across the road east of the concrete block building at a cost of \$16,000.00.

One summer Ray Hungate helped to paint the twostory building white. A gymnasium was built in 1931 across the road south of the two-story building. In the summer of 1938, the cement block building was torn down and the blocks used to build a teacherage, consisting of seven apartments. This building is presently known as the Pleasant Hill Community Center.

The land for the school was donated by several citizens and consisted of two-acre tracts located on four

Pleasant Hill School consisted of numerous smaller schools that were consolidated with it at different

In 1950, the Pleasant Hill High School was moved to Texico, and in 1951, Pleasant Hill School was closed out and the school was divided into the Clovis School District and the Texico School District.

was covered with white frosting and the words "Happy Birthday" as well as the numerals "93" were written in red icing. She also received an engraved plaque.

Mrs. Thornton was the only living charter member of the Pleasant Hill Extension Club, which was chartered in 1927. She served as the club's first president.

Several other "older" former residents were also recognized. These included Andrew Moorman, 89, of Clovis; H.H. DeLozier, Clovis, who attended Pleasant Hill School in 1907; Ester Singleterry who attended in 1909 and Willis Rogers of Clovis in 1911.

Other honorees included Mr. and Mrs. C.M. Page of Santa Fe, N.M., who at one time owned the balance of the quarter section adjoining the school property where the Community Center is located today. The Center was the former teacherage, consisting of seven apartments. The school was then across the road east from their home.

Page, 90, was born on June 29, 1888, and his wife, Mary Lou, 88, was born on June 29, 1890. He served as State Representative from Curry County for eight

June is a special month for the Pages as they observed four different occasions during that time. This past June 9, they celebrated their 71st year of marriage. They both also have birthdays in June and Father's Day also comes within that month.

The Pages had four children, three of whom graduated from Pleasant Hill School. They are Vondolee Page of Wasilla, Alaska; Travis Page, who was killed during World War II; and Leota Page Hicks of Clovis. Another daughter, Fern Page Moody of Santa Fe, graduated from Clovis. All three living children were at the reunion.

Their son, Vondolee Page, was recognized and awarded a plaque for "traveling the farthest distance" to attend the reunion.

Ray Hungate of Clovis was recognized and presented a plaque as the "first graduate" of Pleasant Hill High School in 1917. There were only four members of that class. The only other surviving member is Mary Kays Martin of Baytown, Tex., who for health reasons was unable to attend.

Many former teachers at Pleasant Hill School were recognized and introduced.

Even though many people helped make the Pleasant Hill Reunion possible, Jimmye Donahey received a gift for "doing more work than anyone else."

Everyone registered at the beginning of the reunion and name tags were issued. Specially prepared Pleasant Hill Community Reunion booklets were available. The booklet gives a capsule size history of the community as well as listing all former students and teachers. Another section is devoted to brief histories of former Pleasant Hill residents.

The reunion of 1978 was dedicated to Clarabelle Donahey Smith, now deceased, "who took an interest and was a faithful worker in getting this reunion started."


