Lazbuddie's robotics team takes 2nd at area; advances to state

by Debbie Weir The Lazbuddie High Robotics Team took 2nd place BEST Team at the area West Texas Boosting Engineering, Science and Technology (BEST) contest in Lubbock on Saturday. Twenty-three teams participated.


Lazbuddie now advances to the state and national contest at Texas A&M University Nov. 22-23. They will compete against 60 teams from seven states.

Only 13 of the 23 teams at Lubbock qualified for the BEST contest. The BEST award is based on documentation submitted in a 3 inch binder filled with engineering concepts about the design and building of the robot. Brain storming approaches, considerations of offensive and defensive strategies, and pictures describing the process are included in the notebook. A display table shows community and school outreach and involvement. An oral presentation is given to judges about the engineering process, community and school involvement, sportsmanship and uses of technology.

For the Pct. 3 (Farwell area) Justice of the Peace post, Pam Haseloff, a Democrat, will be re-elected. Vi Hutto will be re-elected to the Bovina area JP post.

But, as stated, there are plenty of statewide contests: U.S. Senator - John Cornyn, GOP, vs. Ron Kirk, Democrat.

U.S. Representative - Larry Combest, GOP, vs. Larry Johnson, Libertarian.

Courthouse Notes

Border Games can use their machines in Parmer County

Parmer County Attorney Charles Aycock told the Tribune on Monday that as part of the plea agreement with Border Games on Oct. 16, they will be allowed to use their machines in Parmer County if they reopen their business here.

Their 49 video gambling devices were confiscated in the police raid last summer. As part of the plea pact, the state kept one and returned the other 48 to the owners.

Border Games' owners are Darrell Cook, of Farwell, and Robert McAfoos, of Clovis.

As part of the plea agreements with Winner's Touch and George's Gold Strike, these two businesses were barred from using the machines that were returned to them. In the pact with Winner's Touch, 47 of the 48 machines were returned to them. In the pact with George's Gold Strike, 49 of the 50 machines were returned to them.

The Tribune incorrectly reported last week that as part of the plea pact, the machines returned to the owners of Border Games could not be used in Parmer County.

Asked why Border Games can use their machines again in Parmer County while the other two 8-liner businesses were prohibited from doing so, Aycock said it's because Border Games had no other machines. He said Winner's Touch and George's Gold Strike had other machines they could bring into Parmer County.

George's Gold Strike and Winner's Touch have reopened in Farwell; and Border Games may reopen here, also.

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
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

The Fillpot Report

LIVE CATTLE: Prices have continued to steadily increase even though cash is still lagging way behind. The spread between cash and the December contract is historically the widest ever seen. Slaughter weights are also the highest ever recorded this week. The \$6 spread between cash and futures with 5 weeks to go will narrow. Hedgers have the opportunity to take advantage of this now.

FEEDER CATTLE: This market will continue to follow the Live Cattle prices up or down. Feeder prices look heavy on nearby months and the March, April and May contracts are still lagging. We still need to see a downward correction into late November to expect a rally into the January/February time frame. The spread is so wide at this point that cattle coming out will project losses.

CORN: Trends are still down with strong resistance above at \$2.60-2.62 basis the December contract. Long term targets still point toward the \$2.35 area? Harvest lows don't usually come around late December or early January. This year may find a low earlier but there is little bullish news to support the market over the near term. Still look for a shot at higher prices into spring.

SOYBEANS: This market remains the strongest and should help to support the corn. Exports remain very strong even though production levels are pointing higher than earlier projections. Odds are that prices will see some type of downward correction into November before attempting another move back up? Weather in South American will be critical over the next 3-4 months.

WHEAT: K.C. Wheat prices are still holding into a tight range and looking for news which could possibly move prices higher or lower. The widespread rain in Eastern Colorado and Kansas did place some pressure on prices, but the nearby contracts remain strong. Any improvement in the crop conditions will be directly reflected out in July K.C. Wheat contracts.

COTTON: Although cotton prices stopped at a long resistance point this week at \$46.85, prices have turned most of their long term charts back higher. At this time, the market is trying to tell us that with two hurricanes in the Delta and wet weather in the South Plains, there may be much more damage than thought. If attitudes begin to change, there could be some panic buying?

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Commissioners presented jail costs, options

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday held a lengthy discussion to plan the county jail's future with an architect from Fort Worth and a contractor from Glen Rose, Texas.

Also attending the meeting were County Attorney Charles Aycock, Sheriff Randy Geries and Deputy Sheriff Wayne Gruben.

The commissioners have three options:

1. Build a new jail.

2. Add on to and renovate the current jail.

3. Build a separate sheriff's office (with storage space) apart from the current jail, but on the same premises.

The commissioners received a bombshell. They learned from the architect that since the county courthouse is on the state historical registry, approval is needed from the state historical society to add on to the current jail -- if the commissioners choose this option.

But the state historical society said it will not approve any additions to the jail. The commissioners' only recourse, if they still wanted to renovate the current jail with an addition, would be to get the society to change its mind.

Thus, this leaves two options: a now jail, or building a new sheriff's office. The problem with the first option is its high cost. The problem with the second option is that it doesn't resolve the problem of jail cell renovations to meet current standards.

Cost estimates given the commissioners on the three options are:

1. A new jail -- estimated to cost between \$3.2 million and \$3.5 million.

2. Modify and expand the current jail -- \$2.6 million to \$2.8 million.

3. Build a separate sheriff's office -- \$560,000 to \$630,000.

The commissioners' next step is to meet with a financial investment representative to discuss the options and how they could be funded. This will occur at the next council meeting.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Rescheduled its next meeting to Nov. 12, so it can canvass the election.

-- Denied a request by Friona State Bank to consider the possibility of letters of credit to secure Parmer County deposits held at that bank.

" Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Recent editorials in local papers are taking the positions that farmers are greedy and grossly overpaid.

As a lifetime agriculture producer, I find such a position absurd. May I quote a few statistics on the current state of agriculture in the United States.

I am a member of the American Farm Bureau's National Peanut Advisory Committee. In July, I attended a conference in Washington, D.C., along with other commodity representatives from across the nation.

On July 16, we met with U.S. Trade Ambassador Robert Zoellick. The following figures were presented at that meeting:

The average U.S. wage earner spends 10.8 percent of their earnings for food. Of this, 8.8 percent is spent on imported foods, mostly foods not produced in the U.S. I.e., coffee, tea, tropical fruits and winter vegetables. So for every \$100 in earnings, the U.S. consumer spends \$9.85 on American-produced food.

As of June 30, 2002, 81 percent of this \$9.85 is the cost of processing, packaging, distribution, service, wholesale and retail markup. The American ag producer is receiving \$1.87 for the food each American consumer purchases per \$100 of earnings. This is less than 1/4 the amount withheld for Social Security taxes.

If the American farmer received no payment for food produced, consumers would see absolutely no difference in food costs.

To keep food at such a bargain for consumers, the government provides additional compensation, commonly called subsidies. The average subsidy in the U.S. is currently \$38 per acre. In the European Union, # farmers are currently subsidized at \$306 per acre.

Unbalanced trade is another problem. Ambassador Zoellick emphasized: Ag products exported by the U.S. are assessed a tariff averaging 62 percent. Ag products imported are assessed a tariff averaging 12 percent. This is in addition to currency fluctuations that can change daily.

Example: Current strong dollar values against other currencies increase the above quoted disparity. Export subsidies: currently the European Union pays 87 percent of all world export subsidies to their exporting firms. The U.S. pays less than 1 percent of all world export subsidies.

Ambassador Zoellick said, "We may have free trade, but it is far from fair trade." He also said his task was to try to make free trade fair, but that most of our trading partners are content with status quo so it is a most difficult job. He said trade compacts made the last 25 years by several administrations is a primary cause of the current difficulty in agriculture and is a hard situation to correct.

Perhaps these figures will show just how difficult it is to make a living farming today.

Rains take toll on cotton harvest

The rains that have soaked the area may have brought our moisture totals up to par, but they're starting to take a toll on the area cotton crops.

Area gins are pretty well caught up with the cotton that was stripped before the rains. Some modules of cotton simply cannot be reached for pickup because the fields are too muddy.

Doyle Johnson, manager of the Farwell Gin, said that time will tell what the effect on the cotton will be.

"We need lots of days with the sun shining to dry things up and get back into the fields," Doyle said. "Right now, even a good, hard freeze would help things."

Johnson said the cotton will begin to get stringy and that some will fall completely out of the burr if things don't dry up soon.

"You just can't get it stripped when this happens, or you can't get enough cotton to make good yields," he stated.

Edwin Teltschik, manager of the Parmer County Cotton Growers Co-op, concurred with this statement.

"We'll see some deterioration in the cotton because of the rain," he commented.

Teltschik explained that the rains will wash out the cotton's natural oils and will cause staining or tinting to the cotton.





Tobin Redwine had a huge game for Lazbuddie. He rushed for 88 yards, had 65 yards in receptions, and passed for 78 yards.



Monse Melendez had a strong kicking game, providing 5 kicks for 10 extra points during the game.



The Longhorns gained 443 yards, 292 rushing and 151 passing, to Cotton Center's 190.









The Texico Wolverines scored their 6th shutout of the season with a resounding 41-0 slaughter of the Eunice Cardinals at home last Friday.

Texico is now 8-0 and has only given up 18 points all year.

Loera scored from the 3 with 6:49 left. The kick was wide and it was 34-0.







Helton suggests review of propane safety guidelines
