### We have a problem

Sometimes when you predict a serious problem, you are wrong.

In this case, I sincerely hope I am.

But, after getting a couple of phone calls late last week, I feel there may be a problem with the new speed limit signs placed along Highway 108 (the Pleasant Hill highway) in back of Texico Schools.

Recently, the state has installed a 15 mph speed limit there "when children are present."

Texico Police Chief Kelley Brophy has defined this time as regular school days from about 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. mt. And Texico police will enforce it.

That means, the 15 mph limit is in effect most weekdays except when school is out, like during the summer and vacations.

The problem is that if you are southbound, you leave a 55 mph limit and hit the 15 mph stretch within a matter of seconds.

And if you are northbound, you go from 45 mph to 15 mph in the same time limit.

That is dangerous.

If you are going to go from 55 to 15, you need some distance to slow down.

What is happening is that some folks are braking strongly once they see that 15 mph sign. That is, most folks. Some are





Headstart requires income verification (check stub) Medicaid/TANF.

Texas school districts are required to provide Pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.

# Norton Farms take 2<sup>nd</sup> place

David Norton, of D&P Farms, recently won 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the ridge till irrigated division of the 2002 National Corn Growers Association (NCGA) Corn Yield Contest in Texas.

Norton won with Pioneer brand 33B51, which yielded 259.2 bushes per acre.

The Corn Yield Contest is an annual competition among corn producers with the goal of producing the highest yields.

In the contest, growers compete within a broad range of corn production classes.

Norton planted the winning entry on April 22, 2002, in fields grown to cotton the previous year. He planted the crop into 30-inch rows using a John Deere 7200 12row planter at a rate of 33,500 seeds per acre.

He applied a total of 250 pounds of nitrogen and 32 pounds of phosphorous per acre to enhance fertility.

He used a John Deere 9610 combine to harvest the winning plot on Oct. 5, 2002.


