



Tori checks out Texico resident's complaints

Last week, the Texico City Council heard complaints from a resident, former Mayor Nathan Tharp, about what he called the poor shape of the city's streets and the need for the council to move on repairs.

So I decided to go and take a look for myself.

I thought Tharp was right -- the streets of Texico are pretty raunchy.

A few things that I noticed were; broken down vehicles, overgrown trees,

weeds growing in the streets, and even some lots that were full of junk.

Now I've never lived in Texico, but reside three miles west of Texico, so I can't say for sure what the streets should look like.

But I've attended Texico Schools for the past 12 years so I do have a feel for how the streets have looked.

Don't get me wrong: there were some nice houses and lawns, but not for the most part.



Friona voting booth moved

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday voted to move voting box 402 from the Friona Fire Station to the Friona City Library.

Election judges were named for the Sept. 13 constitutional amendments election:


In other business, the commissioners:

-- Approved the outside colors for the new county jail and law enforcement center -- Texas shell and terra cotta.

The colors are displayed at the far end of a wall adjacent to the outside jail holding pen at the county courthouse for folks to view them.

-- Received three bids for processed caliche: Ramon Trucking, Bovina, \$7 a ton; Granite Construction, Lubbock, \$6 a ton; and Amarillo Road Co., \$3 a ton.

Granite's bid was accepted.

I drove down every street Texico has to offer and found 58 immobile vehicles, and at least 20 vards that had some serious green thumb issues.

Anderson Street had 8 immobile vehicles, and **Turner Street had 9.**

That's not that many cars, but when those streets are only 10 blocks long, it is.

Rose Street had some yards that needed sprucing up badly.

Overall, Avenue F and Craig Street had the best appearance.

The weeds in the streets and around houses that are for sale are definitely out of control. Tharp was right.

I noticed that even some trees need to be cut back. Some were growing over the stop signs, which creates a potential problem.

Also, weeds are coming up in the middle of some of the streets.

- After filling, take your cylinder home immediately. Keep your vehicle ventilated with the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped (unless your cylinder type does not require plugs or caps). Never leave the cylinder in your car.
- Make sure the grill burner controls are turned off and keep the cylinder valve closed when not in use.
- Make sure the grill is shut off and cooled before covering.
- . When your grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and burner air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from your propane supplier to keep out dirt, insects and moisture.
- If there is a significant and uncontrollable release of gas or a fire, call the fire department immediately and move all people and pets away from the unit.



Ward sent to prison

Ricky Ward, 39, of Texico, has finished his pleas in drug cases, reports the Curry County District Court Clerk's office:

No. 1: In March of 2001, he was charged with possession of methamphetamine, possession of drug paraphernalia and possession of marijuana. In March of 2002, he pled guilty to possession of methamphetamine and received a 3-year deferred sentence.

No. 2: In December 2001, he was charged with trafficking methamphetamine. In March 2002, he pled guilty to attempted manufacturing of methamphetamine and received a 3-year deferred sentence.

No. 3: In December 2002, he was charged with trafficking by manufacturing, child abuse, possession of a felony narcotic and tampering with evidence. On July 14, 2003, he received a 9-year sentence in prison -- with 5 years suspended and 5 years probation.

At the same time, his prior two cases had his probation revoked and a 3-year concurrent sentence was imposed on both.

In addition, charges of trafficking a controlled substance by manufacturing, possession of a controlled substance, and possession of paraphernalia, offenses which allegedly occurred on April 8, 2003, were dismissed.

The result of all this: Ward has been sent to prison for four years (including time served).



PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 68, Section 1)

HJR 68, Section 1 would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use excess receipts in the Veterans' Land and Veterans' Housing Assistance funds for payment of revenue bonds, and use excess assets in those funds to provide veterans homes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide veterans homes for the aged or infirm and to make principal, interest, and bond enhancement payments on revenue bonds."

PROPOSITION 2 (HJR 51)

HJR 51 would expand from six months to two years the period in which the former owner of a mineral interest that was sold for unpaid property taxes may buy back the mineral interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to establish a two-year period for the redemption of a mineral interest sold for unpaid ad valorem taxes at a tax sale."

PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 55)

HJR 55 would authorize the legislature to exempt from taxation land owned by a religious organization that is leased for use as a school or that will be used to expand or construct a place of religious worship that vields no revenue.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property owned by a religious organization that is leased for use as a school or that is owned with the intent of expanding or constructing a religious facility."

PROPOSITION 4 (SJR 30)

SJR 30 would authorize the legislature to allow conservation and reclamation districts to use taxes to develop and finance certain parks and recreation facilities. Also, the amendment would authorize the legislature to allow local elections for the issuance of bonds to improve and maintain parks and recreational facilities in the Tarrant Regional Water District or a conservation and reclamation district located in whole or in part in Bastrop, Bexar, Brazonia, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Montgomery, Tarrant, Travis, Waller or Williamson County.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the use of income and appreciation of the permanent school fund."

PROPOSITION 10 (HJR 61)

HJR 61 would authorize municipalities to donate surplus fire-fighting equipment, supplies, or materials to the Texas Forest Service, which would be authorized to distribute based on need the equipment to rural volunteer fire departments.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as . follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate surplus fire-fighting equipment or sup-plies for the benefit of rural volunteer fire departments."

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 85)

HJR 85 would authorize the legislature to regulate the operation of wineries in Texas, regardless of whether a winery is located in an area in which the sale of wine has been authorized by local option election.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "A constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to enact laws authorizing and governing the operation of wineries in this state."

PROPOSITION 12 (HJR 3)

HJR 3 would immediately authorize the Legislature to limit non-economic damages assessed against a provider of medical or health care and, after January 1, 2005, to limit awards in all other types of cases.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment concerning civil lawsuits against doctors and health care providers, and other actions, authorizing the legislature to determine limitations on non-economic damages."

PROPOSITION 13 (HJR 16)

HJR 16 would authorize a county, city, town, and junior college district to freeze property taxes on a residential homestead of a person who is disabled or aged 65 or older.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit counties, cities and towns, and junior college districts to establish an ad valorem tax freeze on residence homesteads of the disabled and of the elderly and their spouses."

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 28)

HJR 28 would authorize the Texas Department of Transportation to issue

PROPOSITION 15 (HJR 54)

HJR 54 would prohibit a local retirement system and the political subdivision that finances the retirement system from reducing or otherwise impairing certain accrued benefits under the local retirement system.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The Constitutional amendment providing that certain benefits under certain local public retirement systems may not be reduced or impaired."

PROPOSITION 16 (SJR 42)

SJR 42 would amend the Texas Constitution to allow home equity lines of credit and allow refinancing of a home equity loan with a reverse mortgage loan.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home equity line of credit, providing for administrative interpretation of home equity lending law, and otherwise relating to the making, refinancing, repayment, and enforcement of home equity loans."

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 21)

HJR 21 would prohibit an increase in school property taxes on residence homesteads of disabled persons.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit an increase in the total amount of school district ad valorem taxes that may be imposed on the resi-dence homestead of a disabled person."

PROPOSITION 18 (HJR 59)

HJR 59 would authorize the legislature to permit a person to assume an office of a political subdivision without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that office and the election is required by the Texas Constitution. This proposition applies only to local political subdivisions, whereas Proposition 8 applies to state and local political subdivi-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a person to assume an office of a political subdivision without an election if the person is the only caudidate to qualify in an election for that office."

PROPOSITION 19 (SJR 45)

SJR 45 would repeal the legislature's

PROPOSITION 20 (SJR 55)

SJR 55 would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in a total amount not to exceed \$250 million that will be used to provide loans for economic development projects that benefit defense-related communities in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds or notes not to exceed \$250 million payable from the general revenues of the state to provide loans to defense-related communities, that will be repaid by the defense-related community, for economic development projects, including projects that enhance the military value of military installations."

PROPOSITION 21 (SJR 19)

SJR 19 would authorize current and retired faculty members of a public institution of higher education to receive compensation for service as a member of the governing body of a water district.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a current or retired faculty member of a public college or university to receive compensation for service on the governing body of a water district."

PROPOSITION 22 (HJR 84)

HJR 84 would authorize the appointment of a temporary replacement officer to serve on behalf of a state, district, or local public officer who is called into active military duty for longer than 30 days.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the appointment of a temporary replacement officer to fill a vacancy created when a public officer enters active duty in the United States armed forces."







County cotton, corn crops take a beating

I'm sure you know about the horrible damage that was done to our cotton and corn crop this past June.

Well, here's the latest from Parmer County Extension Agent Cody Hill:

About 80 percent of the cotton and about 1,000 acres of corn in Parmer County were destroyed due to the hail we got back in June.

"We normally would have 85,000 - 95,000 acres of cotton planted, but not this year, thanks to all the






