Aycock receives state prison post; resigns as **Parmer County attorney**

Parmer County voters head to the polls on Tuesday to vote in the Democrat and Republican primaries. And there has been a last-second change.

The GOP primary had been expected to have a race for county attorney between incumbent Charles Aycock and Jeff Actkinson, current assistant county attorney.

But Aycock was appointed last week by Gov. Perry to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles, effective immediately. This is a fulltime position.

Thus, Aycock has resigned as county attorney and is urging voters to support Actkinson. Aycock also will ask the county commissioners to appoint Actkinson to fill the remainder of Aycock's unexpired term, through the end of this year.

Aycock, former state Bar Association president, served as county attorney for nearly 23 years. In his new state position, he will have an office in Amarillo, while spending time also in Austin and Huntsville.

Aycock is one of seven members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles. This job, involving prisoners, entails:

- Determines whether to parole a person.
- Determines conditions of parole.
- Revokes paroles.

· Recommends to the governor whether to grant clemency in death cases.

No one filed in the Democrat primary for county attorney, so Actkinson will be unopposed in the fall gen-


Auction a big success

Democrats

Bobbie Pierson is seeking re-election for a second term as county tax assessor-collector. Since no Republicans signed up for this post, she is headed for reelection without opposition.

There is a race for one county commissioner's post.

For Pct. 3, the Farwell area, Michael Haseloff and incumbent Ed Corn are vying. The winner of this race will face Ronald Byrd, a Republican, in the general election.

There are no candidates for the Pct. 1 (the Friona area) commissioner's post. Thus, the winner of the GOP primary will be unopposed in November.

Also on the primary ballot:

-- Charles Stenholm is unopposed for the U.S. Representative post in the primary. He will face incumbent Republican Randy Neugebauer in the general election. Stenholm currently also is serving in Congress but, due to last year's state redistricting, finds himself in Neugebauer's district.

-- Robert White is unopposed as county chairman.

-- Elaine King Miller is unopposed for the state senate post.

-- Presidential preferences, with candidates John Edwards, Joe Lieberman, John Kerry, Lyndon LaRouche Jr, Howard Dean, Randy Crow, Al Sharpton, Dick Gephardt, Wesley Clark and Dennis Kucinich. Some of these folks have already dropped out of the race, such as Lieberman, Gephardt and Clark.

-- There are two referendums on the ballot. One asks if you are for or against an end or privatization of Social Security and Medicare programs. The other is for or against a constitutional amendment protecting taxpayers by prohibiting state mandates that require local property tax increases.

Republicans

County Sheriff Randy Geries is unopposed for a second term, and will be re-elected.

Johnny Actkinson is unopposed for re-election as 287th District Attorney. There is one change, though, in that he had been a lifelong Democrat before switching to the GOP this year.

Wednesday, March 10, 2004, is the day to register children for next year's Farwell kindergarten, pre-K and Headstart classes. Registration will be held from 1 to 4 p.m.

All children who will be four and five years of age by September 1 and live in the Farwell School District need to register for next year's classes. Requirements to be eligible for Pre-K and Headstart, a child must be four years old prior to September 1, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced-price lunches), and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Headstart requires income verification (check stub) Medicaid/TANF

Texas school districts are required to provide Pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.
