Letter to the Editor

I am writing this letter to respond to the paragraph in the last Farwell City Council meeting report that dealt with the status of Farwell EMS. In this report, it was stated that there were complaints about the lack of EMS personnel in Farwell and that this was due to "folks not wanting to commit on a weekly basis to attend meetings."

I am not faulting Mayor Jimmie Mace for stating this, if this was indeed what he actually said, or if his comment was perhaps paraphrased or revised. However, I am extremely concerned over the statement and want to share some details of a more accurate nature with the people of Farwell and the surrounding communities.

First, let me state that the lack of personnel becoming involved with Farwell EMS or any volunteer EMS system is not due to a commitment to weekly meetings. Farwell EMS does not meet weekly. It is currently in our bylaws to meet on the first, third and fifth Tuesdays of each month. However, due to the busy schedules of the volunteers that we are comprised of, Farwell EMS has not held to this schedule for many months. We are currently discussing revising our bylaws and going to one meeting a month for all business and planning that needs to be attended to by the organization and utilizing the other two Tuesdays for training and continuing education hours that are required for our certification levels. We are even considering other days and times to meet that would better accomodate all schedules.

The lack of personnel involved in Farwell EMS is an issue that deals with training and certification. With the exception of being a volunteer driver for the ambulance, all other personnel that respond to emergency calls, treat patients on scene, in the ambulance and at the hospital, must be certified at either Emergency Care Attendant (ECA), EMT-Basic, EMT-Intermediate or EMT-Paramedic levels. The EMT levels must all be State certified and licensed and many volunteers proceed with National Registry of their credentials.

I have the pleasure of serving Farwell as a member of the Regional Area Council for the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System. The position I hold was once held by Nancy Roberts, a dedicated and motivated volunteer for Farwell EMS. Upon her retirement from the RAC, I took her place. I have heard for several months now, the plight that many towns and cities are in with the number of volunteers serving their communities in EMS positions. Farwell is not alone in having a small service. Many larger towns are faced with having no service at all due to the lack of volunteers. These communities are now having to hire an outside EMS source to provide service and have 24-hour manned ambulances.

Training courses are hard to come by in our area due to a limited number of instructors and coordinators. I have begun the process of becoming certified to be an instructor, but it takes time. In the interim, I have been actively seeking classes that could be conducted in Farwell or in the are for people to take to become certified. But these classes take time. They also require a commitment from the people to follow it

The Farwell City Council is a proactive council when it comes to EMS, and I'm proud of our council members for their support and encouragement to our service. The city has stood behind us and will provide the funds for anyone willing to commit to and complete an ECA or EMT-Basic licensure class. After the class, the volunteering begins and a major support structure aids every volunteer. Fellow volunteers, the State, the region and even national EMS organizations help to provide consistent and continuous training opportunities and assistance.

I know the frustration and anger that ensues when a Farwell resident calls for help from Farwell EMS and the response time seems extremely long or no response is given from us. When Farwell cannot respond, the mutual aid system goes into action and Texico is paged first, followed by Clovis EMS, Bailey County, Bovina and Lazbuddie EMS. That is the way it is supposed to happen and why mutual aid agreements are in place with these services. We all help each other.

I have been contacted by several people willing to take the training classes once the classes are in place and the wheels are in motion for this. However, it will take some time to finalize the details.

In the meantime, please know that Farwell is being served by a most dedicated group of volunteers that are consistently called upon to serve. We are currently a team of seven. Not everyone can make it to every call, but we are required to have no less than two on the ambulance to respond. We all have jobs, families and commitments that take us out of the community as often as any other resident. But we never leave the area without touching base with a fellow volunteer knowing where we are, how long we'll be gone and who is charge of checking with Farwell Dispatch if we are unable to make a call and to call for mutual aid. Last week, with the exception of Wednesday, Farwell EMS was called out for at least one call a day. On July 7, Farwell received 3 calls within minutes of each other. While we were on the first call, Texico, Clovis and even Bovina responded to the other two. That's the beauty of mutual aid serving far and wide! And, I must add that all the EMS services around the region are staffed with volunteers and paid professionals that are the tops in the field of Emergency Medicine and treatment.

As volunteers, the members of Farwell EMS do the best that we can to respond to the majority of calls received. We meet when it is necessary and we work very hard to improve our skills, our understanding of patient and family/bystander needs, and our organization.

Volunteer EMS does require a commitment, but each member gets out a level of satisfaction from the effort they put into it. It's all about what each one is willing to put into the effort. But with Farwell EMS, the team that we've built and will hopefully keep building upon is worth all the effort you can give. But if our community feels that a volunteer EMS is not what they want or what is needed for service, then the only other options are 1.) a paid service manned 24- hours, seven days a week by salaried professionals with a minimum of four on rotating duty staff. Two certified personnel must be on board the ambulance with a patient in transport or treatment by law. 2.) No service within the city limits or surrounding area currently covered. All 911 and direct EMS calls would be handled by other agencies and services. Only two of the services in the immediate area are always manned services. The others are strictly volunteer who meet on about the same schedule as Farwell EMS.

Warrants issued in armed robbery

Parmer County Sheriff Randy Geries said that warrants were to be issued on July 21 in the armed robbery July 6 of the David Sides residence in Oklahoma Lane.

In that robbery, a gun was held to Sides' head, and shots fired as his wife, Linda, when she arrived home during the robbery.

David was able to warn off his wife and she fled in her car, with one of the robbers firing shots at her. During this time, David got the chance to escape, and he ran outside and hid.

There were two robbers, a man and a woman. Geries said that through an investigation, warrants were to be issued for the pair, from Clovis.

They were tracked down through police procedures, lineup pictures, and a witness.

This robbery was the first of four major criminal events taking place in this area in July.

Last Saturday night, the Houston Bartlett residence several miles north of Bovina was burglar-

On July 13, a gunman robbed Winner's Touch on Avenue A in Farwell.

He took several hundreds of dollars from the attendent and a cash drawer. No one was in-

Then last Saturday night, Farwell Police Chief Robert Achterberg reported that two men (one of whom is believed to have been the long robber previously) entered Winners Touch again, robbing it the same way.

Patrons were again told to lay on the floor, and the robbers took hundreds of dollars of cash from the attendant.

No injuries were reported, but a woman patron was transported to Clovis hospital for an anxiety attack and high pressure, blood Achterberg.

this robbery, Achterberg said one suspect was identified as being a black male, wearing all black clothes and a black and white bandana on his face.

The second suspect was also a black man, about 6 foot tall and skinny. He also wearing all black and had his face covered.

Both suspects brandished handguns.

Surveillance cameras will be installed at the business.

Parmer County Crime Stoppers is offering a reward of up to \$500 for information leading to the arrests of the robbers. The group met Monday and decided on that reward offer.

Congressman to have forum here

Neugebauer will hold a forum at the Farwell Community Center at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, July 28.

Neugebauer will discuss the Risk Management Enhancement Act, a bill he introduced in June.

"One of the goals of the Farm Bill is to give farmers the best risk management tools available," Neugebauer said. "The Risk Management Enhancement Act would allow farmers to buy coverage for both individual and area-wide losses.

With my plan, for a little more premium, you get a lot more coverage."

Neugebauer's builds additional risk protection into crop insurance by giving farmers. the option to stack Group Risk Protection (GRP) coverage on top of an inInsurance (MPCI) policy. Farmers can choose to purchase GRP coverage up to the deductible portion of the individual policy, not to exceed 100 percent.

Congress has passed more than \$30 billion in emergency assistance packages in recent years to help producers who have suffered substantial crop loss. The enhanced insurance coverage in Neugebauer's legislation would help reduce the need for such packages in the future.







What a higher school enrollment also means

The main articles on Page 1 of the Aug. 30, 1918, issue of the Texico-Farwell News obviously dealt with World War I news. But there was local news aplenty.

It was announced that Texico Schools would open Sept. 2. There apparently was a housing shortage and "it seems Texico's vacant houses are now rented by families and students from all surrounding districts, Roosevelt County, Bovina and from the north and west are asking for rooms. I am asking each of you to assist the School Board and me to find rooms and houses for these boys and girls who are "knocking at our doors" for admittance -- let's get busy quick."

And it was noted that the higher the school enrollment, "it means the sale of more groceries, dry goods and all merchandise."

The Texico faculty was still not complete but hired so far were Mrs. Watson, Miss Curtis, Miss Skidmore, Miss Kays, Miss Nichols and J.H. Kays. They were still needed teachers for Spanish and "domestic science."

In other Page 1 articles:

-- The "Illinois Picnic" was a great success at Twin Mills. Officers were elected with James McDowell as president and Edith Morse as secretary.

-- Forest Long and Anna Porter got married. The groom was holding a post with the Farmers State Bank at Texico.

-- A notice to farmers: the conditions of the country will make binder twine and binder repairs scarce. So all farmers are asked to buy these items early.

-- Recent rains had made the Main Street in Texico impassible due to "the terrible chug holes ... so the city has had it graded from the railroad down to K.R. Runnel's lumber yard."

-- A stockholder's meeting of the Western Tire Mfg. Co in Texico was set for Sept. 7.

-- The News announced it would have a special edition of 12 pages for Sept. 10. More than 5,000 copies were to be published. The issue was to give the "best illustrations and descriptive outline of Texico/Farwell, her community, her people and her industries."

Page 2 had a column on "Friona locals," noting the big ice cream social. Tom Stater and Boone Turner were working in real estate, and J.D. Moore had sold his farm to Ernest Houlette.

There were more war stories, of course, with the U.S. Civil Service Commission saying there was a pressing need for more stenographers. And the end could be seen for the war with the Germans on the retreat.

Page 3 again had the full page ad for the Cannon Ball Motor Co., which has been covered in previous articles in the Tribune.

Page 4 had two large ads -- one for the Triplett Bros. dry dogs, groceries and shoe store; and the other for Barry Hardware Co. -- "the store that stays."

This page contained lots of local tidbits, such as: -- L.,J. Morris and his wife are now running the

Parmer House in Farwell. -- Sara Winn spent the weekend with her family in

-- The Baptist Convention at Pleasant Hill began.

-- Prof. J.H. Kays and Prof. E.A. White attended That's exactly what I





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

From the Desk of the City Manager Ernest Terry: As I look over my desk, there are several projects un-

· Foremost is the fiscal year 2005 budget that the Bovina City Council has been working on for a couple of months. Four years ago, Bovina's budget was about \$450,000, and next year it looks like it will be \$2.7 million. And this will be the third year in a row that the city

has cut taxes! How?

The City's normal revenue is about \$750,000. This increase, over four years ago, is due to making timely and efficient bank deposits, effective collections of City services, and greater attention paid to City sales taxes and franchise fees.

We have been very fortunate to obtain grant funding; we expect another \$112,500 in grant money next year for a Rescue Truck for the Bovina Volunteer Fire Depart-
