

Officials Plan for Greater County Fair in '55

Officers and directors of the Parmer County Fair and Dairy Association put their heads together Friday night for some specific plans on the coming fair, which this year will be September 8-10. The meeting, which was held in the Villa Cafe in Friona, was at-

tended by Clyde Hays, John Getz, Bill Sheehan, Dick Habbinga, County Agent Joe Jones, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Brummett, Mack Bainum, Mrs. Woolbright, and HD Agent Corinne Stinson. A minimum of \$1500 will be needed to run the fair again this year,

and various persons are being enlisted to solicit contributions in communities in and around Parmer County for the financing of the fair. Bill Sheehan, who is secretary for the Association, will work in Friona; John Getz and Walter Kalt-

wasser will work in Farwell, Lariat and Clovis; Clyde Hays will work in Black; Mrs. D. Brown in Muleshoe; and Mrs. Woolbright and Mrs. Brummett in Hereford. Improvements for the fairground facilities include the building of shelves and racks for women's exhibits, and opening the east end of the fair barn and sealing the south door, which is adjacent to swine exhibits.

Special emphasis is being placed on the parade this year, which will be Saturday of fair weekend in downtown Friona at 3 o'clock. Dick Habbinga is parade marshal. He announced that floats will be

divided into these groups: commercial, civic and social, riding clubs, bands, schools, and kiddies. Prizes will be awarded to top entries from each group. Persons desiring to enter competition must register with the fair secretary before 9 o'clock the morning of the parade. The following prizes have been announced for parade winners: Kiddies—\$5, \$3, \$2. Schools—\$25, \$15, \$10. Bands—\$25, \$15, \$10. Commercial—\$15, \$10, \$5. Civic and Social—\$15, \$10, \$5. Riding Clubs—\$15, \$10, \$5.

Additional entertainment for fair

visitors seems to be in store this year. The Friona American Legion and Auxiliary will sponsor bingo, doll racks, a dunking board, and a cake walk. Getz is to contact the Clovis Lions to determine if playground equipment can be borrowed, the Progressive Study Club will sell soft drinks and pie, a queen will be named for the fair with votes being worth one cent each, a fiddlers' contest will be held, and there will be a fishing pond, talent show, and numerous contests for fairgoers. The next meeting of the fair board is scheduled for August 26.

Segregation Ends At Farwell School

In accordance with the Supreme Court decision of recent months, the Farwell school board acted Monday night to end segregation at that school, effective with the coming term.

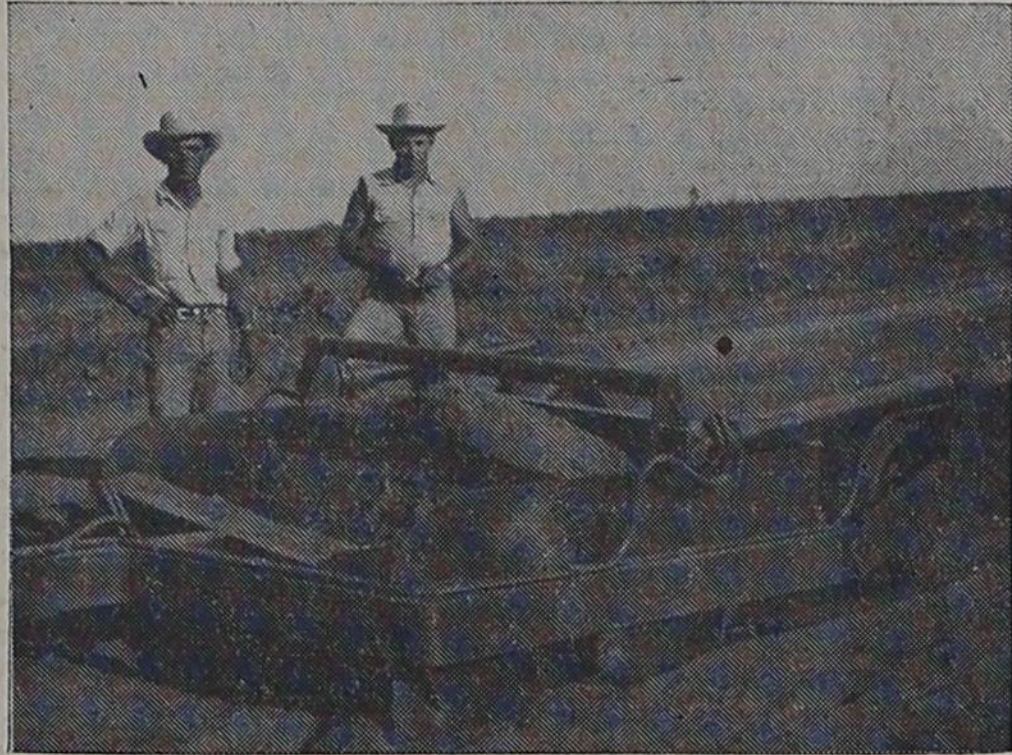
When disclosing the decision, Supt. Jack Williams said that he had been authorized by the board to announce that integration would begin, and explained, "Farwell Schools will adhere to the Supreme Court ruling on segregation."

The past year, a Negro teacher was employed by the system, and about 17 students were schooled in separate facilities on the campus. Negro enrollees are expected to be comparable in number this year.

All colored students will be in the grade school.

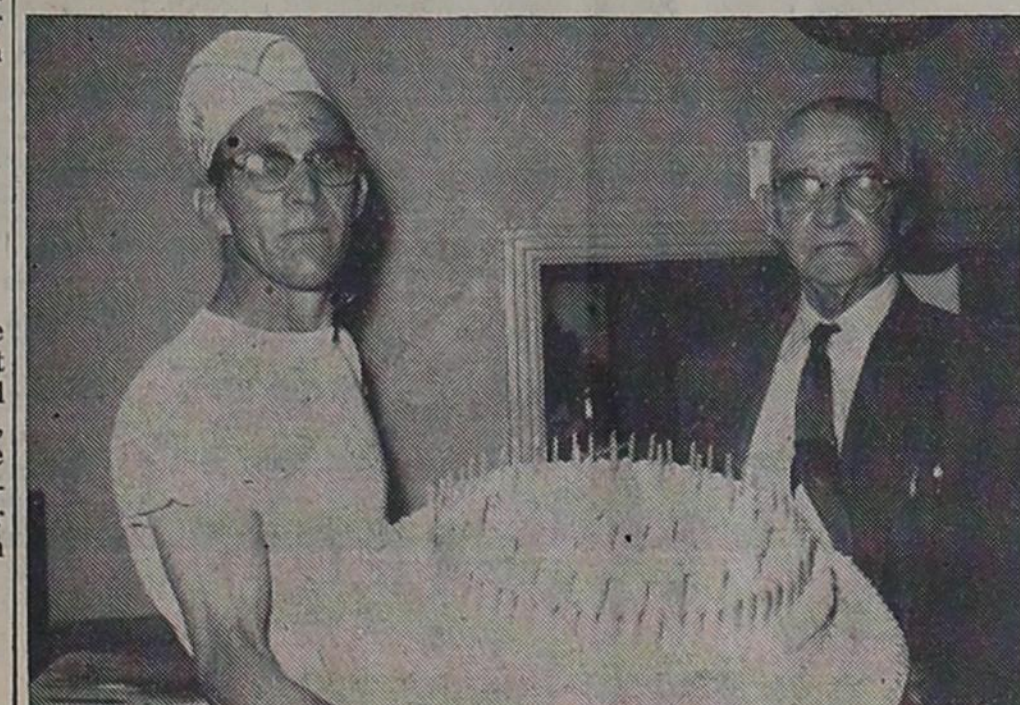

New Scraper Added To SCD Equipment

Cooperators of the Parmer County Soil Conservation District now have another handy piece of conservation equipment at their disposal, it was revealed this week.

Donald Webb, work unit conservationist for the SCS office, reports that the new Engler hydraulically-operated scraper is already hard at work on farms in the District, and will prove to be a very handy piece of equipment.

The scraper, which is all-steel construction except for two rubber tires, has a blade near the bottom and front of the dirt carrying part of the machine, and can plane off three yards of soil and transport it elsewhere in the field at the operator's choosing.

Hydraulic lifts actuate the mechanism, which can be pulled behind an ordinary size farm tractor. It will be used primarily for bench leveling in the District, although it is suited for any type of dirt moving or field leveling, points out Webb.

Delivery of the machine was made from McAllen last week. The cost was \$975.

Cotton Promotion Theme of Meeting

"How a Brighter Future Can Be Shaped for Cotton, the Nation's Leading Agricultural Commodity," will be the topic discussed by John T. Gregg, West Texas representative of the National Cotton Council, when he addresses a meeting arranged by Parmer County Farm Bureau, Friday, August 19th, at 8:30 p. m. in the Friona School Auditorium. Betty Hawkins and her western band will provide entertainment for the group.

In a statement made in advance of his talk, Gregg said "Cotton has made tremendous strides in the past fifteen years. Since the National Cotton Council was founded in 1939, domestic consumption has gone up by three million bales a year.

"A virtual revolution has taken place in operating methods all the way from the farm to the mill. The cotton industry has built a new competitive power and a new confidence to push on to ever greater achievements."

The Council field representative warned, however, that efforts cannot slacken.

"While competitors have been pushed back for the time being, it's only a lull," he said. "They'll be back. New synthetic fibers are coming on the market all the time. The total of cotton's competition adds up to more than six million bales annually. What's more, cotton's rivals are powerful and highly

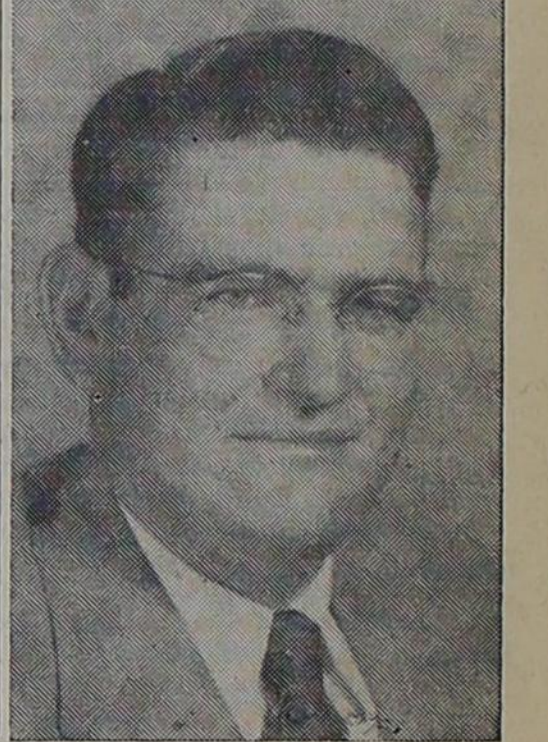

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

... And There's Another Side of the Story, Too

If, after reading the editorial reprint from Grain & Feed Journal concerning low-income farmers, in last week's Tribune, and you didn't quite agree with that viewpoint, the following is a presentation of the other side of the proposal in the best terms the writer knows how to tell it.

Our purpose in presenting two points of view is in the hope of unfolding more than one side of this new Rural Development program which is sure to be a controversial topic in months to come.

As to which viewpoint we would endorse, we would prefer to only give our opinion on the local situation, which would be that such a program is not needed.

In cases elsewhere in the nation where circumstances are much different, however, there may be some justification for the program's inception.

The USDA's new Rural Development Program, as first revealed by President Eisenhower in April, is aimed at assisting with the programs of low-income farmers in the nation who are not presently earning a decent standard of living.

Statistics from the Department indicate that perhaps as many as 25 percent of the farm families of the nation exist on a cash income of less than \$1000 per year. If this is true, then it is evident that a large percent of the rural families are living far below standards accepted as average for American citizens.

Farm workers, part-time farmers, and "hit-and-miss" farmers are exempt from this study.

The program suggests these five points: (1) More credit to low-income farmers, (2) Increase efforts to enlarge employment opportunities in areas affected, (3) Better education and vocational training, (4) promotion of improved health and extension of social security, (5) Encouragement of local participation in the program.

If, when re-convening, Congress acts favorably upon this program, then within the coming 12 months "pilot" programs, in 50 low-income counties of the country will be started. These first programs will test the effectiveness of the project as a whole.

The majority of the low-income counties are concentrated in the Southeast, although there are scattered spots of such areas all over the rest of the country, the USDA points out.

The President: Did You Say Republican

Take a few moments and size up the work just finished by the first session of the 84th Congress. It's a funny turn of events. The Republican administration gave out with a long list of liberal-like requests, which, for the most part, a conservative-like, Democratically-controlled Congress rejected!

For instance:

Ike's big highway project—one of the most colossal domestic proposals of all time. Congress said no.

The President wanted more federal aid for building schools. Nope, said congress.

The health re-insurance plan was an administration brainchild. Congress axed it.

Mr. Eisenhower asked for 70,000 new public

New Motor Grader Bought By Court

Precinct No. 4 (Lazbuddie) took delivery on a new Caterpillar No. 12 diesel motor grader this week, following authorization of the purchase by the Parmer County commissioners Monday.

The purchase price of the new machine was \$15,430. Of this amount, \$2,050 was defrayed as a trade-in allowance for a machine previously in use in the precinct.

Tom W. Carpenter Equipment Company of Amarillo was seller of the new machine.

To finance the investment, the court authorized the purchase of three warrants of \$3200 each, which will mature on April 15 of 1956, 1957, and 1958. The difference was made up from money in the county's road and bridge fund.

In other action taken Monday, the commissioners requested surplus state lateral road funds totaling \$27,843.73, which will be placed on deposit for the county Sept. 1.

When we were trying to get a semblance of an education and at the same time, maintain all the oddities of a teen-ager, we could listen to music on the radio, carry on a conversation with a girl down the hall, and read next day's history assignment. Along about this time every year when the last month of the summer calendar has been turned, we realize two things—it is fair time again, and school will begin right away.

There are thousands of things to be done before these big events. After the fair and the opening of school, summer is officially over—and football, basketball and civic activities will be in full swing again.

We read a story last week about a Missouri mother who gave birth to twins. The couple has 13 children of their own and six pieces and nephews they are rearing.

Our nomination for the understatement of the year would be the husband's remark "the twin boys came as a reward for his wife's patience. She always wanted to have twins."

With 17 children, the mother would have to be "most" patient.

There are so many lovely cucumbers available this season and this is perfect salad weather—so if you would like to try something a little different and one which makes a pretty dish, you might like a jellied cucumber mold. Ronny and the writer like it fine, but since Sonny doesn't care for anything containing gelatin, he doesn't know what he's missing.

We use a tuna salad with fresh sliced tomatoes and crisp lettuce leaves, to serve with the molded salad.

Jellied Cucumber Mold
1 env. plus 1/2 tsp. plain gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 cup hot water
1/4 cup cider vinegar
2 tbs. lemon juice
2 to 4 tabs. granulated sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
2 to 3 drops green food coloring
1 large cucumber

Add gelatin to cold water, let stand for a few minutes, then add hot water and stir until dissolved. Add vinegar, lemon juice, sugar, salt and enough food coloring to make liquid a delicate green. Cool until mixture begins to jell. While mixture is cooling, lightly oil 1-quart casserole. Wash and pare cucumber, flute surface and cut 12 to 16 thin slices, then dice remainder fairly fine.

Arrange fluted cucumbers around sides and outer edge at bottom of casserole. Fold diced cucumber into thickened gelatin, pour carefully into mold and chill.

Invert on cold plate, and arrange tuna or shrimp salad around mold.

chiefs become little snuffle rags after laundering. This isn't always true, and our friends always have better luck than we.

But the next time we hear of a bargain, we will be there.

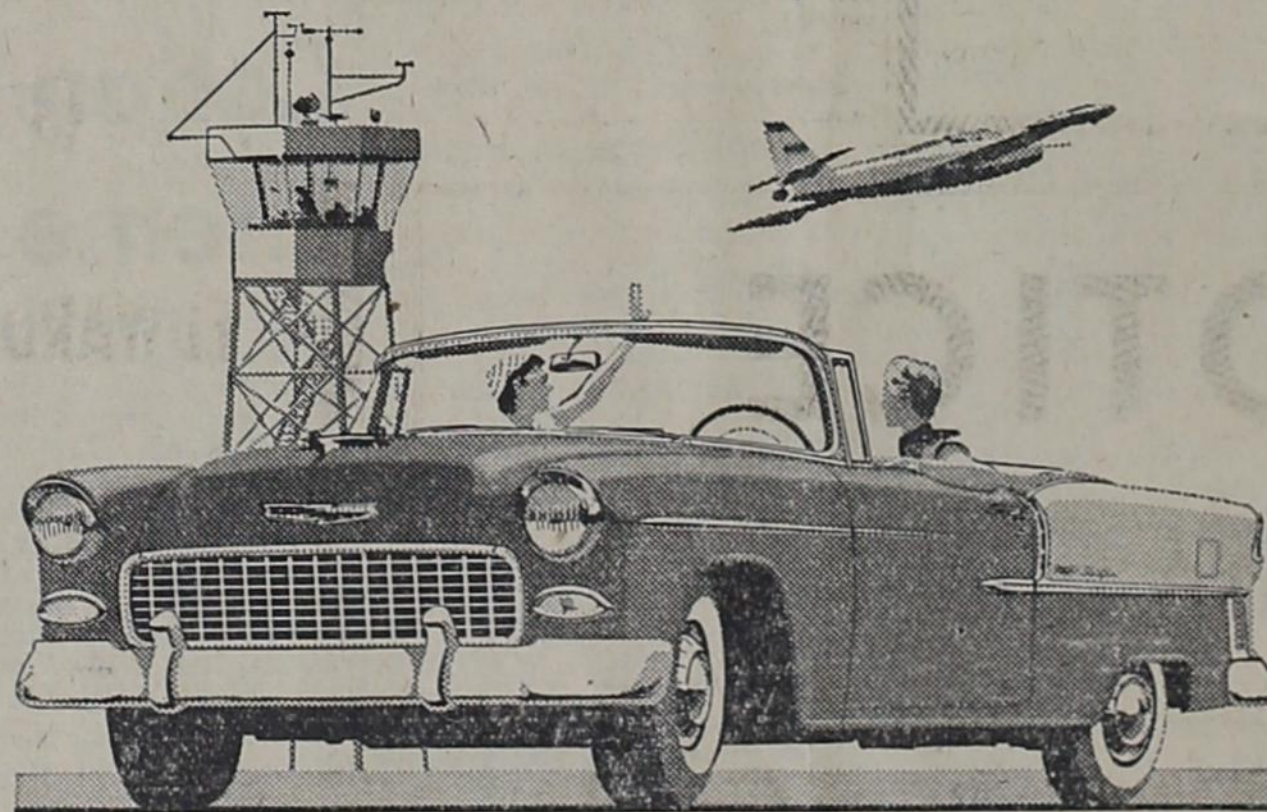

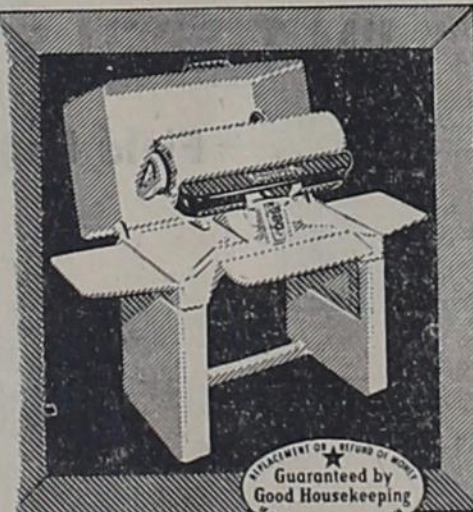

Circus Motif To Highlight Show

The new Agriculture Show of the 1955 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 7-23, will show how the consumer benefits through agricultural research to improve Texas crops.

"Your Stake in Agricultural Research" will be the theme of the show, which is presented by the State Fair in cooperation with the Texas A&M System. Circus-style decorations will carry out the motif of "The Greatest Show From Earth" under the "Agricultural Big Top."

Central features of the show will include a merry-go-round displaying the amount of different Texas agricultural products used by the average family in a year, and a "know what you're buying" demonstration on selection and preparation of foods. Outstanding 4-H teams from all over the state will put on demonstrations in the 4-H Club exhibit.

A "menagerie" exhibit will offer a peek into the future of Texas agriculture, showing nine new and coming crops which have recently been produced or which are now being developed by research. Such unfamiliar crops as sesame, red grapefruit, hybrid onions, Southern peas and coastal Bermuda grass will be displayed.

Individual exhibits will be devoted to grain sorghum, cotton, progeny testing of beef cattle, sheep and wool, poultry, insect control, disease control, farm mechanization, soil building, dairy management and forestry.

All of the exhibits will carry out the gay circus motif. For example, a fat cigar-smoking rooster will be the "barker" in the poultry exhibit, where cage-layers will be an attraction. A big elephant pulling a circus wagon will demonstrate that "it takes power to do the job" in the display on advances in mechanization. A magician with a wand will point out the magic of legumes in the soil building exhibit.

The Agriculture Show also will include exhibits of the Texas A&M System, Texas Technological College, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers. A king-size map of Texas will show the different types of soil common to the various sections of the state.

fear from skin divers, black bass shy away. But it has been determined, explained the Chief Aquatic Biologist, that if the diver will descend quietly and sit on the bottom, the blacks will finally emerge.

He reported the experience of one skin diving fan who went over the side to locate a black bass concentration and determined what bait they preferred. Returning to the surface as an ordinary angler, this best-dressed-fisherman-of-1955 began using a certain type of spinning lure and "made a killing."

The Chief Aquatic Biologist said scientists do not consider this technique to comprise unfair tactics. "After all," he explained, "we have over populations of fish in most areas. The problem is how to catch them."

BRAZORIA, A TOWN FOR NEWS

Brazoria was the scene for the founding of many early-day Texas newspapers.

The fifth newspaper was The Advocate of the People's Rights, published by John A. Wharton and Oliver H. Allen the next year.

Theodore Ledger and A. P. Thompson were founders of the eighth newspaper, The Texas Planter, in 1837.

Skin Diving Seen As Aid To Fishermen

Use of skin diving techniques to study fish for the general purpose of aiding anglers is under consideration by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

The Commission's Chief Aquatic Biologist said formal request has been made of the Federal government to use Dingell-Johnson funds, derived from a special tax on fishing gear, to finance the projects.

The program, if authorized, will be first used in Lake Travis of the Highland Lakes chain, because it has unusually clear water. The studies eventually would be made in other Texas lakes.

Primary objectives would be to locate black bass concentrations; determine what lures will entice them and pass such information on

to the anglers; study habitat conditions that cause bass to gather in certain areas in preference to others; and spot schools of rough fish and inform the bonded commercial fishermen under contract where to set nets to increase the take of rough fish.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist said major emphasis would be placed at the start in observing black bass in Lake Travis. "We have reason to believe that there is a greater black bass population in Lake Travis than is reflected in fishermen's catches," he said. "But our studies have not been complete. For one thing, black bass are so skittish or smart we do not get representative catches of that species in our netting observations. Black bass simply are too cagey and do not get caught in the same proportion to other kinds of fish. By actually observing the behavior of bass around net sets

we hope to obtain a correction factor in order to arrive at a more correct estimation of the bass population in our lakes."

He said the wariness of black bass is typified in their attitude toward skin divers as shown in experiments already made. While carp, buffalo, panfish, catfish and other species show no particular

Fire Damages Butane Tank on Osborn Farm

Firemen were called at 7 a. m. Saturday morning to extinguish a fire which occurred on the Sloan Osborn farm, six miles west of Friona. The fire was reported by Sloan Osborn from the Roy Clements place.

Two workers, Calvin Nazworth and Cecil Mandrell, were filling an auxiliary tank from a large storage tank, which was located about 100 yards east of the house, when the fire occurred. It is not known exactly how the fire got started, but Chief Bainum believes that it was either ignited by sparks or someone was smoking a cigarette too close to the tank.

Both Nazworth and Mandrell were taken to the Friona hospital for emergency treatment and then released. Their burns were not believed to be serious.

Damage is estimated at about \$500. Items which were included in the fire was a large farm truck containing a 200 gallon tank, which was almost destroyed and the large butane tank on the ground had all the valves burned out before firemen could control the blaze.

Chief Bainum says that the firemen extinguished the fire in about 1½ hours.

To get on with the Friona baseball story.

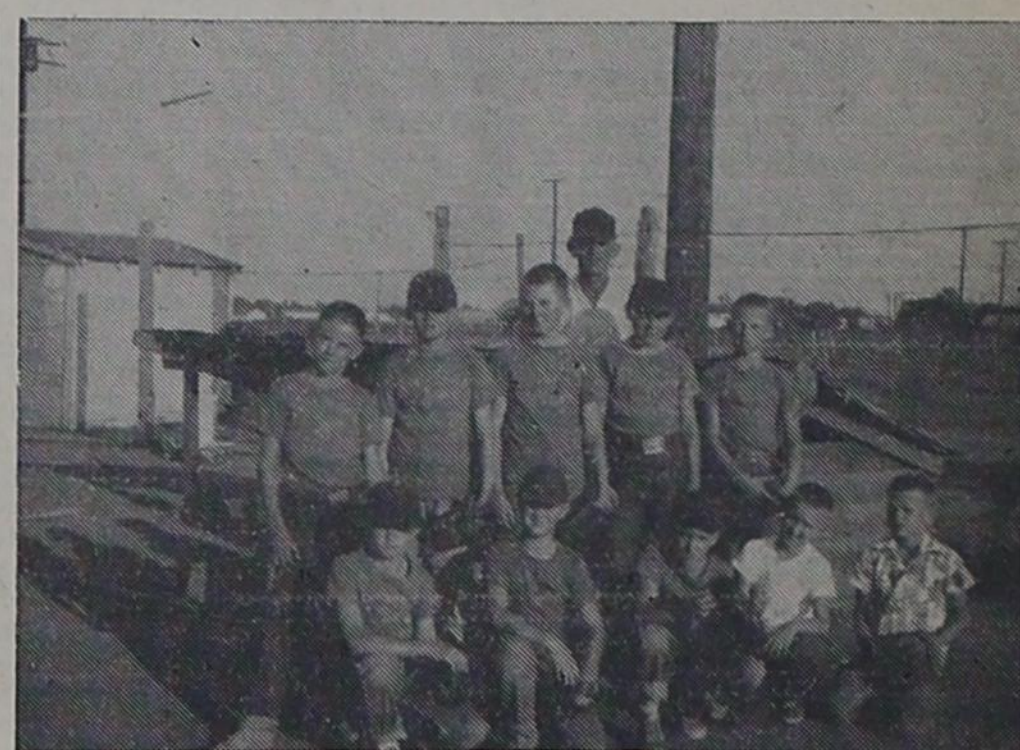

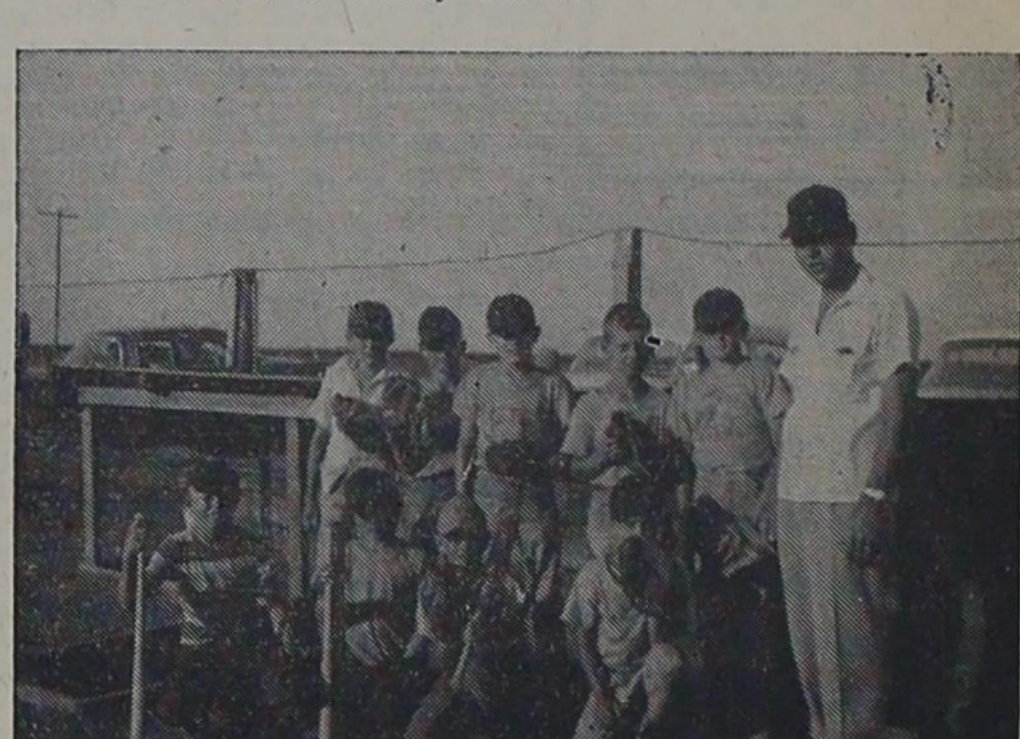
