This bindweed infestation is just a whole lot worse than even the most pessimistic had feared a few months ago. It seems to be coming up along the road rights-ofway everywhere, and threatening fields on every side.

If there ever was a cause for farmers to unite against, it should be this noxious weed scourge. Those who have fought it tell us that it is fantastic how this plant sometimes called possession vine, can gobble up everything in its path, seemingly immune to most control measures.

Farmers who think they have ridded themselves of the weed for a time find it springing up years after an area was thought to be controlled. Such is the hardiness of the plant and the seed it pro-

We think that the work engaged. in by farm organizations and Extension Service personnel in educating rural residents to this threat has been outstanding.

Last year's county production totaled about 12,000,000 bushels. As to what it might soar this year-well, that's anybody's guess, and it's really a little bit too early to start counting chickens. But, the facts are, the way the cards are stacked at this writing, it looks like a whopper.

Let's hope the crop turns out better than have our pre-crop predictions on price prospects. Elevator men point to the current low ebb in grain sorghum prices, and say there isn't much chance that they'll improve any before our grain harvest gets started in a few short weeks.

There are primarily two reasons for this. One is that accelerated rate at which Commodity Credit is disposing of stocks of grain sorghums. That phase is pretty complicated, and hard to

keep up with from week to week. The other reason, though, is the great grain sorghum harvests that are already going on downstate and to the east of us. We receive many, many papers from all over the downstate area, and virtually without exception, all report bumper grain crops for the first time in



# ... And There's Another Side of the Story, Too

If, after reading the editorial reprint from Grain & Feed Journal concerning low-income farmers, in last week's Tribune, and you didn't quite agree with that viewpoint, the following is a presentation of the other side of the proposal in the best terms the writer knows how to tell it.

Our purpose in presenting two points of view is in the hope of unfolding more than one side of this new Rural Development program which is sure to be a controversial topic in months to come.

As to which viewpoint we would endorse, we would prefer to only give our opinion on the local situation, which would be that such a program is not needed.

In cases elsewhere in the nation where circumstances are much different, however, there may be some justification for the program's inception.

The USDA's new Rural Development Program, as first revealed by President Eisenhower in April, is aimed at assisting with the programs of low-income farmers in the nation who are not presently earning a decent standard of living.

Statistics from the Department indicate that perhaps as many as 25 percent of the farm families of the nation exist on a cash income of less than \$1000 per year. If this is true, then it is evident that a large percent of the rural families are living far below standards accepted as average for American citizens.

Farm workers, part-time farmers, and "hit- said the lawmakers. and-miss" farmers are exempt from this study.

The program suggests these five points: (1) More credit to low-income farmers, (2) Increase efforts to enlarge employment opportunities in areas affected, (3) Better education and vocational training, (4) promotion of improved health and extension of social security, (5) Encouragement of local participation in the program.

If, when re-convening, Congress acts favorably upon this program, then within the coming 12 months "pilot" programs, in 50 low-income counties of the country will be started. These first programs will test the effectiveness of the project as a

The majority of the low-income counties are concentrated in the Southeast, although there are scattered spots of such areas all over the rest of the country, the USDA points out.

A group of children from the church, ages 9-13, left Sunday morning for a week of camping at Walther League Camp. They will return home Saturday.




