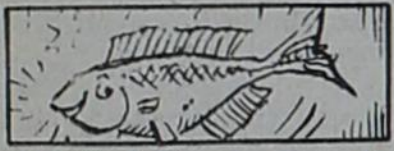
Q. Why is the Texico Post Office front door locked so much more than the front door at Farwell Post Office - for example: Washington's Birthday which was observed this past Monday? [Name withheld by request]

A. We asked this question of Mrs. Louise Engram, Postmaster of the Texico Post Office, and she explained it this way:

The Texico Post Office is in a different Postal district than Farwell and works under different rules. The Texico Post Office is limited as to the number of hours that are allocated to the operation of the facility, and no one is being paid to open and close the front doors on weekends and holidays.

To accomplish this task would entail at least an extra two hours' work that would be charged against the operation of the facility. Two hours is the minimum time for which a person may be paid in postal employment.

Also, Mrs. Engram explained that the last mail received at Texico Post Office on ordinary weekends and holidays is at 7:15 a.m. on Saturday morning; and no-

thing more until the morning of the next regular working day. Therefore, after Saturday morning there is no mail to put up on a Sunday or a following holiday.

Included in Most Valuable player honors was Kevin Hargrove, a senior, who tied with Roy Watley, also a senior, from Vega.

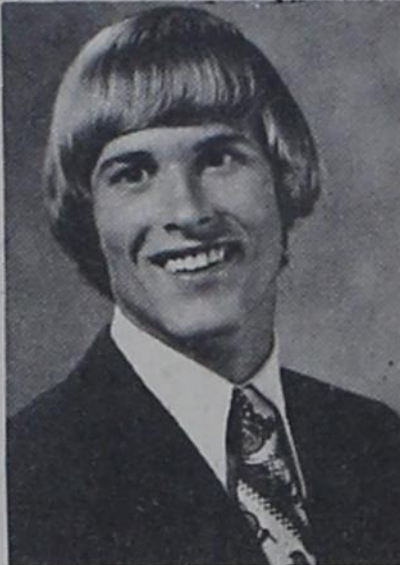

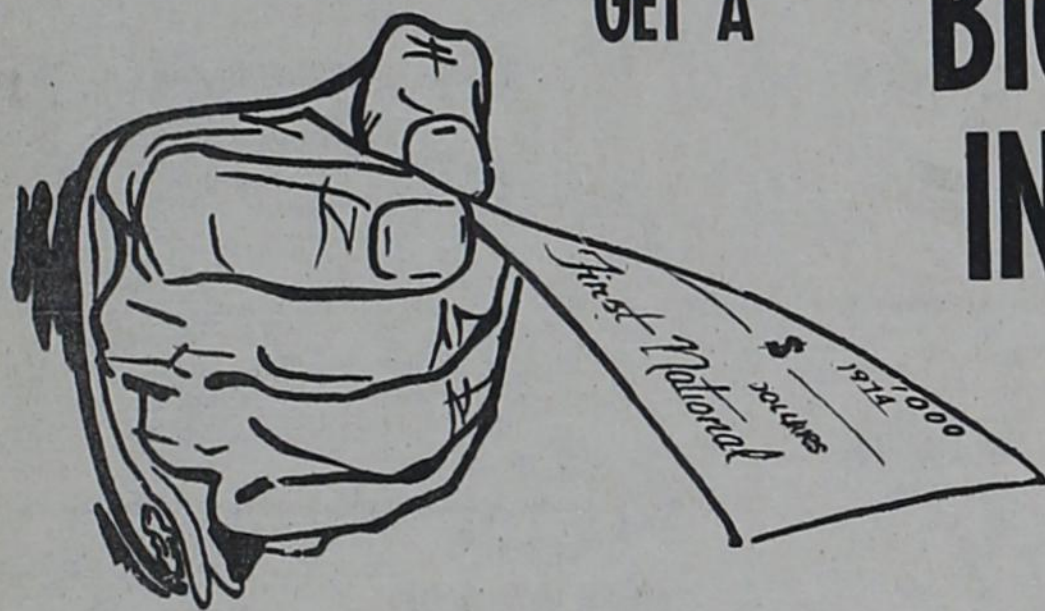

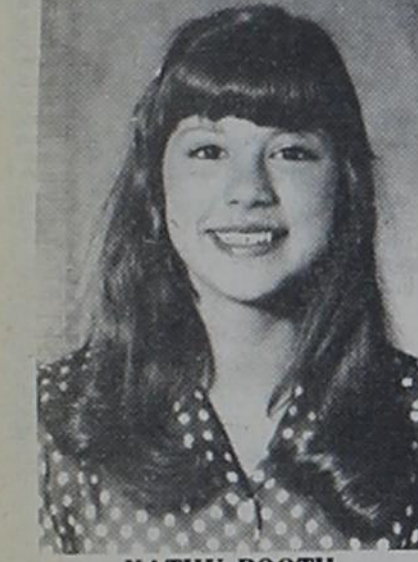

Poison Program Slated

A public meeting for an educational program on the Panhandle Poison Control Center is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Monday, Feb. 25, at the First United Methodist Church in Bovina.

Sponsored by the Parmer County Family Living Committee and the Parmer County Home Demonstration Council, the program will feature emergency information for treatment in the event of poisoning.

Special speaker will be the director of the Emergency Services at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, who will give information and how area residents may use the center effectively and also give basic information on care of persons who have been poisoned.

"We are especially interested in having people who work around herbicides and pesticides," said Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent Jana Pronger, as well as mothers with young children.

The demonstration agent said a nursery will be provided for any mother who attends the program.

In Texas last year, there were nearly 200 fatal poisonings listed as accidental, and Miss Pronger urged everyone to attend the meeting to find out how to prevent such fatalities. "We urge everyone to attend," she concluded, "remember, the life you save may be one of your family members."

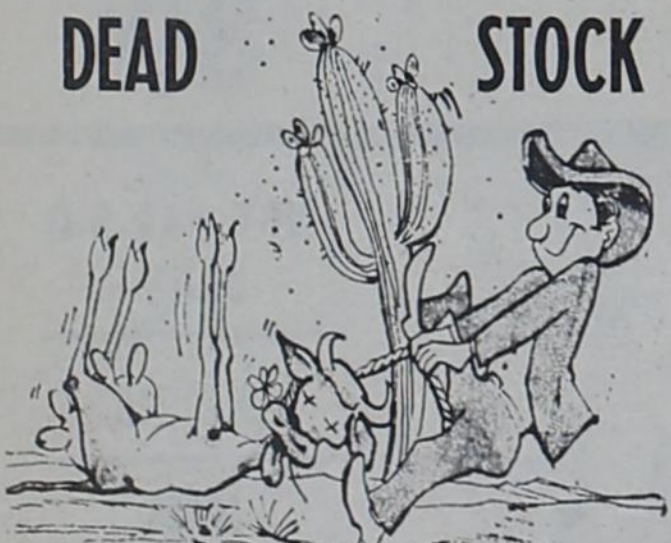

interviews from the previous year were recorded and played back as a TV screen framed the one who was speaking.

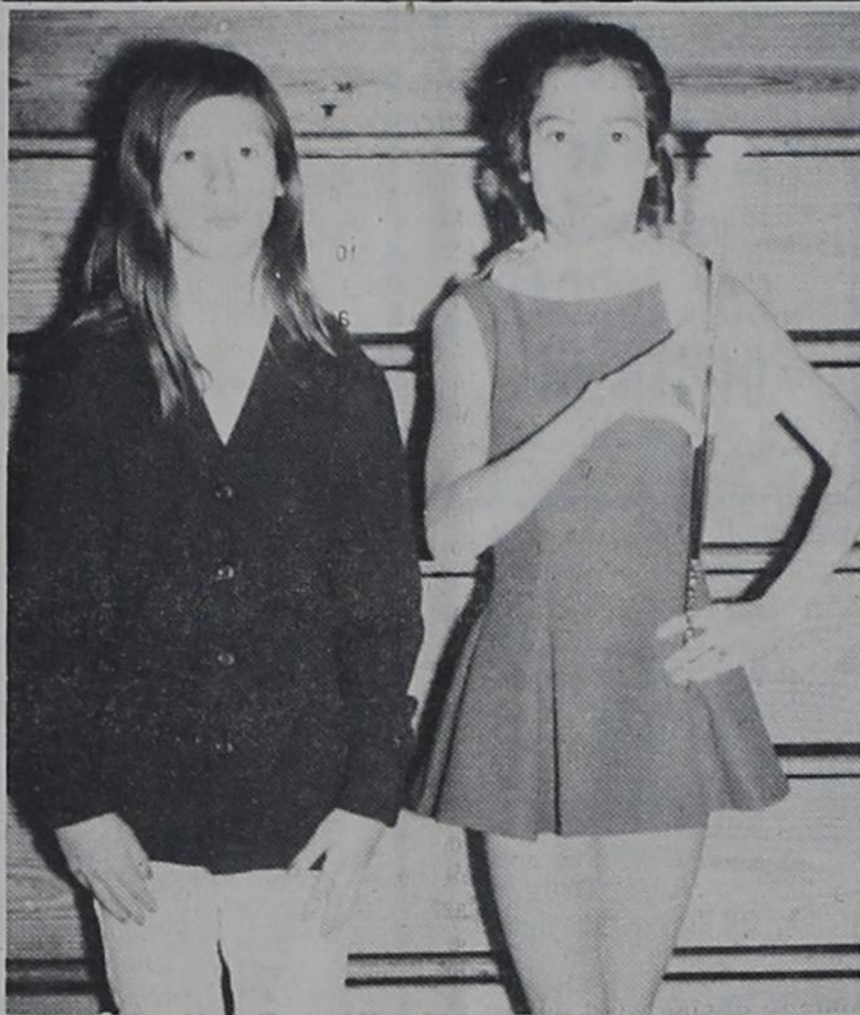
