Grapefruit Sales Drop With Truck-Train Crash

A spectacular truck-train themselves to the grapefruit. crossing crash at 4:51 MDT Thursday afternoon at the Farwell-Texico railroad crossing left one man slightly injured, and widespread damage and scattered grapefruit, with hundreds of cases of grapefruit scattered helterskelter up and down the

Only loose grapefruit dotted the wreck site some two and a half hours later when the wreckage was cleared enough for the train to move off the crossing which was blocked during that time. After the accident, driver of the truck, Ben C. Dean, 51, of Anchorage, Alaska, told persons who flocked to the accident to help Dean was driver of a 1974

Peterbuilt truck, owned by P. A. Bronder of San Antonio. He told investigating officers that he had stopped in a line of traffic at the crossing to let an eastbound train clear the tracks. He, and other witnesses, told officers that the crossing lights were working at the time. When the eastbound train cleared, the lights stopped and traffic started moving.

According to the report, the truck was the fifth vehicle in line and four cars crossed ahead of him. As the driver started across the last of four tracks at the crossing, a westbound train triggered the crossing lights, but too late to avoid the collision.

The truck was hit about 10 feet behind the tractor, less than one-fourth the length of the trailer, and the smashed trailer wrapped around the engine of the train. The train came to a halt several hundred feet from the State Line Road crossing in Texico with the trailer still wrapped around the engine, the windows of the engine and lights smashed.

Engineer of the Santa Fe train, David L. Cheatham of Amarillo, was not injured, but a slight injury was received by E. B. Elliott, also of Amarillo, who was in the train engine. Calls were received by the Clovis State Police Office, the Clovis City Police Department and the Clovis Fire Department Ambulance Service, as well as Texico and Farwell emergency services.

Controlling traffic on the Texas side of the line during the accident was Texas Highway Patrolman Jim Bishop of Farwell, while New Mexico State Police officer Emmett Sparks and Sgt. K. P. Garnett acted as traffic controllers on the New Mexico side. Investigating the accident was Texico City Marshal Butch Foster. He said he issued a citation to the driver of the truck for having no log book.

Both the truck and train moved away under their own power, and wrecker crews from Clovis worked Friday during the day to remove the twisted wreckage of the trailer from the railway roadbed where it had been pulled away from the train. During the time the wrecker crews were working Friday, the Texico Volunteer Fire Department was summoned to the area where cutting torches had started a fire in the tall grass and weeds in the area where they were working on the trailer.

were awarded first and third places, respectively. Phillips is expected to compete in this event later in the season.





Work Smarter

-- Not Harder

"Spring cleaning"--and other housecleaning-doesn't have to be a drudgery, one observer points out.

"To make it an easier, happier time, get organized for the job," Lillian Cochran with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, suggested.

The home management specialist offered several suggestions to reduce cleaning work.

For example, she advised vacuuming rugs or carpets before dusting furniture--vacuuming stirs up dust, which eventually settles on lamps, tables and other furniture.

The soft-bristled brush attachment of a vacuum cleaner offers the most effective way to dust furniture, according to the specialist.

"Although it takes a bit longer, this method gives longer--lasting results since dust goes into the vacuum cleaner--not into the air to

settle elsewhere.

"This attachment also picks up litter and larger pieces of gritty soil without scratching furniture surface--and is acceptable for dusting upholstered furniture, lamp shades and draperies."

To dust acrylic plastic furniture, use a damp cloth, Miss Cochran said.

"A damp cloth cuts down friction of rubbing and helps reduce static electricity--which attracts and holds dust on many places.

"For further cleaning of acrylic plastics, use a solution of mild soap or detergent and lukewarm water--or a regular cleaning concentration of ammonia and water.

"Rinse thoroughly and blot dry with a soft, clean clothsuch as cotton flannel.

"To remove minor scratches and protect surface, wax periodically with car paste wax," the specialist added.

Since Deon planted his grass there have been several thousand acres planted to grass in the district. Included in his study was the operation of water, wastewater, operation of plants and safety and contamination free water systems. All studies were designed to educate operators to better protect the people they serve, according to

He received his certification after completing a formal and specialized education, according to the Texas State Health Department. During the time he was studying, he accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination as given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineering Section.
