## New Regulation On Wheat Deliveries

Although the official information has not yet been received at the local office of the AAA, it was stated here the first of the week that stringent regulations regarding deliveries of the new crop wheat had been announced by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Under the new regulation, the grower will be compelled to sell at least half of the crop of new wheat that he delivers to the country elevators, and the elevator operators, in turn, will be required to earmark not less than one-half of such deliveries for the CCC, leaving the elevator operators one-fourth of the crop produced this year to sell as he chooses for milling.

C. M. Henderson, local elevator operator, explained that the CCC had stepped into the wheat situation in order to get sufficient wheat to meet commitments for foreign shipments.

Asked what control the Corporation might exert over wheat stored on the farm, Henderson expressed the belief that such grain would not be disturbed, "unless the Government sees it is going to fall short on its commitments, in which case the Government might step in and require that farm stored wheat be moved." He added quickly that this was merely a speculation on his part adding "so far as I have been advised, no farm stored grain will be subject to the new regulation."

### Increased Capacity At Bovina Elevator

J. P. Macon, operator of the Macon Elevator at Bovina, is making additional improvements at his elevator and said Saturday that he expected to be ready to handle wheat by June 1st.

The main improvement will be raising the head house of the elevator in order to give an increased gravity flow to grain that is being loaded out in cars. In addition to heightening the head house, storage capacity will be increased another 5,000 bushels, he said.

New motors, new belts and cups are also being installed. Hubert Ellison of Bovina is in charge of the work.

## Parmer Releases 78,000 Bushels Wheat

### Three Unopposed as Deadline Approaches

With June 15 set as the deadline for county and precinct candidates to file with the county chairman their intentions to become candidates for office in the Democratic primary, three county-wide office-holders in Parmer County are still without opposition.

Sheriff Earl Booth, Treasurer Roy B. Ezell and Candidate Charley Lovelace, who is asking the job as county and district clerk, had drawn no opponents early this week, while all other county office-holders were facing contests.

The speculation is that Ezell will be re-nominated unopposed. But the same speculation places at least one opponent in the clerk's race, with a possibility that Booth may also draw some opposition.

In the precinct contests, W. S. Menefee has drawn no opponent in his race for county commissioner of precinct 4, and Bill Flippin is not being contested for his job as commissioner of precinct 1.

There is a different picture in the other commissioner precinct, with John Armstrong and Frank Doshier contesting the seat of Commissioner T. E. Levy in precinct 3, and W. E. McCuan seeking to unseat Floyd Schlenker in precinct 2.

County Judge A. D. Smith is being opposed by Supt. W. O. Cherry, of Bovina, to furnish the only county-wide race yet developed in the coming primary.

From present indications the real fireworks promises to develop in the district races, with Harry Schultz of Dalhart, seeking to replace District Judge John Aldridge of this city, and Floyd H. Richards, Dalhart, out after the job now held by District Attorney King Fike.

In the race for state representative, there are three candidates, with Joe Jennings and I. B. Holt combing the district for votes in an attempt to ease out State Representative Tom Deen.

Filing deadline for district offices comes on June 3, but it is generally believed here that there will be no more entrants.

### Bovina Graduates Have Candlelight Ceremony

An unusual and doubly impressive commencement ceremony for the 1946 Bovina seniors was held, Monday night, with the program being given by candlelight. Just before the exercises began, a transformer blew out, and no electricity was available.

Candles were arranged about the stage, and Dr. A. K. Knott, from West Texas College, Canyon, used the occasion to sidetrack some of his prepared speech to illustrate how adaptable people were to a new situation. The seniors entered carrying lighted tapers, placing them at the foot of the stage.

Musical numbers included a vocal solo by Miss Martha Williams, a class song, and the seniors joined with other members of the school chorus in singing the Alma Mater. Mrs. Edith Cherry was at the piano for the class marches. Rev. Porter gave the invocation, the welcome address was offered by Wm. R. Alverson, the farewell by Dorothy Rhodes, and the benediction by Rev. Roscoe Trostle.

Supt. W. O. Cherry presented the diplomas to Wm. R. Alverson, Ted E. Brock, Denzil Eberting, Ercy A. Hampton, Ray D. Hart, Ruby Pearl Johnston, Sam I. Johnston, Jeraldine Niece, Dorothy Rhodes, John W. Tabor and Macie K. Watson.

On Sunday, the seniors gathered in the morning to hear Rev. L. I. Hill, formerly of Friona and now of Amarillo, deliver the baccalaureate address. Mrs. Cherry played the marches, with Rev. Fred Stump offering the invocation and Rev. Max vocal delivering the benediction. A vocal solo was sung by Macie K. Watson.

### Young People Injured In Car-Truck Crash

Billie Joe Eberting is in a critical condition, Miss Jeraldine Niece sustained bad cuts and four other young people received bruises and scratches as the result of a car-truck accident on the main street in Bovina, Monday night.

Eberting, driver of the car, and Miss Niece were taken to a Clovis hospital following the accident, which occurred a short time after graduation exercises at the Bovina school.

Reports are to the effect that the driver was momentarily blinded by dust and did not see a large truck, parked on main street by highway department workers, until too late to avoid smashing into the rear of the vehicle.

The Eberting car was completely demolished, with the left front door ripped out and left hanging on the rear of the truck. Flying glass was responsible for injury to the group, and it is feared that Eberting has a serious concussion.

Other members of the party were Clifford Smith, Denzil Eberting, a younger brother of the driver; Miss Martha Williams and Miss Delores Wilson. All are from Bovina.

### Foster Qualifies As DHIA Official Tester

Billy Joe Foster, of the Oklahoma Lane community, qualified as a testing supervisor with the Dairy Herd Improvement Association, following a recent school held in Plainview.

The training course was sponsored by the Extension Service, with G. G. Gibson, dairy husbandman, and J. W. Davis, Jr., assistant, in charge.

Classes were held, and practical work was given the class by running an official test on Warren Orr's Jersey herd, and a DHIA test on Jim Rigler's Jersey herd.

Others qualifying as testing supervisors were Rebert Huseman of Nazareth, V. L. Harrington of Levelland, and Clyde M. Teague, Jr., of Tulla. County Agent Lee McElroy announced two weeks ago that several herd owners in this county were anxious to secure the services of a qualified tester, and it is believed that Foster will be kept busy in the county.

### Former Bovina Girl Is Play Co-Author

Information received here reveals that Miss Oleta Rhinehart, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. W. Rhinehart of Bovina, was co-author of the movie "Crime of the Century", which was shown in a Clovis theatre last week.

Miss Rhinehart has been on the writing staff of Republic Studios in Hollywood for the past two years, having gone there from Washington, D. C., where she spent some time. It is understood here that she also co-authored a Broadway play.

### CLIFTS TO AUSTIN

Supt. H. A. Clift and family left the first of the week for points in Texas, where they will visit a few days before going to Austin. At the state capital, Supt. Clift will attend a four-day lecture session dealing with elementary education. They expect to be gone about two weeks.

Responding both to the appeal to take wheat out of storage for use in averting overseas famine, and to the bonus offer of 30c per bushel, Parmer county farmers opened their storehouses last week and turned over thousands of bushels of old wheat to the Commodity Credit Corporation.

In order to get the grain out of storage bins, CCC had offered a premium on wheat during the Emergency Wheat Purchase Program, which closed last Saturday.

Running the records at the local Triple A office, Harold Carpenter reported that forms on file showed a total of 78,337 bushels of wheat delivered to the CCC, and added, "Some of the forms are not yet returned to this office. . . . we expect to show a final total of around 100,000 bushels."

In speaking of the drive to get wheat into trade channels, John B. Martin, AAA supervisor here, remarked that it was his opinion that practically all wheat stored in the county was turned over to the CCC before the deadline. "At \$2.01 a bushel, why keep it in storage?" he added.

In addition to the bonus, farmers were tempted into immediate delivery by the fact that they could receive immediate pay. The AAA office issues "sight drafts" on all wheat delivered under this program.

Considering the fact that Parmer County probably put 100,000 bushels of wheat "in the pot", it was considered likely here that the Texas quota of 500,000 bushels was surpassed.

### Severe Hail Destroys Many Acres Wheat

A reporter in Friona last Saturday learned first hand that the hail storm which swept across that end of the county a week ago was probably the most severe storm that has ever visited Parmer County.

It was impossible to get a tabulation of the losses, calculated to run into the thousands of dollars, to wheat fields that were nearing the harvesting stage. Conservative estimates placed the loss at or near the million-dollar mark.

The storm started at Tucumcari, N. M., and reached to Crosbyton, Texas, varying in width from 12 to 18 miles, and totalling destroying all growing wheat in its path.

W. L. Edelman, who said that he had repeatedly traveled over the Plains section, gave it as his opinion the wheat destroyed was the best in the entire Panhandle between here and Canadian. Many of the fields were estimated to yield 20 bushels.

Edelman is believed to have been the heaviest loser, with 2400 acres completely wiped out. His yield had been estimated at 25,000. Other losses included Charley Noland, a full section; Loyd Lookingbill, 500 acres; B. K. Greeson, full section; Johnson Brothers, 500 acres; Roy Euler, 400 acres; Joe Poindexter, 1000 acres; L. L. Cannon, 300 acres; Pete Buske, 1600; Bruce Par, 80 acres of irrigated.

A check-up revealed that only a very small fraction of the destroyed fields was covered by insurance.

### Allan Shivers Pays Visit To County

Allan Shivers of Jefferson County, candidate for Lt. Governor of Texas, was in Parmer County last Saturday on a whirlwind tour over the Panhandle in the interest of his candidacy.

Shivers is the first state candidate to bring his campaign to this county in the present campaign. After serving twelve years in the Texas Senate, Shivers enlisted in the Army and spent two years in uniform. He has been one of the most promising leaders in Texas politics for several years.

### OFF TO COLORADO

Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Doose and family left the latter part of last week for Grand Junction, Colo., where they may make their home. He recently sold his interests here to Paul Wurster. Before leaving, Doose said the family "may locate" in Colorado. Grand Junction is the home of Mrs. Doose's father.

With cloudy weather prevalent over most of this area for the past several days, harvest of the 1946 wheat crop is not expected to begin until around the usual dates of June 10 to 15, County Agent Lee McElroy believed this week.

Unusual heat early in April rushed the crop along, and it was thought likely the first of this month that harvest might get started some two weeks in advance of custom, but the swing to cooler weather has counteracted much of the early heat, McElroy pointed out.

Reports reaching here from other counties indicate that the crop is turning out more per acre than most optimists had believed. Some counties are reporting a surplus of custom combine machines and operators, which are now moving with the harvest toward this area.

### 6,000 Acres Hailed Out

Estimates made last weekend were to the effect that the county lost some 6,000 acres of wheat in the hail storm which swept the northern and eastern parts of the county a week ago Sunday night.

McElroy said most of this wheat was in irrigation areas, or where summer fallowing practices had been used, observing "it was probably the best wheat in the county, with most of it expected to yield from 20 bushels upward to the acre."

Reports from the hail-stricken areas, principally north and east of Friona, said that the fields were completely wiped out by the devastating hail, resembling pastures after the storm moved on. Asked if sufficient moisture was received in the area to allow planting of row crops on the land, McElroy replied in the negative, adding that most farmers estimated less than a half inch of rain was received with the hail.

### Big Shipment From County

Barring further damages by weather conditions, the prediction is being freely made by grain men and observers generally that wheat shipments from Farwell, Lariat and Bovina will exceed the shipments made from last year's record crop.

But for the destructive hail storm that swept through the northeastern corner of the county a week ago, shipments from Friona and Black were calculated to exceed last year's crop. Several thousand acres of the best wheat in the county was totally destroyed by the strip of hail at least 18 miles wide which ripped through the corner of Parmer and extended on into Castro and Deaf Smith counties on May 19th.

Observers agree that generally over the county the yield will be low, but the increased acreage is expected to be responsible for heavy crop. The most optimistic predictions yet voiced estimate that the highest yield per acre on dry land farms will not exceed 20 bushels to the acre, with only a few fields rated that high.

The heaviest increase in the county will come in the Oklahoma Lane and Lariat communities, where little wheat has been produced in past years on the light soils. Summer fallowing of normal row crop fields is due to pay off good dividends in wheat this year.

Another thing which will add to the county's production this year are the low-yield fields, many of which would not pay the expense of harvesting in normal years. This season, however, with the price at around \$1.75 per bushel, farmers say fields that will produce as low as three bushels to the acre will be harvested.

### EQUALIZATION BOARD

The Parmer County Commissioners Court will sit as board of equalization, at the courthouse, on Monday, June 10th, it was voted at a call meeting of the court on Monday of this week. Minutes of the meeting show that the only other business transacted was the payment of current bills.

**Ford is Police Car of The West**

The Ford appears, from a recent survey, to merit the title "police car of the West". More than four out of ten police cars in the 11 Western-Most States—Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Utah, Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Idaho, Arizona and New Mexico—are Fords, according to the survey.

Of the 4,859 cars reported in police work in this territory, 2,067, or 42.5 percent, are Fords. All other makes of automobiles comprise the remaining 57.5 percent.

Of the five Ford factory territories in this region, the Seattle, Washington branch reported the highest, 52.2, percentage of Ford cars in police work. Salt Lake City was next with a percentage of 48.6 and Denver was third with a 45.6 percent. Long Beach, California, reported 41.8 percent Fords, and Richmond, California, 33.8 percent.

The City of Los Angeles reports 128 Fords out of a total of 441, all makes. Los Angeles County reports 69 Fords in service in a total of 123 cars. Of Gendale's 17 police cars, 13 are Fords. On the other hand, Santa Monica has 17 police cars and not one of them is a Ford. San Diego has 64 Fords out of a total of 92. Santa Ana has four Fords out of a total of eight police cars.

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**Alfalfa Silage VS Hay**

COLLEGE STATION.—To the dairyman, alfalfa has greater value as silage than when it is field cured, according to recent studies of the USDA's Bureau of Dairy Industry.

Recent studies showed that cows on silage produced about seven per cent more milk than those on hay. At the start of the trials, the silage contained nine times as much carotene as the hay, but at the end silage was 14 times as rich in carotene, because the hay lost carotene at a higher rate. In addition, cows fed silage, gave milk much higher in Vitamin A potency. The protein content of dry matter was found to be 21 per cent in the silage and 15 per cent in the hay.

J. W. Davis, assistant dairyman for the A. and M. Extension Service, says he believes this study and others similar will stimulate increased interest in trench silos in Texas.

**FEED CEILINGS BOOSTED**

OPA has given mixed food manufacturers permission to raise their ceiling prices immediately to reflect grain and feed ceiling increases. Previously, manufacturers had to select a "pricing day" to which their price would be held for the current price ceiling week.

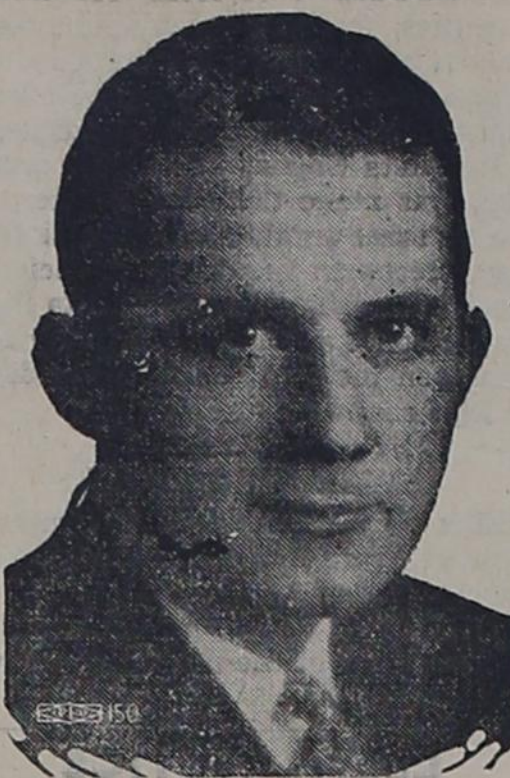

**Americans Respond To Famine Relief Drive**

NEW YORK—The American people are responding with their traditional generosity to the nation-wide Emergency Food Collection for the hungry and starving millions overseas, Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace, national chairman, says.

The appeal for money to buy food and for gifts of food canned in tin for shipment to famine areas is underway in more than 6500 cities, towns and villages, of which 500 have organized since the campaign officially opened May 12.

Wallace said every mail brings checks and money orders made payable to Lee Marshall, executive director, at national headquarters, 100 Maiden Lane, New York City.

Many local groups and organizations, Wallace reported, are arranging "famine" luncheons and dinners, with menus typical of the meager fare on which hunger victims overseas are trying to subsist. The proceeds are turned over to the Emergency Food Collection.

Checks covering costs saved at breadless, cakeless and pieless meals now being instituted at many public restaurants, college and university dining hall have also been pledged to the collection, he added.

The American Quarter Horse Association has again accepted the invitation of officials of the Texas Cowboy Reunion to hold an "official" American Quarter Horse Show at Stamford in connection with the rodeo on July 2, 3, and 4.

Burns stated that in addition to regular cash prizes, the association would offer, for the first time, a trophy to each of the first place winners of the open calf roping contest and the cutting horse contest, provided the stallion, mare or gelding is registered in the Stud Book or Registry of the Quarter Horse Association.

Roy Aarledge, chairman of the Quarter Horse committee, mailed entry blanks and prize lists to breeders in the association and a record entry is expected from breeders over the nation.

**Health Notes**

By Texas Department of Health

AUSTIN.—A good old fashioned spring house cleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a great deal toward furthering good health in this state, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who said in Austin today, "From a practical standpoint the old adage that 'cleanliness is next to Godliness' is still well worth emphasizing."

A general clean-up program of state-wide proportions with the objective of bettering health conditions for our citizenship should include surface cleaning, drainage, the graveling of streets and alleys, the cleaning of all parks and playgrounds and the clearing of weeds and rubbish off of vacant lots.

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises will be," said Dr. Cox, "of inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as dysentery, typhoid and poliomyelitis. Good community house-keeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the State."

**WHEAT FOR FAMINE RELIEF**

The flow of wheat, stimulated by the offer of the government to pay a bonus for wheat delivered before May 25 resulted in movement of over 100,00 bushels from major New Mexico wheat counties.

**CEILINGS INCREASED**

An increase of 5 percent in the list prices of farm machinery has been authorized by the OPA. Ceiling on farm machinery repair and replacement parts remain unchanged. Therefore, according to the OPA, farmers will pay on the average 3 percent more for new equipment and repair parts. Manufacturers will receive a net increase of 10 percent of which about half will be absorbed through dealer margins.

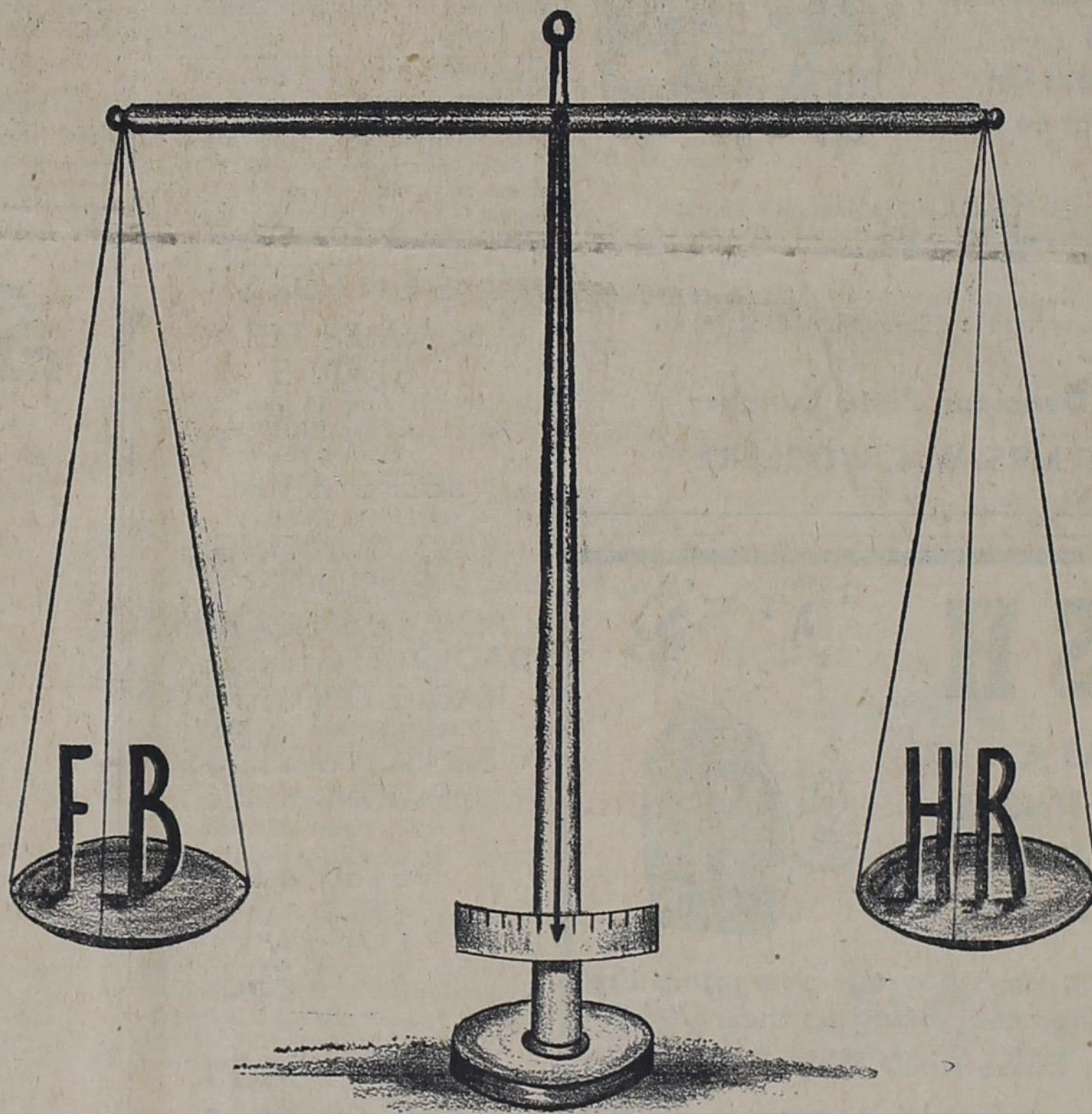

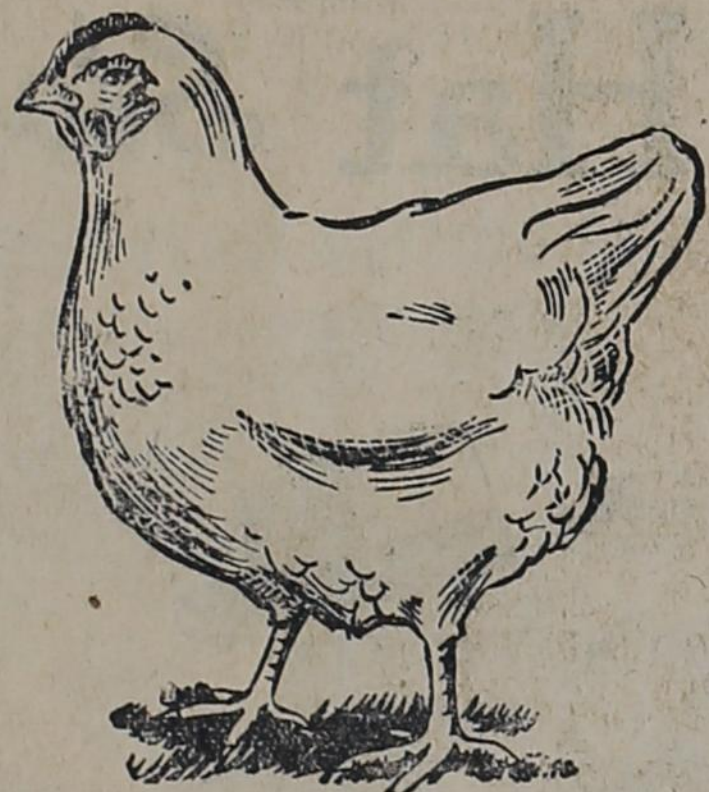

**Loan Guaranty Is Explained to GIs**

Q. May a veteran pay off a guaranteed loan before it becomes due?  
A. Yes, the regulations give the veterans that right.

Q. Can a guaranty of loan be obtained if the proceeds are to be used by a minor or a person under legal disability?

A. This can be done only if the loan and liens are valid under the state law governing the transaction. Many states have enacted statutes removing disability of veterans, and for the wives of veterans who are minors, to enable them to make such loans.

Q. Are veterans of World War I eligible for benefits under the GI Bill?

A. No, its benefits are for World War II veterans only.

Q. May funds from a loan guaranteed by the Veterans Administration be used to pay operating expenses on a farm?

A. Yes, but the veteran must actually operate the farm.

Q. Must a veteran put any of his own money into a business, a home, or a farm in order to get a guaranty of loan?

A. No, this is not a requirement for guaranty or insurance. It is a question which is settled with the lender. The only bearing it has on the guaranty or insurance of a loan is that in the case of a farm or a business it may affect the likelihood of the veteran's success in the future.

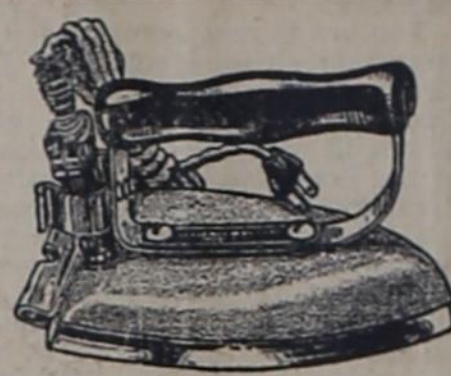
Q. May a loan to buy an automobile or truck be guaranteed or insured?

A. Yes, but only if the auto or truck is necessary to the conduct of the veteran's own business or farming operations, or the conditions of his employment require that he have such a vehicle for use in carrying on his work, but not merely for transportation.

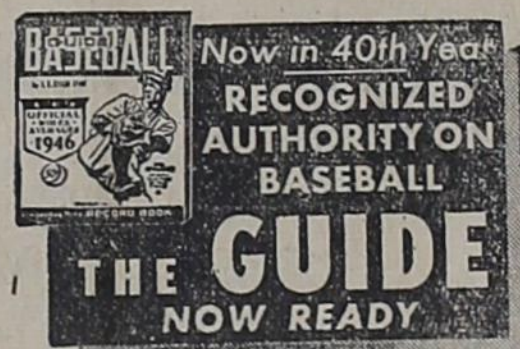

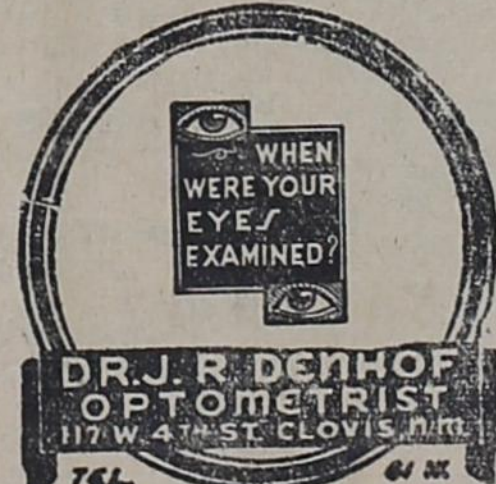

We might remind our patrons that the beef carcass is not made up of sirloins, T-bones, rounds and prime roast, which is another way of saying you are going to have to help us rid the cases of second-choice meat, including hamburger. We can't always have choice cuts and nothing else.

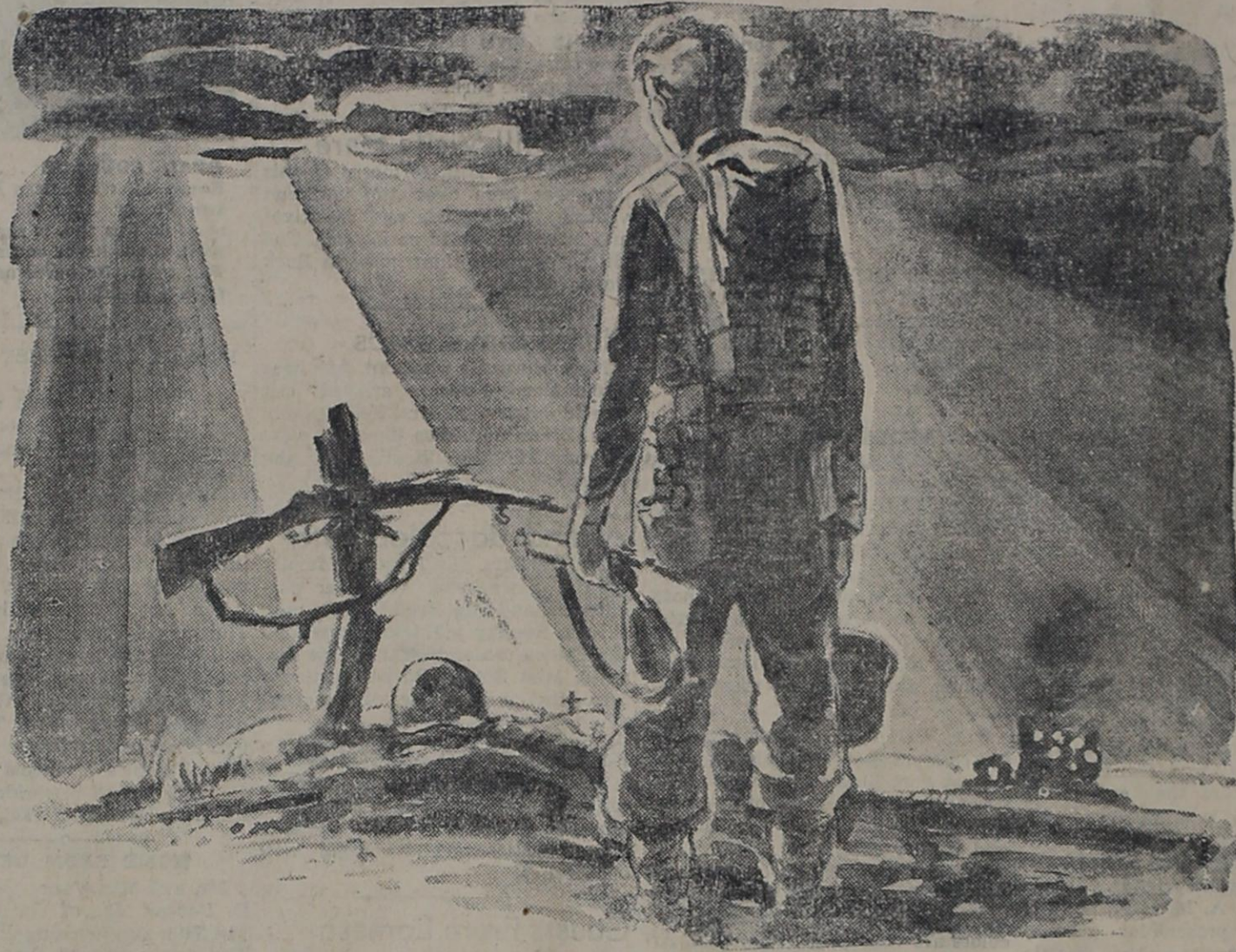

# On this Memorial Day We Pay Tribute to Parmer County's Eighteen Dead



**CLAUDE ISOM GOBER**

Lt. Claude Isom Gober, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. I. Gober of Farwell, was born on August 3, 1920, near Frederick, Okla., and died in the crash of a B-17 plane near Wargrave, England, on November 13, 1943.

Affectionately known as "Buzz", the young man grew up in the Oklahoma Lane community, joining the AAF in August, 1944. He trained as a bombardier on a B-17 at Ellington Field, Houston, and Big Spring, receiving his commission in April, 1943 and leaving the States in September of that year.

His death was one of the unaccountables of war. According to a letter from Sampson Sharff, who ordinarily served as co-pilot in the crew with Gober, the B-17 started out on an operational mission, and while over Britain went into a spin that carried most of the crew to death. Gober, as bombardier, could have released the plane's bombs and possibly saved some lives, but the bombs would have struck a small English town, and the ship went down with its load of explosives.



**VIRGIL WEIS**

Pfc. Virgil Weis, son of Mrs. Carl Bender of Friona, is buried in an American military cemetery on Tacoblan, in the Philippine Islands.

He died in an Army hospital near Palo on Leyte in the Philippines, on April 2, 1945, it was learned here. The cause of his death was not determined.

Weis spent a little more than four years in service, having been inducted on March 2, 1941.



**P. L. NEW**

Mr. and Mrs. E. R. New, formerly of Friona and now of Lubbock, were informed in July, 1944, that their son, P. L., met his death in France on July 8. New was connected with the local Farmer's Elevator before entering service.

In March of 1942, he entered service and was assigned to Camp Barkeley, Texas, for training with the 90th Division, 358th Infantry, following which he went to California, in 1943, for desert training.

Just two years after his entry into the Army, he sailed with the 90th for England, and was there one month before joining in the invasion of France on June 6. A short six weeks later, New met his death by enemy action, at the age of 37 years.



**LOYD REISER**

An unexpected tragedy of war took the life of Sgt. Loyd Reiser, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Reiser, now of Plainview, on Mother's Day, May 14, 1944.

Flying in formation with other C-47 transport planes, over Italy, Reiser was killed when his plane collided with two others in the formation. Thirteen young Americans went to their deaths in the crash.

Reiser was engaged in farming north of Bovina for some time, and had attended the Bovina, Rhea and Friona schools. He volunteered for the Air Force on December 28, 1941.

Burial was made in the Mt. Sopranio Military Cemetery, not far from the city of Rome, in Italy.



**EVERETT LOUIS GEE**

Pfc. Everett Louis Gee, of the United States Marines, gave his life in action against the Japanese on the island of Peliliu, in the Palau group, on September 28th, 1944. He was 20 years of age at the time of his death.

Gee, son of Mrs. F. R. Barber of Bovina, and husband of Julia Hardage Gee, entered service at San Diego, on May 24, 1944, and was sent to overseas duty on April 18, 1944.



**OWEN DRAKE**

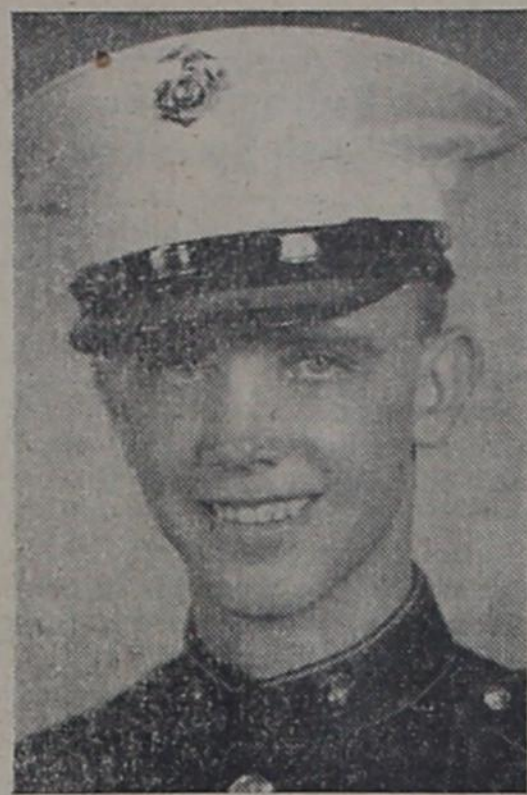
Owen Drake, former Friona lad, met his death in the invasion of Normandy, near St. Lo, France, on July 30, 1944. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Drake.

Entering service in November, 1943, Drake was assigned to the 115th Infantry of the 29th Division. He landed in England on July 12, 1944, and hit France on July 18th, to meet his death only two weeks later. The remains were laid away at a military cemetery at Le Chene, Guerin, France.

In his column of July, 1944, the late beloved Ernie Pyle spoke of "the breakout from our beachhead" in which Drake's outfit participated. Pyle writes "at least paste it (July 25) in your mind. For I have a hunch that July 25 of this year 1944 will be one of the great historic pinnacles of this war."

Fifty-eight percent of the nation's known gas reserves are in Texas.

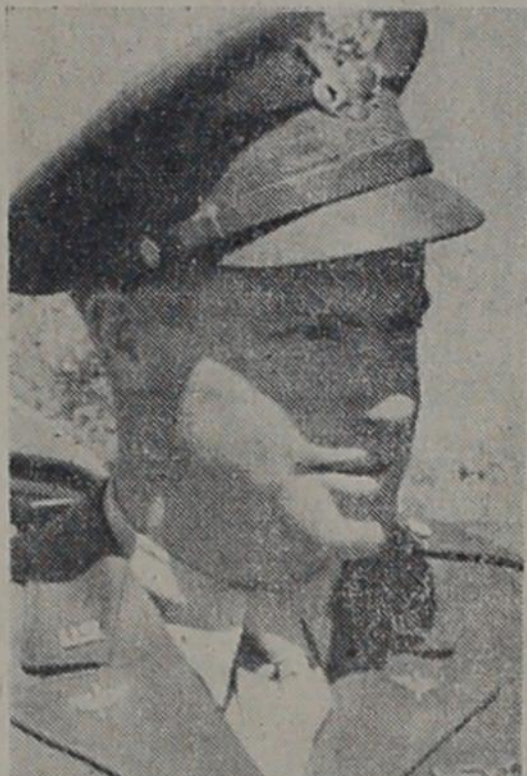


**THOMAS PARKER**

The first Parmer County boy officially reported as killed in action by the War Department was Arthur Thomas Parker son of Willis Parker, formerly of Farwell and now of Friona.

A member of the Marine Corps, young Parker entered service on February 12, 1942, and met his death not quite a year later, on January 13, 1943, in the furious action to regain possession of Guadalcanal.

The Purple Heart certificate and medal were awarded to Parker posthumously, being received by his father. He was a little over 19 years of age at the time of his death.



**J. R. CALDWELL**

A Christmas holiday which ended in a plane crash in the mountains of New Mexico on December 26, 1942, was responsible for the death of Lt. J. R. (June) Caldwell, Jr., after he and his cousin, S-Sgt. Maxwell M. Caldwell of San Antonio, had spent Christmas in the home of the former's parents near Farwell.

Apparently out of control, the plane crashed in the Mogollon range shortly after clearing Roswell, enroute to Williams Field, Ariz., where the young men were stationed. Heavy snows covered all traces of the crash and the bodies until the following fall.

Caldwell entered the Air Force on October 1, 1941, and was trained at Rankin Field, Calif., Gardner Field, Calif., and Williams Field, where he received his commission and pilot's wings on April 24, 1942.



**MACYL ROBERTS**

Entering service on March 15, 1942, Herman Macyl Roberts served overseas from July that same year to February 19, 1944, when he was reported killed in action in the battle for Eniwetok Island, which came to a successful end three days later.

According to information received by Mrs. H. W. Roberts, of Lascor, Colorado, Roberts was buried at Japant, in the South Pacific.

His first overseas assignment was to Wallace Island in the Samoa group, where he was stationed for 16 months. From there, Roberts went to the Hawaiian Islands, serving from October, 1943, to January, 1944. His last letter came from Hawaii. His movements are then unknown until February 17, 1944, when he took part in the battle for Engibi Island.



**HORACE COFFMAN**

A truck accident, which occurred on November 4, 1944, in New Guinea, took the life of Seaman 2-c Horace (Hob) Coffman, son of Mrs. Arma Coffman, formerly of Friona and now living in Amarillo.

Coffman, who was 25 years old, donned his Navy blues on May 28, 1944, and received his basic training at Camp Wallace and San Diego. He was overseas for a period of only six weeks when involved in the accident that cost his life.



**DENCE JUSTICE**

Sgt. Stephen Dence Justice, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam J. Justice, of Farwell, was killed in action in the battle of the Belgian Bulge, on December 28, 1944. Justice entered service on January 7, 1941, volunteering at Clovis.

At Fort Bliss, he asked to be transferred to the paratroops, and was sent to Fort Benning, Ga., for his training. His first overseas assignment was in Africa, in February, 1943, after which he was in the Fifth Army groups which hit the Anzio Beach in the invasion of Italy, and moved into Southern France in September, 1944.

Justice belonged to the 509th Parachute Infantry Battalion, which was cited for outstanding service by Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark.

A few months ago, Mrs. Justice received word that her son was buried in an American military cemetery at Hehri-Chapelle, in Belgium.



**REX McELROY**

Back in March, 1942, Parmer County's casualty list was started, when Mr. and Mrs. F. W. McElroy, formerly of this city, received word that their son, Rex, was believed lost along with other members of the crew on the submarine "Shark".

The War Department's communication revealed that the Shark was "more than thirty days overdue, and was presumed lost in the Far East".

McElroy was a Navy man of some years, having served one four-year hitch on the "Texas" and "Nevada", and then entering the submarine branch, where he had three years of training at a sub base before war was declared.

Until the message came from the War Department, his parents had not heard of him since hostilities opened. He would have been 28 years of age in July, 1942.



**IRA B. BENGER**

Capt. Ira B. Benger, of Friona, was killed in an accident which occurred at Biggs Field, El Paso, on May 13, 1943. Serving as operation officer for the B-24 school at Biggs Field, Benger was a passenger on a routine flight when the plane crashed.

Benger entered the army on October 15, 1940, and was stationed at Santa Maria, Cal., for primary training, and at Moffett Field, Cal., for basic. He graduated from the Stockton, Cal., base in May, 1941, with honors, receiving his second lieutenant commission. He returned to Moffett Field as instructor and later transferred, with the school, to La Moore Field as flight commander, being promoted to squadron commander.

He volunteered into the B-17 school at Siebling, Fla., qualifying as a pilot for all types of planes and upon completion of his work there was stationed at Tucson, as instructor with the B-17. From Tucson he went to Pueblo, Colo., to instructor in the new school for B-24 pilots, and became a first pilot. He then came to Clovis, where he received his captaincy in February, 1943.



**NATHANIEL TAYLOR**

One of the more familiar tragedies, drowning, claimed the life of young Pvt. Nathaniel E. Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Taylor, of Friona, when he was swimming in the San Marcos River near San Marcos, Texas. The accident occurred on April 28, 1944.

Taylor entered the Army at Fort Sill on May 28, 1943, and shortly thereafter was sent to Sheppard Field, later to Kelley Field. On November 1, he was moved to San Marcos, where he entered the Air Corps navigation school.



**WILLIAM J. PALMER**

Pvt. William J. Palmer lost his life in an accident, the nature of which is not known, on April 25, 1944, after he had been in the European Theatre of Operations for one year. He went overseas on April 24, 1943. At the age of 20 years, he enlisted on May 19, 1943, and received his training at Camp Barkeley, Texas, where he was assigned to the 745th, Tank Battalion. His burial plot is unknown. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Palmer, Route 1, Friona, Texas.



**ROY E. HUGHES**

S-Sgt. Roy E. Hughes met his death February 12, 1944, while flying his 15th mission as a top turret gunner, with the 15th Air Force. The plane was shot down near the German-Austrian border and only one crew member, the waist gunner, escaped with his life, only to be taken prisoner.

Hughes was awarded the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf clusters and the Purple Heart, presented posthumously to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. A. Hughes, of Friona.

A 1939 graduate of the Friona school, he was employed at Reeve Chevrolet when he entered service on August 7, 1942. Training was taken at St. Petersburg, Fla., Madison, Wis., Jacksonville, Fla., Harlingen, Tex., and Langley Field, Va. Hughes was assigned to the anti-submarine patrol with a bomber crew, based at Jacksonville, Fla., and later at Cuba before going to Italy with a B-24 crew in September, 1943.



**JAMES C. BRADLEY**

James Calvin Bradley, who was with the Americans captured when the Philippines fell to the Japanese, never came home to tell his experiences.

Although the date of his death is not certain here, young Bradley was one of the unfortunate prisoners of war who went down in a Japanese ship struck by American shells, near the Philippines, when he and thousands of others were being moved to more secure Japanese internment camps.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Bradley, formerly of Friona and now of Mulleshoe.



**HOMER C. JOHNSON**

Pvt. Homer Carrell Johnson was a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Johnson, formerly of here, who now reside in Chemult, Oregon. On Mother's Day, May 13, 1945, he was killed in action on Luzon Island. Johnson was inducted on Oct. 18, 1944, and went to Camp Walters, Texas, where he received training for 17 weeks, and was moved to Camp Ord, Calif., and went overseas from there in April of 1945. Besides his parents, he is survived by his wife and three children; Carrell Gene, 7; Donna Tae, 5; and a son who was born on his father's birthday, and is four years old.

Eight registered Chester-White gilts and one registered Chester-White boar were distributed to Parmer County 4-H clubbers, the past Saturday, County Agent Lee McElroy reported today, in the annual Sears Foundation contest.

Receiving the boar and a gilt was Loyd Kriegel, while the following each received gilts: Ross Jefferson, James H. McKinley, Jerry Jones, Bobby Englant, Kenneth Bridges, Warren Hromas, and James E. Welch.

The boys will feed out the gilts and have them bred to the boar, with the top gilt from each litter being returned to the sponsors for distribution to other club boys next

spring, McElroy explained. "These are the best pigs we have ever received in the contest," the agent told a reporter, adding, "it now depends on what the boys feed them as to how they will turn out."

**Dairy Herd Tester Is Hired By Parmer Co.**

Action by directors of the Parmer County Cattle Club on Monday of this week resulted in the announcement that Billie Joe Foster had been hired as official dairy herd tester for this county.

Foster recently completed a training course for DHIA testing supervisors, held in Plainview. County Agent Lee McElroy, reporting the meeting, said that every herd owner in the county will be given an opportunity to have dairy animals tested during June, which will be the first month of operation.

A minimum of \$6 per month will be charged up to 10 cows, and 20c per head will be assessed for testing over 10 animals. In addition, the owner will pay 1c per cow per month to the county association for maintenance. Payment will be made to the Parmer County Cattle Club, which will in turn pay the salary of the tester, McElroy added.

At the present time, the agent said, there are some 20 grade A dairies operating in the county, and testing of these animals alone will almost compromise a fulltime job. McElroy urged that all herd owners who wish to secure Foster's services notify the agent's office immediately, so that a schedule can be arranged. Owners will in turn be notified as to

the date Foster will do the work.

Directors of the county club are Levi Johnson, L. M. Grissom, Donald Watkins, Wendol Christian, Virgil Teague, J. T. Gee, W. E. Martin and Sterling Donaldson.
