# Half-Million Bushels Wheat Are Cut

Elevator men this week scratched their heads in wonder as they tabulated the returns of the 1953 wheat crop. In Parmer County, the harvest will amount to over 500,000 bushels in spite of the tiny acreage and the extended drought.

Dryland wheat is averaging about six bushels per acre; irrigated somewhere between 25 and 30. County Agent Joe Jones says it would be mighty difficult to guess at wheat acreage this year, but it must have been somewhere between 50 and 60 thousand acres.

**QUALITY IS GOOD**  
If farmers didn't have anything else to brag on this year, they could at least claim that they had produced a very good quality of wheat. Without exception, all elevators contacted by The Tribune reported good to excellent wheat.

Wheat is still trickling into elevators but it is apparent that the harvest is about done for, and the figures above will change little in the next two weeks.

Following is the customary end-of-season breakdown of harvest returns as compiled by The Tribune:

**BLACK**  
**Black Grain Company**  
J. R. Braxton, elevator manager, says he has received 70,000 bushels this season, and expects to be finished with the harvest this week. Yields in the northeast part of the county are head and shoulders above anywhere else. Braxton says yields of from 50

to 60 bushels are not uncommon, and reports that Gus Schlab, who farms four miles southeast of the town, averaged 63 bushels per acre.

**FRIONA**  
**Friona Wheat Growers**  
Receipts Monday were 75,000 bushels, and the harvest was about over at that time. Arthur Drake, elevator manager, admits the crop exceeded his expectations. He made a guess of about 50,000 bushels for the elevator before cutting began.

He reported that Lewis Welch, northwest of town, made 45 bushels on a quarter-section; and Frank Zinser, 10 miles north, averaged about the same with his wheat.

Wheat is so dry, Drake says, "I haven't run a dozen moisture tests all season long."

**Santa Fe Grain**  
Preach Cranfill says the company has received 85,000 bushels. Preach said that at one time this year, he "didn't expect anything" of the crop, so he is pleasantly surprised with this harvest.

Dalton Caffey, 10 miles southwest of Friona, consigned wheat to Santa Fe which averaged 43½ bushels per acre. "Good wheat," reports Granfill.

**BOVINA**  
**Bovina Wheat Growers**  
On Monday, 37,000 bushels had been received, according to A. C. Teeter, manager. Wendol Christian of Oklahoma Lane turned in the best yield there, averaging 47 bushels per acre.

The harvest is about over in the Bovina area, Teeter believes, and added that he had guessed his elevator's "take" at 10,000 bushels this season.

**Macon Elevator**  
Wheat at Macon Elevator is around 25,000 bushels, reports J. P. Macon, owner. Frank P. Wilson, 6 miles northwest of town, averaged 38 bushels of good wheat from his quarter-section, reports Macon.

Macon said the harvest has been "a little above what I anticipated."

**Sherley Grain Company**  
Consignments to Sherley totaled around 90,000 bushels the first of the week, according to Joe Moore. Ed Meeks turned in the best yield there, he said.

Ed Got 37 bushels per acre on a 70-acre plot 6 miles south, and 3½ east of town. The expected yield at Sherley was around 60,000 bushels according to Moore. The returns exceeded the farmers' hopes, as well as those of eleva-

tor men, he asserts.

**LARIAT**  
**Lariat Elevator**  
Boone Allison is the most surprised of all elevator men this week. "I'm really down in the cotton country," he said. "I didn't figure we'd get hardly anything!"

But this week he had taken in 22,000 bushels. N. L. Saylor reported a yield of 33 bushels per acre. "Awful good wheat here this year," says Allison.

**TEXICO-FARWELL**  
**Farwell Elevator**  
Herbert Potts, manager, reports that Farwell Elevator had received 14,000 bushels by the first of the week. Potts had a pre-season guess of between seven and eight thousand bushels, so he is surprised.

He reports that Frank Seale's farm three miles northeast of town has yielded 30 bushels per acre this year.

**Roberts Seed Company**  
More wheat than was expected arrived at Roberts' Elevator in Texico, also. M. C. Roberts reports that they have received around 60,000 bushels. The harvest is all over now, he says.

### ROGERS SAYS PARMER IS ON DROUTH LIST

Parmer County, along with 151 other Texas counties, has been included in the "drouth disaster" portion of the South-west by President Eisenhower.

A telegram from Congressman Walter Rogers Tuesday to The Tribune confirmed this:  
**WASHINGTON, D. C.**  
"Farmers and ranchers your county eligible for aid in disaster relief program. Suggest meeting with county agent for full particulars and procedures. Walter Rogers."

Parmer County Agent Joe Jones said shortly thereafter that he had received no "particulars" applying to the program, but he added that he would be happy to help farmers and ranchers in any way he could.

The F. H. A. office at the courthouse reports "quite a few" people had been in to see them Tuesday morning, although an office secretary said the number of inquiries did not amount to a rush.

Most people are simply seeking information, she said. Walter Johnson, F. H. A. supervisor for the county, was not at the office and consequently could not

be reached for a statement. It will probably be the F.H.A. which will handle loans made available from the President's \$8,000,000 "fund", which will probably be made at around four per cent interest over a lengthy period. It also is likely that any person making application for the loan will find it necessary to show that he is unable to secure credit from private financing circles.

### 4-H's Plan County Camp at Meeting

Ten 4-H boys and ten adult leaders were present at the meeting Tuesday night at which plans were made for the Parmer County 4-H Camp to be held July 27-30.

County agent, Joe Jones, reports that the site for the camp has not yet been decided, but that the trip will be made by truck and pickups, and that James Mabrey will help with the menu planning for the camp.

Last year, the group went to Holy Ghost Canyon, and 76 attended, with 67 boys and 9 leaders.

**FATHER PASSES AWAY**  
Word was received here this week that the father of L. R. "Jelly" Vincent passed away Monday in a Dallas hospital. The Vincents have been with him for the past few weeks.

### Cotton and Feed Looking Good In Parmer County

Much to the surprise of a lot of people, including county agent, cotton and feed are looking pretty good all over the county, says agent Joe Jones this week.

"We have about eighty thousand acres of cotton that are sure looking good," he said, adding that "the feed is doing very well, too."

These observations come as a happy note to Parmer County farmers, who have just had their county included in a "drouth disaster" area of the Texas Panhandle.

It is, of course, entirely too early to be speculating on the ultimate outcome of the crops. A lot of things can, and usually do, happen between now and fall, it has been pointed out.

Subsurface moisture still is insufficient, even though much of the crops are being grown under irrigation this year.

The agent cautioned farmers "to be careful" of watering cotton down the row at its present stage.

## OUR FLAG AND Independence Day

Saturday, July 4, will find "Old Glory" flying in breezes all over our nation. Of course we all know that as a national holiday, July 4, or Independence Day, is probably more generally observed by all the people than any day set aside as a holiday; and it dates the period of American Independence and the establishing of principles upon which has been founded the grandest and greatest republic the world has ever known.



But, how many of us know much about our nation's flag which will be flying so proudly on this day? Following are some interesting, but little known facts about our country's flag:

The United States Flag is the third oldest of the National Standards of the world; older than the Union Jack of Britain or the Tricolor of France.

The flag was first authorized by Congress June 14, 1777, and this date is now observed as Flag Day throughout America.

The flag was first flown from Fort Stanwix, on the site of the present city of Rome, New York, on August 3, 1777. It was first under fire three days later in the Battle of Oriskany, August 6.

It was first decreed that there should be a star and a stripe for each state, making thirteen of both; for the states at that time had just been erected from the original thirteen colonies.

preted by Washington: "We take the stars from Heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it with the white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing Liberty."

In 1791, Vermont, and 1792, Kentucky were admitted to the Union and the number of stars and stripes was raised to fifteen in correspondence. As other states came into the Union it became evident there would be too many stripes.

So in 1818 Congress enacted that the number of stripes be reduced and restricted henceforth to thirteen, representing the thirteen original states; while a star should be added for each succeeding state. That law is the law of today.

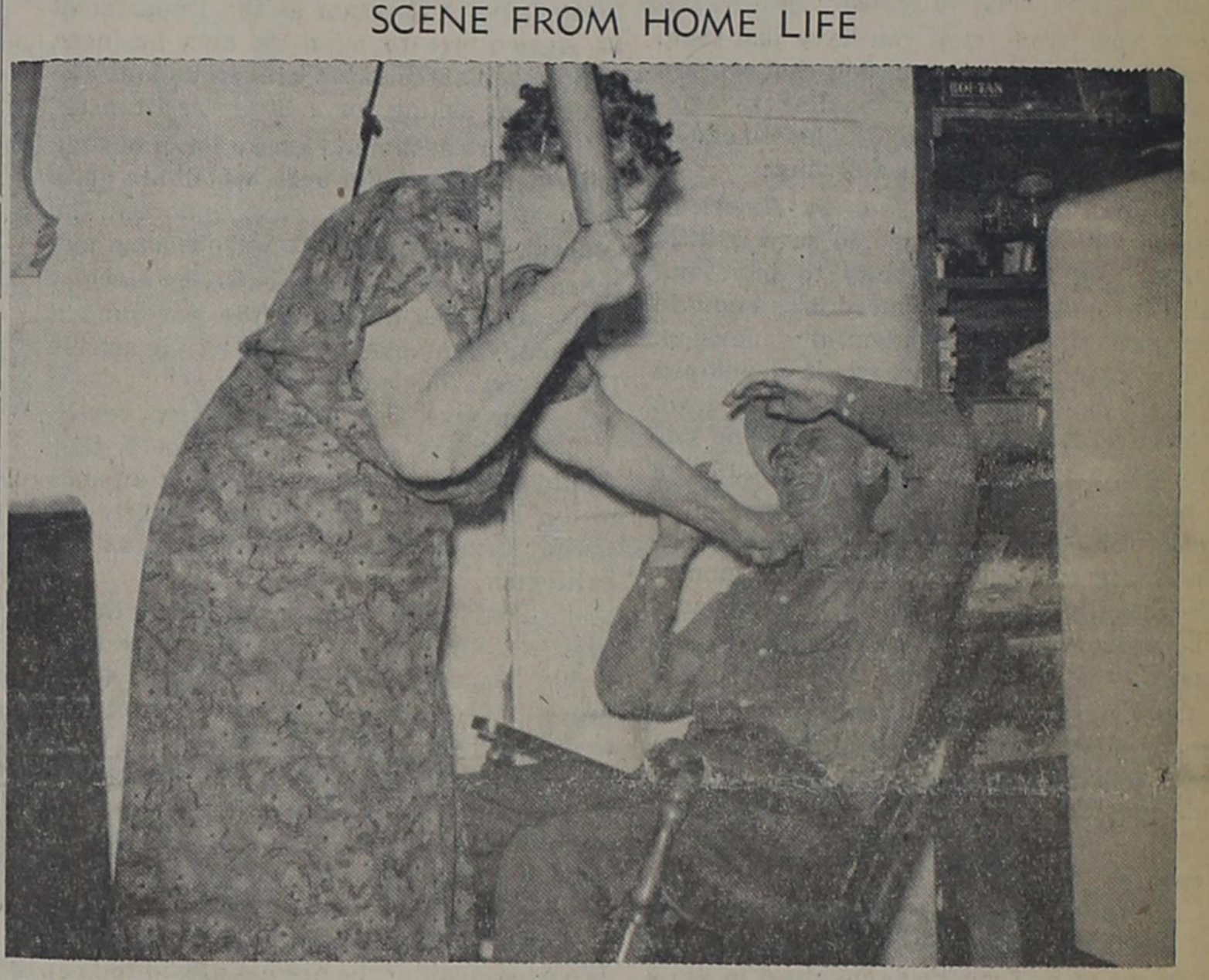
The name "Old Glory" was given to our National Flag August 10, 1831, by Captain William Driver of the brigate Charles Doggett.

The flag was first carried in battle at the Brandywine, September 11, 1777. It first flew over foreign territory January 28, 1778, at Nassau, Bahama Islands; Fort Nassau having been captured by the Americans in the course of the war for independence. The first foreign salute to the flag was rendered by the French admiral LaMotte Piquet, of Quibron Bay, February 13, 1778.

The United States Flag is unique in the deep and noble significance of its message to the entire world, a message of national independence, of individual liberty, of idealism, of patriotism.

And, how many of us know just what days the flag is to be flown? A joint-resolution, passed by the house June 22, 1942 named the dates on which the flag is to be flown. In section 2, it states that the flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement.

The flag should be displayed on all days when the weather permits, and especially on New Year's day, January 1; Inauguration Day, January 20; Lincoln's Birthday, February 12; Washington's Birthday, February 22; Army Day, April 6; Easter Sunday (variable); Mother's Day, second Sunday in May; Memorial Day (half staff until noon), May 30; Flag Day, June 14; Independence Day, July 4; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Constitution Day, September 17; Columbus Day, October 12; Navy Day, October 27; Armistice Day, November 11; Thanksgiving Day, fourth Thursday in November; Christmas Day, December 25; such other days as may be proclaimed by the President of the United States; the birthdays of States (dates of admission) and on State holidays.

# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## Our Ideas on the "Disaster"

Well, what do you know. The Texas Panhandle and Parmer County along with it, has been declared a "disaster" area! The nearsightedness displayed by farmers and cattlemen who flocked to Lubbock last week appalls us. Even makes us a little ill at the tummy.

We're sure that you can remember a while back when Texas cattlemen flailed the federal government for attempting to control run-away meat prices by juggling the cattle market? Remember how so many farmers and ranchers howled that "the government is trying to run our business." Sure you do, and so do we.

Well, the funny part of the matter is that the shoe is on the other foot now. The bottom has dropped out of the cattle market and things are looking pretty drab for the grain and cotton markets.

Now, the faint-hearted men who dabbled in livestock, and the near-sighted farmers who didn't keep anything in the kitty for off years are running to Secretary Benson with such stories that moved the staid old ex-farmer to tears.

Now, from what you have just read, you might get the impression that we are waving our arms and appealing to emotions. If you insist on cold, level-headed reasoning, we submit the following:

John Jones, an average American citizen who had managed to save a little money, got the opportunity to buy land near town which he figured was right in the path of a big residential expansion. Later, much to his sorrow, it developed that the land he purchased failed to drain adequately, and as a consequence, no one wanted to buy any of the land for building a house.

John Jones had made a bad investment. He had failed to make any money. We usually refer to this little game as a "business venture." Everybody plays it, in one way or another.

Charley Johnson, who runs a dry goods store, bought some shoes at a bargain from a wholesaler. Now Charley finds out that the shoes won't sell. They're out of style. He bought "white elephants". He loses.

That kind of thing goes on everyday, in virtually every type of business. The element of risk is always involved in seeking a profit. At least it should be; some

cattlemen think it shouldn't.

If man buys 100 head of skin cattle in the fall, expecting to feed them out during the winter and market them next spring, he's taking a chance on making-or losing money in process, just the same as anybody else.

Should he be entitled to any special consideration, any elaborate system of marketing controlled by the federal government to insure that he doesn't lose money? Figure it out for yourself. Be honest.

When will people realize that when they ask for government credit, or for cheap government feed or for special consideration in rail rates, that they are burdening every other taxpayer in the States down with their own troubles.

Somebody said a long time ago, "that government is best which governs least." We believe it.

Let's get the government out of the farming and ranching business, or let them take it over entirely. We're upset by the fence-sitting attitude of a few farmers and cattlemen who scream at the Department of Agriculture to mind its own business, and two months later are around at the back door asking for a little "assistance."

We're ashamed to see a lot of our big daily newspapers out here, which are quite influential editorially, have endorsed the federal aid program. It wasn't long ago when they were running cartoons on their editorial pages depicting the government as a many-tentacled octopus, sitting astride the nation's business system.

Someone is off the beam here, really. Ranchers would learn a lot if they would check into the management of some of our larger companies, which surely undergo just as much business risk as the cattlemen.

They (the companies) have things like "sinking funds". Then, when the inevitable business slump does come, there are enough funds left in the fund to tide them over for a little while.

We don't know if anybody from Parmer county went to Lubbock last week. If they did, we hope they sat still and listened instead of wailing their woes.

Clarence Kube, Farwell delegate to Boys State was introduced by Loyde Brewer. He spoke on the outstanding speakers and the new outlook on communism gained at boys' state. Walter Curd, Texico representative, was unable to attend the program.

Rex Pool, Farwell Boys' Stater in 1951, sang "I Am A Pilgrim," and following his song, Nelson Smith showed movies made at the President's inauguration. He also had a film made at the Donkey Ballgame staged at the Farwell football field recently.

Following is the report made by Darlene Sprawls, in which she recounted the activities of the week at Texas Girls' State. It is representative of the reports made by the other delegates, as all the organizations are planned in much the same way.

"We left Farwell on Sunday afternoon by train, traveling with Pullman accommodations. We arrived at Temple, at 4 o'clock the next morning and had breakfast before leaving by bus for Austin. After being greeted by members of the Auxillary in Austin, we went to our rooms, got settled, and met a lot of the girls. We were given badges designating our names, our political party and whether we were to serve in the senate or house of representatives. I was a federalist and Bel was a nationalist.

That night was our first meal in the cafeteria, and our first assembly. We were welcomed by Mrs. Blieden, department president. We were given an outline of each days activities, which began in earnest Tuesday morning.

Each morning we had reveille,

flag raising, exercise, breakfast, and cleaning of areas before the actual work and study began. On Tuesday we studied city government, and heard a talk by Truman O'Quinn, former Austin City Attorney. A study on Parliamentary Law was taken up before we had our organization meetings for the two parties. After lunch, we organized our city government, and then had an assembly at which Mrs. Max Brooks spoke to us on "Women in the Armed Forces".

We had a lot of fun naming our county and cities. One of the favorite expressions down there was, "No Kiddin', We've had it!" So when we named our city we called it "No Kiddin', We've," and we called the County "Had-it". The other city in our county was called "I've".

I was named Police Chief in my city, and Bel was public health officer in hers.

That night we began study of county government and heard a speech on that subject by the Honorable Les Proctor, county Attorney of Travis County.

Wednesday brought a study of state government and the convening of the House and Senate. Dr. Howard Calkins government professor from the University of Texas, spoke to us on the various phases in state government. Party meetings followed, and that night we had our state primary elections. The governor of the 1952 Girls state was presented and Mrs. A. J. Breaux told us about "Boys & Girls' County Government Program." Entertainment was provided by various "citizens" of girls' state and then the election announcements were read.

Thursday morning was highlighted by a tour of Austin by bus. We went to the Governor's mansion, the capitol, and viewed the treasury department beneath the capitol. The senate and House held meetings in the wings of the capitol, and then we had a joint meeting of the two bodies and were addressed by Judge Elwood Font of Houston.

That afternoon the elections were held and after much breathless waiting, the results were announced. That night brought the inaugural dinner, honoring the new officials. The banquet was held across the street in a club, and to reach it we had to file across the street, two by two. Since I was near the front of the line, I could look back and see the myriads of beautiful formals, seeming to float endlessly across the street behind me. It was simply beautiful!

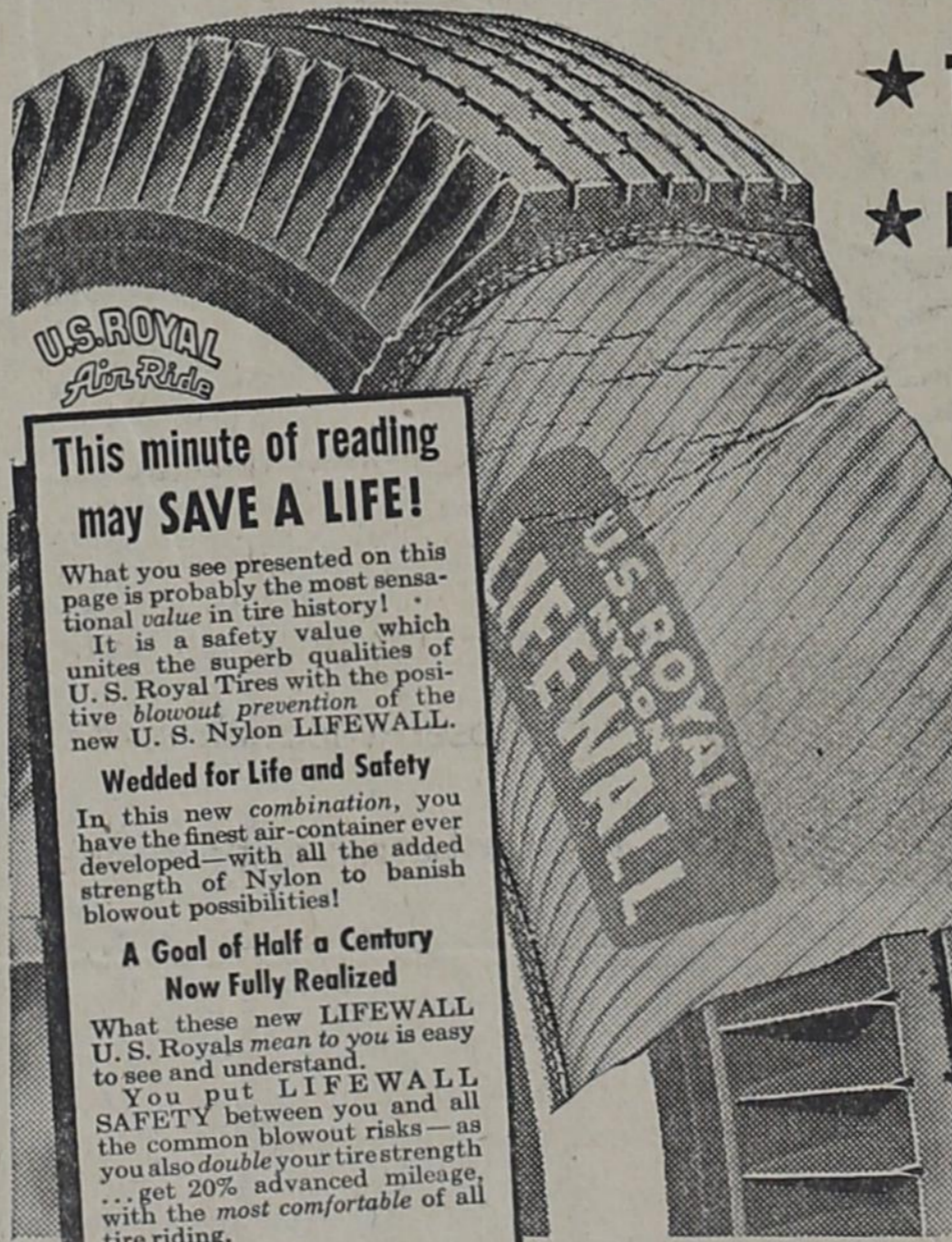
Guest speaker at the banquet was the Honorable John Ben Sheppard, attorney general of the state of Texas. Entertainment was provided by our junior counselors. We were all really sorry that it had to end that night.

Friday, the state offices began functioning, along with the city and county governments. At assembly, Dr. Chauncey Leake made a very interesting talk on the "Health Resources of Texas."

Later the Honorable William McGill, Texas civil defense, made a talk on his work, and Mrs. Marian Bliden reviewed the book, "Key to Peace". Later each of us was presented with a copy of the book, by the Texas Manufacturing company. We were instructed to read it, and then to place it in

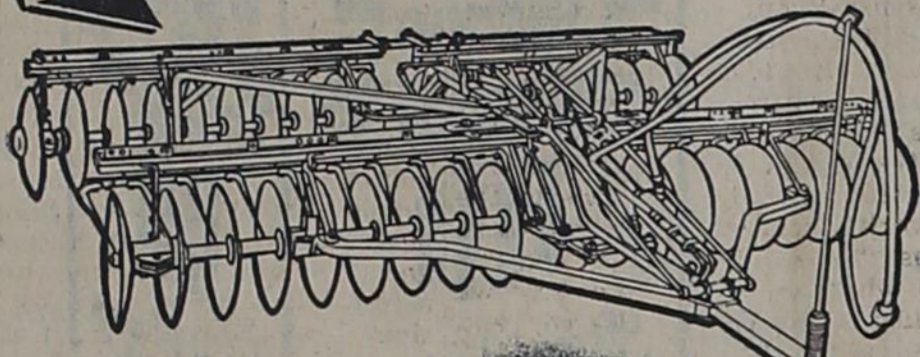
Sunday morning we had our last assembly, and then a church service conducted by Dr. Robert

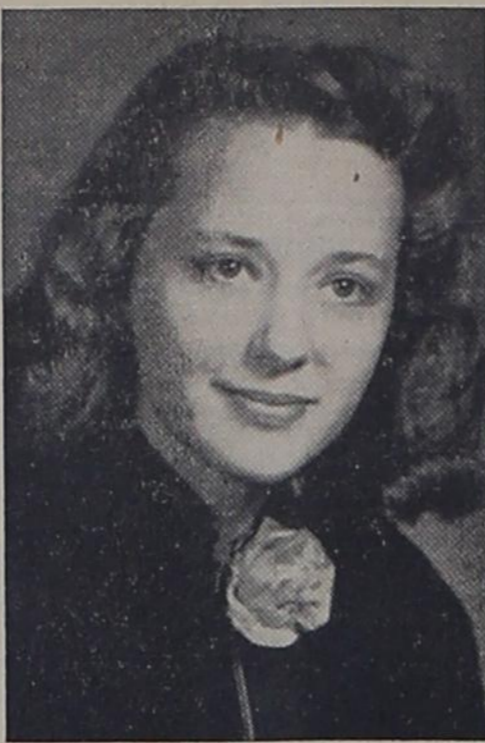

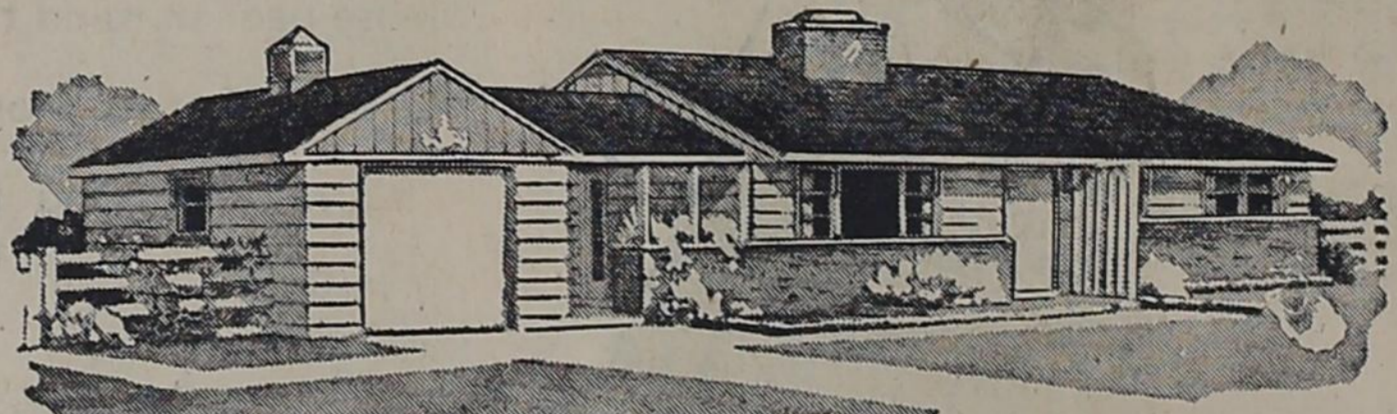

**It's Back to The Pen For Bad Checker, Amon Messenger**

Amon Messenger, 21, heard the news in district court Tuesday that he must go back to the State penitentiary. He was charged with passing a bad check for \$18 to James Miller at the Bagley Service Station No. 1 in north Farwell.

Messenger, who got out of the pen March 18 after serving a sentence for forgery was up to his old tricks again in a short time. He passed the \$18 check April 4.

An indictment was made against him by the grand jury April 13, and also against his partner, Wayne Ponder. Ponder was tried the next day and released on probation, but Messenger was still at large at that time.

Tuesday, Messenger entered plea of guilty before Dist. Judge E. A. Bills. The defendant's attorney sought to have sixty days removed from the two-year sentence because that time had been spent in the Parmer County jail awaiting trial. The 60 days was not deducted.

At the trial Messenger asserted he was ready to give up his check writing.

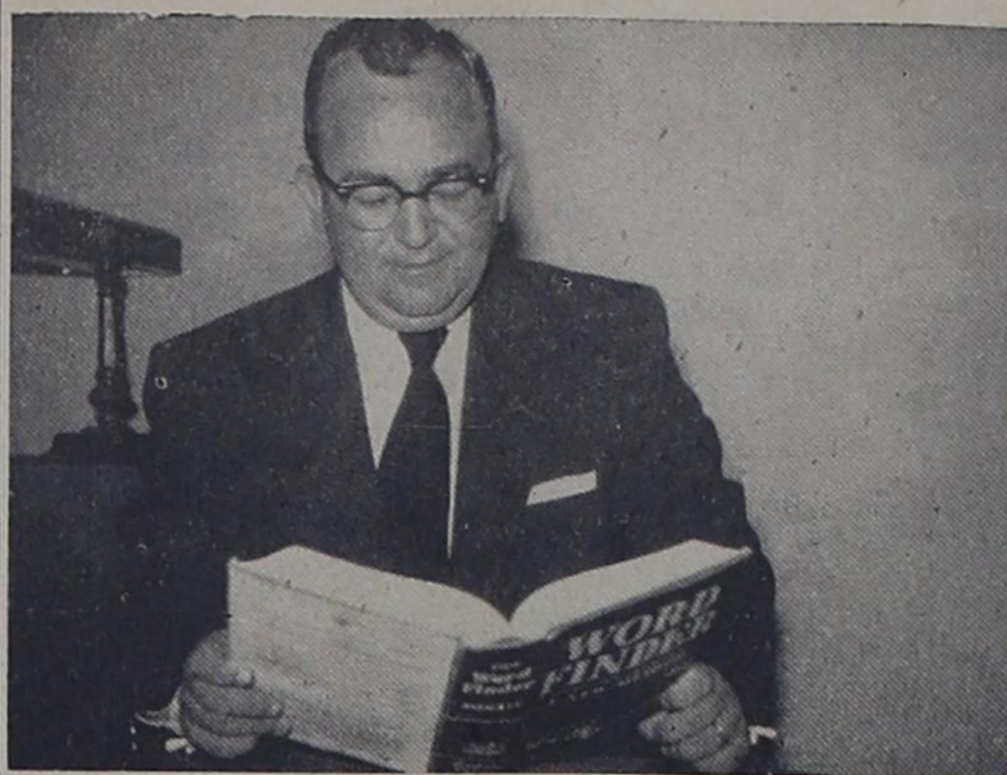
