

Registration under way for bicycle contest

All youngsters are reminded that registration is open for the Border Town Day's Decorated Bicycle contest.

Youths must sign up at the State Line Tribune, 404 3rd St. in Farwell. -- Two brand new bicycles are being given away. Tedson Trailers and Master Tech Auto Service, both of Texico, have donated the two bicycle. One is for a boy and one is for a girl.

This year's BTD theme is "Farwell's 100th Anniversary." It is very important to follow the theme since that is a large part of judging.

The judging is done by Clovis residents recruited by the Clovis Chamber of Commerce.

Also, an anonymous donor has provided funds for cash prizes to be given away in each category.

"Everything is ready at the Tribune for kids to register," said Linda Moss, who once again will honcho the annual bike contest. And, once again, she is being assisted by Joy Stanton.

The registration deadline for the contest is at 3 p.m. on July 28.

Mrs. Moss said that youths planning to enter the contest need to register, giving their name and age, to be eligible for all the prizes.

The contest will be held one hour before the Border Town Days parade kicks off on Saturday, July 30. The contest takes place adjacent to the Citizens Bank branch in Texico. Entrants need to be here at 10:00 a.m. Texas time.

After the bicycle contest ends, all participants will ride in the parade to the Farwell City Park.

Prizes will be announced at the beginning of the day in the part activities at 12:30 p.m. cst, at the Farwell City Park gazebo.

All participants need to be on hand at that time to receive their prizes. No motorized bikes are allowed in the contests.

All riders must bring their decorated bikes and trikes to the west side of the Texico brand of the Citizen's Bank building in Texico by 10:00 a.m. Texas time (that's 9:00 a.m. New Mexico time).

Room is available for the contest, and the Texico City Council has approved closing the street next to the bank to traffic during this time. Thus, there will be complete safety for the kids during the judging.

"You must be on time or you will not be judged," alerted Mrs. Moss.

She added, "Contestants need to be sure to stick to the theme - 'Farwell's 100th Anniversary' - if they are going to be counted. The judges will be looking for adherence to the theme."

The contest is open to all youths who live in the Texico and Farwell School Districts. Also, the BTD committee has voted to allow children and grandchildren of local folks to enter, also, even if they live elsewhere.

The contest is open for youths from 6 to 12 years of age.

Other rules are:

-- All participants ride in the parade. Their folks can go along, too. The parade ends at Farwell City Park and a bicycle rack will be set up just across the street on the property of First Baptist Church of Farwell.

-- Riding bikes in the park during BTD is not allowed, for safety reasons.

-- You must be present at the park to receive your cash prizes (or if you win the bicycles) when the announcements are made during the 1 p.m. ceremonies.

Parmer County gets financial thumbs-up

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday approved the financial audit for 2004, as prepared by the Farwell CPA firm of Kirkland and Kirkland.

As has been the case for the past few years, the report said the county is in excellent financial shape. For example, it has enough funds available to pay 11 months of expenses even if it didn't collect one cent in revenue during that period.

In previous years, the Tribune has given comparisons on the overall financial statistics. But the state last year mandated counties to change to a new financial reporting model, termed the "accrual method."

So if the Tribune compared the 2004 to the 2005 statistics, it would be like comparing "apples to oranges."

But what is important are the following statistics:

--The assets of Parmer

County exceeded its liabilities at the close of the most recent calendar year by \$6,451,187.

Of this total, \$4,449,685 may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors; \$1,586,297 of the county's equity is invested in capital assets, net of related debt.

-- The county's total debt as of Dec. 31, 2004 is \$3,233,350 (mostly for the new jail).

-- The net assets of the county increased by \$729,081 in 2004.

-- As of the close of the current year, Parmer County's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$4,486,915.

This fund balance reflects a decrease of \$302,601 for the current year. About 99 percent of this total, \$4,449,685, is available for spending at the government's discretion.

-- At the end of the current year, reserved fund balances were \$415,205.

-- The unemployment rate for Parmer County was 4.6 percent for calendar year 2004; the state's average was 6.1 percent that year.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Reappointed Robert White to a 2-year term as a board member representing Parmer County on the

A person may sign up once each time he or she is in a store until July 28, when the boxes will be picked up and taken to the park for the drawings.

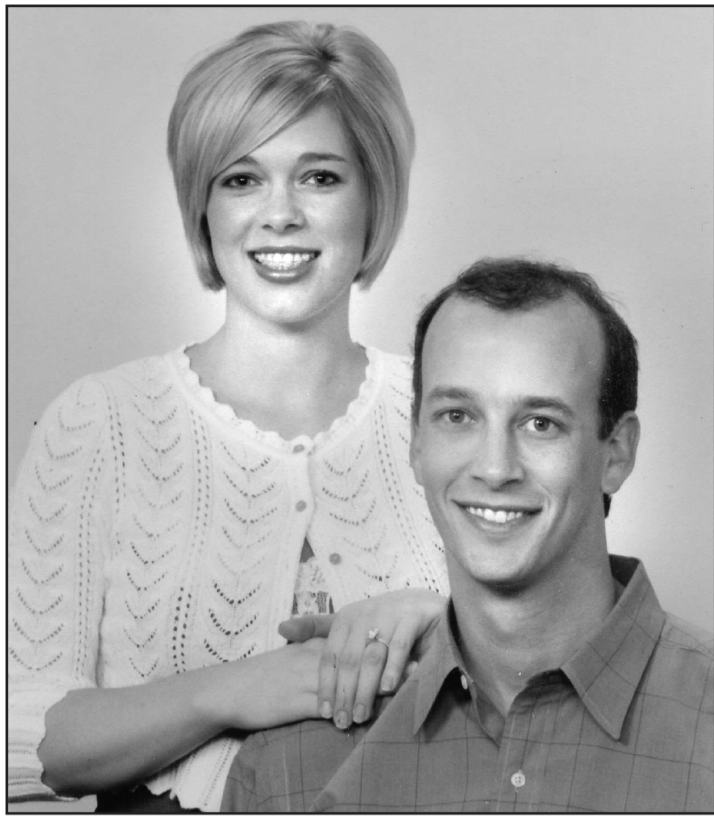
A list of where all the boxes can be found is elsewhere in today's Tribune.

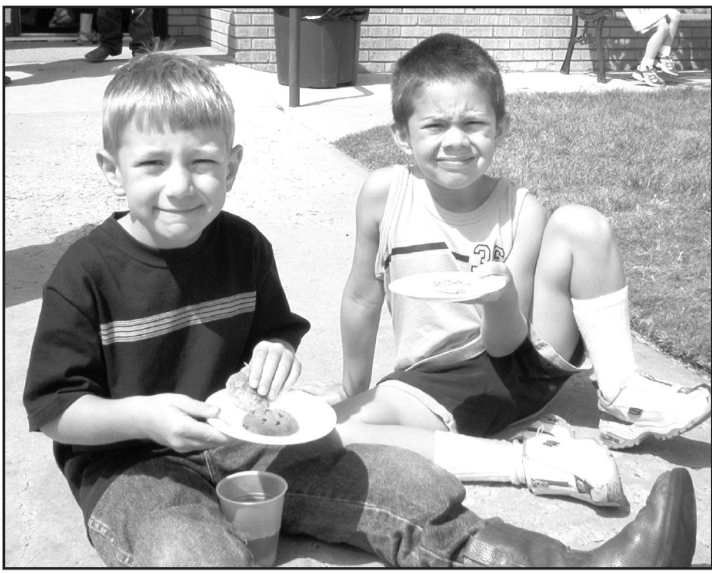

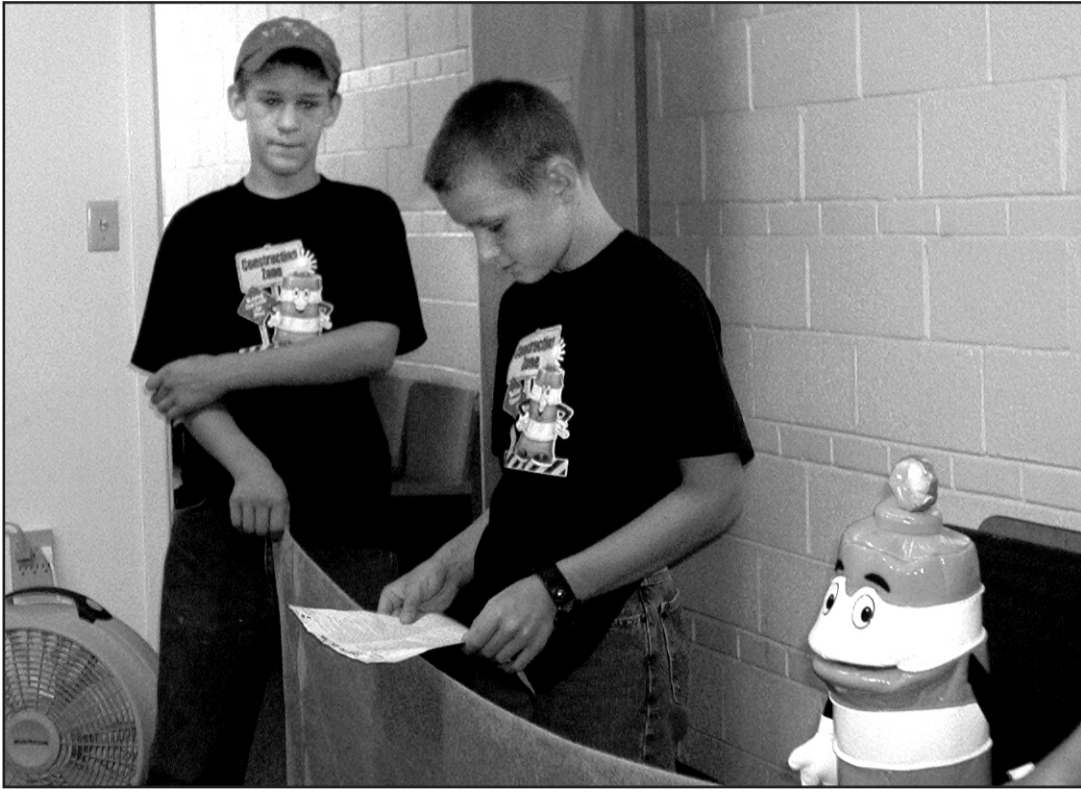

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday received the proposed 2006 budget, which won't be approved until the August meeting. Highlights were:

- Funds were budgeted for a second police officer.
- City employees will receive 3 percent pay raises.
- Rate hikes in the water budget may be needed due to expected higher utility costs.

"The cost of utilities is going to hurt us next year," said Mayor Jimmie Mace.

He cited Farwell Schools as an example. Farwell Schools has budgeted 14 percent more money for electricity and 80 percent more money for natural gas in the coming year.

A chart showing the city's revenue and expense projections for 2006, with this year's budgeted and actual expenses, will appear in next week's Tribune.

In other business, the council:

- Agreed to advertise for bids for a new sewer cleaning machine.
- Had no one attend the public hearing for the 2004 Water Quality Report.
- Approved a building permit application for Robert Vidaurri, a carpenter at 109 8th St.

-- Approved a license for Juan Bautista, of Lubbock, to place a breakfast burrito stand on the lot where Winner's Touch is (2nd Street and Avenue A). He said his sister, Rosa Chavez, will operate it.

-- Heard Mitch Walls complain about junk and vehicles parked in the 200 block of Second Street.

He had several questions to ask including (with the city's responses):

- 1) Is there an ordinance

against parking trailer houses, vans or cars on corner lots? If they block the view of motorists, it raises a safety issue.

2) If a resident ignores the city's procedure to solve a problem, what happens? It goes to city court.

3) Is there an ordinance about the number of vehicles parked at a house? No.

4) How many pets can a resident have? Four maximum.

5) Is a business, such as vehicle repair, allowed in a residential neighborhood? No.

Police Chief Robert Achterberg has been working on some of the vehicle complaints and will continue to do so.

-- Approved a building permit for Mr. and Mrs. Stuart Meyer that had been denied at the June meeting. It allowed a 40'x60' metal building plus a house addition at their planned new home at 802 Ave. F.

-- Received a request from the Meyers' to turn their home at 401 1st Street into a minimal-care assisting living facility with a maximum of 16 residents.

Mrs. Meyer, a registered nurse, would manage it. They had a petition with most residents favoring it.

But the council explained that in order to get a variance to allow this, certified letters are sent to all property owners within 200 feet and 100 percent of those folks returning the letters must favor it or it's denied.

There's a problem here for the variance since one property owner, Jo Beth Williams, who lives at 404 1st St., said she opposes the Meyers' home becoming an assisted living facility. She said she had signed a petition earlier supporting the change but has retracted it (see her ad elsewhere in today's Tribune).

-- Heard Mrs. Williams complain about a trench behind her dumpster, asking that the city place some gravel there. Mace said the city will check into it.

Farwell schools to add 3rd kindergarten room

The Farwell School Board on Tuesday heard Supt. Larry Gregory report that a 3rd kindergarten will be added for the coming school year.

The 3rd teacher will be Angela Thompson. About 40 kindergarten pupils are expected in August.

In other business, the board:

-- Received an update on the progress for the new track. It is almost completed, with just a latex layer (running surface) needed to be put on.

-- Received the resignations of Karen Barnes, junior high special education teacher, and Nicole Cryer, 1st grade teacher.

Mrs. Barnes has taken a job with the Parmer County special education cooperative, and Mrs. Cryer's husband has been transferred to Lubbock.

-- Hired Kim Cates to teach 1st grade and Mona Bermea to take junior high special education.

-- Heard that the gym roof repairs have been completed.

-- Approved the Student Code of Conduct and Student Handbook for 2005-2006.

No major changes were made. A section about steroid use was added.

The Texico City Council on Tuesday approved a form that allows the "Three Wishes" TV program to film on city-owned properties.

City Clerk Mike Hannagan reported that the TV show is working on the possibility of helping with the payment for the new playground equipment to be placed at KKR Park. This has not been finalized.

The city has agreed to pay an Albuquerque man \$8,000 to install the equipment. The man needs 3 to 5 local folks to help him (he will pay them).

Hannagan said the TV folks told him they plan to set up a "wish tent" in Clovis.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard that Daniel Freeman, who has been a dispatcher with the Clovis police department, will become Texico's 4th police officer on July 25.

-- Heard councilman Doug Scioli present suggested revisions to the city personnel policy. These likely will be acted on at the next meeting after receiving a good response from other councilmen.

-- Called an executive session on litigation at the suggestion of Fire Chief Lewis Cooper and city Attorney

Should Texico school lunch policy be changed?

The Texico School Board on Tuesday discussed a recent article in the State Line Tribune whereby some Texico students complained that the lunch period was too short, and when they drove to local restaurants they had very little time to eat lunch.

This caused a problem with potential driving violations because Texico has four police officers and there are many stop signs in town.

The board discussed this with Fela Sena, cafeteria manager. The board felt there are two options available:

- 1) Leave the current policy in place.
- 2) Close the campus so all students will eat in the school cafeteria. This would handle the safety concerns voiced by the students.

The board would like citizens' input on this. They ask that school patrons contact them or school officials about which of the two options they feel should be chosen.

In other business, the board approved four hirings:

- 1) Glynda Martin as junior high coach.
- 2) Bobbie Foster as elementary physical education teacher.
- 3) Wendy Hollis as elementary Title 1 teacher.
- 4) Tonya Stone, as pre-school and kindergarten teacher. She replaces Cary Kittrell, who has moved to San Marcos, Texas.

-- Heard Supt. R.L. Richards report that one post is still open -- high school custodian.

-- Received the state baseball championship trophy from Coach Richard Luscombe.

-- Heard Richards announce that, thanks to the work of elementary principal Wayne Anderson, Texico Schools will receive a \$53,000 grant for physical education.

This may involve setting some time aside just before lunch for elementary pupils to have an exercise period.

Richards said this could help ensure that the youths eat their lunches better and not rush through lunch.

-- Heard reports on construction: the two kindergarten rooms' renovation has gone well; the auditorium has new seats, carpet and curtains; and the academic learning lab project is taking a bit longer.

The lab will be adjacent to the high school library and will be a computer lab. It will be managed by librarian Billie Cooper and aide Teresa Marshall.

-- Discussed the baseball field work. The state likely will give Texico about \$75,000 toward it and school officials are applying for other grants, such as from Major League Baseball.

There is no date yet on when the field will be ready for play.

Lazbuddie takes emergency action on roof repairs

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday took emergency action dealing with the roof situation.

A recent hail storm clobbered the roof, resulting in 7 fractures per square foot, reported Supt. Karl Vaughn.

So the board is having Michael Fortenberry, of Littlefield, do emergency repairs that will be guaranteed up to a year.

This will give the board time to find a company to put on a new roof. Lazbuddie has a \$10,000 deductible on its insurance policy.

In other business, the board:

-- Gave 4 percent pay raises to non-professionals staff and administrative personnel.

-- Accepted the resignations of:

1) Howard Tooley, high school principal. He has accepted a job as elementary school principal in Chillicothe, Texas.

2) Sarah Schumacher, 2nd grade teacher. She had taught at Lazbuddie for one year.

3) Eddie Lopez, who had signed a contract in May to come to Lazbuddie and teach social studies and coach.

-- Hired the following:

1) John Jones, high school principal. Jones, who lives in the Lazbuddie district, was a science teacher at Muleshoe Schools.

2) Becky Jones, elementary teacher. The wife of John Jones, she had been the Muleshoe band director.

3) Margaret Rogers, elementary teacher. She is coming from Lubbock.

4) Vinnie Gomez, Spanish teacher. He is coming from Lubbock.

5) Renita Pollard, business teacher. She is coming from Canyon.

-- Heard Vaughn report that there are still two staff vacancies: a math teacher, and a FCCLA/social studies teacher.

Marion Ty Rutter.

-- Heard that Duncan Disposal will seek at the next meeting a 4 percent rate hike due to higher fuel costs.

-- Heard Cooper report that Tucumcari has dropped out of the Ute Lake project. This means that the cost to Texico will be higher than earlier stated.

He said Ute Lake officials want Texico to have a town hall meeting to learn more about the proposed project.

At the last council meeting, the council's tone was negative toward the project due to the high cost involved per resident.

-- Put into effect July 11, a 4 percent pay raises for city personnel.

-- Plans to put a 12-inch steel sleeve under Wheeler Avenue when it is repaired next month by state highway department personnel. This will allow for a later, and better, water line to be placed under the highway.

-- Heard Margie Crooks, of the Cemetery Board, say that the new trees at the cemetery are in bad shape.

It was suggested that Lewis Foster, who mows the cemetery, take care of watering the trees. But the problem is that he cannot make too high a salary or very high city insurance would kick in.

So someone else will be sought to water the trees. Also, a drip system was suggested.

-- Discussed raising the fees for head stones \$10. The council is looking at charging \$400 for cemetery plots, with \$75 to be refunded if a headstone is put on the grave within a year of a burial. Otherwise, the city would use the \$75 to put on a headstone.

accumulations ranged from .8 inches to over 2 inches at local weather stations. The precipitation did not come without cost, some areas were also stricken with hail which has taken a toll on area crops.

Over 5000 acres of cotton was severely damaged, much of which may end up being a total loss around the Farwell and Lariat areas.

Fields in this area sustained from 50% to 90% terminal loss plus severe damage on plants which still have the terminal intact. Square sets in this damaged cotton range from 0 to 15%.

Over 1000 acres of cotton was also lost and at least 3000 more damaged in the Maple area. Corn has also been damaged, leaves are stripped, tassels broken, and stalks bruised. Many fields have sustained mostly cosmetic damage but some may have lost some yield potential.

The current plot fee is \$300, plus a \$65 deposit for a headstone.

City councilman Oran Jay Autrey said several years ago he donated marble headstones (still at a Clovis monument company) to the city. The cemetery board will check on this and use them at the Texico cemetery.

-- Accepted the bid of Dix Electric, at \$5,555 for two fire sirens to be installed, one on the north side and one on the south side of Texico.

-- Will talk with city building inspector Terry Martin about changing his contract rate since the state is not allowing him to approve building permits right now. Autrey said it may take legislative action to allow it.

Thus, if someone wants a building permit in Texico, they have to get state approval.

Martin also helps with insect control, thus the need to keep paying him.

-- Heard Rutter report that nobody showed up at the Texico public auction for three vehicles. He will call "dismantlers" and get their bids in order to get rid of the vehicles.

-- Heard Hannagan report that Phase 1 of the city's street repair project (on the south side of town) is completed. But Autrey said he believed the contractor had used some of the city's cold mix on it. So the council is withholding \$7,500 toward the payment until an agreement is reached.

Phase 2 of the project, which includes east-west streets on the north side, will begin next week.

Also, the state has approved \$62,000 for Phase 3, which calls for repairs to Hereford, Katherine, Mildred, Hudson, Anderson and Kindred streets.

-- Purchased a pumper/tanker from Triple A, of Clovis, for \$270,326. It will be delivered in 240 to 300 days.

-- Okayed spending about \$20,000 (the bulk from fire department funds) for fire station overhead door repairs (to make them higher).

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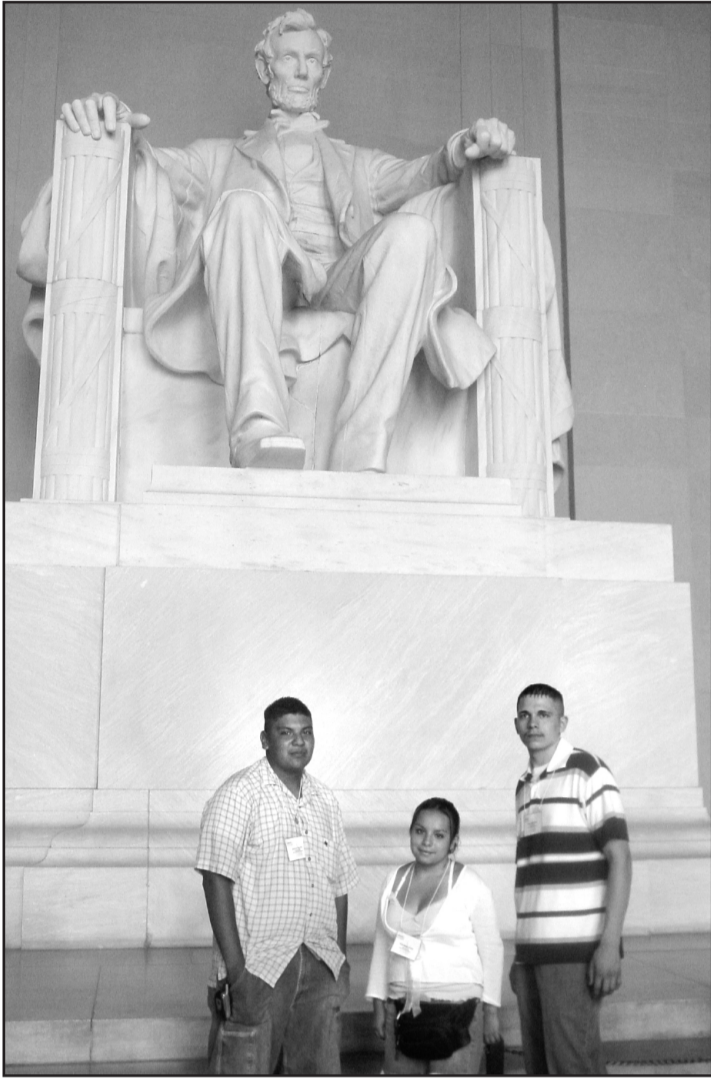

Students attend leadership institute

Bovina High's J.J. Reyna, Elizabeth Orozco and I recently visited Washington, D.C., as part of our participation in the Bert Corona Leadership Institute.

Our trip to Washington D.C. was educational, fun, and an experience we will never forget. It started out around October when Zeke Castro, our Region 16 migrant coordinator, came to Bovina and told us about the Leadership Institute that would take place in Washington D.C. He explained that the BCLI is a non-partisan, multicultural agency founded to train, develop, and build networks of leaders to empower their communities.

Special emphasis is placed on empowering youth for civic participation, citizenship and the political process. For us to be able to attend, we had to meet the following criteria: be a high school freshman, sophomore, or junior, a migrant student, and complete the application form with an essay and recommendation letters. The applications were due by Jan. 18.

Finally after waiting two months, we found out who the lucky people were. There were 14 students selected from Region 16, and the three of us were included. We also had our sponsor Celia Quintana, Migrant Coordinator.

Our journey started at 9:30 a.m. on June 4 as we met at the school to start our trip to Washington. We spent the day in Amarillo where we attended workshops to learn who Bert Corona was and how to introduce ourselves formally to our government officials. Finally, on June 5 at 3 a.m., we checked out of our hotel and went to the airport. Our flight left at 5 a.m. and after some transfers and 6 hours later, we landed in Washington.

While there, we were divided into groups, and each group came up with problems we had in our communities, plus statewide problems. Afterward, we decided on four issues we would present to our politicians -- which included education, agriculture, immigration and Social Security. We presented these to Sen. Cornyn, Sen. Hutchinson, Cong. Thornberry, and Cong. Neugebauer.

The purpose for going to Washington was to better understand how government and politics work, and we did. We made our presentations to the Congressmen and Senators and confirmed our belief that you never get a straight answer from a politician.

We toured every day and walked miles and miles, but because of the events of Sept. 11, and lack of time, there were some restrictions on the places we could see. For example, we toured only part of the White House.

We also visited Arlington Cemetery, Library of Congress, Supreme Court, Capitol Building, Holocaust Museum, and Air and Space Museum. We attended a

Rundell, who died in an airplane accident, was the interim youth minister at the First Baptist Church of Bovina. He put an emphasis on sending underprivi-

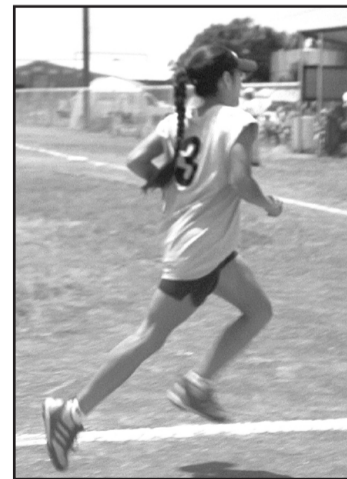
leged kids to church camp at Glorieta, N.M., even if he had to take money out of his own pocket.
