It's time for the 39th Border Town Days!

The 39th annual Border Town Days celebration kicks off Saturday and it promises to be another superb family event for the Twin Cities of Farwell and Texico.

The day begins with the decorated bicycle contest at 10 a.m. (all times in this article are cdt - Texas time). It will be held adjacent to the Texico branch of the Citizens Bank on Anderson Street.

The deadline for entering this contest is Friday, July 29, at noon. You need to sign up at the State Line Tribune office, 404 3rd St., Farwell. The theme is "Farwell's 100th Anniversary."

Cash prizes will be awarded to the top placers, and the grand champions (a boy and a girl) will receive brand-new bicycles, courtesy of Master Tech Auto Service and Tedson Trailers; both of Texico. Linda Moss and Joy Stanton are in charge of this contest.

The bicycle contest judging starts promptly with three judges from Clovis, picked by the Clovis Chamber of Commerce, serving in that capacity.

At 11 a.m., the Big Parade kicks off from Griffin Street in Texico. A map showing where participants need to line up is elsewhere in today's Tribune.

This year's parade again will feature a large contingent of antique tractors and cool cars. Parade Marshal Hal Helton will be assisted by Cynthia Reynolds, Charlie Bowers, and Nita Wilson in lining up the entries. Participants are urged to be at the parade start half an

Texico Police Officer Gilbert Salgvero will give the signal to kick off the parade, which proceeds down the highway (closed to traffic both ways). The parade goes to 5th Street in Farwell, turning south past the Farwell Convalescent Center, and ending at the Farwell City

Helping out in this area will be David Pollard, who will be stationed at the railroad crossing, and J'Dan Sudderth, who will be at the end point of the parade to direct participants where to park.

After the parade, which normally takes about 45 minutes, folks will congregate at the Farwell City Park for a large variety of food and entertainment, highlighted by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club barbecue. Walter Hughes & Co. is in charge of the barbecue, which is known for its delectability throughout the area. The BBQ opens immediately after the parade.

Also at noon, the Merchants Giveaway will start. Thirty merchants are participating in giving away goodies to folks who have signed up at their businesses. Jerry Adams and the folks from the Farwell Convalescent Center are in charge of this event.

Announcements of winners will be made by master of ceremonies Fred Chandler periodically, until the giveaways end. Folks will have a few minutes to get to the gazebo to collect their winnings - or new names will be

The opening ceremony starts at 12:30 p.m. at the gazebo with Allie Brooks singing the National Anthem. Then the Twin Cities mayors will give their tradition welcome, after which Honorary Parade Marshal Mike Prokop, Texico football coach, will be honored.

The float contest, tractor contest, car contest, decorated bicycle contest, and animal unity contest winners will be announced and cash prizes handed out. Providing funds for these awards were Security State Bank, the Texico branch of Citizens Bank, the Farwell Banking Center of Muleshoe State Bank, the Texico and Farwell Chambers of Commerce, and the anonymous donor.

One special note about this year's BTD. To go along with the theme of Farwell's 100th anniversary, the current and two former Farwell mayors will be in the parade along with two former Farwell School superintendents -- Jack Williams and Willie Roberts.

Lazbuddie School's story started in '25

Lazbuddie Class of 1966

It was no more than a wide place in the road in 1925. when the first students enrolled at Lazbuddie School. They walked, rode in Model T's, and occasionally horseback to school, and it was the start of a long, rich heritage that continues today.

While many small country schools have consolidated, or went to either elementary or high school grades only, Lazbuddie School will celebrate its 80th anniversary on Aug. 6 with ex-students, teachers and friends gathering for a special all-school reunion.

Donna Glover, reunion coordinator, said events will start at 8:30 a.m. that day with a golf tourney, then registration at 10 a.m. at the school. A concession lunch will be served at noon, and a general assembly will be held at 4 p.m. in the auditorium. The day will conclude with supper at 6:30 p.m. in the cafeteria.

The original "Old Red" school building was built in 1928, and the campus grew in 1948 with the addition of a new high school building, just north of Old Red. An elementary school was built on the south side of Old Red in 1956.

E.R. Haskins was the first superintendent, from 1929 to 1935. He was also the first boys' basketball coach. The first girls' coach was George Foreman.

"There was a quonset barn out behind the school where they played basketball," said Barbara (Hinkson) Lust. "I remember sitting in my grade school classroom and looking out the window and seeing the quonset on fire. We formed a bucket brigade, but it burned down."

Mrs. Lust, who authored a history of Lazbuddie School, said parents and teachers formed the first PTA in 1929, and the school participated in the first UIL contest in 1930.

"Home economics classes were started in 1931", she said. "and vo-ag in 1932. Also, in 1932, the school played football for the first time. The first graduation ceremony was in 1931, and Lazbuddie became a fully accredited high school in 1934."


Old Red was torn down in 1965 to make room for a new cafeteria, offices and classrooms. The new building joined together the high school and elementary building, which stand today.






Texico receives rate hike request from Duncan Disposal

The Texico City Council on Tuesday met with Duncan Disposal representatives to discuss a rate hike.

They asked for a 4 percent cost of living hike to go into effect the first week in October.

Don Foard, Duncan's municipal marketing director, noted that Duncan hasn't asked Texico for a rate hike since 2001 although they could have sought a cost of living hike annually under the terms of the contract.

Also attending was Robert Searls, Duncan's general manager.

Duncan's reps indicated that the fuel surcharge will be maintained because the cost of fuel continues to be high. As for the future, there is no way of knowing which way it will go.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey suggested a 6 percent hike because that would include any proposed fuel surcharge hike by Duncan.

Autrey said it would be better to have residents accept one hike rather than two -- one now (the 4 percent requested) and one this winter (if fuel costs remained high, it is possible Duncan would seek another hike

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stamps or TANF only have to list their child's name, food stamp or TANF case number. An adult household member must sign the application.


Households who do not list a food stamp number or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "none". The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy the school secretary will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Charles Carter, Supt., P.O. Box 70, Bovina, TX, (806) 251-1336.

Households that list a food stamp or TANF case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

Letter to the Editor

In the July 21, 2005 issue of the State Line Tribune an article was published regarding the amazing story of the 5-year-old Taylor McCoy. I only hope I could match Taylor's courage in defending my own dog should she encounter the same unfortunate circumstance. Taylor sounds like an extraordinary young boy, and I wish him a full, speedy recovery.

I would, however, appreciate the opportunity to provide some clarification regarding information which was misreported in the article. Specifically, the article indicated that while Plains Regional Medical Center in Clovis possessed adequate supplies of antivenom, "Friona hospital only had one vial available," a statement which engenders the notion that Parmer County Community Hospital (PCCH) is not adequately prepared to treat snakebite victims. It is vitally important that the residents of PCCH's service area understand that such a notion is entirely false. At all times PCCH maintains recommended levels of antivenom, and we remain fully prepared to administer high-quality healthcare to victims of a snakebite, as we have done five times during the last two years. Please allow me to provide a cursory explanation of standard treatment protocol for snakebite victims, as it relates to the standard protocol at PCCH.

The snakebite therapy of choice in the medical community today is called CroFab (crotalidae polyvalent immune fab). Administration of CroFab should be initi-

ated as soon as possible after snakebite in patients who develop signs of progressive envenomation. The initial dose of CroFab, which is 4 to 6 vials, may be repeated, if necessary, until control of the initial symptoms has been achieved. Following initial control of symptoms, maintenance doses (2 vials) of CroFab may be administered, and additional doses may be required for recurrence of symptoms as time progresses.

Sean P. Bush, M.D., FACEP, Associate Professor of **Emergency Medicine at Loma Linda University Medical** Center, where he is also on staff in the ER as an emergency physician and envenomation specialist, advises that all hospitals should maintain in stock at least one dose (4 to 6 vials) of CroFab. As advised by Dr. Bush and required by protocols established by the Medical Staff of PCCH, we maintain one dose (4 vials) of CroFab at all times. To provide and added measure of security for our patients, we enjoy an ongoing agreement with Hereford Regional Medical Center which provided PCCH with access to addition supplies of CroFab. Dr. Bush further recommends that all snakebite victims should be transferred to a facility with an appropriate Intensive Care Unit following administration of the initial dose of CroFab, as is the standard protocol at PCCH.

Occasional encounters with rattlesnakes are an unfortunate reality of life here in rural north Texas, and I want to assure the residents of Parmer County and the surrounding area that the team of healthcare providers at PCCH stands ready and able to provide the necessary treatment for snakebite victims in our area.

I appreciate the opportunity to clarify any misconceptions resulting from the noted article, and I invite anyone to contact me should there be questions related to the services available at PCCH.

Registered dogs, purebred dogs, papered dogs, what does it all mean? In the simplest explanation, a purebred is an animal whose parents, and grandparents, are all the same breeds. A registered, or "papered" animal is one whose parents and grandparents are purebred and have their lineage verified through an organization that keeps these pedigree records. Some records can trace a pedigree back well over one hundred years. Nearly every purebred domestic animal breed has a registry somewhere.

When you buy a registered dog, the seller should be able to give you a registration certificate or a litter certificate. If the seller says that the paperwork has not come back, then he should be able to give you the registration numbers and registered names of both parents and the date the puppy was born. Being registered is as close to proof as you can come to a guarantee that your dog is purebred. Though, it is not one hundred percent because there are unethical people everywhere.

Some people assert that the AKC and UKC "ruin" breeds of dogs because these organizations promote dog shows. Hogwash! Sure, some breeders breed

dogs just to win, but there are also many that care deeply about proper disposition and health. Both of the main registries promote dogs that are representative of their breed both in appearance and attitude. In addition to the "beauty" shows, there are also hunting, herding, obedience, agility, and lure coursing shows.

Is a purebred better than a mix? Both have their good points, and personal preference is the only criteria. When you get a purebred from a breeder who knows their breed, you can be pretty sure of certain things like adult size, appearance, and behavior. In other words, that Golden Retriever will look like a Golden, have a soft mouth, and will show an interest in birds and retrieving. On the other hand, a Golden Retriever mixed with a Collie will give you a pup with hybrid vigor, less likely to have genetic illnesses, and often many of the best traits of both breeds. Drawbacks for purebreds are that some breeds are more predisposed to certain genetic disorders, and some breeders just do not care if their dogs are healthy or good specimens of the breed. Mixed breeds are a bit of a grab bag, with a combination of traits from the various breeds in their background. Most mixes are fun and good looking dogs, but other times they can be strange creatures like a Rottweiler/ShihTzu mix I once knew who was short legged like a Bassett hound, with short spiky hair, and a pushed in face. She had a wonderful, sweet personality, just like her ShihTzu father, but it was hard to see the Rottweiler characteristics of her mother, other than size.



Local photographer captures nature on film

While she was in college she got her first digital camera. Since then, she has estimated that she has taken around 5,000 photographs.

Luckily, the digital format allows a lot of flexibility, as well as being much easier on

Rebecca found this important because it allowed her to experiment more with her shots. For instance, in 'Stormy Sky Over West Texas', the clouds are backlit by the sun. This creates a very dramatic image but it also tends to wash out the foreground of the the photo, which includes the windmill. It would have previously taken quite a few shots to make sure that the settings were right to get the best image. This would

have probably run up a rather large bill to develop all that film, but with digital equipment taking one picture costs the same at 20 or even 200 for that matter.

Along with photography Rebecca also enjoys drawing, painting, and digital imaging. A few of her photos are shown below. These as well as others can be seen on display at Gallery Fifteen in Farwell.



Texico school building nears completion

(Editor's note: This article is part of a continuing series featuring issues of the Texico-Farwell News, published between 1917 and 1920. The issues were discovered a couple of years ago in the basement of the Ruby's Antiques building in Texico.)

The big news in the Sept. 27, 1918, issue of the Texico-Farwell News was that the new Texico School building was nearly completion and was ready for the teachers and pupils of the primary grades. It would be a week or more before the high school would be ready for their

Pupils planned entertainment at the school on Oct. 4 for the benefit of the school library. The whole community was invited to come and bring a pie or box as the box supper and social hour would be after the program.

Other major articles on the page involved World War I, with headlines such as "Americans operating Germans' railroad", "German people stunned by recent events in France", "Texas has sent 200,000 men into nation's service" and "National Woman's Liberty Loan."

The Methodist Church was planning the first of a series of Lay services held by men. B.N. Graham is the Lay-leader and in charge. Topics would include "Abraham's offering Isaac as an example of faith and consecration", by F.J. Doose; "David's mission to the world", by W.M. Ford; "Secret of Paul's success," by B.N. Graham; and the closing address by J.M. Hamlin.

As always, on Page 3, there was the full page ad for the Cannon Ball Motor Company. This ad has been covered in previous Tribune articles so it will just note again that the company failed to produce vehicles as offered.

On Page 2, an article said that John Bradley, one of the irrigation farmers, had half acre of onions this year that yielded 12,000 pounds which he sold at 5 cents per

He also has 33 acres of sweet potatoes which are estimated to make 300 bushels per acre. Onions are \$1,200 per acre, and sweet potatoes at \$750 to \$1,000 bring in a lot of revenue if you have acres enough.

"Bovina Items" noted:



-- O.J. McLean is the new possessor of a jitney.

-- Bovina School is progressing nicely, with a large enrollment. Mrs. Hecox, Miss Lively, Miss Ross and Miss Gregory compose the faculty. Mr. Fish is janitor.

-- Miss Camilla Patton is teaching the Daniel School southwest of Bovina, and spending weekends in town.

-- Miss Irene Tidenberg and Miss Gertrude Lambert are teaching the Liberty School near the Y.L. Ranch.

-- Forest Ross is home on a 30-day agriculture furlough from El Paso.

On Page 4, there was a half-page ad addressed to "The People of Texico-Farwell":

The ad said the People Auto Supply Company of Texico-Farwell was offering shares for \$100 each "when we are ready for business."

R.H. Burgess, of Texico, (who had a P.S. saying he wanted to buy your Broom Corn), said the organization would be completed Oct. 15-18. "You can get in between now and that time if the stock is not all subscribed for. ... Wholesale and retail business and 200 customers to start with. Help concentrate business. Remember the Knocker has an axe to grind. Send me your subscription

By subscribing the \$100, "you are entitled to buy your auto supplies at Jobbers Prices plus 10 percent ... You can save 25 percent per year and then get another dividend from the wholesale end of the business, which I am reasonably certain, will amount to from 25 to 50 per-

The rest of Page 4 carried lots of tidbits, such as:

-- The Literary and Debating Club of Farwell High will meet Friday night at the Court House. The topic is "Should Government ownership of the railroads be adopted after the war?" Affirmative, Battenfield. Negative, White.

-- Mrs. Bolls, wife of the painter and paper-hanger for the new Texico school building, and who is staying at the Cannon Ball Hotel, is sick this week.

-- Mr. Snodgrass left Monday morning for Kansas City with a car load of sheep.


-- Work has begun on the new telephone building. The old building has been moved to the back of the lot and the new foundation is being laid.



"You not funny more any. I give you taste of own medicine."


He/it then fired the thing at me, hitting me in the forehead. The effects of its ray gun were astounding!




