The car industry always spends a considerale sum of money in market research to determine what the public's taste is trending to. A car that is a dud stylewise can result in frightful losses to the company that markets it.

Ever since the war, the manufacturers have been confident that the American people wanted cars ever bigger, better (more luxurious), and were willing to pay the price tag to get these autos.

And so, the makers who offered cars with more horsepower, more driving comforts, more chrome, and wider seats and longer wheelbases were the ones who stayed out in

These cars have necessarily resulted in high initial cost, and because of their girth and performance, have also been expensive to maintain and operate. But, it appeared that this was the formula for Mr. and Mrs. America.

All of a sudden 1958 came around, though, and something happened to the tastes of the public. For reasons which no one has been able to explain, there has been a clamber for small, low-priced cars which, although having poor performance by the standards we have become accustomed to, are fabulously

Their comparatively small plant in Wisconsin is about the busiest auto maker in the country at the moment.

Ford is rushing up with standby plans it has had for a small car. The new model is expected to be introduced this summer or early fall. This is not the English-built small car of Ford that already is selling well in the country. The new car will be built here at home.

So far the only move General Motors has made has been to import a small car made in the B-M factories in Germany. It is called the Opel. So far it is handled only through Buick dealers. Observers feel G-M will either introduce some more small cars or give Opel dealerships to Chevrolet, Oldsmobile and Pontiac handlers in the near future, though.

Chrysler is suffering one of its major setbacks. The Chrysler Corporation is one of the nation's oldest and best entrenched car making units, and has skated over some thin ice in previous years. (Remember the old Chrysler Air-Flo car of the 30's, which was ahead of its time?)

Chrysler made an astounding come-back in 1957, led by a new president, Tex Colbert, who, incidentally is really a Texan as the name implies. Chrysler couldn't make enough cars that year to keep up with orders, so company strategy was to make only minor changes for 1958 and keep cranking out the cars instead of shutting down for costly retooling and a big model change.

This now appears to have been a major strategy error, as Chrysler - made products have fallen way down in sales totals. It also would appear to mean that the American public insists on a major style change every year, although that argument can be shot full of holes by looking at the way Americans are buying the German Volkswagen, which hasn't undergone a significant style change since Adolph Hitler had it designed "for the people" in 1937! Cotton below 15/16 inch has limited market demands. Shoot for 31/32.

Beef cattle research proves cottonseed hulls can reduce cost and improve feedlot results. Replacing 1/3 to ½ of the alfalfa in steer rations improved gains, dressing percentage and carcass grade and reduced bloat and scours in Texas Agricultural Experiment Station tests. The Mississippi Station found 100 pounds of hulls to equal 272 pounds of sorghum silage, while in a Texas Tech College test hulls had 225 percent of the value of sorghum silage. When hulls replaced sweet sorghum fodder, in a ration containing sorghum grain, cottonseed meal and alfalfa hay, steers gained faster and had a slightly higher dressing percentage at the Big Spring, Texas Field Station. Feeding hull to cattle grazing fast growing, washy small grain pasture prevents excessive looseness and mproves utilization of the grass.



from accidents. Highly combustible buildings, ject entirely. nay, feed, and flammable liquids are found on farms. Farm families can prevent fire only by keeping fire, heat, and power under control and keeping all combustible materials away from heat, sparks, and

Common causes of fire on farms are: defective heating and cooking equipment, de-fective chimneys, sparks fall-ing on combustible roofs, dry leaves or grass, misuse of electricity or defective wiring, equipment, or appliances; careless use of matches and tobacco, tractors, autos or other gas engines, and dryers operated near combustible materials; flammable liquids or gasses improperly stored or used, uncontrolled burning of trash, grass, or woods; fats, grease, potholders, or clothing exposed to the heat of the kitchen range; cleaning fluids used indoors, or fires quickened with kero-

Prevent fires by avoiding these causes of fire. Dispose of trash and accumulated junk in house, barn, or yard.

Man is the master of fire, heat and power, all necessary on farms. A wise master makes each his obedient servant.
