Family: That's substance

There's something about this western landscape, I guess.

I got a call from a gal who worked as a reporter for me back in Virginia several weeks ago. She was born in Amarillo and wanted very badly to return to Texas. She wanted to know if I knew of any jobs here.

I didn't, but she heard about a position in Conroe, Texas. And it felt pretty good, when her prospective employer called me to check out her professional credentials, to say she was a top-notch worker. As it turned out, she got the job and another Texan has returned home.

It was a coincidence that a day or two after she called, that an editor I had trained back East also called. Yes, he was from Texas and wanted to return, too. I'm sure he'll find a spot one of these days.

Before I arrived in the Twin Cities, I probably would have been hard-pressed to understand why young professionals would want to leave the hustle-bustle of the East Coast to the big sky country out West. Now I understand.

It's not the landscape that counts. It's not the position so much that matters. The money even becomes secondary after awhile. It's the people that are missed.

Folks here, we have found, are decent, God-fearing, family-oriented and community-minded. Now, I realize that not everyone falls into all those categories. But I think most do.

Funny thing is that some people here probably don't realize what a good thing they have going. The fellowship here is second to none. The family that you have here, whether it be blood relatives, neighbors or the whole community, is just that -- family. You can't put a dollar figure on that.

I got to thinking of the type of community this is when I was reading Bro. Ralph Gate's remarks in last week's edition. His comment about "openness" really hit home. That's exactly the word my family could use to describe our greetings by townsfolk last year.

And I remember what one local fella told me shortly after my arrival.

"Y'know, Mike," he said. "I bet if my car broke down and I had to get somewhere, I could knock on any door in town and borrow that person's car. That's what type of people live here -- right neighborly."

When I look back at all the places I have lived, I would be hard put to think of any of them in the same vein. Oh, sure, they had other things going for them. But, in the final analysis, they don't count for very much; they're veneer, without substance.

Family -- that's substance. In a big town, the pace picks up. There's more diversions. More people to know, more places to go. Too often, the family takes a back seat to what else is offered.

It really stood out when I lived in the suburbs of Washington, D.C. There were young people, people in their 20's and 30's, and even some in their 40's and 50's. But there were very, very few grandparents. It was almost like one of those fairy tales where the elderly are not allowed.

That bothered me. To me, if a family unit -- child, parents and grandparents -- can either live together or near each other, so much the better. Sometimes, that can't be the case, such as in my own, for example.

But it's a joy when I read articles in this paper about families celebrating grandparent's or great-grandparent's birthday. That is the way it should be. And that's one of the great strengths of this area: people care about their folks. I mean, really care.

The way our communities are set up, with strong churches, caring neighbors and families, we have a real strength that surpasses all the glitter that a big city has to offer.

It's a lesson I wished I had learned years earlier.

Fosters arrived in a covered wagon

Will Foster and his parents moved to Farwell 65 years ago.

At first, they lived 10 miles east of town, the area now known as Oklahoma Lane. The family traveled here in a Model T and a Valley Car.

Will returned to Oklahoma and married Gertrude Churchwell. Will and Gertrude had been school sweethearts in Elks City, Okla. They both went to a little country school named Willow Springs.

After they got married, Will and Gertrude traveled by train back to Farwell in January 1921.

The Fosters marketed milk and cream to Raton, N.M. and Grade A milk to Plainview, Texas, and Portales, N.M. The milk was placed in 10-gallon cans.

Gertrude and their first child, Nelson, had traveled back to Oklahoma to visit in 1922. In September, Will, his son and Gertrude traveled back to Farwell by covered wagon. It took them 5 1/2 days to return.

The Fosters have six children -- Nelson, who died in 1973; Estelle Feagan of Kansas; B.J. lives in

Lubbock and is a Methodist minister; Barbara Trumble of the Pleasant Hill area; Nicky (Merle Duane) lives in Decab, Texas, and Marci Bell lives in Clovis.

The school the children attended is now the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church. The school had basketball, baseball and six-man football at the time.

In 1940, Oklahoma Lane had lights and phone service but the roads weren't graded yet. Foster helped grade the roads by using four horses. Charles Christian was the County Commissioner and he paid Foster \$5 a day for the work. They graded from Farwell, to the underpass, to the Boling place and to Sam White's place.

Son Nelson raised Appaloosa horses, including 006 Domino. Just in the last year Will sold an heir of 006 to Ed Hardage.

Son Nicky, when he was younger, showed Jersey cows in Plainview and won the Showmanship World Champion Dairy Cows award.

Texico moves forward on empty buildings

The Texico City Council Tuesday night began action to solve the problem of two longtime vacant buildings along the highway.

The council unanimously passed a resolution finding the two buildings unsafe. The buildings are located in the block directly east of City Hall. One, known as the Olson Building, is owned by Frank Dalton, said City Attorney Duane Hamar. The other, known as the Freeman Building, is owned by W.L. Freeman and B.L. Freeman, said Hamar.

According to state law, a copy of the resolution must be served on the owners or posted on the buildings. Within 10 days, the owner shall start removing the building or file a

written objection with the city council seeking a hearing.

Appearing before the council was Bill Nance, a state building inspector headquartered in Clovis. He said the buildings were a menace and could be dangerous for citizens. He also gave the council a written report on his findings.

As for the Freeman building, it was obvious that the front wall is collapsing. Nance said the floor in the Olson Building is in danger of falling into the basement.

The council has funds budgeted for the demolition of buildings.

In other business, the council: --Told Hamar to check into prices for painting the water tower with a

sign noting the state championships that Texico High has garnered over the years. Both the Booster Club and Chamber of Commerce have agreed to give \$100 apiece toward the project.

--Approved spending \$30 toward a Texico-Farwell Lions Club project of placing flags in front of Twin City businesses on nine patriotic days a year. The \$30 will be for a flag, in front of City Hall.

--Tabled a request by Bill Moreland for a street light to be placed at Ave. E and S. Garwood. The council will check first to see if a pole is in place there.

--Noted that a new city marshal will be named at its March 26 meeting.

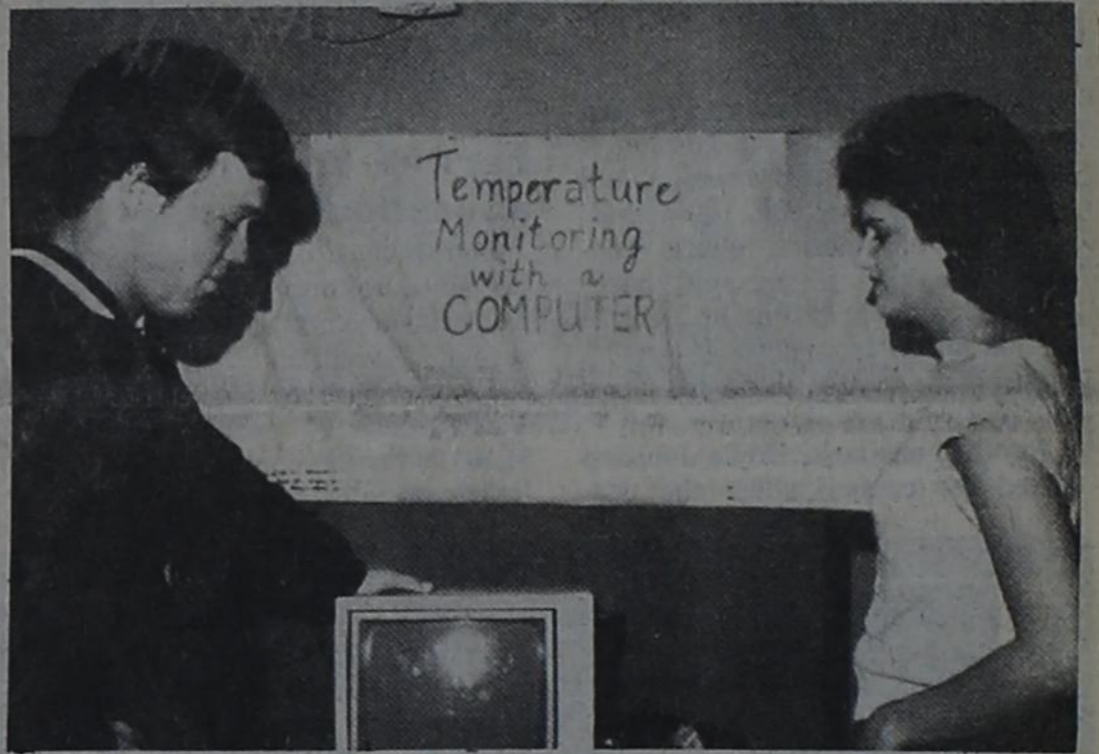

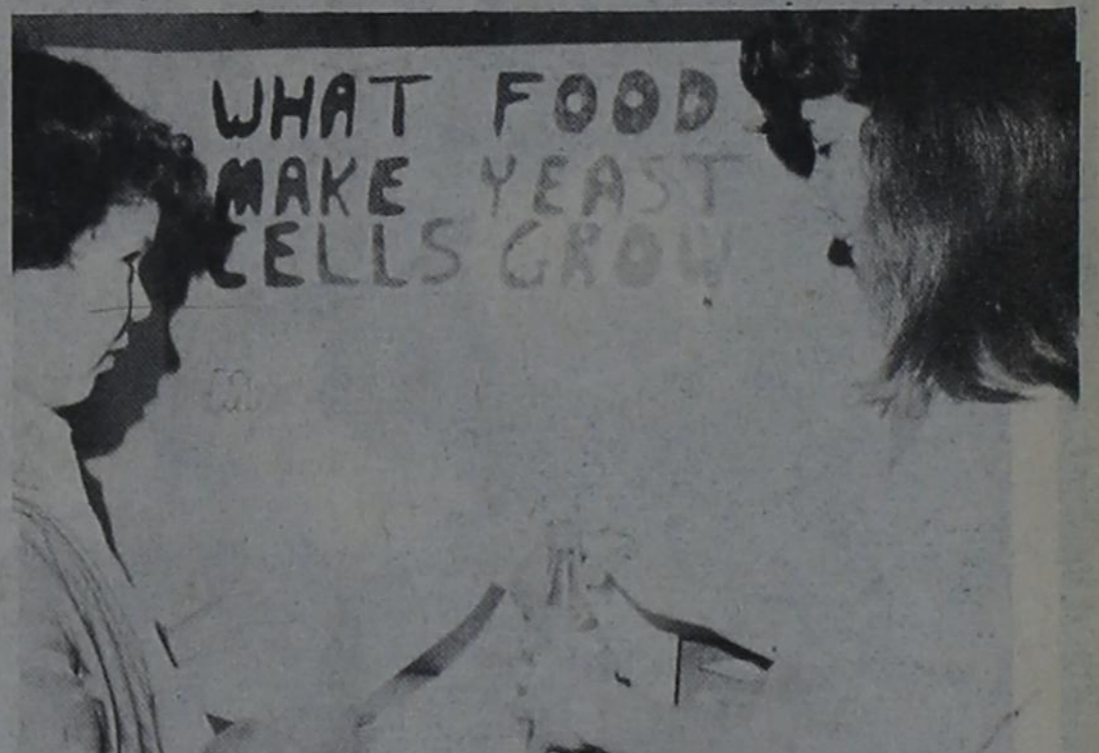

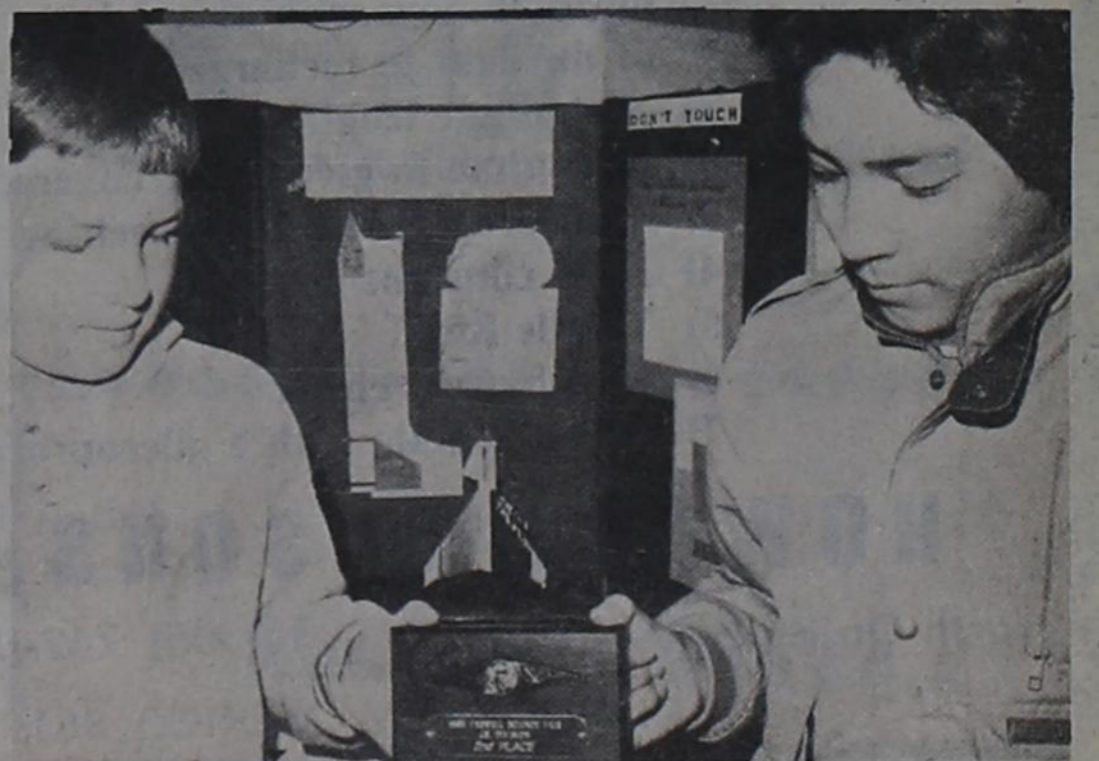

The Fosters moved to Farwell in 1952 on Third Street. The house is now owned by Gary Fly. In 1962, they moved to their present address at 904 3rd Street.

Mrs. Foster was active in the Oklahoma Lane Variety Club which has been desolved now; she was president and treasurer. She is in the Farwell Study club and United Methodist Women. Mr. Foster has been busy with his dairy cows and farming. Some of the businesses that the Fosters remembered of the 1920's were four grocery stores, two or three cafes, a gin, two department stores, two doctors, and a theater. When they moved to town in 1952, Main Street was paved, Third street was not paved yet.

Gertrude was the Farwell Study Club Woman of the Year in 1973 and

Chamber of Commerce Woman of the Year in 1983.

Both of the Fosters enjoy the choir at the Methodist Church in Farwell. They helped get choir robes and a music stand. The music stand has been dedicated to the Fosters and they were presented a gold plaque.

The Fosters will celebrate their 64th wedding anniversary in December.

Mr. Foster was born April 20, 1901 and his wife Oct. 23, 1901. They have 22 grandchildren and 32 great-grandchildren.

Asked what they thought of Farwell, Mr. Foster replied, "If I know of a better place I would go there. Since I have been a resident of Farwell for 65 years, believe I will stay put."

Park restroom to be checked

The need for a restroom at the Farwell City Park was discussed at Monday's City Council meeting.

Councilman Fred Chandler said he would check into whether a restroom could be placed at the park.

The topic came up during a meeting with Gary Pitner, a representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. Pitner explained program guidelines and how small West Texas communities can apply for state funds through the PRPC.

Most of the projects getting PRPC approval are for water line extensions. After further discussion, it didn't appear that Farwell could qualify under PRPC guidelines (such as eliminating ghetto conditions, having a pressing need, where the bulk of the immediate population to be served as low-to-moderate income, etc.) for such projects.

In other business, Doyle Johnson asked the council about the pos-

sibility of paving the east end of I Street. The council told Johnson he needs to talk with his neighbors, including the school system, about participating on the cost. The council indicated it favors the project.

Jesse Landrum was appointed election judge for the April 6 city election. Archie Tarter and Dorothy Eason will be clerks.

As recommended by the Farwell Community Center board, the council agreed to lower the rate for using the center kitchen for cooking purposes from \$50 to \$15. The rate for using the dining room will stay at \$20.

Farwell tax allocation increases

Bob Bullock, comptroller of state accounts, has provided totals for the Farwell sales and use tax summary through March 1.

The net payment for this period was \$2,267.12, compared with \$1,569.29 for the comparable period last year -- a 17.79 percent increase.

In other business, the Chamber pledged \$100 toward painting a sign on the water tower noting that Texico is "the home of state

champions." The Texico Booster Club pledged \$100 last week, also, for this project.

If done, the sign also would include a picture of a Wolverine and list the several state championship Texico teams of the past few years.

The council agreed to have a new brochure printed up. And a letter was received from Texico High, thanking the Chamber for donating funds to send a student to Boys State.



Texico girls lose regional match

In a battle of state powerhouses, the Texico girls' varsity basketball team came out on the short end in regional district play at Elida March 8; the Wolverines lost to Grady, 56-44.

The defeat, followed by Texico's win over Elida, 53-46, in the consolation left the Wolverines with a 21-4 mark as their season ended.

Concerning the loss to Grady, Coach Roy King said, "We got beaten by a pretty good team. I think Grady has a good chance of winning the state. We didn't shoot well, especially from the outside and we were not able to get the ball inside."

"Although we got behind by 15 points, we came back to within six points a couple of times. But they got some fast-break points and they extended their lead."

Grady took a 15-10 lead at the end of the first quarter, and increased its lead to 33-18 at halftime. Texico outscored Grady 12-8 in the third period, but Grady nudged Texico 15-14 in the final stanza.

Scoring for Texico were: Cheryl Scott, 16 points; Kelly Lynn, 14; Kathy Harrison, 6; Coy Jo Burk, 4; and Karen Snodgrass and Helen Jo Boarman, 2 each.

Texico hit on 20 of 59 shots from the field, for 33.9 percent. From the free throw line, they were 4 for 8--50 percent.

Scott led Texico with 15 rebounds. Also helping were Harrison, 5; Lynn, 3; Twilla Longo, 2; Burk and Boarman, 1 each.

Snodgrass had 6 steals for Texico. Boarman led in assists with 4.

Against Elida, which had defeated Texico in four overtimes the week before, Texico fell behind 10-4 at the end of the first quarter before going into the half with a 22-22 tie. Texico outscored Elida, 16-4, in the third quarter. Elida won the final stanza, 20-15.

Scoring for Texico were: Lynn and Harrison, 14 each; Scott, 11; Snodgrass, 8; Burk, 4; and Boarman, 2.

Leading rebounders were Snodgrass, 10; Lynn, 7, and Scott, 6.

"It was hard getting up to play this game," said King. "But all our players wanted to win this game for our three seniors -- Cheryl Scott, Kathy Harrison and Karen Snodgrass."

Texico's hopes dashed

After a district opening round win over Dora last week, Texico's varsity boys basketball team's hopes for a district tournament title were dashed by Tatum, 55-42, at Floyd.

In the Thursday ball game, Tatum jumped out to a 14-8 first quarter lead, then upped its margin to 28-17 at halftime. Tatum outscored Texico in the final two quarters, also -- 9 to 6 and 18 to 17.

The loss ends the season for the Wolverines, who finished with a 15-9 mark. They were 7-3 in district.

Scoring for Texico were: Regan Williams, 22; Danny Powell, 9; Billy Bibbs, 5; Stanley Cross, 4, and Doug Thornton, 2.

Bibbs and Powell each had three steals. Powell had three assists. Williams had 8 rebounds, followed by Cross with 5.

Texico made 17 of 41 shots, 42 percent, from the floor. The Wolverines were 8 of 18 from the free throw line -- 44 percent.

In the earlier game against Dora, won by Texico, 57-50, scoring for the Wolverines were: Williams, 25; Bibbs and Powell, 10 each; Mark Meeks, 6; Stan Cross, 4, and Doug

Thornton, 2. Bibbs led in assists with three. Powell had five steals. Williams had 20 rebounds.

Texico jumped out to a 16-8 first quarter lead, but went into the half trailing 24-23. The Wolverines came on strong in the final stanza for the win.

Combest cites USDA measures

Rep. Larry Combest announced today that the U.S. Department of Agriculture will permit farmers to hay and graze 1985 acreage conservation reserve (ACR) acres. Combest was notified by USDA concerning the special permitting of haying and grazing due to the current shortages of hay. State officials of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office will determine which counties are eligible to participate under the special ACR provision. The determination to hay and graze will be made on a county-by-county basis and farmers in the 19th Congressional District need to apply with their local ASCS county offices for eligibility and permission to participate in this ACR program.

In addition to haying and grazing their own acres, this ruling permits farmers to allow haying and grazing of their ACR acres by another producer. Farmers utilizing this provision may not charge for the value of the hay or other vegetative growth. "This decision by USDA should alleviate current shortages of hay brought on by adverse weather and allow farmers to replenish depleted hay supplies," Combest said. "I encourage the farmers of West Texas to contact their local ASCS offices in order to participate in this special haying and grazing program."



Flag project under way

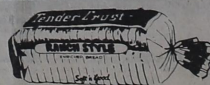
