# Tax Appraisal Board Rejects Building Donation

The newly elected and recently organized Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board met Monday night and voted to reject the offer of a free building to house the board.

The anonymous offer was made to the Tax Appraisal Board, via the Parmer County Commissioners Court. The original offer was for the construction of an approximately 30' x 40' all-brick building at the cost of about \$50,000. The construction of the building would take about 75-90 days and the only stipulation placed on the donation was

that it be built on the north-west corner of the Parmer County jail in Farwell.

The Tax Appraisal Board is comprised of five county men. The board consists of E.A. Parham of Lazbuddie, Lawrence Jamerson of Bovina, David Grimsley of Friona, D.C. Herring of Friona and Gilbert Kaltwasser of Farwell. The board members are elected by the school board and the city and county commissioners based on the number of parcels in each district. Consequently, there are two board members from Friona

and one each from Bovina, Lazbuddie and Farwell.

The purpose of this newly-organized board is the result of a state law passed last year to set up a uniform appraisal system for all property in the county. The board will be in charge of appraisal for all tax units; their appraisals will be sent to the individual taxing agencies and rates will be set there. At the present time each unit does its own appraising and there is quite a discrepancy.

The immediate job of the board is to hire a chief ap-

praiser, set up the office, approve the budget for the office and hire a review board. So far, the meeting times have been consumed with setting up the office.

In their meeting on Monday, May 5, the board met to discuss the donation of the building. In this meeting, Gilbert Kaltwasser made a motion that the building be accepted as offered. The motion was seconded by E.A. Parham and the resulting discussion lasted approximately two hours. In the final vote, the decision was split, with Kalt-

wasser and Parham voting for the motion and Jamerson and Herring voting against. Grimsley, being chairman of the board, cast the deciding tie-breaking vote against the motion. Before the meeting ended, Jamerson moved to reconsider the motion on the following Monday.

In the next meeting on Monday, May 12, Jamerson moved and Herring seconded to put the office in Bovina. The reason given was that it was a centrally located place and convenient to the entire county.

The resulting vote, again after several hours of discussion, was the same as the one on the previous Monday night. Kaltwasser and Parham voted against this motion, Jamerson and Herring voted for it and Grimsley broke the tie by voting for it. The motion passed to house the board in Bovina, in a location to be found.

According to Kaltwasser, he and Parham question whether or not they will be spending the taxpayers' money wisely by paying rent on a building when there is a free one available.

The building being discussed is a 20' x 30' building of approximately 600 square feet and the rent on this building will be \$150 per month, according to Kaltwasser.

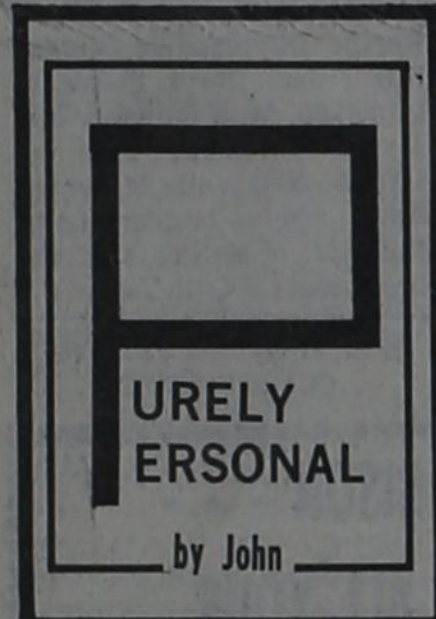
Kaltwasser feels that no consideration was given to the fact that the offered free building would have given the board access to the courthouse and county tax records.

"I feel that the battle lines are down," said Kaltwasser. "We had what we needed and it was free and we turned it down. I fail to understand the

reasoning of the other board members.

"I feel like Tony (Parham) and I and the entire city of Farwell have received a deliberate slap in the face. I think that no matter what was offered, Farwell would not be considered by the board as a place for the building," Kaltwasser said.

The Tax Appraisal Board normally meets on the first Monday of each month. It will conduct an additional called meeting if something new comes up, according to Kaltwasser.



Ah me, how petty can a body get? We really do not know, but the committee to select the location of the consolidated county tax assessing office should give us a clue.

We note in a story that their considered judgement was to locate it in Bovina and pay a fee. Some place a small amount of the taxes paid by each and every taxpayer in Parmer County will go to pay that expense. It is a needless expense in light of the offer to have had it built free and donated to the county.

As with most government authorities we really appreciate the way they spend our money. I view this as the Tax Board forcefully taking a small amount of money out of my pocket needlessly, without my consent. As we see it, the only purpose of this irresponsible spending of the public purse was to satisfy petty and partisan ends -- urk.

The flip side of freedom is responsibility. A thorough discussion of these few words would run into several large tomes of fine print. Unfortunately many people in this country are not prone to think very much on this subject. It would appear that most people in the mass media have not even given the thought passing notice.

Press censorship is abhorrent to all thinking citizens of this country, yet freedom of the press entails a great deal of responsibility. In common with most folks we feel that the greater welfare of all the people in the United States deserves some consideration. Apparently the mighty moguls of our Public Broadcasting System put the general welfare of our country in a secondary position to their concept of freedom of the press.

By their decision to televise the controversial "Death of a Princess" film they are endangering the welfare of this country. Generally speaking, these same people who wish to show this film are the same ones who have painted us in this energy corner of dependence upon imported, mostly Arab, oil. This really puts us in a position of not being able to pick a fight with anyone, least of all our prime source of oil.

Yes, we can easily win the battle of freedom of the press, but can we win the war of national survival?

This is one of those deals that when the effect shows up the real cause is lost to the public mind. In a year or two, we could still be very dependent upon Arab oil. We go, hat in hand, to ask if they would please up their oil production for our benefit. They, very politely, say "hell no." Never mentioning the irresponsible actions of the PBS authorities of several years ago who just had to show "Death of a Princess" to win the freedom of the press battle. At that time we could lose the war of survival and the fat heads who were the original cause of our predicament never mentioned or punished.

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports that his department has made an arrest concerning the theft and vandalism of a pickup and a tractor at Bovina reported last week.

A 1976 Ford pickup belonging to Bovina Pump Company and a John Deere tractor belonging to Tom Beauchamp both received extensive damage. A 16-year-old juvenile, has been arrested in connection with the vandalism and charged with juvenile delinquency.

Sheriff Lovelace also re-

ported the burglary of a house belonging to Jeff Conger last week. The family was away for the weekend and returned to find almost all of their household goods missing, including stereo, TV, bedding, dishes and clothes. The Conger home is located about seven miles southeast of Friona. The Sheriff's department investigated the theft Sunday night and Monday.

In other action, a volt meter valued at \$80 was reported stolen from a van belonging to Lee Hutchins of 513 2nd St. in

Farwell.

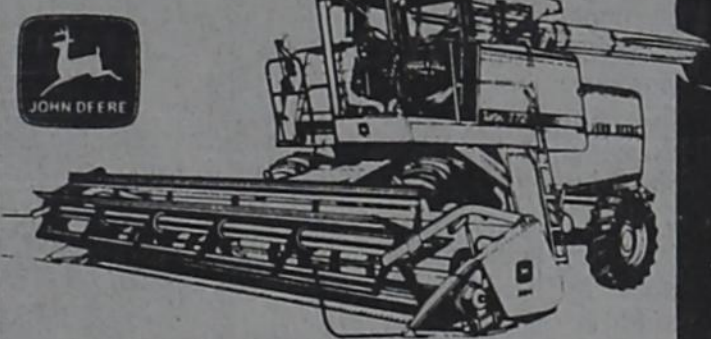

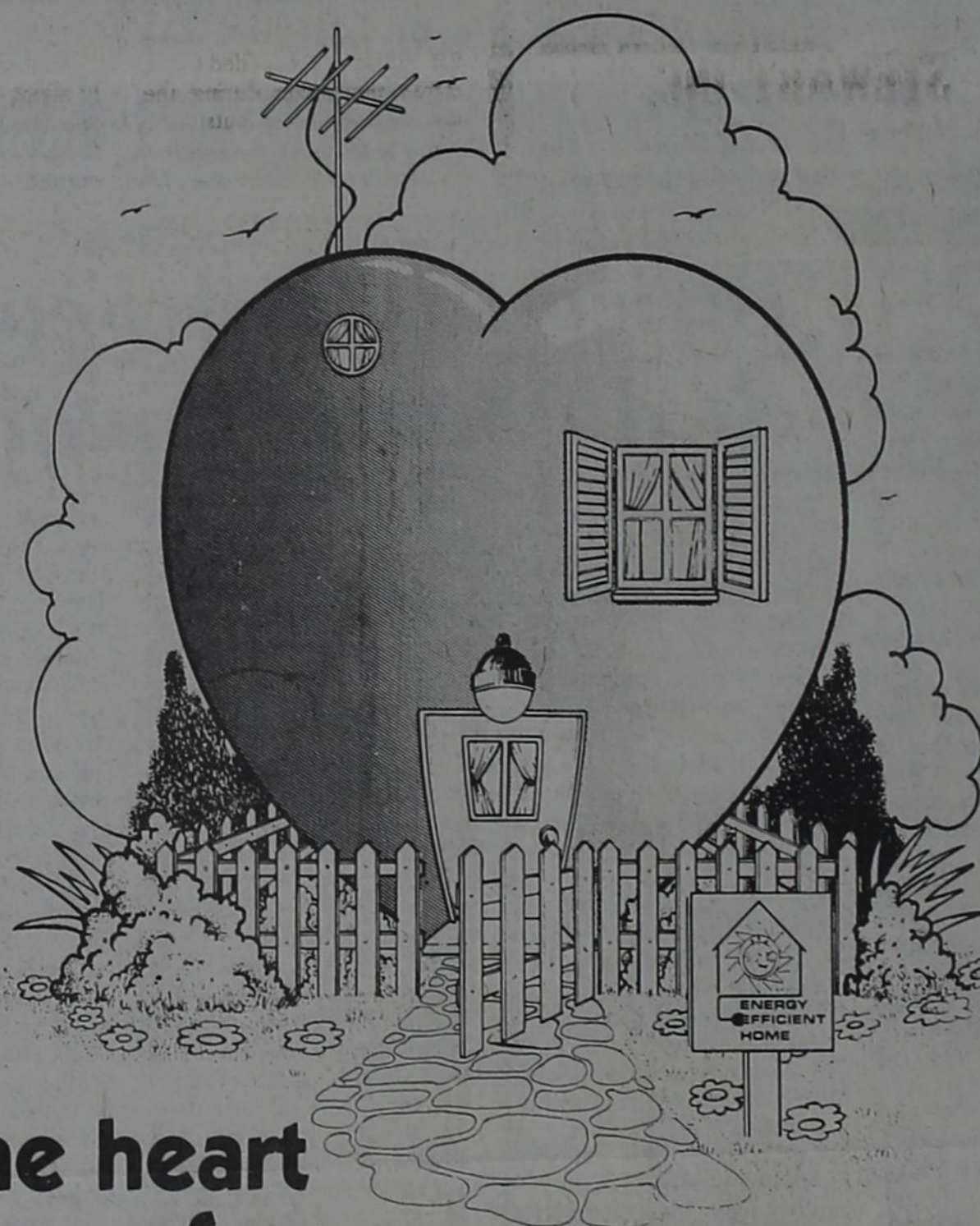

### True Texans are a vanishing breed

COLLEGE STATION — There was a time when to be correctly called a Texan one had to be born in the state.

Those guidelines don't work anymore, says an urban sociologist and state demographer at Texas A&M University.

More than 50 percent of the 2.5 million people added to the state's population during the last decade were "outsiders" who moved to Texas, says Dr. Robert Skrabanek. The re-

mainder of the new residents were born here.

But many old timers wouldn't even consider the newborns true Texans, Skrabanek says, because there is a good chance their parents weren't born in Texas, and that still makes them "newcomers."

Skrabanek estimates that only about 70 percent of Texas' population today could be considered native in the traditional sense.

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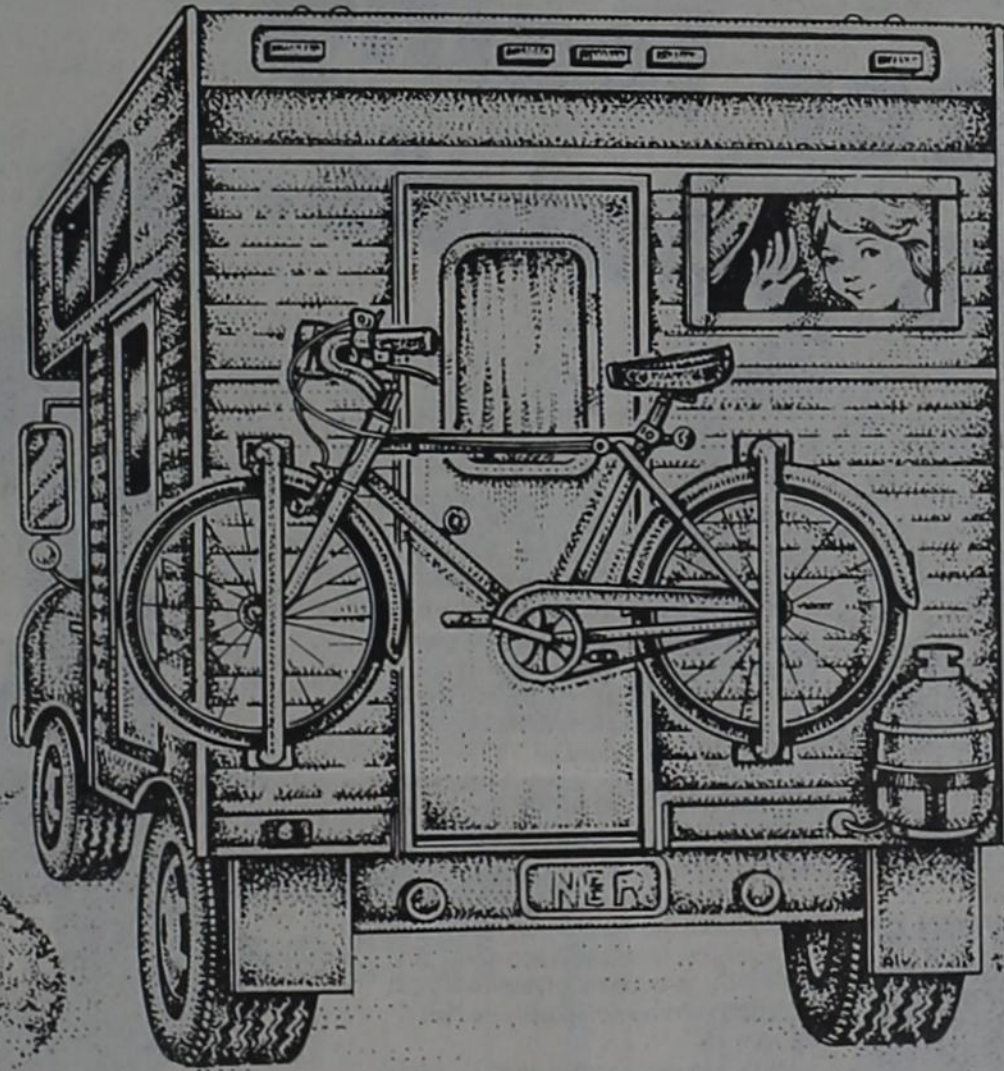

As each new officer was installed she lit a candle as she accepted her office. Installed as new officers were Robin Gregory, president; Joyce Williams, vice-president; Altha

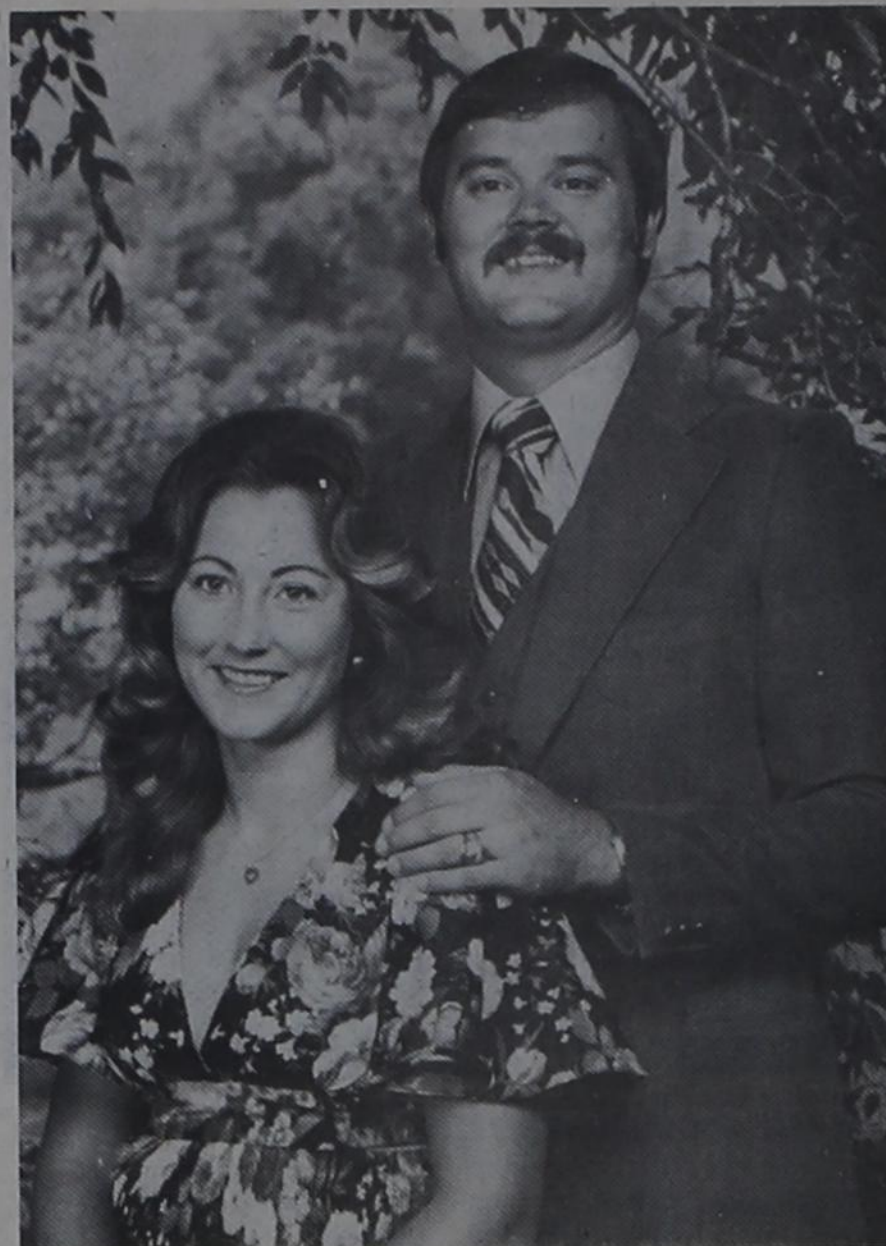

## Texico Pioneer Woman: 'Wouldn't Change Past'

"I worked in the cotton patch 13 months out of a year," Nellie Wall stated, while speaking of her childhood chores.

At her first home which was in Hunt County, near Celeste, Tex., she hoed and picked cotton rather than playing house and playing little girl games like most little girls do now.

The spry "young" lady of 88 years talked of the move her family made to Sierra, Okla., when she was a young girl. Nellie walked one-half mile every morning to attend Kate School in Doxey, Okla. at the age of ten. She and her older sister had to take turns going to school, because one of them had to stay with their mother, who was frequently ill.

Nellie met her husband-to-be in Seira at the age of 16, but she and J.E. Wall waited until she was 22 to be married. They then moved to Blacktower, New Mexico, where they lived in a dugout. Their first two children, Lena and John, were born in the one-room dugout. The pioneers then moved to their claim, 32 miles north of Roswell, where they stayed for a year.

While they were living in Roswell, Nellie was chopping wood and a piece flew up and hit her hand. "You know that hand never hurt me 'til a week later, when the blood poison was half-way up my arm," she commented, "and when the blood poison set in so bad, I thought I was going to lose that arm." Nellie had to have her hand cut open and drained before the poison was finally under control, but in the process of lancing her hand, the main leader in her forefinger was cut, and, today she still can't straighten her finger.

Although her arm was hurting so badly she could hardly stand it, she drove a team and buggy from Roswell to Clovis with one hand and took care of two babies while she was at it. "It wasn't easy, and I couldn't give the road to anybody," she stated, "be-

cause I wasn't strong enough to pull the horses over with my left hand."

Mr. and Mrs. Wall bought a farm of 320 acres south of Clovis in 1922 and started to work raising cotton, corn, maize, and a garden. Their other five children, Vera, Willie, Coy, Lola, and D.E., were born under this roof.

Nellie says she made a trip to the store about once or twice a month to get flour, sugar, coffee, bacon, syrup, and sometimes a few clothes. Later, they built a new house in which Mrs. Wall still lives. Mr. Wall died in May of 1963, after the couple had been married 49 years.

"After 88 years of hard work," Nellie said, "I've had enough good times to forget about the bad ones."

"Mamaw" Wall now has six

living children, 23 grandchildren, 28 great-grandchildren, and so many friends that to count them would probably be in the millions. She is so well known in this area that she recently received a greeting card from Spain that was addressed "Mamaw Wall."

The three living sons, John, Willie, and D.E. live near Texico (Coy died in 1977). Of the daughters, Lena Stephenson, will soon be moving to Clovis from California; Lola Richardson lives in the Pleasant Hill area; and Vera Martin lives near Cleburne, Tex.

"There is nothing I can think of that I would change about the past," she commented, "because I've had a good life." The pioneer lady recently celebrated her 88th birthday. She still enjoys her hobbies of raising house plants and piecing quilts, and is especially appreciative of frequent visits from her family and friends.

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**Around The House with Laura Jacobs**

Assistant Parmer County Extension Agent for Home Economics

The beautiful month of May is National Mental Health Month. In a national survey of families, 73 percent of the family members (parents and teenagers) felt that mental health would be improved if people were more concerned about others and less concerned about their own problems.

Dr. Earl Menninger, the famous psychiatrist, once gave a lecture on mental health and was answering questions from the audience. "What would you advise a person to do," asked one man, "if that person felt a nervous breakdown coming on?" Most people expected him to reply, "Consult a psychiatrist." To their astonishment he replied, "Lock up your house, go across the railway tracks, find someone in need and do something to help that person."

Although few, if any, of us may be on the verge of a nervous breakdown and still fewer can even find railway tracks to cross, Menninger's

advice still rings true. Much human energy is being spent worrying about how inflation or the energy crisis or the rising food prices are affecting families. When worry engulfs a person, it is easy to forget about the human concerns of those in the family. Children, regardless of the country's economics, still need parents. They need parents who somehow can find the time and energy to be concerned about them.

Children need their parents to help them understand life, the changes that are occurring within their bodies and among their friends. Children, at least most of them, need a parent who can listen to their concerns and help them interpret what is happening. As we worry about what this summer will bring or what the next paycheck won't bring, maybe we can remember Menninger's advice.

Lock up the worry and go find you child and do something to help him or her.

Joe Martinez turned in a record-breaking score for the discus competition of 44.80M (147'11") to win first place. The previous state record was 138'11". Martinez also took fourth in the shot competition with a score of 13-44-6.

According to Paul Topliff, boys track coach, "the boys ran real hard."

"We went to state saying that we had to win the hurdles, discus and 400M relay and get points in the long jump and shot put. And that's what we did," said Topliff. "I'm really proud of the kids."

According to Topliff, the boys ran the fastest time in the 400M relay, which was to have been their best event. However, they were disqualified because an official made a mistake and lined the kids up in the wrong exchange zone. Their time in this event was 45.1 which would have been the winning time.

"That would have given us ten more points, as well as taking points away from the other teams," said Topliff. "The way we had it figured we would have come real close to winning."

The boys were also disqualified from the 800M relay because there had been a mistake in the time that was sent in.

In girls state competition, three Wolverines took honors in their events. Ruth Scott placed fourth in discus, fifth in 800M run and fourth in 1500M

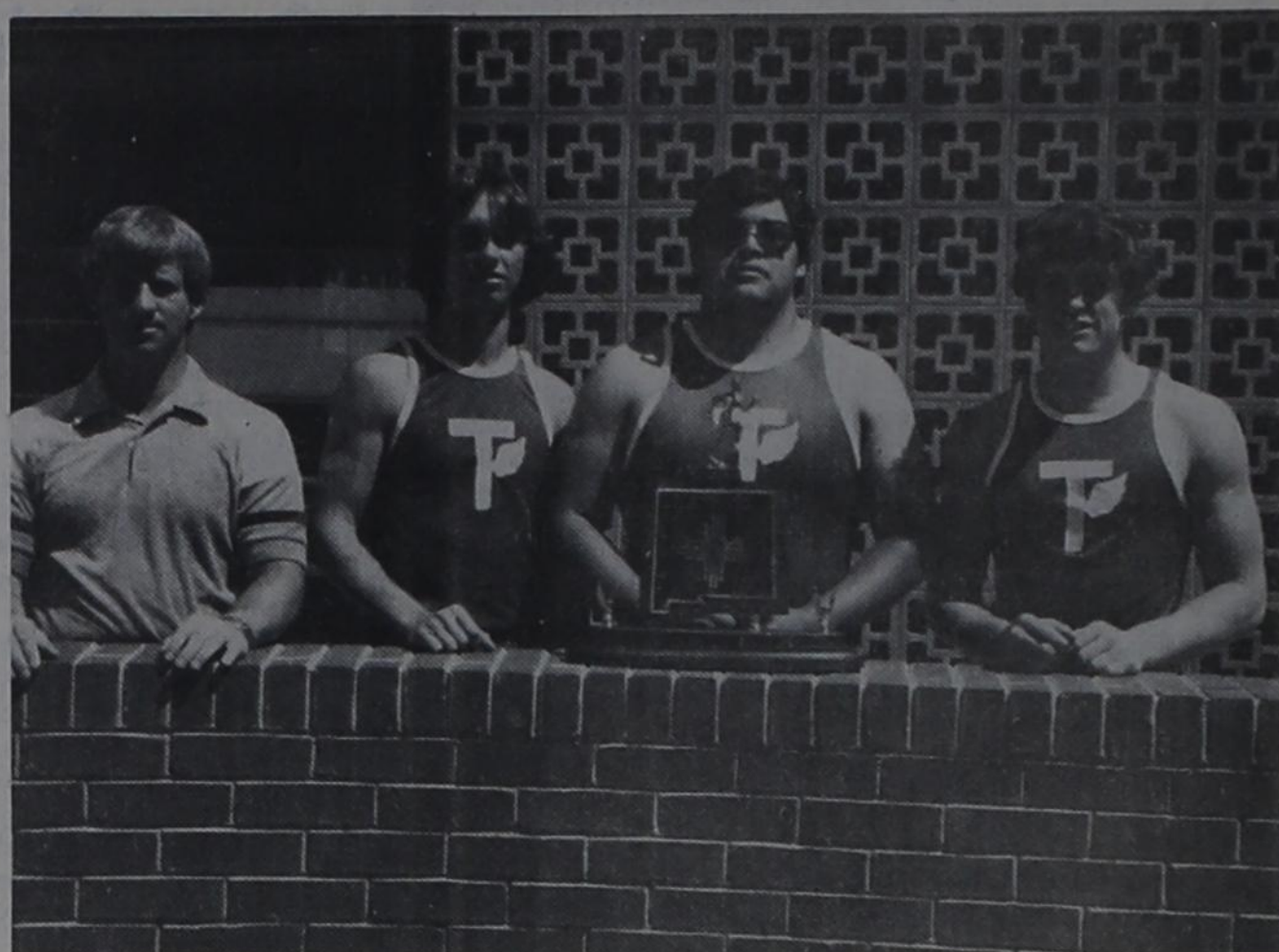
run. Corinna Hungerford placed fifth in 100M dash and Lisa Coffey placed third in 400M dash.

In team competition, the Texico girls took second in medley relay, third in both 800M and 1600M relay and fifth in 400M relay.

The Texico girls were last year's state champions and were slated to bring home first place honors again. According to Roy King, girls track coach, the girls ran the best times they had ever run. "Everybody else just ran good, too," he said.

"It was the most balanced track meet I've ever seen," he said. "We went all the way to the mile relay having to take third in that event in order to place third overall."

"I'm real proud of the girls," King commented. "And we don't have any seniors on the team so they will all be back next year."

Admission to the concert is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students.

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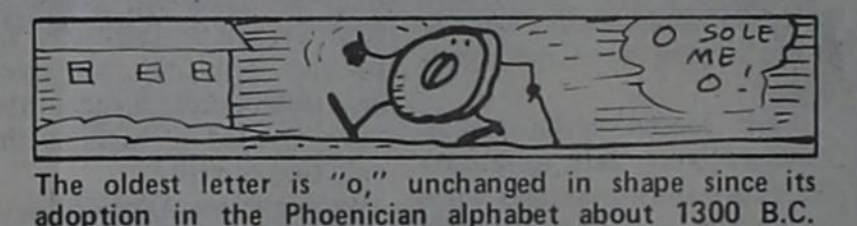

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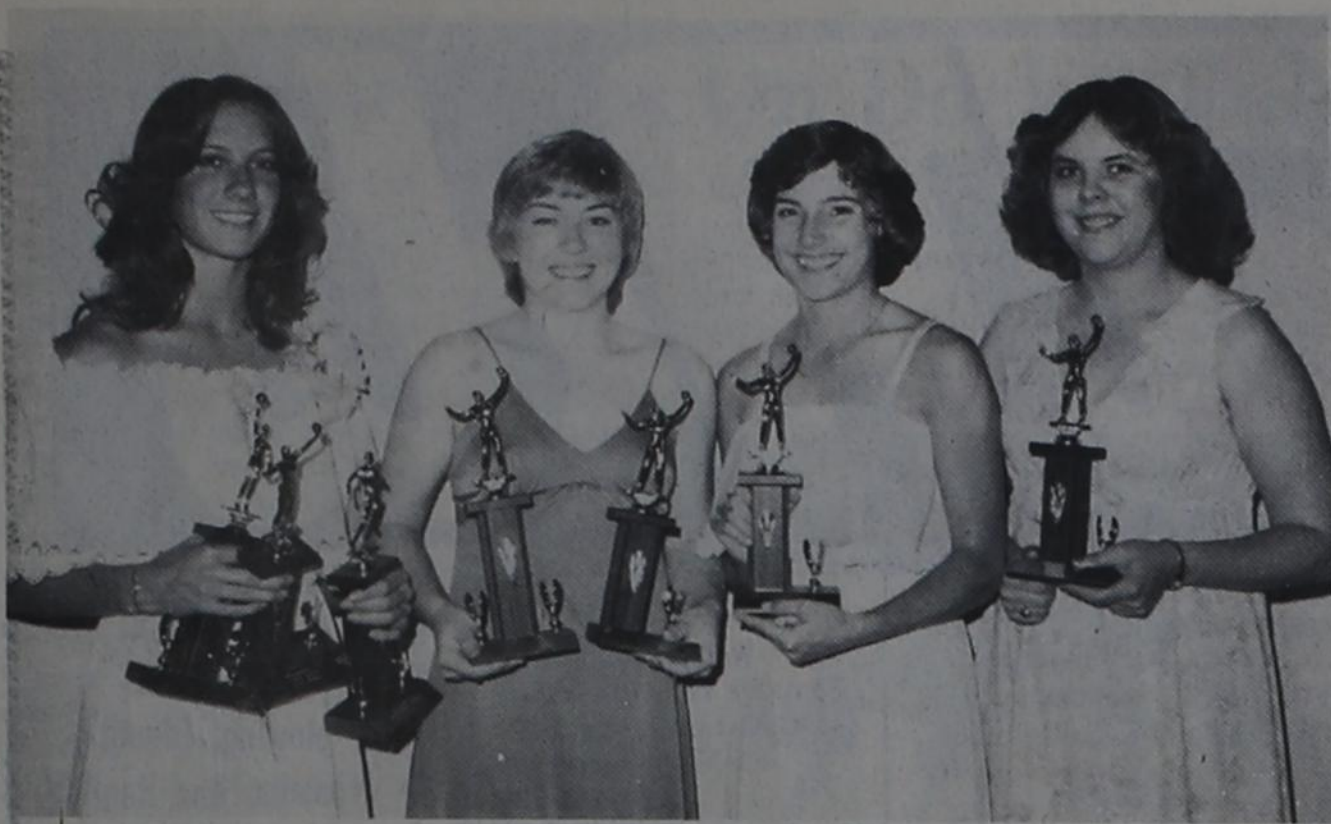

A person should rely on what he has, not on someone else's talent or ability. He should be honest along the way - honest

with himself and not have an attitude of win at all costs.

Riley concluded by saying that a person is not finished when he attains success, that he then needs to be positive and also needs to thank those who helped him along the way - his coaches, teachers, family and associates.

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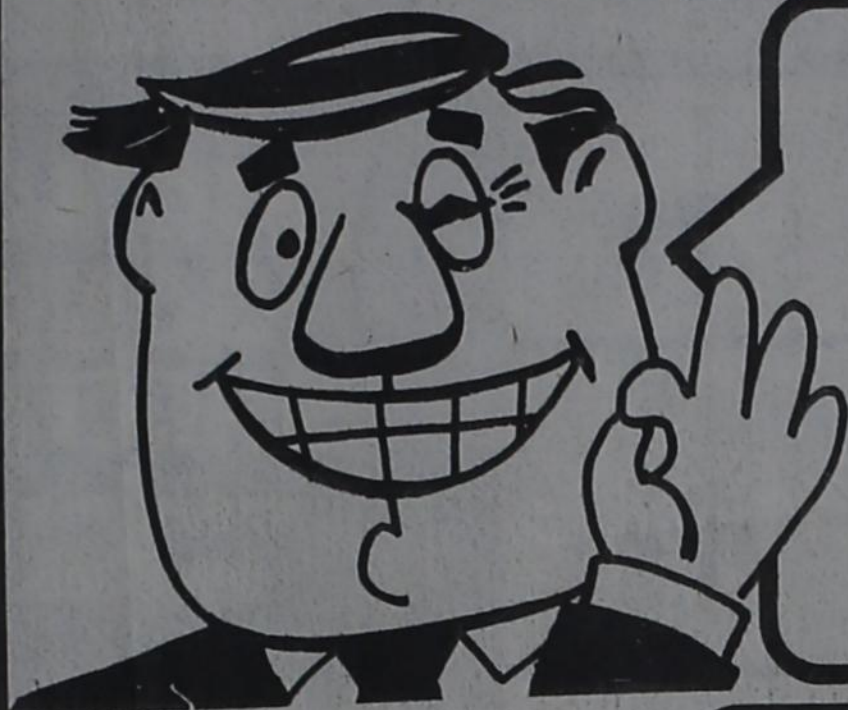
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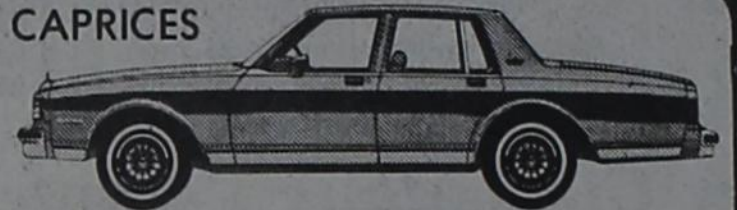
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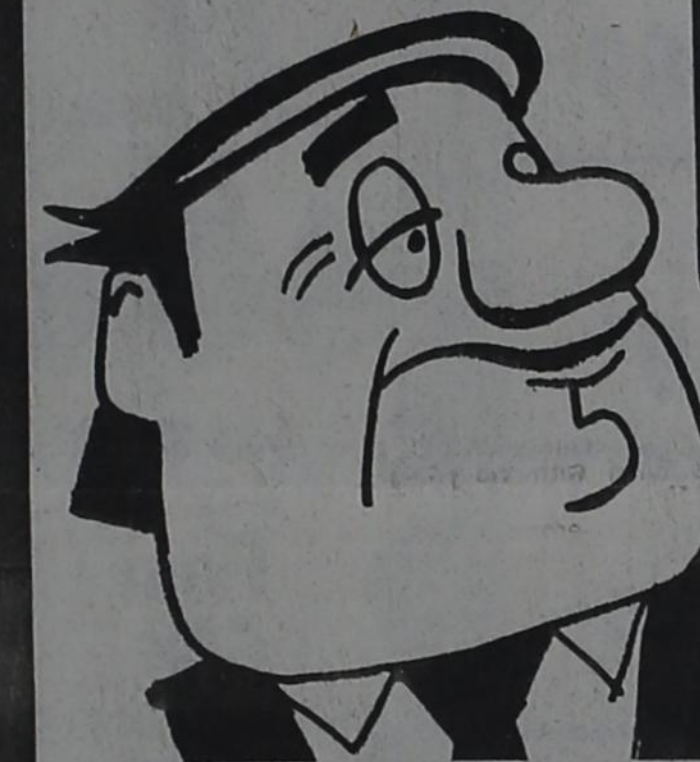
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**Auxiliary Donations**

Farwell City Council met in regular session Monday night and heard a report on continuation of plans for the proposed new water treatment plant for the city.
