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'It's All About Science'

Farwell Junior High project has students learn about forensics

Sometime during the evening of May 14th, a crime was committed at Farwell Junior High: the bench outside of Principal Jimmie Mace's office was stolen.

Rather than alerting City Police Chief Achterberg or the Federal Bureau of Investigations, school administrators called in the experts: the Crime Scene Investigation (CSI) units from the 6th and 7th grade science classes and their captain, Mrs. Brenda "It's All About Science"

The teams of diligent detectives scoured and deciphered the clues left at the scene of the crime. Advanced Forensic science techniques and some pretty tough interrogation sessions helped the teams develop a list of "the usual suspects."

The particular target suspects were a hardy group of hardened criminals: Cindy "The Bookie" Littlejohn, Connie "The Con" Bailey, Linda "Square Meal" Moss, LuAnn "Fingers" Fillpot, Tanya "The Officer" Chadwick and, most surprisingly, Jimmie "Make 'Em!" Mace.

The students at Farwell Jr. High were shaken by the crime but felt better when the ace detectives began to close in on the perpetrators of this senseless act of

One week went by and the CSI teams were hot on the trails of the criminal or criminals. Each case was evaluated and compared and finally, on the morning of Thursday, May 22, each CSI team made their case for and against each suspect.

LuAnn "Finger" Fillpot was the perp, with Linda "Square Meal" Moss acting as an accessory to the crime by aiding and abetting in the theft. Connie "The Con" Bailey had the tables turned on her when it was exposed to the public that she was being framed. But the best card in the deck was yet to be played in this exciting and challenging Crime Scene Investigation.

Sound like a great episode from one of the most

popular television shows produced? Junior High Science teacher Brenda Logan brought all the aspects of this intriguing show into application when she began developing a unique hands-on science lesson for her 6th and 7th grade classes.

In February, Mrs. Logan attended a workshop that brought basic Forensic Science applications together in a "Detective Training Academy." The purpose of this workshop was to train and inspire science teachers to teach an entire unit on the applications and study of forensics. She came away fired up and ready to put the

workshop information to use. "I never dreamed that this project would become so popular with the students and the school staff and teachers," Mrs. Logan commented. "I made a few in-


quiries to people asking for help and it just took off!" Mrs. Logan was the only teacher in this area who attended the Detective workshop to actually carry through




Mrs. Logan is released by Farwell Police Chief Robert Achterberg after she makes bail.





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

CSI project

Jeanette Reyes, the Region 16 representative that developed the Detective Training Academy materials, was a huge source of help to Mrs. Logan and the proj-

Mrs. Reyes made elaborate folders, badges, question and answer sheets, suspect packets, developed evidence ideas and helped develop the crime scene.

"The success of this project was aided in large part by her enthusiasm and hard work," said Mrs. Logan.

The "suspects" did an incredible job of playing their parts as well.

Not only did they follow their scripts of ways to answer questions, each suspect took things further by baiting situations and students with specific comments and carefully placed clues.

For example: one of the clues at the crime scene was a large green paint footprint. Cindy Littlejohn, who was not the thief, painted the bottom of one of her shoes green. She then proceeded to cross her legs and position herself in such a way that when she dangled her shoe, a particular group of CSI detectives saw the shoe bottom when they were in the library.

"One of the students came running into my room after this and excitedly said, 'I think I know who did it!' early on in the investigation!" Mrs. Logan exclaimed. "She was also very sneaky about leaving a newspaper with particular classified ads circled, and she had talked for several weeks about wanting particular things. She was wonderful!"

Another funny aspect of the investigation was how several of the students convinced Linda Moss to give them warm cinnamon rolls while they were questioning

"One of the students told me that all cops ate doughnuts while they were on duty and he thought a cinnamon roll would be very helpful to my situation," Ms. Moss laughed. "I was thinking that maybe I could sweeten up the investigation by bribing them with the rolls!"

The entire suspect group began working the project several weeks prior to the project. It was a well coordinated effort and Mrs. Logan was very appreciative of their support and participation.

"However, the success of this project was made even more worthwhile by the students' enthusiasm, dedication and willingness to learn," Mrs. Logan explained. "Seeing and hearing how much fun they were having at this project made me so proud to bring this project to them!"

The students worked in groups of 3 to 4 people. They interviewed one suspect at a time and they gathered evidence to support or rule out each suspect. They had to decipher each clue and they had to develop a scenario for the crime.

The CSI teams gathered hair, handwriting, lipstick and clothing samples, footprints shoe prints, and fingerprints. They also had to determine and research whether each suspect had a motive to steal the bench. They then used the microscopes to study the evidence and they learned all about the different identifying marks in a person's fingerprints, hair strands and lip prints. A lesson in Chromatography was incorporated into studying the evidence of the pen and marker ink bleeds. Different inks and different brands of pens and markers make different bleed patterns when wetted. The students were able to see these differences and how each piece of evidence begins to tell a story and uncover the crime scene secrets.

Mrs. Logan was most encouraged at how this project brought the students together to learn lessons in teamwork and problem-solving.

"I think this project really brought out the best in many of the students," she stated. "I watched several of the students open up and get involved where they had been really quiet and stood back on their own before."

The students felt that this was one of the most fascinating school projects they had ever been assigned.

"I definitely have an interest in Forensic Science


now," said Maria Rodriguez.

"This project didn't seem like a school lesson at all," said Amanda Myers. "I've learned so much from this and I hope we do it again next year!"

Out of a group of 16 6th and 7th graders interviewed, 7 of the students expressed a keen interest in forensic science research and investigation.

At the conclusion of the project, each CSI group had to make a poster proving who was innocent and who was guilty. Not one of the groups missed who actually stole the bench.

However, in a twist of fate that only seems to occur in the plot of TV shows, evidence of a critical nature was allowed to be admitted to the "court" for proof of who

the actual criminal mastermind was found to be.

Principal Jimmie Mace stood up and presented a signed document with Mrs. Brenda Logan's signature, requesting permission for the project and the stealing of the Junior High office bench.

The classroom went quiet as Mr. Mace instructed, as principal of the facility, to have Mrs. Logan arrested and taken to jail for the crime.

Mrs. Brenda Logan, sweet, enthusiastic, pillar of knowledge to our young children, was going to have to pay her debt to society for her actions.

She was stunned as the cold steel of the cuffs was placed against her wrists.

She shouted her pleas of innocence. She accused. She ranted. She got feisty as she was placed into the police car to be whisked away.


Then the gig was up and Mrs. Logan was released to the arms of her adoring students and co-workers.

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
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

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
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Propane Gas Grill Safety Tips

- Always use your grill outside in a well-ventilated area. Don't bring cylinders inside or into an enclosed space such as a garage.
- Before lighting your propane gas grill burner, use a leak-detection solution to make sure all connections are secure. Contact your local propane gas supplier to obtain the leak-detection solution and instructions on how to use it. Never use matches or lighters to check for leaks.
- Always use or store cylinders in an upright, vertical position. Store them outside and away from sources of ignition.
- When you have your cylinder refilled, ask your supplier to check for dents, damage, rust or leaks.
- · After filling, take your cylinder home immediately. Keep your vehicle ventilated with the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped (unless your cylinder type does not require plugs or caps). Never leave the cylinder in
- Make sure the grill burner controls are turned off and keep the cylinder valve closed when not in use.
- Make sure the grill is shut off and cooled before covering.
- · When your grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and burner air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from your propane supplier to keep out dirt, insects and moisture.
- If there is a significant and uncontrollable release of gas or a fire, call the fire department immediately and move all people and pets away from the

Also to be discussed in executive session was a swimming pool topic that had been put on the agenda by councilwoman Sharon Askew. This was to be discussed privately "for personnel reasons."

There was a recent incident at the pool where police found some juveniles having a drinking party.

After the executive session, the board voted to advertise for an adult to manage the swimming pool; and also declared a police car as surplus.

The council approved the request by Fire Chief Lewis \$500. The board will not Cooper to declare as surplus a 1969 pumper and a brush truck, as long as no money was owed on them or that they were leased. Cooper was not present, and a question arose over whether the brush truck in question was still being leased and money owed.

In other business, the council:

-- Okayed a plan by Grimes & Associates for asbestos abatement at the current city hall, for \$5,270.

-- Approved the annual audit, which showed Texico ended the fiscal year with \$637,000 on hand, up from the previous year. City Clerk Teresa Harth was commended.

-- Accepted a bid for \$3,500 to raise one of the fire department's doors so the new truck can fit in.

-- Discussed the continued improvements at the cemetery: a) A woman complained that a water line crosses her

gravesite. Since it's a line no longer being used, it can be moved. b) Someone will be hired to move out the pile of cali-

c) There is still no water out there. The only bid to run electricity from the pole to the new well came in at

d) The old water well may be filled in with caliche.

e) Cemetery board member Marcia Leavell sent out more than 300 fund-raising letters, and has received back \$3,300.


-- Discussed summer projects: roof repairs on the auditorium, cafeteria and part of the junior high; also some junior high renovations.


The board heard that the foam in the auditorium seats is disintegrating (after 37 years of use), and is looking at replacing the seats.


