**Replanting Decisions . . .**

 To inspect the growing point, split the stalk down the center with a knife or razor blade, he advised. If the growing point is okay, it will be white in color and will be firm textured. If the growing point has been damaged, it may be discolored and soft. This may allow bacteria or other disease organisms to penetrate into the growing area and cause problems.

"Corn can recover but may have the leaves bound together in the whorl in a condition called buggly-whipping," he said. The plants can recover and yield well. However, recovery may require more time than the producer is willing to give in making a decision. In this case, these plants should be considered as dead plants when the stand count is made, he explained.

Stand count can be made by measuring a set length of row per the row width of an operation, the agronomist said. This is 13-feet-1-inch for a 40-inch row, 13-feet-9-inches for a 38-inch row, and 14-feet-6-inches for 36-inch rows. "Make a stand count several places in the field to determine what kind of recoverable stand is still present," Huffman said.

"If you decide that you have enough stand, but plants are ragged, then you may want to use leaf loss to help make a decision," he said. When the leaves are lost at a younger stage it does not affect the yield of corn plant as much as later leaf loss, he explained. At the ten-leaf stage, the yield loss may be as high as 15 percent if severe leaf damage occurs. Losses increase with severe defoliation and then decrease after tasseling to maturity.

If you decide to go to an alternate crop, there are several things you need to look at, he said. Weed control and her-

bicides already present are important factors to consider.

The main problem is that the herbicides that have been used are not all labeled to cover the alternate crop, the agronomist cautioned. The dinitroaniline herbicides such as Treflan and Prowl, do carry a label for post emergence weed control in corn and sorghum. However, these particular herbicides are not labeled for pre-emergence use.

Therefore, if these have been used, a producer would need to plant soybeans in order to utilize the herbicide that is present and avoid herbicide injury to a grass plant such as sorghum. If a producer has used Dual and wants to plant grain sorghum, he needs to use Concep-treated seed which protects the seed from the effects of Dual. Several companies have Concep-treated seed at this time but you should order seed as soon as possible, he noted.

"Other herbicides may cause problems to the alternate crop that you plant behind the corn or cotton crop. Look at the labels, talk to your supplier, and investigate other problems in order to make an intelligent decision," Huffman urged.

"At this time, spraying with all kinds of wonder products probably is not going to help," the Extension specialist said. Foliar feeding of fertilizer and fungicide of this crop is probably not going to make that much difference and now is not the time to spend extra money on a crop that may or may not make it, he cautioned.

"You need to look at the crop, make a sound decision, either keep the crop that you have and live with it, or go to an alternate crop as soon as possible in order to minimize losses and try to make money and pay your bills at the same time."

If producers have questions concerning this, their county Extension agent has a publication in his office concerning leaf loss and information that might help in making a decision, Huffman said.

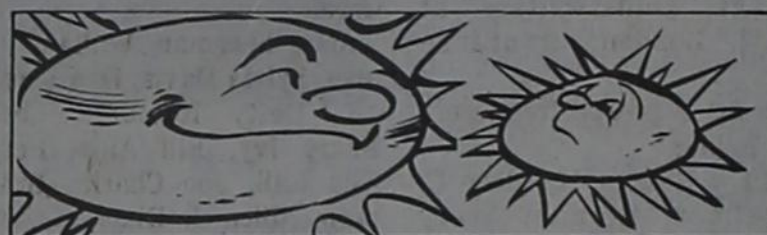
Mr. Walls died June 3 at a Clovis nursing home. He was a brother of A.N. Walls and Frances Williamson, both of Farwell.

# Democrats Decide Runoff

Only 144 Parmer County voters turned out to cast ballots in the Democratic Primary Runoff election for Texas on Saturday, June 5.

The runoff election for four statewide offices was necessitated when the candidates for these positions did not receive 50 percent of the ballots cast in the primary election on May 1. Winners in the various races will now face Republican opponents in the general election in November. There was no Republican runoff election.

In a stiff contest matching U.S. Rep. Jim Mattox against former U.S. Attorney John Hannah for the position of attorney general, Texas voters chose Mattox by a 7,012 to 6,886 count.

Democrats also picked nominees for land commissioner and two places on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

The voters' choice in the land commissioner's race was between State Sen. Pete Snelson of Midland and Austin lawyer, Garry Mauro. Snelson defeated Mauro by a vote of 8,413 to 5,201. He will square off against Republican nominee Woody Glasscock of Hondo in the November general election.

The Democratic judicial races had Dallas lawyer John Humphreys against Austin Lawyer Charles Campbell in a runoff for one seat on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals; and State District Judge Bill Black of Belton against Dallas County Criminal Court Judge Chuck Miller for the other.

Humphreys defeated Campbell for the nomination for Court of Appeals, Place 1, with 6,262 votes to 5,337.

Miller won his bid for nomination for Court of Appeals, Place 2, by defeating Black

with 5,975 votes to 5,669.

Parmer County voting results are as follows:

Attorney General: John Hannah, 99 votes; Jim Mattox, 43 votes.

Land Commissioner: Pete Snelson, 81 votes, Garry Mauro, 62 votes.

Criminal Appeals Court, Place 1: John E. Humphreys, 65 votes; Charles "Chuck" Campbell Jr., 57 votes.

Criminal Appeals Court, Place 2: Bill Black, 69 votes; Chuck Miller, 52 votes.

All votes were unofficial at press time.

**MAJORITIES CAN BE WRONG**

When St. Paul was at Ephesus his proclamation of the gospel caused such a stir that the idol makers, who were losing money, protested until "the whole city was filled with confusion." Soon somebody started a chant: "Great is Diana of the Ephesians!" Others joined and the chorus swelled until "all with one voice, about the space of two hours, cried out, Great is Diana of the Ephesians!" (Acts 19:34) and the town clerk, referring to the religion which surrounded this pagan goddess, said confidently: "THESE THINGS CANNOT BE SPOKEN AGAINST" (Ver. 36).

But later at Rome, the apostle was informed, with reference to those who had accepted the truths he had been proclaiming: "As concerning this sect, we know that EVERYWHERE IT IS SPOKEN AGAINST" (Acts 28:22).

We wonder which side our readers would now prefer to be on: that of the superstitious multitude or that of the minority who place their faith in the Bible.

Millions worshipped the goddess Diana from a thousand years before Christ to two centuries after, but who knows her today? Where is the evidence of all the miracles she is supposed to have wrought? Her glory is little more than a memory and the religion which involved around her name is a thing of the past.

But the Bible, for all these centuries and more, has stood unchanged and unchangeable. It has weathered, not barely, but handsomely, all the storms of criticism and opposition and has proved to be indeed the Word of God. Read the Bible and especially the part meant for us today: the Epistles of Paul. Depend upon it, act upon it, and don't hesitate to stand for it, even when in the minority; for where the most vital truths are concerned, majorities have often been wrong.

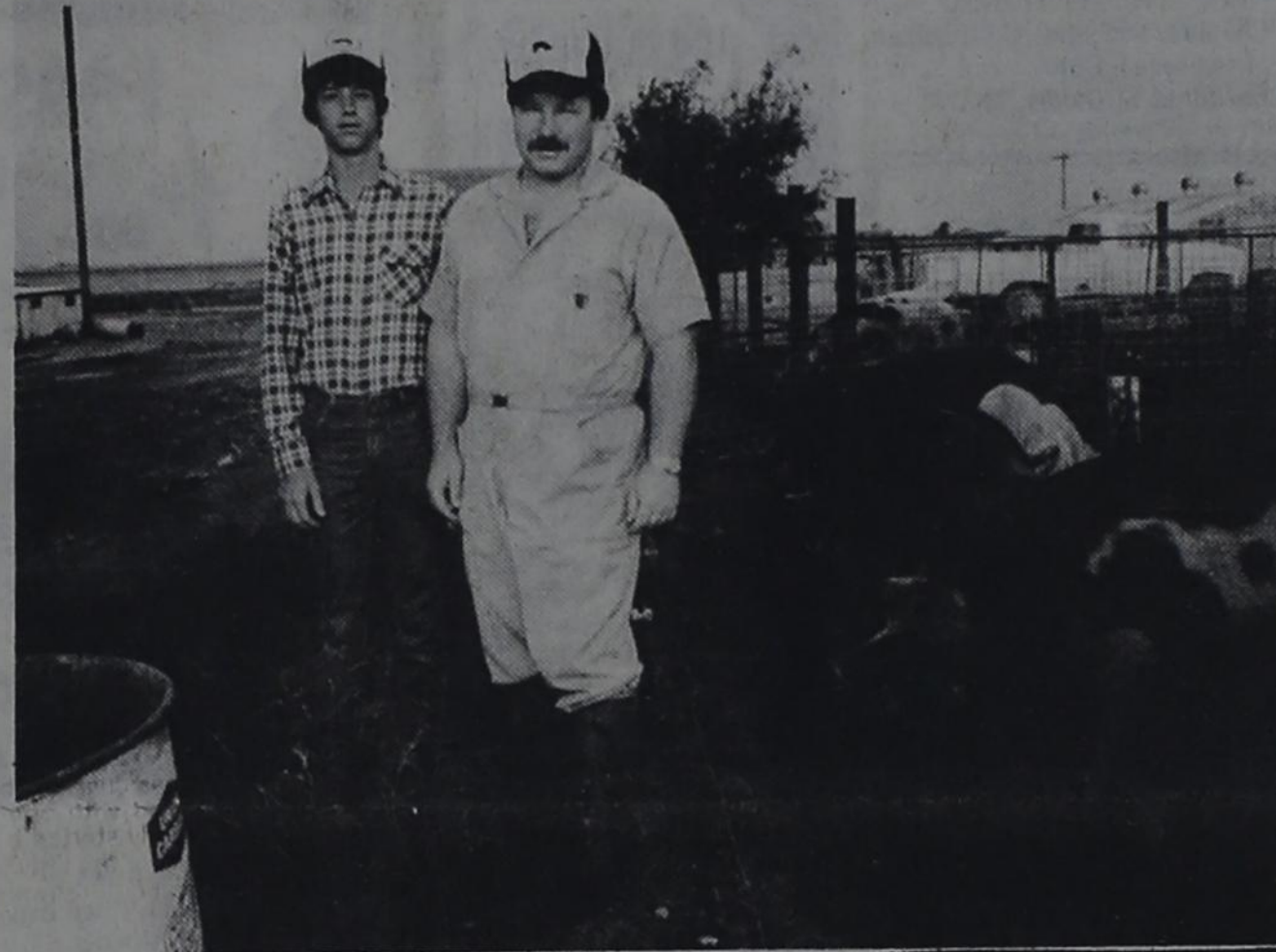
