The State Line Tribune | Keeping Wartime Records on Herds

COLLEGE STATION-The critical protein feed situation is a compelling reason why dairymen should keep production records, according to O. W. Thompson, dairyman for the A. & M. Extension Service.

Records point accurately to unprofitable cows and are a safe guide in culling inefficient producers from the herd. Records, too, are necessary in feeding cows according to their production. In order to make the most efficient use of the feed available individual cows must be fed according to the milk they give. To do this accurately the milk produced and feed consumed by each cow in the herd must be weighed and systematic records kept.

Production records also are essential if the dairyman expects to follow a constructive breeding and herd improvement program, Thompson explains. This applies whether he has grade or purebred animals. Furthermore, records are imperative to a breeder of registered dairy catbeen visiting his parents, has re-tle because he sells breeding stock on the basis of established production or, in most cases, upon the production records of their ancestors.

> Manpower shortage is making it difficult for some herd improvement associations to retain the services of testers having the qualifications required before the war. However, a group of dairymen in the Nacogdoches territory solved this difficulty by employing a vocational agricultural teacher for enough days monthly to test their herds. In some cases older members of 4-H clubs or FFA boys may be qualified and can be employed on part time, the dairyman suggests.

Health Notes By Texas Department of Health

AUSTIN-A steady increase of deaths in Texas from all forms of cancer is disclosed by the fact that over 45,000 persons have died from this dreaded disease within the last ten years, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"The public should be warned against cancer 'quacks' and so-called cancer cures," Dr. Cox said. "Advertising of medicines and so-called cancer doctors puts dangerous misinformation before the public. Undoubtedly," 'Dr. Cox declared, there are many persons who being thus delayed in seeking proper medical advice, unnecessarily lose their lives to this disease."

According to the State Health Officer there are two recognized scientific was of treating cancer; namely, sugery and the use of X-ray. Treatment must be started early and be carried out by a competent surgeon. In allmost twothirds of the cases, sugery is relied upon to remove cancerous growths while X-ray or radium is used to good advantage in approximately one-third of the cases successfully treated. Frequently the two methods are combined.

"The greatest defense against death by cancer is early diagnosis," Dr. Cox stated. "Every case is an acute emergency demanding instant attention, and it is unfortunate that so many persons suffering from cancer do not seek medical advice until beyond possibility of cure."

Dr. Cox pointed out that any unisual bleeding from any body cavity, any lump in the breast, or any surface sores, especially on the face or the mouth, changed appearance of any wart or mole, and even chronic indigestion may be symptoms denoting the presence of can-

Where cancer is suspected, do not delay but consult your physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "Self-medication, serums, 'colored lights, pastes, salves, and diets are absolutely worthless in the treatment of cancer."





Heating and cooking stoves went under rationing orders on Tuesday, clothing included heavy underwear with application forms and information and material distributed to in a cold climate, probably near local rationing offices.

Now affected by rationing are all the coast. new heating and cooking stoves designed to burn coal, wood, cil or gas for domestic use, with certain exceptions, which include the sheet metal, air-tight wood stoves not equipped with grates or cast iron base or lining, gas hot plates, portable ovens, laundry stoves with built-in water jackets or coils, portable gasoline camp stoves, and alcohol or charcoal stoves.

Eligible aplpicants will be those who show they have no usable stove at present and need a stove to heat essential living or working space, or for essential cooking.






