**Health Department Sponsors Center**

The Texas State Department of Health, after consideration by the Crippled Children's Advisory Committee, has been approved as sponsoring agency for a 5-state regional congenital heart disease center to be operated with funds provided by the Childrens Bureau, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, State Health Officer George W. Cox has announced.

Details of the program were outlined in a report from the Children's Bureau and the Dallas County Medical Society, many whose members make up the staff of the Children's Medical Center in Dallas, where treatment will be given children admitted under terms of the program.

Five states—Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Texas—have combined into a single region for convenience. Applications for admission of Children to the Medical Center in Dallas will be accepted from all five states.

Children's Bureau officials said the Children's Medical Center in Dallas was selected as the treatment and diagnostic and surgical care for children with all types of heart disease, because of its geographical location in respect to the other states involved, and because the Dallas County Medical Society gave its approval and support to the program.

Upon approval of an admission application, the child will be admitted to care. The bills, including board and room for the parent while the child is in Dallas, will be paid with funds provided by the Children's Bureau.

Parents financially able to pay part of the cost are expected to do so, the plan states.

The plan pointed to the need for the program by declaring that congenital heart defects in children in Southern states account for approximately 50 percent of all

cardiac lesions.

Dr. Cox's announcement said objectives of the program were to "provide a mechanism whereby treatment facilities for congenital children in this area may have access to existing diagnostic and cardiac diseases, and to augment training facilities whereby young physicians may become intimately acquainted with the various aspects of this type of disease."

**Civil Service Announces Posts**

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced examinations for Librarian, \$3,410 a year, and for Mediator, \$5,940 a year.

The Librarian, positions to be filled are nine various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. A written test will be given and appropriate education or experience is required. There is no maximum age limit.

Mediators will spend most of their time traveling throughout the United States but their headquarters will be in Washington, D. C. Responsible experience in making or interpreting labor agreements or in mediating between management and employees in the application of labor agreements is required. No written test will be given. The maximum age limit is 62 years, waived for persons entitled to veteran preference.

Full information and application forms may be secured at most first and second class post offices, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C. Applications for librarian positions will be accepted by the Commission's office in Washington until further notice. Mediators must file their applications with the board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, National Mediation Board, Washington 25, D. C., not later than May 28, 1953.
