Time to vote

The national election is on Nov. 2 and Texans will be voting for their governor and lieutenant governor in Austin and for their congressmen in the U.S. House of

Representatives.

Candidates for governor are the incumbent Republican Rick Perry and Democrat Bill White. The separate race for lieutenant governor is between GOP's David Dewhurst and Democrat Linda Chavez-Thompson.

The candidates for Texas Congressional District 19, which includes Parmer County, are the incumbent Republican Randy Neugebauer and Democrat Andy Wilson.

While almost all the state offices are contested races, none of the elective offices are in Parmer County.

Thus, elected will be Trey Ellis, county judge; Sandra Warren, district clerk; Colleen Stover, county clerk; Altha Herington, county treasurer, and Pamela Haseloff, Pct. 3 Justice of the Peace.

State Rep. Warren Chisum, whose district includes Parmer County, is unopposed for re-election.

New Mexico's voters will be selecting their U.S. congressmen and a new governor as well.

The race for governor and lieutenant governor pits the Democratic ticket of Diane Denish and Brian Colon against the Republican ticket of Susana Martinez and John Sanchez.

The candidates for New Mexico Congressional District 3 are Ben

Texico's agriculture and shop classes are offering one of their grandest creations for sale. The young artisans used rough-cut cedar to create the 4 ft. by 20 inch by 20 inch chest, beginning last year and finishing this month after months of meticulous work.

Finished with Danish oil and a lustrous coat of varnish, the chest offers the sweet fragrance of cedar so pleasing to people but so repellant to insects.

The chest is displayed in the lobby of the Educational Complex and during athletic events, in the lobby of the Sports Arena. It will be won by the highest "sealed bid" offered for its purchase on the bid form available at the school or submitted by mail to Cedar Chest Sale, c/o Texico Municipal Schools, PO Box 237, Texico NM 88135.

Mailed bids include name, address, phone number, bid amount, and signature.

The deadline for submission is Dec. 4, at the conclusion of the Citizen's Bank Basketball Tournament and the winner will be notified thereafter.

The cost of materials to make the chest is \$175, which is set as the minimum bid, and the funds from this sale will be returned to the shop account for future projects and to support the Future Farmers of America chapter.

I had a dream the other night. And I do want to stress this is just a "dream."

There is no way this could possibly happen.

It starts after the November general election, with the Democrats

maintaining control of the Senate and the Republicans winning a majority in the House.

A special TV event is called and sitting at the table are President Obama, the Democrat Senate majority leader and the GOP House majority leader.

President Obama takes the lead by saying: "The American people should know that I have had serious discussions with the leaders of Congress and we have made agreements that will impact on our nation

in a positive way. "First, I would like to say that I have been arrogant in my views of what is best for this nation. I have finally understood that the positions I have taken on major issues has been far from what the majority of Americans want, and far from what is right.

"Congress and I have been playing politics instead of simply doing what is best for the nation. We now understand that our nation is on the decline and the leaders of both parties are responsible for it.

"Thus, tonight, I, along with the leaders of Congress, are announcing that at this difficult time in our nation's history, we have decided to put aside politics and make the hard decisions that are needed to right our ship and give all Americans hope in their future.

"First of all, Congress is going to repeal the drastic parts of the new healthcare program and limit it to what was really needed. And I will not veto this decision.

"The money thrown away on the trillion dollar stimulus cannot be regained, but we have agreed to reduce the number of federal government employees by 15 percent, which will see huge savings to our nation.

"We have identified many government agencies that are bloated, do little, and can be done anyway with easily. Also, the military budget has gotten completely out of hand and we are tabling any future military hardware programs along with cutting back our military troop numbers.

"All troops will be pulled out of Iraq within the month. The draw-down of troops in Afghanistan will begin immediately. We have the technology to maintain strong pressure on the

Taliban, through drones and computers. And we realize that having a large number of troops is counter-productive to a political settlement there.

"We will close many of our foreign bases that no longer are meaningful. Some of the troops brought back will be used to guard our border better.

"The "Bush tax cuts" will be continued except for persons earning \$250,000 or more a year. Those folks can afford higher taxes.

"The most important problem facing our nation is job creation. We are putting in place special tax incentives for business to hire persons in America. We will put higher taxes on businesses that outsource jobs.

"We are eliminating the extra "taxes" on small business that were part of the healthcare bill (and, by the way, had nothing to do with health care) and by heavy bureaucratic pressures. The bureaucracy will be ordered to pull back on its policies of hurting small businesses. Any bureaucrats found going

against our new policy will be summarily fired.

"We admit that while we have been saying that we are doing everything we can to help businesses grow, the bureaucracy has been doing the opposite. We are setting up an overview committee to end this travesty.

"There will be an immediate freeze on fed-

eral hiring. Salaries of all federal employees will be cut 15 percent to put them more in line with private industry."

When President Obama finished speaking, the two Congressional leaders backed everything he said.

As I said, it was just a dream.

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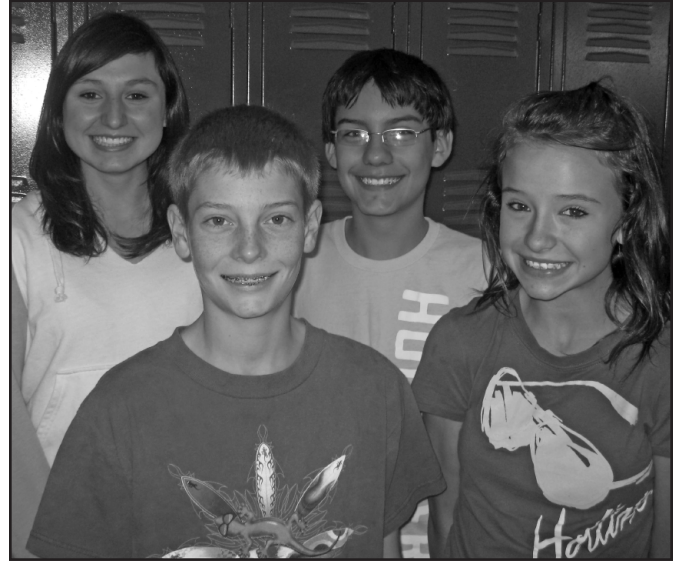

In one of the biggest issues of this election year, Curry County voters will vote on a bond and a tax issue that would fund a new courthouse and incarceration facility.

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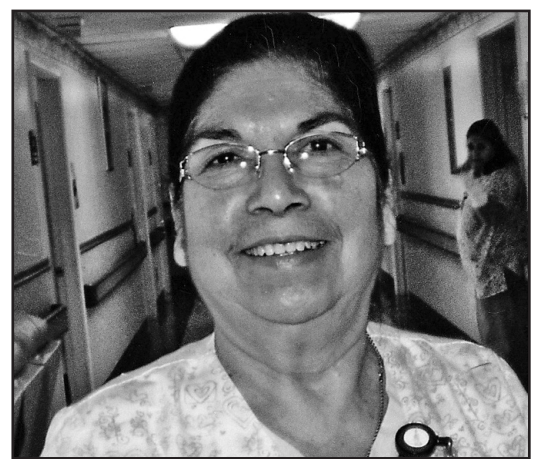

Live Cattle prices turned up some of their long term charts last week ahead of the \$102 cash trade. Once packers finished their buying, futures prices began to turn back lower. This week show lists are sharply higher over last week and futures prices traded back down about \$1.00 off Friday's close. The next few days should tell more, but for now, the December contract has been unable to take out it's contract highs around the \$102.65 level. Could be a failure up here, but need to see cash trade later in the week.

Feeder prices had no reaction to the higher cash fed trade last Wednesday, but were able to gain a couple of dollars before Thursday's open. The market traded back up into some fairly strong resistance levels on Friday before selling off on Monday. Feeders are focused on the distant months in the Live Cattle along with the potential for a top in corn prices.

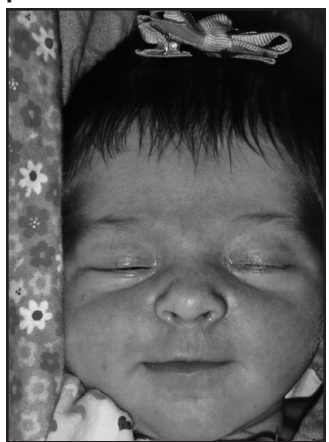
Soybean prices have continued to move higher over the last few weeks. The upward momentum seems to be slowing, but the market has done little to indicate a top of any kind. Soybeans will be tied to corn prices and until corn begins to change direction, it may be difficult to expect lower bean prices.

Corn prices continue to hold, but are currently in position to retest the \$5.88 highs this week. If prices fail to make new highs and move back below last weeks low around the \$5.42 level basis the December contract, it could indicate a top or major weakness ahead. If prices can see another new closing high, then long term trends will remain in tact and higher prices can be expected to follow.

Wheat prices have continued to drift lower over the last couple of weeks while waiting to see if corn and bean prices find a top? The market failed on it's last attempt to break out into new high territory and the market has been flat or soft with little or no direction. Support lies below around the \$6.80 level basis the December KC contract. A close below this level would most likely lead to another leg down.

Cotton prices continue on their rocket ride higher with prices surpassing the highest levels ever seen in history. The December contract closed up the 500 point limit on Monday at \$124.71. There is no telling where prices are going from here, but a switch to synthetics could become an option? The need for high quality cotton in China has helped to fuel higher prices along with huge Fund buying.

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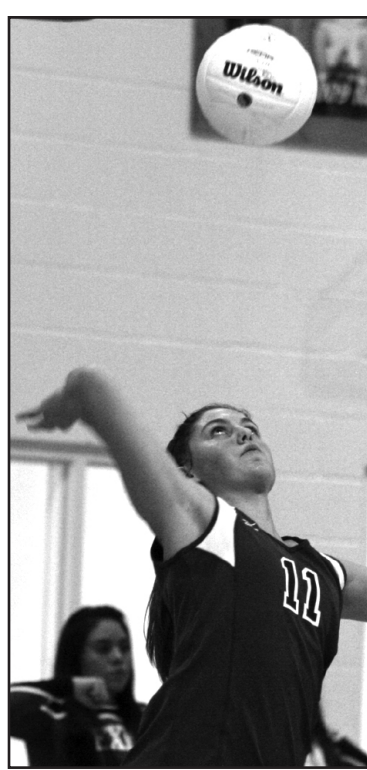
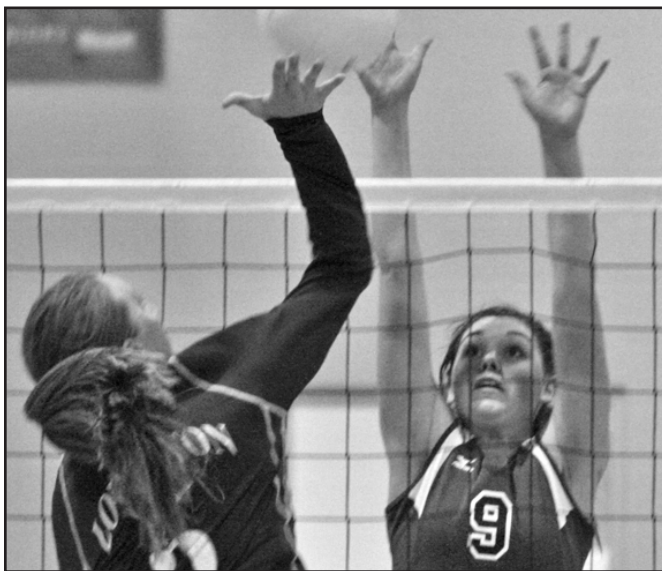

Americans are often accused of indifference towards the democracy they should cherish. Of all the nations in the world where voting is not mandatory, America typically has one of the lowest voter turnouts.

For instance, while the 2008 presidential election attracted the biggest percentage of the voters since 1964, that was still only about 56 percent.

National elections that do not have a presidential race on the ballots draw even less, with a response by the voters being 40 percent or less. But that may change in next week's election.

Some political analysts are astonished by the growth in political participation by the American people since 2008. The inner courts of both political parties are more appalled than astonished, however.

But why anyone would ever complain about more Americans getting more involved in politics?

The reason for that is that the big-government types, both Republican and Democrat, "fear the people" when the people don't do as they're told. They view free speech as a virtue only if those voices are saying something that those political elites want to hear.

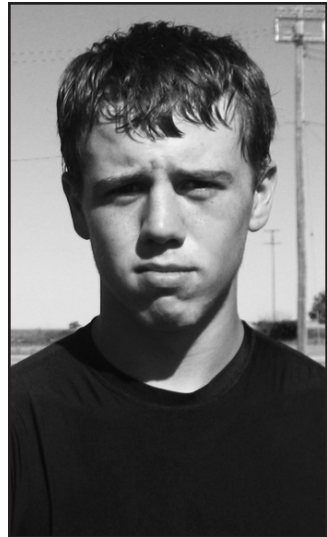

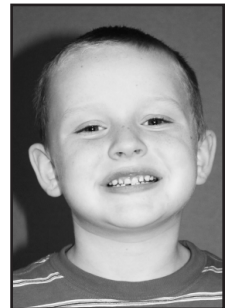

The Texico Wolverines played one of their best games of the season Friday, beating the Tucumcari Rattlers 22-21.

The Wolverines are 4-4 on the year. If they beat Clayton this weekend, they are in the state playoffs; if they lose, they still have a shot to be named an at-large team.

Texico spotted the Rattlers an 8-0 lead. A 31-yard kickoff return by Shay Harrison got to midfield but they could not advance. The teams traded possessions.

Then the Texico offense rose up and in seven plays moved 55 yards for a TD. Big runs by Harrison and Donovan Johnson mixed with a 21-yard pass from Jose Posada to Lucas Walthers culminated in a short scamper for the Posada TD.

Coach Ryan Autrey didn't hesitate and chose to go for the two-point conversion to match Tucumcari. Johnson took the pitch and hammered it in for the tie. The play set the tone for the rest of the game as the Wolverines stood up and answered everything that the Rattlers threw at them.

The energized defense then attacked as Walthers and Brandon King combined for a 5-yard loss. Then King sacked the QB for another 9-yard loss.

On offense, Texico move downfield quickly. Harrison, Jose Posada, Johnson, and Jesus Rivera pounded away. Rivera punched in for 1 TD from the 2. Sergio Posada drilled the kick, giving Texico a 15-8 lead.

The Rattlers then scored on a long TD pass after a surprise onside kick failed, knotting the game at 15 apiece. This ended the scoring in the first half.

Texico opened the 2nd half at its 19 but lost a fumble. The defense held as Rivera and King combined for a sack, and Harrison and Johnson had big stops.

This was the first in a series of miscues as Texico turned the ball over on three consecutive drives.

But the defense came up big as they held Tucumcari without any points from those turnovers. Walthers, Jose Posada, Harrison, Johnson, King, and J.J. Tuls made big plays to thwart the Rattler. The third quarter was scoreless.

In the 4th quarter, Tucumcari drove 46 yards for a TD and a 21-15 lead after the PAT kick was wide left.

After a Texico punt on their first drive of the fourth quarter, Tucumcari drove 46 yards for a touchdown to take the lead 21-15. The extra point try was wide left.

Texico then began a long 75 yard drive of its own. The Wolverines moved the ball on the ground as Elliott Pelfrey, Ali Valles, D.J. Griego, Zach Madrid and Daniel Gomez dominated the line of scrimmage.

Jose Posada scored from the 4 with 3:17 left. The Sergio Posada kick gave Texico a 1-point lead.

The game did not end without drama as the Rattlers battled on. But big tackles by Johnson, Jose Posada, a sack by Alan Valles and pressure by Walthers ended Tucumcari's hopes.

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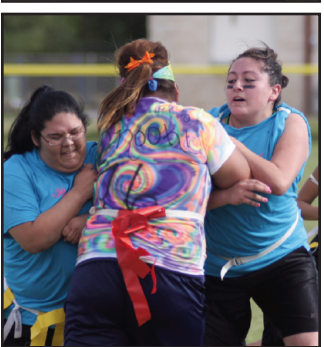

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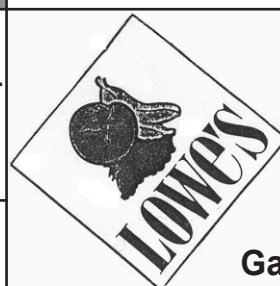
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
