# **Grave in the Garden Reported Empty**

### Man of Galilee **Influenced Many**

Last Friday Jesus of Nazareth was put to death by crucifixion. Today the population of this capitol city was rocked by the startling news that he is alive! Who is this man who has made such an impact on the whole city and country?

Born in the city of Bethlehem about 33 years ago, Jesus spent most of his childhood and youth in Nazareth. He lived with his parents, Joseph and Mary, attending the regular Jewish schools and assisting his father in the carpenter shop.

It is reported that the popular preacher had an intense interest in people. On one of his trips to Jerusalem ten men afflicted with leprosy came to him for help. He directed them to report to the priests for inspection. It was on their way to the temple that they were healed.

Certainly a person who can heal a disease such as leprosy would be considered a desirable member of society.

she was restored to life by the words: "Damsel, I say to you, arise." Some of his followers tell us that even though his friend Lazarus had been dead four days, he called him back to life with the words "Lazarus, come forth." It is not surprising that someone who apparently has power over life and death should be heralded as the Son of God.

Although his ministry was marked with concern and compassion for the masses, he nevertheless did take exception to many of the pronouncements and the activities of the leaders of the church. Because of this attitude, the church leaders refused to accept him.

Religious lawyers sought to discredit him in the eyes of the public. When this failed, they plotted his death. Persuading one of Jesus' own followers Judas Iscariot, to betray him, they succeeded in a conspiracy which ultimately ended in his death But did they really succeed? Today it seems that even death could not silence Jesus of

#### Centurion **Testifies**

The centurion, who was in charge of the crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth and responsible for preserving law and order, gave what may be considered the most eloquent testimony of all in regard to the person who was crucified on Calvary's hill.

He had been a silent witness to all that happened. When questioned soon after the events of Friday, he spoke with conviction. He stated that there had been a great miscarriage of justice, since the words and actions of the man crucified were not those of a man guilty of crime.

When asked who he thought the crucified man was, he replied, "To the best of my knowledge, He was, as He Himself said, the Son of God." That this sort of testimony should come from a man died. trained in the rigors and discipline of the Roman army is indeed surprising. It was then that the opposition took command calling out: "If you release this man, you are not the emperor's friend." Was this a veiled threat? Would Pilate's past misdeeds be reported to Caesar? Reluctantly but deliberately, he washed his hands before the mob. saving: "I am innocent of the blood of this just Person; see to it yourselves." Reluctantly he signed the death warrant for Jesus of Nazareth. Justice finally had been trampled into the dust. Pilate had sold out to the opposition.

This raises some interesting questions: Will Rome condone such action in its courts? Can Pilate continue as Governor? What, in fact, does the future hold for Pilate? Time alone will tell.

#### **Events in Nature Cause Concern**

Phenomena in nature during the past few days have caused the citizens of the area no small concern.

Friday from noon till 3:00 p.m. this city and all the region, possibly the whole world, was ashamed that I haven't spoken out sooner. shrouded in darkness. Never before in the history of man, as far as can be determined, has the words of the scriptures about the Messiah midday sun been completely darkened. This cannot but say that this Jesus is the promised Sor phenomenon was not an eclipse of the sun, since the Passover is held during the period of the full moon, thus making the eclipse impossible.

Two earth tremors of considerable intensity were reported. It seems uncanny if not ominous, that the first quake occurred precisely at the moment Jesus of Nazareth died. The time of the second tremor coincides with the time the Roman guards reported the tomb was opened and found empty.

Such happenings certainly challenge rational and scientific explanation. Can it be that history will pronounce these events "acts of God?"

A few minutes before His death he shouted, he considered Jesus to be the promised Messiah. 'It is finished!'' That appeared to be a shout Nicodemus read the following words from Isaiah: "He is despised and rejected of men; a man o there some other victory or accomplishment He sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised and we esteemed him not. Surely he hath borne our grief, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteen him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities; the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we ar healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all."

Turning from the prophecy, Nicodemus stated "I can't help believing that these words, as well a many others in the prophecy speak of Jesu Christ. You reporters covered his trial. After Lazbuddie, Landon attended Texas Tech University and North Texas University. He and his wife own an E-business and reside in Dallas.


According to his website, at one point, he realized the "day-to-day wasn't fulfilling his need for creativity. That's when he began moonlighting with a pen and paper."

# **Farwell distribution center** to be open in April

Farwell City Council on March 19 heard that the new distribution center will be opening April 1.

The distribution center is a place where residents can take trash that cannot be put into dumpsters. The materials are cleared out to the Clovis dump periodically.

City Street Supt. Gerald Porter said items like tires, batteries, and biohazards are still against the law to dump, but tree branches and larger items will be taken.

For folks who live outside of city limits, there is a \$25 fee for using the distribution center.

In other news, the council:

- Approved Jesus Ramirez, on 8th Street, to close in his carport.

- Cancelled the city election as all city council and mayoral spots were unopposed.

- Changed the policy at the Farwell Cemetery for burying cremated remains. Currently, the rule is that for each plot sold, only one body or 4 cremated remains can be buried per plot.

Mayor Jimmie Mace said other cemeteries are allowing one urn to be burried over a casket.

Mace said that has been asked of Farwell in the past, especially in situations where infants pass away and the family wants the baby buried with a grandparent.

The council asked that the urns be buried at least 2 feet underground, and a ground level marker be placed, instead of a larger headstone.

The council also discussed a clause in the cemetery ordinance that says. fund-raiser "monuments must be made of suitable materials."

Councilman Mario Lara said that he has seen monuments brought in from Mexico that quickly fall apart.

The council decided that marble and granite are okay, and other materials must be approved by the council.

Cooperative sales were very high last year due to record temperatures, drought, wildfires and the high percentage of usage driven by the weather. The coop set an all-time peak demand level of 203 megawatts on Aug. 2.

The net margin for 2012, including G&T capital credits was \$11,252,197, compared to \$11,185,319 the preceding year.

During the year, the co-op installed 43 miles of underground and overhead distribution line to serve 249 new services. Irrigation load added included 218 new services.

Currently, the underground backlog is about 8 to 9 weeks.

Substation No. 24 in the Bovina area was finished just in time to serve the new Cargill facility.

The co-op plans to being a program called Operation Round Up designed to raise money for the co-op's scholarship program or other benevolent purposes.

#### Letter to the Editor

Rural Texas could be the political process. crippled by loss of Universal Service Fund (USF); King bill would help do away with USF support for rural telecommunications, and a crippling blow will be leveled against the economic well-being of rural Texas. That's the message of

Texas "Keep Connected,"a coalition of elected officials, community leaders, emergency responders, health care, education, and private industry officials, and homeowners who are urging the Texas legislature to retain USF support for high cost rural telecommunications services.

USF support is in jeopardy of being removed this legislative session.

State Rep. Ken King, of Canadian, a newly-elected Republican to his House District 88 post, has introduced HB 2835.

"Essentially what this bill would do is keep the fund going for the benefit of rural Texans. Without USF support, rural Texas cannot have affordable phone service. We have nine phone cooperatives in the district. They are providers of last resort -the ones with copper lines going through the houses. In an emergency, that's it, that's what you have," says King, referring to the importance of land lines in rural service.

King's bill awaits a public hearing at the House State Committee. The 13-member panel that makes up John Smithee, who repre- in many rural areas. sents Parmer County.

SB 583 by Sen. John Carona, chairman of the Senate Committee on **Business** and Commerce, and relating to eligibility for support from the USF, is also wending its way through


Chris Barron, of the State Firemen and Fire Marshals Association of Texas, emphasizes the importance of land lines in emergencies. "A reliable form of communications needs to be available. We need to have reliable land lines." savs Barron, who points out wireless that while phones are helpful in emergencies such as wildfires or storms,

they're no substitute for land lines. Because of the sparse population of rural areas and the thin number of customers per square

mile of service area, cost of providing land line service has always been a challenge for rural telecommunications providers.

Joey Anderson, mayor of Muenster, Texas, a community of 1,500 in Cooke County, says there are only four customers per square mile in his area, making phone service challenge. а Customer density is even more sparse in some parts of the service area covered by West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, that provides rural telecommunications in Deaf Smith, Castro, and Parmer counties.

While the trend is toward high speed wireless, Michael Balhoff of Williams and Balholff, a consulting firm specializing in communications Affairs and energy, says wireless providers can't provide the speedier service the committee includes of enhanced broadband






